Marking the beginning of the Nuclear Age, July 16

BBC Radio 4 transmitted live the tolling of the bells of St. Martin in the Fields. Fifty times, one for each year since the first atomic explosion in Almagordo, USA. We marked our pain at the beginning of the nuclear age by 'dying', silently, covering all Trafalgar Square.

Over three thousand people came to hear survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and of the French atmospheric testing in the Pacific. We heard poems and testimonies from downwind victims of testing at Christmas Island and the US desert. The connections were made with the present arms race, and the new nuclear nightmare of nuclear weapons states pointing 'smaller' bombs at the Third World. We left, inspired by a leader of the French peace movement reminding us that we had stopped atmospheric tests before, and we can stop all tests now.

Confronting the new nuclear nightmare

Campaigning in the run-up to the NPT Conference last spring sometimes felt as though we were banging our heads against a brick wall. Then suddenly, mid-June 1995, just as we were faltering, the brick wall gave way.

Worldwide condemnation of France's decision to re-start nuclear testing prompted media coverage epitomised by the Guardian's full-pager headlined "The Return of the Nuclear Nightmare". The public response has been overwhelming, matched only by CND groups and activists' readiness to take to the streets, armed with French wine bottles, petitions, leaflets, placards and the confidence of those who know that their issue says: NOW!

People worldwide commemorated the anniversaries of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. I remembered as the police officer at Faslane on Nagasaki Day asked us in the police van: "What were you thinking of when you blockaded the base?" "Do you know what they do in there?" an arrestee asked him. "I don't care what they do in there", he replied, to which came the calm statement, "We do".

We condemn Chirac's decision with the full knowledge that IT IS JUST A SYMPTOM of a system that allows nuclear terrorism in all its manifestations. The NPT Conference failed everybody and we are facing a new nuclear nightmare. It is our challenge in the coming months to turn the tide of opposition to nuclear tests into a movement for a Global Ban on nuclear weapons. No ifs, no buts: No nukes. The only possibility for a real future.

Stop Nuclear Testing

When, on June 14, President Chirac announced that France would conduct up to eight underground nuclear tests between September 95 and May 96, the world seemed to finally wake up to the fact that the nuclear nightmare is not over.

CND must pull out all the stops if it is to help thwart Chirac but our job does not stop there. It is equally essential that we highlight China's testing programme, Britain's deployment of Trident and, above all, the urgent need to start negotiations immediately for a global nuclear ban.

Boycott News

Much of the press interest in the anti-testing campaign has focused on the boycott, as many activists around the country can testify. There have been many photo opportunities for those keen to pour French wine down the drain.

Around the world news show that 80% of New Zealanders are boycotting French goods, spontaneous boycotts of French wine

are widespread in the Netherlands, Germany, Norway, and are spreading daily to other European countries. The level of protest in the Pacific countries is even more intense, with talk even of breaking off diplomatic relations.

CND has already collected thousands of pledges to boycott French goods around the country, as activists leaflet High Streets, supermarkets and off-licenses with petitions in hand. CND is calling for individuals to support the boycott as their tangible show of disagreement with the French government's decision.

To help to publicise the boycott campaign the British Nuclear Test Ban Coalition with the generous support of Media Natura have produced a 30 second boycott advert for showing in cinemas. This takes the form of a "Day of the Jackal" spoof where the message hits home to a Chirac look alike by shooting the bottle of French Wine on his dinner table. French testing

● Local campaigning against the French plans have demonstrated widespread support for CND's message so far: keep up the good work and let us know of any particularly interesting or original actions you do.

● if you live within reach of London, come along to the French Embassy protests in Knightsbridge on Tuesdays, 5.00 - 7.30pm.

● ask people to send faxes to Jacques Chirac on 00 33 1 47422465 with messages of opposition to his plans.

● tens of thousands of petitions and pledges are already coming into the Office. Please keep them pouring in.

