The past 3 weeks have been a disturbing experience for the striking Justmen, not only because 43 of them have been unnecessarily arrested - some of them violently -BUT, and maybe more importantly, because of the calculated way the Tory Council have co-ordinated all the facilities at their disposal the police, the media, the public's money - just in order to isolate the dustmen; and, as Inspector Cooper has said, to "break their will".

One begins to wonder just exactly what right-winger Danny Sheldon meant on Radio Brighton when he said that it was "time for a confrontation" and that the Council would welcome the strike, so that its manual workers could get back to the "old days". As the dustmen realise, there is more here than just a strike over back pay or a wages claim. Theirs is a fight for the maintenance and extension of union rights which has national implications.

This is why, perhaps, the Daily Telegraph has dubbed Sheepcote the "Grunwicks of the South".

If we look at the events which have led to the dustmens' situation we see the unnerving strategy designed to isolate the dustmen:



æ 1 By Control of the Media -The Argus and Gazette carried the Borough Council's 'Case' (Friday 23rd Feb.), while failing to give the dustmen the opportunity for a detailed reply. Thus, for example, no-one but the dustmen knew that Small Dole tip at Henfield was available for rubbish disposal, that the compromise offered by the Council on Wednesday 7th Feb. "to return to work if backlog is cleared" meant contradicting workloads, manning levels and bonus payment schemes fought for and agreed to over the previous 3 years. ## Homeless forced to sleep out

Through the snow and ice 23 people slept rough in Brighton. (December figures.

Ignored by you and me, ignored by the Council's Housing Department, 23 people sleep, or more accurately, are moved on from the beach, benches and shop doorways of Brighton.

Another 250, everyday, turn in desperation to the Council Housing Department, Social Services or voluntary groups for a bed for the night. Those that don't get into the limited accomodation run by the voluntary organisations end up squashed into shared bed and breakfast rooms or sleeping at the, men only, reception centre in Elm Grove. (and try that for a demoralising experience ). Then the next night it starts all over again.

These are the SINGLE, HOMELESS people who nobody really wants to know! It isn't just the stereotyped "dosser" who make up these figures; most of them are simply people hit by unemployment, broken marriages, long hospitalisation, imprisonment or service in the armed forces and who suddenly find themselves flung back onto the street, with nowhere to turn.

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The provincial journalists' strike ended on January 17th - not so much with a bang, but a whimper. After 6 weeks of exhortations from NUJ President Denis Mac-Shane, the Argus journalists, like 9000 of their colleagues across the country, had the wet towel thrown over them by an executive happy to play the percentage game with the Newspaper Society. Denis had bigger fish to fry, notably the new technology struggle at Times Newspapers. He abandoned 28 locked-out journalists on the Nottingham Evening Post and left some juniors on the Argus with under £6 extra; far short of their £20 claim and hardly worth the freezing morning pickets.

But what were the real issues hind the journalists' uncharacteristic militancy, the attitudes of the other unions and the 14.5% sell out which left the proprietors of Westminster Press (who own the Argus) laughing all the way to the stockbrokers? The Voice went behind the scene at Robert Street to find out.

The poor results of the strike can be attributed to a lack of co-operation with the print unions and management's clever divide and rule' tactics under the threat of massive redundancies as new technology worms its way in.

The Argus didn't once comment on the strike during the dispute. So what exactly did happen? The first development of note was the excellent relations which obviously existed between production manager John Holland and the police ( see picture ), in ensur-

ag that the newsprint lorry Sot through. When the scab driver narrowly avoided photographer John Fortune in North Road, the police escort almost finished him off! These neutral arbiters of justice were also seen to viciously dash Roy Greenslade and Peter Archer from the scab's cab, reportedly paid £150 per run by

The Voice asked the journalists' FoC, Peter Fairfield, about their attitude to the driver. 'I think he's a member of T&G', Peter said, 'and he has a union letter to let him in. 'Not much in the way of solidarity there! But 'further probing revealed that the letter of admission had been written by a print union official, Jack Furney of Natsopa, under pressure from ... you guessed it - John Holland! ( The driver fiddled his T&GWU card by posing as a lapsed member. His name is R E Toms and he drives lorry number VKN 553J.)

