





Inside, a new heating system has been installed (which should be a relief to all) and having had a full year of computerisation we are now better able to control our stock. 



Dissenting writers are few and far between, but we do have John Pilger. In his new collection Distant Voices (Vintage, £6.99) Pilger writes in his usual ascerbic style about the Gulf War, Disneyland and other recent horrors. Sometimes Pilger adopts unlikely heroes (as in his recent praise for Militant) but mostly he acutely dissects the world around us. Not a cheerful book, but essential reading.

Labour Party members will be rushing to read DEFEAT FROM THE JANS OF VICTORY by Mike Margusee and Richard Hefferman (Verso, £9.95) which is published in November. Leaving aside that the writers are from a group called Labour Briefing who have been as unsuccessful as it's possible to be in politics this book looks at how Labour under N.K. lost its policies, its members, its credibility, its finance and the election. Sounds pretty careless if true. Still, as Labour is still some 3,000 times bigger than Briefing, plus it has an MP or two ...

Edited by Margaret Busby - herself well known as a Black Publisher - this is a massive anthology which covers the whole of Africa, the diaspora and from ancient Egypt to modern times. This massive book (1000 pages) contains prose, poetry, autobiography and non-fiction. £30 is, well, £30, but you will find yourself dipping into this work for years to come. £23.01 cheaper is another excellent anthology Breaking Ice (Vintage) which is a good introduction to African-American writing, men and women. Terry McMillan is the editor. She also has a new book out of her own, Waiting to Exhale (Doubleday, £14.99) which has been getting rave reviews. Alice Walker, Gloria Naylor and (closer to home) Joan Riley all have new novels out this year (Possessing the Secret of Joy, Bailey's Cafe and A Kindness to the Children). Toni Morrison also has a major novel out, Jazz (Chatto, £14.99) which is a fictional portrayal of Black American urban

life in the 1920s. Also from Toni Morrison is Playing in the Dark: whiteness and the literary imagination which examines race in Willa Cather, Melville, Hemingway and other white American writers.