If the French Test

● if you can reach Knightsbridge, we are asking people to go to the French Embassy *as soon as possible* after hearing the news.

● if you are not near London, try to mark the test with vigils, boycott actions, shadow-painting and lots of letters to local and national press.



● CND will be calling a demonstration at the French Embassy, 58 Knightsbridge at 1pm on the first Saturday after a French test. Please start planning for this now by compiling lists of people who might come down, checking out coach companies etc. This protest should be massive.

● CND is planning to send a

coach to Paris for a big international demonstration against French testing on September 30. Tickets are £40 and bookings should be made with Anna Rehin on 0171 700 2349 or 01273 476358.

Chinese testing

● If, as we believe is likely, the Chinese test again in the autumn, CND will call an immediate protest at the Chinese Embassy. Ring the office for details if you hear of a Chinese test.

Day Schools

● CND is encouraging groups and regions to organise Campaigning Dayschools for the autumn to help activists get to grips with the facts and arguments around the new nuclear nightmare and thus to more effectively talk to local media, people in the street etc about why nuclear weapons are an urgent issue again. Why is France testing?

From the small amounts of information made public by the French government it is clear that the purpose of the tests is weapons development rather than stockpile safety.

The first test will involve a warhead for the new generation of nuclear missile submarines. It is a multiple independently targetable (MIRVed) warhead with high earth penetration capability and stealth characteristics. It is significantly

more sophisticated than anything France currently deploys.

The next two tests will verify the performance of a nuclear trigger. Chirac was deliberately vague as to whether this was a new or an old design of trigger.

The last four or five tests will be for the development of PALEN - France's programme for laboratory and computer simulation. These tests will probably double up as tests for new warheads - a warhead for deployment in the next 10 to 15 years, an air to ground missile (similar to the cancelled British

TASM).

The crucial point is that the purpose of these tests is to assure the French status as a nuclear weapons power well into the next century. More importantly, France will continue, for the foreseeable future, to be able to develop and deploy new nuclear weapons systems.

China Sneaks Another Test

China carried out an underground nuclear test on Thursday 17 August at 0100 GMT. The bomb exploded in Xinjiang Autonomous Region causing a seismic event, measured at 5.6 on the Richter scale.


It was the 43rd known Chinese test (the UK has done 44). The previous test took place three days after the end of the NPT Conference in May 1995. It is likely that there will be another test before the end of the year, and they plan to continue into 1996 until the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) is signed.

Now that the US and France have agreed to a 'zero yield' for the CTBT - no tests of any description with explosive yield - it is time for China to drop its demands for so-called 'peaceful nuclear explosions' to be exempted from the test ban.

It is also time for public awareness to be raised about China's unwillingness to stop testing and developing its nuclear arsenal. The high profile of French tests must be used to keep China's tests in the public eye. In London, on August 17, CND organised a demo at the Chinese Embassy attended by over 100 people, many active in the Stop the French Testing Campaign. Demonstrators maintained a continuous protest from 12 noon to a candlelit vigil at 10.00pm accompanied by a constant cacophony of supporting car horns from the passing traffic

Britain and the French tests

French Testing and Tactical Trident

Why is John Major so reluctant to criticise Chirac over French tests? Because Britain also wants to carry out nuclear tests, and for the same reason: to develop a low-yield warhead for use against the Third World. If this can be developed, it will be fitted to 'Tactical Trident', the single-warhead version of Trident tasked with defending Britain's 'vital interests'. Tactical Trident will become operational in December, carrying either the current 100 kiloton warhead or a new 'low-yield' version.

We must oppose not only the French nuclear tests, but also *what is being tested*. A principal purpose of

the tests is to develop a warhead for France's new air-launched nuclear missile, the Air-Sol Longue Portee (ASLP). This missile was originally to have been a joint Anglo-French production. ASLP is pointed at the South; the yield of its TN-100 warhead can be decreased to produce only a few kilotons of destructive power - for use against non-nuclear enemies.

