

Council gets Go-ahead **Political Sackings** "ALLEN NOT SO INNOCENT"

MANY LOCAL SOCIAL WORKERS and some clients in East Sussex will have been following the story of sacked social worker STEVE BASSAM. Voice readers may recall the story we carried on the case in issue No. 42. In that report we were not particularly critical of Dennis Allen, the Director of Social Services in East Sussex who did the sacking. We saw him as being pushed by the Tory hawks on the Social Services Committee into his blatantly political decision. NOW WE HAVE TO REPORT THAT DENNIS ALLEN IS NOT SO INNOCENT. At the Industrial Tribunal which has just rejected Steve's case for unfair dismissal, Allen introduced 'evidence' which had never been mentioned before and which was completely denied by both Steve and his supervisor Gerald McBurney.

"SLUR ON SUPERVISOR"

Furthermore Allen has allowed the Tribunal to call Gerald McBurney's integrity into question when he is universally regarded within Social Services as a person of the most straightforward and impeccable honesty. The sacking of Steve is an injustice which badly discredits Dennis Allen in the Department, and now there is this totally unprovoked attack on Gerald McBurney. It was obvious to everyone at the Industrial Tribunal hearing that the only way the Council could cover up the incredible weakness of its case was by attempting to damage the excellent reputation of Gerald McBurney who, throughout the case has maintained that Steve's work was satisfactory. The Tribunal fell for this tactic, Steve lost his case and Gerald McBurney was accused of being "motivated by a misguided sense of loyalty to his former trainee". Still worse the Tribunal report said that it could not accept Gerald's evidence "in its entirety". Are they accusing him of lying ? THIS UNDERHAND SLUR SHOULD BE REGRETTED AND DENOUNCED IMMEDIATELY BY DENNIS ALLEN if he is to retain any respect among Social Workers in East Sussex.

Meanwhile the fight against the decision of Allen and the Industrial Tribunal continues. The judgement opens the way for any Local Authority to sack Social Workers for out-of-hours political activity, regardless of whether such activity affects their work or not. (FULL STORY ON CENTRE PAGES)

CATERING WORKERS'

Catering workers at Brighton's new municipal conference centre have won the claim for which they went out on strike for a week in April, They will now have the same conditions of overtime pay as apply to local authority manual workers, such as the cleaners and attendants who also work at the centres.

The National Joint Committee, which is the final appeal for grievances between councils and their employees, settled the claim in favour of the catering taff on Thursday May 4th. On

aring the news, GMWU convenor at the centre Harry Jackson said: "This is a real victory. Some of the men will get an extra day and a half's pay out of this."

Before the settlement, catering workers worked five days a week on a rota basis, with no extra payment if they had to work on Saturday, or Sunday. The first four hours of overtime were only paid at time and a quarter. Council chief executive Reg Morgan excused this by saying; "We are following the catering trade nationally, and in Brighton."

Meanwhile, in the same building, cleaners and attendants were working under conditions laid down in the 'Yellow Book' which covers local authorities manual workers. This says:

*All overtime must be paid at time and a half.

*Time and a half for Saturday working.

*Double time for Sundays.

The catering workers have a basic pay of 75p an hour. This means that they have to work long hours of overtime to earn a living wage. Being paid overtime on the Yellow Book system would have meant an increase in gross pay of 30%. So a claim was put in last year for catering staff to be paid overtime at the same rate as other manual workers.

The claim went through the various stages of the conciliation procedure, but this was very time consuming, and at the centre things came to a head. It was announced by the GMWU members that as from Tuesday 18th April the catering staff would work a normal Monday- Friday week.

On the Tuesday a man turned up who was due to be taking a day off. Management immediately sent him home. A similar incident

happened on Wednesday. It was decided that if anyone was sent home on Thursday, it would be considered that management had started a lockout by denying the man his right to work. The following day when a man was sent home the centre workforce walked out.

The General & Municipal Workers Union immediately made the dispute official. It continued for a week while the union and employer sides of the National Joint Committee arranged a meeting; a return to work saved the conference of the Advertising Association.

Conference centre workers are now waiting for final details of the deal to be worked out, but they have already won a big victory. They have defeated attempts by Chief Executive Morgan and the Council to treat catering workers worse than other council employees, using the excuse that since private employers treat catering workers like dirt, why

Sounds familiar doesn't it? But this statement comes, not from Thatcher or Webster but from the manifesto of the British Fascists and is over 50 years old.

Fifty years ago the Brighton Fascist branch had a new District Officer - Major Baillie - who, said the Brighton and Hove Herald, "will be remembered for his valuable organising services at Hove during the General Strike of 1926."

