Exactly the same can be said about Larry Law's publication <u>Spectacular</u> <u>Times</u> but one must add that Law has also managed to make a vulgar ideology out of situationist theory. Instead of trying to criticize, because he is unable to, the parts of books that he does not agree with he ignores them and uses the rest as quotes in his "pocketbook ideology"¹ The dedicated followers of this self-made priest (he has made himself a priest more by his bad actions than by his bad intentions) consume his hotch-potch at all times, for example at the Leeds 'Stop the City' demonstration last year (1984) a pamphlet appeared called <u>Stop the</u> <u>City Times</u> and in one moment a thousand spiky heads stopped what they were doing (which was nothing) to read what it was that they were protesting about. What a joke it is and what a first hand example of spectacular contemplation which Law tries so hard to make coherent.

If Law really wants to make a "Situationists for Beginners" why doesn't he contact the marxist-leninists at <u>Writers and Readers</u>? After all someone who gives space to <u>Time Out</u> and <u>City Limits</u>² may have some standing with these pigs.

Law's confusion is such that he can criticize <u>C.N.D.</u> as a specialized oppression (Skeleton Keys issue) but finds himself, as a man, unable to write about "Nomen and the spectacle"³ which is itself a specialized oppression (he might as well have produced a pamphlet called "Elack Jewish Homosexuals and the spectacle") but as it says in <u>The Veritable Split in</u> <u>the International</u> ⁴ "...(The) poverty stricken immigrant benefits too from the planetary exploitation of the producer of jute or copper in the under developed countries and is no less of a proletarian for that." Law's failure to understand even specialized oppression fully shows how futile his publication is. He does not advance theory because he cannot, and rather than do nothing he perpetuates his misery and that of others making theory static.

+ Box 7, The Other Branch, 12 Gloucester Street, Leamington Spa, Warks. was a plain to charge over, before the enemy's guns were reached, of a mile and half in length. At 11.10 our Light Cavalry brigade rushed to the front. They numbered as follows, as well as I can accertain :--

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Total 607 sabres. The whole brigade scarcely made one effective regiment, according to the numbers of continental armies; and yet it was all we could spare. As they passed towards the front, the Russians ppened on them from the guns in the redoubts on the right, with vollies of musketry and rifles they swept proudly past glittering in the morning sun in all the pride and splendour of war. We could scarcely believe the evidence of our senses! Surely that handful of men are not going to charge an army in position? Alas! it was but too truetheir desperate valour knew no bounds; and far, Indeed, was it removed from its so-called better part-discretion. They advanced in two lines, quickening their pace as they closed towards the enemy-a more fearful spectacle was never witnessed than those who, without the power to aid, beheld, their heroic countrymen rushing to the arms of death. At the distance of 1,200 yards the whole line of the enemy belched forth, from 30 iron mouths, a flood of moke and flame, through which hissed the deadly balls. The flight was marked by instant gaps in our ranks, by dead men and horses, by steeds flying wounded or riderless across the plain. The first line is broken, it is joined by the second, they never