We must protest against the development of new, more 'useable' nuclear weapons, on either side of the Channel. We must resist the threat of British tests as well as the reality of French tests. We must say 'Don't point Trident (or ASLP) at the Third World'.

Covert UK missile test in the US as anger at France mounts

On July 24 the UK spent another £18 million firing a (thankfully) 'unarmed' missile off the coast of Florida, in the US.

French nuclear testing and the new UK Trident warheads are two sides of the same coin - a race to install new nuclear weapon systems before international disarmament obligations catch up with the smaller nuclear powers.

The crew of HMS Victorious are being taught by US experts to "safely handle, maintain and operate" the US-designed and manufactured Trident D5 missiles which are part of the UK's 'independent' nuclear stockpile.

Victorious will be launched into international waters later this year with a 'tactical' role. This means that single warhead-equipped missiles, each capable of a strike ten times the power of the Hiroshima bomb, may be targeted on non-nuclear weapon states to defend "British interests".

How does this square with the UK's recommitment to nuclear disarmament in May at the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty Conference?

The firing was carried out under the command of Commander J.H. Gordon, Royal Navy. Might he benefit from a letter or two asking what it's all for? (c/o Ministry of Defence, Main Building, Whitehall, London SW1A 2HB.)

Time to Lobby

CND is organising a lobby of Parliament on Tuesday 17 October, to coincide with the annual debate on the Defence Estimates.

This will be a crucial time to lobby MPs. The debate will be held on the first two days after the summer recess. This is our chance to put our message of no more nuclear testing, no more nuclear weapons at the top of the political agenda.

This year, for the first time, the Statement on the Defence Estimates 1995 (SDE95), published annually by the Ministry of Defence refers to developing a new nuclear weapon system to replace Trident, in a section on Aldermaston and nuclear weapons research.


SDE also includes a new section on nuclear accident response ("the risk of a defence nuclear accident is extremely small"). This section is likely to be a response to the work done by CND, Scottish CND and Nukewatch in recent years on nuclear warhead convoy safety and safety of nuclear submarines.

The annual SDE debate is a good opportunity for MPs to raise nuclear issues in the House of Commons. John Major clearly needs to be pressed further on nuclear testing by MPs on both sides of the House.

Unlike the US Congress, the UK Parliament cannot make any amendments to its Statement on the Defence Estimates. MPs must either vote for or against the whole document. This year some MPs will be voting against SDE95 on principle because it includes sections on nuclear weapons. If you think your MP might support this position please write to her/him. In any case please contact your MP and ask to meet her/him at the lobby of Parliament on Tuesday 17 October.

CND in Action

The West Midlands Peace Caravan Tour was the most successful ever. It went to Oswestry, Ludlow, Hereford and Evesham and collected almost 3000 signatures against the resumption of French testing. The tour was covered by all the local papers and by Shropshire radio.

Watford CND reports that both Labour and Conservative councillors deplored the decision of the French government to resume nuclear testing. They gave unanimous backing to a motion to write to M.Chirac and to the mayor of Watford's twin town, Nanterre; and lobby MPs and MEPs on the issue.

Nottingham CND held a cheese and wine party on the streets of the

city, offering English cheese and Australian wine in a bid to persuade people to boycott French produce.

Hailsham & Eastbourne CND sent a giant postcard to President Chirac signed by over 300 people calling on the French government to scrap its plans for testing in the Pacific.

Irish CND has been holding regular demonstrations outside the French Embassy in Dublin and the consulate in Cork to protest nuclear tests. They have also been working on trying to get a response from Irish politicians on the transport of a nuclear warhead on the Irish sea on its way to Coulport.

Orpington CND met with their MP John Horam concerning the NPT and the MP suggested that the group knows more about the issues than he does; he would find out the official view of the government on a set of questions compiled by a CND member.