The Herald (now absorbed in the Gazette) used the occasion to print approvingly the group's manifesto. It contains the same chauvinistic whining as can be heard now.

The same spluttering about 'alien cultures' and a declaration that "membership of the British Fascists is strictly confined to those of British birth and parentage and Christian creed."

It also promised that "all persons not of British birth shall be absolutely excluded from the Civil Service".

shouldn't the Council? As one man said on the picket line: "They are using us to subsidise the centre". The precedent they have set

should enable staff at other conference centres to get the same deal for themselves. It could also give confidence to private catering workers. There is already some evidence that the Brighton Centre strike has encouraged some catering workers to join unions. If this trend continues, it will soon put the wind up the hotel-owning cronies of the council Tories. Let's hope this summer sees Brighton hotel workers getting organised.

NF On the Run

A REPORT FROM THE BRIGHTON AND HOVE ANTI-FASCIST COMMITTEE.

The committee vigorously denounced the Tory decision to ban the Anti-Nazi League in from Council buildings, and organised a demonstration outside the special Council meeting which debated the Tories outrageous attack on democratic freedoms. And now in the coming weeks the Committee will also be active in the Lewes Rd. ward where the NF is putting up a candidate for the County Council.Last year they kept the NF votes down to a derisory number. Now they intend to fight to get them reduced even further.

Up and down the country, school students have routed any attempt by the NF to spread their vile propaganda into the schools. In Brighton and Worthing school students have played a leading role in organising against the fascists. It was heartening to read that, in Leeds, the NF could only mobilize

40 supporters on St George's day, a traditional day of fascist activity.

The respectable image of the NF, This is a clear warning to all

much helped by Margaret Thatcher's version of racism, is being eroded by this anti-fascist activity. As this erosion takes place physical attacks by fascist thugs increase, as in Wolverhampton where 7 West Indians were shot at from a car. Tyndall, in the wake of electoral disasters for the NF has been forced to spur on the lumpen thug elements with speeches in the vein of his Brixton speech, 'drive them off the streets ... ' anti-fascists to expect further viol ent attacks and acts of physical intimidation. The warning to all trade unionists surely came with the bombings at the NUPE and Communist Party H.Qs and serves to illustrate the desperate and deliberate measures fascists will take. We should all take heed and organise now. Workers united will never be defeated.



The nazis are on the run. Last year it really looked as if the NF could take off into the political big-time, but now, after poor parliamentary and local election results, things are different.

These, and the contrast between the 80,000 strong Arti-Nazi League march and the pathetic little walk arranged by the NF the following day, show the real strengths of the two movements.

The question is, where does the ANL go from here? Obviously, if the tremendous momentum is to be maintained, it has to extend its activity to counter fascism on the widest possible level, and it has to broaden its organisational structure and establish local, workplace and and trade union branches.

Neither of these objectives is intended to by-pass the existing local organisations, such as Brighton's own Anti-Fascist Committee which has done excellent work over the past two years. Rather, it is to work in conjunction with the local organisations and help them to be that much more effective by linking them up with a nationally-based anti-fascist movement.

Thus it is hoped that the Brighton

branch of the ANL which is now in the The specific aims of the Brighton

process of being set up will work in the closest co-operation with the Anti-Fascist Committee, in campaigns against the spread of the nazis' racist literature in the community and the schools, and against the NF's attempts to find a local platform to propogate its views. ANL will be to inform as many people as possible of the nazi nature of the NF and its racialist propaganda, and to draw as many people as possible into active opposition to it. Areas in which the local ANL could expect to be active are leafletting and demonstrating in districts where the NF put up election candidates, setting up a Seagulls Against the Nazis group to work around the Goldstone ground on match days where racist and NF chanting is a blight on the Albion's achievements, encouraging the formation of ANL branches factories, offices and schools and countering racism generally on the widest possible level.

There are already 200 local branches of the ANL across the country and the number is growing fast. There is to be a national

It now seems clear that unless there is radical economic and social change structural unemployment is here to stay. Unemployment is now running at 6.5% and in Brighton the figure is 7.14%.

The government's JOB CREATION PROGRAMME (JCP) was ostensibly an attempt to tackle the problem of unemployment, but it was based on the mistaken belief that the present slump in the economy is only temporary and that full employment should return in a few years. The JCP was therefore only designed to meet the temporary needs of a few of the unemployed and it imposed a 52 week rule, which stated that no person should be employed under the scheme for more than a year. In fact the programme only provided temporary jobs for 80,000 people while the number of unemployed was 1,700,000.

Clearly most of the projects had little chance of permanency and now most of the schemes are being wound up. In Brighton several schemes were developed under the JCP including

conference in the summer to which the Brighton branch will send a delegate. By then the local branches in general and the Brighton branch in particular will have had the active experience to enable them to contribute to the discussion and the decisions about the ANL's future direction.

