The booktrade may have been feeling miserable this year, but it has been a good year for co-operatives and collectives generally. In Nottingham several new co-operative businesses have been set up recently, for example the Nottingham Cycle Company and the Veggies food van, and we urge you to support them and thus support workers control - not controlled workers. Communication between Nottingham co-ops is improving and this autumn the Notts co-ops also began to establish international links when a delegation from co-ops in Zimbabwe visited Nottingham. In the new year we should have an illustrated leaflet about the local co-ops to give away.

When we wrote the equivalent notes last year we ended that 'we hope by protest and resistance (and good bookselling) we can all make it through to 1985'. Well, we've just about managed to reach 1985. We can only insert in that sentence '1986' and hope for the best.

Introduction

Mushroom is Nottingham's alternative bookshop. We are the only independent locally owned bookshop in the city centre and the shop is run and owned by its workers. For this list we have picked out a small selection of books from our stock which we think would be particularly suitable as presents for yourself or for friends, or which we're excited about and would like to draw to peoples attention. We will try to keep all the books listed in stock, but please bear with us if we run out of some, or if publishers put the prices up. As well as books, we stock badges, pamphlets magazines, book tokens, posters, candles and joss. Also for this time of year we will have radical Xmas cards, CND wrapping paper and peace crackers! We have also a free notice-board on which people can publicize events, contacts, campaigns etc all the year round.

For the radical booktrade, this year has been most interesting - well, quite depressing to Many shops (not us) are in very grave trouble as they have never reached a stage where they can ride out a financial downturn. Several shops and publishers have closed. Surprisingly, some new shops are opening and the Federation of Radical Booksellers have just brought out a manual on how to run a bookshop which should help. Ironically, several shops are reporting that the increased availability of 'our' sort of titles in the 'high street' shops is drawing off trade and creaming off the profitable lines of radical books which could formerly be found only in alternative bookshops. We're certainly finding that books an areas like feminism, gay writing, vegetarianism, war and peace, selp-help health are no longer just to be found here - a mixed blessing!

The one area that's more worrying is the seizure of gay books from several shops especially from Gays The Word. A leaflet is enclosed which explains what has happened to them. This is also an appropriate moment to mention the miners' strike - we have a collection box for them on the desk and will be selling xmas cards for NUM welfare funds.

To conclude this little chapter of misery we - in this case the booktrade as a whole are having to campaign to stop the government putting VAT on books. With VAT on sanitary towels and chips to name but two it is obvious that VAT is not a tax on luxuries but a way of loading more of the burden of taxation on to the poor. We are now resisting the government putting this tax on knowledge. A separate leaflet is available and we urge you to do all in your power to keep VAT off books. Then after that we suggest you use any remaining energy in trying to create a more just, free and peaceful society!

The good news is that we're still here, the shop's stock and sales continue to expand as do the movements and ideas with which Mushroom is associated. Particularly welcome to us has been the enormous growth in interest in vegetarianism and animal rights and the continued impact of the peace movement which reached new heights locally this summer with the Reclaim Chilwell action and, a week later, the biggest peace gathering ever in the city at the peace festival. ideas are applicable now. Good introduction to Morris.

*WILLIAM MORRIS TODAY. (Institute of Contemporary Art) £6.95. This is the catalogue of the exhibition this summer at the ICA. Whether you like the exhibition

or not this book is well worth looking at.

*BOOK OF VERSE. William Morris (Scolar) £4.95. This facsimile of the original handwritten and designed book which Morris wrote for Georgy Burne-Jones, clearly shows Morris' love of calligraphy and use of decorations throughout the pages. *WILLIAM MORRIS: DREAMER OF DREAMS. Richard Boston (Old Hammond Press) 65p. These are two well written, amusing essays on Morris' ideas and how these ideas are still relevant today. Second pamphlet by Nottingham's newest publisher. The author is well known to Guardian readers.

*BEAUTY OF LIFE. William Morris (Brentham Press) 80p. An address delivered in Birmingham in 1880, this pamphlet was first published under the title 'Labour and Pleasure verses Labour and Sorrow' but I think the present title sounds better. *WILLIAM MORRIS AND THE MIDDLE AGES. edited by Joanna Banham & Jennifer Harris (Manchester University Press) £8.95. An impressive book of essays together with the catalogue for the exhibition at the Whitworth Art Gallery which is on until the new year. Both book and exhibition have been well reviewed.