South Cheshire and North Staffs CND got good press coverage of their anti French testing actions, including a photograph in the paper pouring French wine (the real thing!) down the drain.

WoMenwith Hill Women's Peace Camp has been a highly noticeable presence at the US base this summer, an example being "Peace Truth Justice Freedom Wimmin" painted in bright red paint on Antenna L 'golf ball' which has resulted in charges of £21,504 in criminal damage. Book Review Nuclear Wastelands

A Global Guide to Nuclear Weapons Production and Its Health and Environmental Effects

Extract from The Guardian review, July 9 1995

At almost £35 copies will not be flooding local CNDs, but it is an important book to be aware of. The editor, Dr.Arjun Makhijani, makes the point that although no one has been killed by a nuclear bomb in wartime since the Nagasaki explosion, thousands have died in their production and testing.

Accidents, leakages, breakdowns, the list of nuclear negligence is endless, and to it can be added the activities known to be dangerous but to which people are subjected to with minimum advice. Uranium mining, for example, carries the highest risk for health of the whole nuclear weapons production cycle, and its victims are estimated in thousands.

The exhaustive research compiled in the book shows that the majority of the victims are anonymous, ignored and most have no chance of redress. The authors calculate that "hundreds of thousands of excess cancer deaths" have resulted and are still resulting from radiation doses due to nuclear testing in the atmosphere.

The clearest message in this wide ranging book is that secrecy also kills. No nuclear power has transparent information policies, all have falsified records in some way and some, especially China and France, have hardly given data at all.

No future research into nuclear weapons will be credible unless it refers to this study.

Nuclear Alert at Rugby

Between 7.30 and 8.30am on Friday 7th July a train carrying power station waste pulled into Rugby station for a routine train crew change. Passengers on the station and/or railway staff heard 'crackling' noises and sounded the alert. The train was moved to sidings and Nuclear Electric's incident team called. They arrived four hours later. Police and fire crews sealed off the area and advised people in homes within 50 metres to shut their windows and doors and stay inside. The train station was not evacuated. At one point it was admitted that there was a defect with one of the flasks but officials maintained throughout that there was no escape of radiation. At about 2.30pm the train was allowed to continue even

though it was not known what was causing the problem with either flask or wagon. Thanks to some excellent on the spot work by Tom Cuthbert, the BBC and local radio gave it full coverage.

The event triggered an efficient and prompt response from many CND activists across the country who monitored the developments and ensured the press were alerted. Paul Hawkes of CND London Region's Nuclear Trains Working Group reports the Department of Transport say flask E83 caused concern but the event was an 'abnormal occurrence', and not a 'notifiable incident'. The chances of a radiation leak would depend on the severity of crack and length of the incident. More information from Paul Hawkes tel 0181 533 42 81.

A Personal View from Hiroshima

One of the first activities I ever took part in when I became involved in CND was a simple candle floating ceremony on Hiroshima Day. To be in Hiroshima and Nagasaki for the 50th Anniversary Commemorations as a guest of the Japanese Peace Movement was a remarkable experience.

After my first visit to the A-bomb Museum two thoughts were uppermost in my mind. One was that all political and military leaders should be made to visit Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The other was that British nuclear policy is based on the willingness to inflict suffering on an unimaginable scale in 'defence of British vital interests'. As my time in

Japan went on I felt more and more angry and ashamed about Trident, THORP and the whole nuclear obsession of the British Government.

The Hibakusha who have suffered the mental and physical scars for 50 years yet have devoted themselves to working for a nuclear free world are a shining example of true humanity. The victims of nuclear testing who were also in Japan showed similar dignity and courage in their determination to convey the truth of their experience and to stop the nuclear madness. We have to do everything we can to work in solidarity with them.

