SQUATTERS POURED INTO MOULD

'Activist structures appear to be highly vulnerable to manipulation by individuals with a preset agenda that rest on creating and leading a 'consensus' to an already decided outcome and trajectory. The main feature of these models is usually noticeable in their inflexibility, emphasis on production 'efficiency' and focus on 'getting shit done'. This is done under a facade of collective decision making and 'inclusion'. These forms of 'non-hierarchical consensus decision making' are just as vulnerable to passive aggressive power dynamics as other forms of organisation. The power dynamic is suppressed but is diffused into the very form of the structure itself, establishing 'permitted' limits of action and dialogue on the 'participants' - 325 magazine #6, p.5

I attended the national Squat Meeting in Bristol on March 13-15. A £3 million 'mansion' was temporarily occupied, a building left to turn to mould for 2+ years while awaiting planning permission for development into luxury apartments in the extremely fancy and insular Clifton 'village' area. The owner and builders turned up before the gathering started and were reassured with promises by 'the squatters' to move out on the Monday following

the event as the builders were said to be due to start work (it was felt by 'the negotiators' that the workers' livelihoods should not be unnecessarily affected). The owner's security kept an eye throughout on who was coming and going, supposedly under the pretence that the builders' tools were in the building (which they had the opportunity to take but chose not to; and when the squat crew left on Monday no one was searched anyway).

From what I was able to find out publicity for the event had been very limited in Bristol itself, due to fears that local squatters would use the opportunity of having a 'free space' to try and have a party in town (which has been largely impossible in recent years due to police repression); curious reasoning, assuming an inability to hold down a space with direction and purpose. The current economic situation has slowed and even halted much building work, so this could be a good time to promote squatting for much needed housing, as rents, deposits, and the cost of living continue to rise disproportionately (the poor get screwed still further) and more buildings become left unused. Why are there not more squats? In Bristol there have been - as in other towns - flurries of

illegal evictions as gentrification continues, though in some instances deals have been made with owners of both buildings and (traveller) sites. In the battle to retake access to space, resources, decision-making etc, taking a space and making an agreement with the owners and police might be the pragmatic option, but isn't one which constitutes much hope or which sends a clear message of total resistance.

No contact was made with local housing/homeless groups or individuals, so this event was very much an in-growth of the UK squat/activist ghetto. In other countries such as, for example, Greece and Mexico, activists/revolutionaries/anarchists (call them what you will) have only succeeded in going beyond a self-contained 'alternative' scene or an isolated vanguard by adapting to local circumstances and ditching ideological pretensions in order to attack the State/corporate world continuously. This has resulted in a groundswell of community and solidarity.

Aside from an excellent talk on lock-picking (the tools and guides are available on the internet, get practicing!), a discussion on networking (within pre-existing 'activist' networks), and a resisting **Continued on the inside...**

evictions skill-share, the level of discussion floundered on the shores of the lowest common denominator (not helped by drunk/anaesthetised 'participants'). It seemed that voices were being silenced and ideas at odds with those of the facilitator(s) of the already long discussions held in a large group were being rapidly bypassed in order to reach decisions that seemed to have been pre-decided. Most of anything interesting happened informally, outside the hastily invented timetable of discussions and 'workshops' (the latter not light engineering – that had already been mostly completed by the time the Gathering started).

In these times when the Global Market seems to teetering on the brink, while simultaneously the military and politicians are initiating new forms of repression and technological control, I left this Squatters Gathering feeling that an opportunity had been missed by the participants to further direct action and resistance, and

am still unsure as to what the remit of the weekend had been.

In many spaces in the UK supposedly oriented toward action and DIY ethics (and throughout society in general) drink and drugs have created an atmosphere which marginalises sobriety and promotes a false sense of group coherence (lifestyle politics). Becoming resistant requires a clear head and decisive, continuous action. In the early stages of deprogramming (and very occasionally further down the line), 'drugs' can function as a springboard of inspiration and connection with an 'outside'; but with training these experiments don't need to be endlessly repeated until our bodies and minds have been

MUSIC REVIEWS

Repeater – Ultra Violet
[Peace Off Ltd]

The title track opens with some glitch-hop before a hyped-up vocal lets you know it's about to double in tempo. It breaks you in easy like a new recruit before releasing the full damage. Even after it kicks in proper it still maintains waves of attack so as not to be continuous for no good reason. The flipside spews some broken JBs samples till it wrings in the amens in a distinctly flippant and messy brokecore fashion.

