



have been enabled to ensure that the day reflects and celebrates their achievement.


We invested the time required to ensure that the event was not a 'publicity stunt' but a celebration and validation of the fact that local communities, acting together, can achieve real change.


Given that the programme did not choose to invest in buildings but people we need to invest more time to demonstrate the impact of this investment.


Falling in Love in NG7



A visit to Uhuru By Arvinda

am a volunteer with the Partnership Council. I work for approximately four hours a week. To further my work, I recently accompanied a colleague on two visits to a group called 'Uhuru' who meet ccally. I found the visits extremely valuable. The following is some of what discovered during them.

Jhuru is a group for black (African-Caribbean) men. It congregates once a week at Hyson Green Community Centre. Its users originate citywide. There are about 15 men 'on the books' seven or eight of whom attend on a regular basis. The benefits Uhuru provides are many. They include opportunities to socialise, with the enhanced quality of life that can oring; talk over problems with others, and the cathartic effect that can have; help avoid isolation (insularity is never a good thing); keep active; learn new skills; make and maintain friendships; do something creative; relax; and not least of all, have fun. Uhuru also provides recreational activities for its members, such as visiting the cinema, going bowling, visiting the oub, and attending the Boys' Club. It also organises day-trips, a trip to Blackpool was a recent example. Uhuru members select these activities, democratically.

Uhuru is not a group for black men with osychiatric problems: it is for all black men, regardless of their mental health. However many with mental health difficulties attend. The benefits and opportunities available to mentally ill men of coming to such a group are numerous. Those listed above for non-sufferers are all also positive steps towards improving poor mental health.

Those men who attend Uhuru who have mental health problems feel comfortable and secure there. There are other groups in the City for these sufferers. However these are for the exclusive use of those with psychiatric disorders. The users who attend Uhuru feel that by going to Uhuru they avoid the stigma connected with attending a centre used solely by those with psychiatric problems: they do not wish to be labelled as mentally ill, with all the negative associations and prejudices that can come with that.

The other support groups are mainstream. Some black men are mistrustful of these as they feel that mainstream mental health provision fails to understand their

ifestyles. Some also fear that they may be treated differently because they are black. These are not a problem at Uhuru since mainly black workers run it.

Feeling part of a community is therapeutic or anyone with poor mental health, since ne mentally ill often feel isolated and nsecure. Another advantage of attending Jhuru is that being together with other placks, togetherness with one's own people, as some see it, can provide aluable understanding and support for

Update:

New Leisure Centre Proposal.

Since the summer and the completion of consultation work on the project, the City Council has been working on the initial conceptual design drawings for the Leisure Centre, and assessing the cost implications of the project. The present drawings incorporate leisure water (fun pool), deck level swimming pool, large fitness suite, health suite, sports hall and meeting rooms. The Project Team are currently furthering the development of these designs, and have plans to compile a detailed business plan, and investigate potential sources of funding. In addition preliminary work on assessing the design features needed to meet environmental considerations has also taken place.

At this stage the development of the project is still at a very early stage and the conceptual drawings are likely to change regularly. Trying to create an Economically Strong Community

Future Business Strategy

Introduction

The Partnership Council Business Forum contributed its views to the URBAN Action Plan, written by local people who lived and worked in the Partnership Council Area. The Action Plan informed the spend of approximately £5 million up to the end of December 2001. A key element of the Action Plan was a business related agenda for change and the ideas culminated in a Business Strategy, developed by the Business Community and implemented over the last 2/3 years.

The purpose of this document is to review the strategy, identify the achievements, identify areas where there has been limited progress, identify new areas where the business community believes additional developments are required and to progress a new strategy to continue to the development of an 'economically strong community."