To stand by the A-Bomb Dome at the side of the river which was filled with the dead and dying fifty years

ago in Hiroshima is to know beyond any intellectual argument that humanity cannot live with the Bomb. This is the challenge for the rest of history. Politicians look ahead to the next opinion poll, the next election. Have we the vision to look ahead for centuries and millenia and really begin to create a culture that makes another Hiroshima or Nagasaki impossible? I believe that we have if we determine never to look away from the truth of those terrible days in August fifty years ago.

Hibakusha Tour

The "Hear the Hibakusha" tour during June and July took survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki to 13 cities around Britain. All in all it was hugely successful with well attended public meetings, much local and national media coverage and widespread appreciation that these survivors of the bomb have something important and distinctive to tell us. Their accounts of what happened on those terrible days, August 6th and 9th 1945, were a moving reminder to all who came to listen of why our campaign for a nuclear free world is so important.

In many of the cities visited, cherry trees and plaques were planted by the Hibakusha and local

dignitaries to the memory of the victims of the atomic bombings. In Scotland they visited the Faslane peace camp to see the base for Trident - with its destructive capability of 3000 Hiroshimas - in Cumbria they visited the Sellafield reprocessing plant and when in Reading they paid a visit with local campaigners to the Aldermaston atomic weapons establishment. In Coventry they took part in the filming of a 'Songs of Praise' programme which was

broadcast by the BBC on Hiroshima day itself. At the end of the tour, Masao Morihara and Reiko Yamada spoke movingly at the July 16th Trafalgar Square Rally against nuclear testing.

I am sure that many people who had the privilege to meet them were struck as I was by how brave and dignified were these people who know better than any of us what nuclear really mean.

Nagasaki Day Actions

Faslane Peace Camp

Over 200 people attended the Nagasaki Action at the Clyde Submarine Base, Faslane on August 9th.

Thirty five were arrested for blockading and entering the base, including activists from Belgium, Holland, Germany and as far out as New Zealand.

A week of events had preceded the action, starting with a shelf clearance of French produce from Marks & Spencer's stores in Glasgow and Edinburgh on Thursday 3 August. There were also various activities throughout the seven days including interactive theatre at the MoD offices in Glasgow, films and a demo at the Edinburgh Military Tattoo. The latter however was met with furious police hysteria - they snatched our "Stop Promoting

War" banner, broke someone's nose and arrested others.

On the night before the action we had a torchlit procession to the Trident area at Faslane saw an effigy of the 'Fat Man' - the Nagasaki bomb, being burned on the razor wire.

Hiroshima Commemoration in Keswick

Nearly 500 people gathered in Crow Park, Keswick, on Sunday 6 August in the evening for the dedication and floating of candles on Derwentwater to commemorate the victims of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima 50 years ago.

The contrasting silhouettes of Skiddaw and Grisdale Pike formed the backdrop as Peter Whitaker read Lord Judd's inspiring message of support by the light of this flaming torch.

The torches and steady rhythm of the two drummers attracted much attention. Many joined the procession as it wound through the town centre displaying with banners and placards the simple message NO MORE HIROSHIMAS.

A bright white moon cast its light over the calm surface of Derwentwater as the tiny coloured boats slowly transported the candles towards deeper water. The simplicity and symbolism of the ceremony was very impressive.

Their prompt response was effective and the show was cancelled, with pieces in the local and international press - whilst in Cuba, a CND member heard of the cancellation on CNN World News!

Atomic Mirror Pilgrimage 1995.



conference. Please tell your regional council rep. your preferences so that Council can make the decision as democratically as possible.

Elections will take place at Conference, for the Chair, Treasurer, three Vice-Chairs and 20 members of the national Council for 1996.

There will also be an innovative range of workshops to learn and share experiences with other members and activists. This year for the first time we are introducing public sessions, with well known figures to take advantage of the recent upsurge in interest in nuclear issues.

The building is accessible to people with disabilities and a creche will be provided for those with children (please mention on your registration form if you will require the creche). There will be a bar on Friday evening to welcome people to Manchester and a social on Saturday night.