Detest – Hi-8 Adventures
[Bang a Rang]

Totally firing and relentless lo-fi but hi-tech hardcore for those looking to punish a dancefloor. It starts off like a demented old-skool track before the kickdrum becomes the main focus. Lots of edits and sample-drops keep up the pressure without letting it slide for a minute. First I've heard of their output – I want more!

Najmal – One Step [Kaometry/ Joprec]

Soft and soulful electronica on this first 12" released on two labels. The drums could be a bit fresher and tighter but any lack of production values are outweighed by memorable melodies and arrangements.

KTL – KTL IV [eMego]
Nana April June – The Ontology of Noise [Touch]

I'm a sucker for all this Black-Metal-meets-computer-music stuff, and here are two recent takes on this meme: KTL IV processes distorted guitars though Max/MSP as usual, but Jim O'Rourke's production gives the mix a more organic feel than on the previous KTL releases and the second, long track 'Paratrooper' builds up a slow grinding pulse reminiscent of early Swans, but overall a bit less inspired than their first two releases and unlikely to make any new converts. Nana April June goes for a purely digital approach – morphing single layers of noise and field recordings into something approaching the buzzsaw guitar sound of church-burning Norwegian nutter Burzum, but with an effect far more similar to the more recent ambient/noise work of Pan Sonic – recommended.

V/A – Get A:Head [Mashup 05]

This is worth buying just for the Helicopterface track on the B side – a grinding mid-tempo industrial/electro

monster from the same continuum as 2CB's 'Earth Mover' and Chaos AD's 'Dreaded Pestilence' – getting dropped by the likes of Surgeon and Gunter Saxenhammer this is guaranteed to add some proper industrial illness to yer tekno/electro/breakstep mbc. The rest is fairly forgettable – although the two Element Abuse mixes on the flip are serviceable enough, in a sub-Somatics kinda way.

FILM REVIEWS

Synecdoche, New York
[Directed by Charlie Kaufman]

Originally approached to do a horror film, Kaufman thought about the things that he found horrifying – loneliness, regret, illness, dying – and came up with this. This directorial debut, from the writer of Being John Malkovich and Adaptation, is a film that asks you to engage or retreat; a multi layered, intertwining tale that follows a struggling theatre director, brilliantly played by Phillip Seymour Hoffman, as he searches for truth. To this end, he creates a world within a world; where actors play real people from the director's life, the director himself; and as time goes on, further actors who are playing the initial actors. Not likely to be a box office hit but if you like your cinema hard to swallow, buckle up and enjoy the ride. Available as a download from newtorrents.info or in cinemas 15 May.

Bloc Weekender, Butlins in Minehead

Bloc is a strange event as it's more like a series of gigs in a weird so-bad-it's-quite-funny holiday camp hell. The lineups cater to more serious muso types rather than rave-it-up-like-a-loon ambitions of rival event Bang Face. So, once you ignore the garish surroundings which were built with completely different people in mind, and the twatty security trying to enforce a ban on bringing your own booze into the arenas, you go and listen to some bloody tunes innit.

Musical highlights for me were the showmanship and real-deal live sets performed by Tim Exile and Beardyman plus the opportunity to see out the weekend with hard-as-nails drum'n'bass from Dylan and Robyn Chaos. Some faces behind free-party rigs were supplying the sound, and they did a good job of it too as in general it sounded phat. The VJing was generally quite poor but you can't be allowed everything, can you now?

Hackney Social Centre call out

After four years of occupation, with an agreement with the landlord, this squatted warehouse has suddenly been informed of the bailiffs being booked to evict the space on 3rd April – despite having received no notification of any court proceedings!

So the space is being opened up as a social centre/arts space and invites everyone and anyone to come and get involved...