*UPROOTING WAR. Brian Martin (Freedom) £4.00. A book about developing strategies for grassroot activists to challenge and replace the war system. The author looks at ways of confronting institutions such as the state, bureaucracy, the military and patriarchy.

*HOUSING IS THEFT, HOUSING IS FREEDOM. Colin Ward (Old Hammond Press/Mushroom) £1.00. This pamphlet argues for dweller control of housing and against the socialists who think they know how best the people should live and those conservatives who know nothing about how people live at all.

*THE EDUCATION OF DESIRE: THE ANARCHIST GRAPHICS OF CLIFF HARPER. (Anarres Pub) £4.95. Cliff Harper's art is familiar to many people in the radical movement. Now available from America, this is a carefully chosen collection of Emma Goldman's most significant, yet largely unpublished, writings from the tumultuous final four years of her life. *SERIOUS POLITICS BEGINS WITH THE BOMB.Laurens Otter (Anarchist Arguments 3) 50p. Subtitle: Taking up the Socialist Challenge on the Lessons of the First Wave. Large format pamphlet which examines the failure of the first wave of CND and its relationship with the left, so that we can learn from past mistakes. It argues that the movement which will abolish the Bomb will be one that shuns elitism and insists on rank and file decisions, placing emphasis on direct action.

*WRITINGS OF THE VANCOUVER FIVE. (Free the Five Defence Group) 75p. Our economic and social system which subjects people to poverty and degradation, is upheld by a system of law designed to isolate, imprison and punish those who are impoverished or who try to resist the ongoing injustices. Here are the writings of five resisters together with information about the 'justice' they have been subjected to.

*ANARCHO-SYNDICALISM: RACISM AND STRUGGLE. (South London Direct Action Movement) 15p. New pamphlet written with the hope of provoking a dialogue with militants and workers of all races.



*ACID RAIN. Steve Elsworth (Pluto) £3.95. With all the recent publicity about the CEGB's unwillingness to acknowledge their responsibility on acid rain this book explains what acid rain is, what and where is affected and what can be done about it..







A few other areas are also worth mentioning. The 1st. International Feminist Bookfair happened all over Britain earlier this year and at short notice a group of local women organised two well-supported events. One a talk by Ellen Kuzwayo with the showing of her film and the other a series of readings from poets and writers, including Sunita Namjoshi.

This group has stayed together and will be organising a series of book events with us next year. We would like to thank them for the effort put into the events and hope that they will be as successful next year.

Library supply now represents about a quarter of our income and we welcome the opportunity to supply more libraries. This year we should become a recognised supplier for schools and colleges in Notts. and would be happy to talk to any teacher or librarian who might want to work with us. Stocking text books - Open University, art, sociology and English has increased but quite often we only hear that we are a recommended bookshop when students come in expecting to find the books. This then is a plea to lecturers to check their booklists with us early!

We held our first users meeting this autumn and this has given us lots of suggested changes which in the new year we hope to get round to. We welcome constructive criticism so please - if you want the shop to change, or want new sections to be created, let us know. Having said that - changing can be slow - we are discussing having separate black studies and lesbian sections and to do this we have to virtually re-arrange the entire shop. We still can never seem to put child care books where pregnant women can reach them. But we are trying.

One unfortunate item we have to mention is shop-lifting. We've had a plague of shop-lifting of art books and politics books especially. This drives us up the wall when we find that trying to extend the range of books available in the city is met by a few people wanting free books at our expense. It is not our policy to involve the police when we catch shop-lifters: cleaning out our cellars is much worse! Shoplifters please go to commercial shops or join a library if you can't afford books.

We put a lot of effort this autumn into hosting a national Federation of Radical Booksellers conference. These conferences happen three times a year, and are a chance for radical booksellers from around the country to meet each other, swap ideas, information and books - as well as to have more formal discussions. For the Nottingham conference, we also introduced 'training workshops' led by people who could teach us about particular aspects of the book trade, such as library supply. The conference and the social on the Sunday evening both went well, with the last minute panics by us as organisers going unnoticed by other people, and we would like to thank everyone who has helped us on that. In particular, we would like to thank everyone who offered or provided accomodation for visiting booksellers. We ended up with more places than we needed so whether or not your offer was taken up, it was very welcome - after all we can't have booksellers kipping on the pavements, can we?