STEVE BASSAM -

Dennis Allen, the Director of Social Services in East Sussex, is essentially a PR man, standing between the Social Workers and the Tory controlled Social Services Committee. He is generally liked and thought to be an approachable, reasonable director, subject to his weakness for sudden, authoritarian decisions. He is out of touch with Social Workers in the field and with the situation in which they have to work, and does not have much time even to consult the Sccial Services Managers who run the whole operation. As with all top bureaucrats he has more in common with other top bureaucrats at County Hall than he does with the people underneath him who are doing the work. He is constantly under political and economic pressure from the Tories to cut services and discipline the work force and he assumes absolute authority in many areas where greater consultation and more democracy would greatly improve the morale and corfidence of Social Workers generally. In May 1977 he called trainee Social Worker Steve Bassam to

an interview to discuss Steve's involvement with Squatting activities in Brighton. He clearly disapproved of Steve' out-of-work politics and suggested that he should talk over his squatting activities with Gerald

McBurney, Steve's supervisor in Eastbourne. But he did not suggest that Steve should end his involvement with squatting.

Back at work Steve continued to get good reports from his supervisor, and was also initially supported by Mair George, the Training Supervisor for East Sussex. His relations with his clients were deemed to be entirely satisfactory.

DISMISSED

Then, without any consultation, came Dennis Allen's decision not to second Steve to a professional Social Work course, a decision which was equal to dismissal. In his letter he admitted that the decision was taken for political reasons in so far as he deemed Steve to be unsuitable for employment by a Local Authority. THERE WAS NO COMPLAINT AT ALL ABOUT HIS WORK.

When Steve contested the decision the Council closed ranks. Mair George altered her opinion of Steve's work and Dennis Allen sheltered behind his authority. The Voice knows, Dennis Allen knows, and Social Workers know, that the pressure for his dismissal came from outside the Social Services Dept. and that the grounds for his dismissal were Steve's active confrontation with local authorities who supported the rights of the property companies against the squatters. In fact once Dennis Allen had made his decision and had communicated it to several senior members of the department on June 3

at County Hall, one of these senior members said to another that 'Steve Bassam had been dismissed for political reasons'. If Allen had consulted housing experts in Brighton he would have found that Steve Bassam was seen, even by the housing manager the late Wally May, as a serious and committed promoter of practical housing plans even though he could be flippant and provocative towards the law. And so it came to the Industrial Tribunal last month. Steve claimed unfair dismissal and was able to call on his supervisor, Gerald McBurney, and a colleague, Maria Jaftrzebska, to testify to his satisfactory work. The Council, who called Dennis Allen and Mair George, could not dispute this but rested their case on Steve's political activities OUTSIDE WORK. They claimed that these activities conflicted with his professional duty but they were unable to show how. They claimed that these activities were contrary to Council policy on Squatting even though there wasn't one. Finally they asserted their authority and reputation, and it was this which

influenced the Tribunal.





Those who were at the hearing agree that the Tribunal in the person of its Chairman - a local solicitor called Starkey - was hostile to Steve's case from the start. Starkey's manner towards Steve's witnesses was aggressive and contrasted sharply with his respectful manner towards Dennis Allen and Mair George.

Jock Dunn, the Trade Union representative had great difficulty in putting questions and showed a limited under-

HOUSING ACTIVIST AND the full story

Dennis Allen is now being asked by Social Workers to spell out what the Tribunal's judgement means for the future. In upholding the dismissal the Tribunal said, "the applicant was dismissed by aptitude, not by reason of conduct, although of course . it was his conduct, and sometimes out of working hours, which demonstrated lack of aptitude." This means that the Tribunal completely accepted the Council's claim that Steve's squatting activities were unacceptable in a Local Authority employee, gardless of how good he is at his

work. IF SQUATTING IS FORBIDDEN TO A SOCIAL WORKER TODAY, WHAT MAY BE FORBIDDEN TOMORROW ? A Midlands Social Service Dept. recently sacked a Senior Social Worker who was arrested at Grunwicks. Probation officers have suffered similar attacks for their support of workers' struggles, and the judgement of Steve's Tribunal leaves it open to Local Authorities to decide what constitutes unacceptable behaviour in an individual's private and political life. IF THIS IS NOW THE LAW IT IS A BAD LAW AND MUST BE DENOUNCED AS SUCH. And we still demand a statement from Dennis Allen repudiating the Tribunal's slur on Gerald McBurney. Allen's own integrity is at stake. The people also can pass judgements.



FIELDWORKERS REPRESENTATIVE GROUP (E.Sx. 
It was Steve Bassam's involvement with the Brittania House squat last summer which angered the Tories on the Social Services Committee and led to his dismissal. This squat, which was very popular with the passing public and was even favourably reviewed in the Argus, was designed to draw attention to the disgraceful fact that Brighton was continuing to allow office building in defiance of the County Structure The idea of 'unfair dismissal' standstill. The squat was very successful. It was supported by town planning and housing experts from the University and exposed the hypocritical attitude of Brighton property owners. As a social worker, Steve was rightly more interested in Brighton's homeless than in the profits of big property companies. Clearly the same thing cannot be said about the Tories on the Social Services Cttee.

Industrial Tribunals were established under the Industrial Training Act of 1964, initially to hear appeals from employers against levies raised by Industrial Training Boards. In the era of socalled 'equality' their work has expanded to include employment rights such as equal pay, sex discrimination, unfair dismissal and redundancy claims. Now they form part of the battery of state structures created to regulate and discipline industrial conflict and class struggle. Plan when simple housing was at a was created in the Industrial Relations Act of 1971 and written in to the Trade Union and Labour Relations Act of 1974. With rising unemployment the Tribunals have become very overworked. In 1976 there were 33,701 case 'enquiries'. The procedure allows for pre-hearing conciliation done through solicitors and the Tribunal secretariat and this eliminates nearly 64% of cases. Of the remaining 36% some two-thirds are found to have been 'fairly dismissed while roughly 4,000 (11% of the total) receive some compensation. A VERY SMALL PERCENTAGE GET REINSTATED (2%) as a result of hearings.

This means that arbitrary and unfair dismissal is STILL A RELATIVE-LY SAFE AND CHEAP WAY OF GETTING RID OF 'UNDESIRABLE' EMPLOYEES. The amounts awarded out of court or in court are not substantial, the vast majority within the £90-£200 bracket, a very small sum indeed for most employers.


As for the sacked employees the disincentives are enormous. Above all there is NO LEGAL AID for the Tribunal hearings and at legal fees of at least £30 a day that can quickly deter anyone even with a good case. Steve Bassam, in the case under discussion, had to pay all his own expenses totalling over £100.

And who constitutes the Boards? A chairman who is nearly always a solicitor, an employer, and a trade unionist. By any count that's two to one, given the political prejudices of the legal establishment.

USING ADULT EDUCATION

Images of Adult Education

Most readers of Brighton Voice probably don't see adult education as relevant to them; it is thought to be something to do with flower arranging or Yoga or Thomas Hardy's poetry. Nothing to do with unemployment or fighting against cuts. Now I would argue that it is wrong to see flower arranging as intrinsically"inferior". If people want to study that, it is important that they should be given the facilities to do so. But adult education has other potentialities: the purpose of this article is to draw attention to them.

The power of the consumer.

The essential point is that it is voluntary. People study because they want to, not to pass exams. Students pay a fee (this varies, but it usually works out at 50p a meeting) to study what they want; there are no entrance qualifications. DES. If they don't like the tutor or the subject they stop coming- if the class falls below a magic numberareas". about ten - it folds up.

The other side of the coin to this is that if a group of people can get together and show that sufficient demand exists, a class can be put on. An example: a Lewes Womens' group wrote to the WEA asking for a course in womens' studies; they suggested their own syllabus for the course and they are going to teach it themselves. The Lewes branch of the Workers Education Association agreed.

Who puts on courses ?

In Brighton there are four organisations : 1/ The Local Education Authority (L.E.A.), far and away the biggest provider of classes. Subjects are e.g. car maintanance, keep fit, dancing, languages and crafts. courses are held in L.E.A. premises - schools or youth clubs when they are not being used for their normal functions, although there are some more specialised centers.

work for the Parks and Gardens Dept., Brighton Resource Centre, the C.A.B. and the Old Market Arts Centre. Although these projects made little impact on the unemployment situation in Brighton some have shown how the scheme has been used successfully to channel resources into areas of need which would not otherwise be financed by the state.

Brighton and Hove Community Resource Centre is one project which successfully used the JCP to develop resources for community organisations and to support community action. The project employed 8 JCP workers from last June to April this year, but the temporary nature of the scheme meant that it was very difficult to plan, develop and implement longterm projects. The JCPs were only allowed 10% of the wages to cover the cost of materials and administration, which made renovating an old church hall almost imposssible. Then the Manpower Commission intervened at a very late date to tell the Centre that they could not extend the project until June as expected because of some arbitrary ruling. The Centre project started one day too early to qualify for an extension.

But the worst failure of the JCP is that the workers employed under it are now once again on the dole. "Most of us face a long period of unemployment", said one.