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The issues go deeper than crossing picket lines, however. The introduction of new technology (NT) - such as the latest fast presses, lettaflex system and photocomposition; the use of Caltech processing equipment, alphabetical processing via on-line keyboards and the ubiquitous video disply terminal (VDT) - all spells a rapid death for the highly skilled in the printing industry. Since journalists and advertising clerks will be able to input copy directly onto the presses, most printers are naturally defensive and sceptical of journalists' motives. After all, the latter have been slow to support them in their struggle against redundancies. Nevertheless, one National Graphical Association member at the Argus told us he was disgusted that the journalists had not received more official print union support.

Why do the print unions fear this new technology one might ask? Surely it can only revolutionize the newspaper and print industry? Unfortunately, this is not the case. A report from Sussex University reveals that the "microprocessor revolution", of which VDT's and direct input are a part, could eventually put 4 to 5 million people out of work. At the Daily Mirror, NT has already dispensed with a third of the Natsopa workforce over the last few years and the unions have agreed that the 'same proportion again must go! Bowden...'

A curious rumour is circulating in Brighton about Andrew Bowden, Tory M.P. for Kemptown. It all began when a NUPE worker trying to get hold of the last copy of the Trades Council Bulletin, asked a newsagent in Kemptown for Brighton Voice. "Sorry" said the newsagent "we've been advised not to sell it." "Who by ?" asked the worker. "Well, two years ago," said the talkative tradesman "we got a letter from Bowden the M.P. and then a couple of months ago we got one from a group called the Eleventh Hour Brigade. They both said the same thing, but I don't know who the second lot were."

At another shop, the NUPE worker tracked down an issue of the Voice and found that the so-called Eleventh Hour Brigade were none other than the local National Front. But where was the mention of Bowden's letter ? He phoned the Voice and was sent a back copy of No. 33 which contained the full letter from Bowden to the newsagents in Kemptown, dated July 1976 in which the Tory champion of freedom gave his friendly warning to shops selling the Voice. The rumour grew from there. How could it be stopped ? Ridiculous as it is, people in Brighton began to wonder if Bowden might be just a little bit sympathetic to the National Front, and, still more incredible, whether he might not be just a little bit pleased that those sellers who had ignored his advice had finally got what they asked for. Really ! The things people believe these days.

Circumstantial evidence in support of the rumour is, of course, pretty thin. Despite the fact that Bowden holds a right-wing Tory view on immigration you could hardly call him a racist. Despite the fact that his supporters in his election campaign at Kensington North in 1964, campaigned with a "You don't want a nigger for a neighbour" slogan, you could hardly call him prejudiced against black minorities. Despite the fact that his party in Kemptown received an embarrassingly large sum of money from Jimmy Doyle, founder of the fascist Racial Preservation Society, it would be a bold person who could say that Bowden was in any way implicated. Despite the fact that he did nothing when told by a neighbour that the NF were printing antisemitic tracts in Sutherland Road, in his own constituency, you couldn't accuse

him of complacency towards the fascists. Despite the fact that he tried to brand the Adult Literacy scheme in Brighton as a communist front, despite his condemnation of Brighton Voice as a paper run by people who want to set up a "totalitarian state", you couldn't accuse him of political exageration. He's obviously not an extremist who dreams of reds under the bed, and the fact that he calls everything he disagrees with "political filth" and regularly calls the facts of bad . housing, low wages, underprivilege and discrimination in Brighton a pack of "lies" put out by "left-wing extremists, shouldn't blind us to his genuine concern for truth. In fact he's a pretty ordinary sort of Brighton Tory, so how could he possibly be interested in the National Front? in to squash this disturbing rumour. The leader writer of the Argus, Mr. Jock Miller, who has written more pro-Bowden words than his objective paper would care to admit, showed there was nothing in common between Tories and the NF when he merely congratulated them on beating up a group of gays, and in the Brighton Council we have Bowden follower George Bolton saying in all innocence and blamed it on the communists. The Left in Brighton have attacked the shops and blamed it on the right.",

I wish to make it quite clear that I totally condemn any acts of violence of any type sgainst your shop or any others that sell Brighton Voice. It is a tragic fact that there are small groups of extremists both on the left and right who have a vested interest in furthering violence and chaos in order to achieve their own political ends and to destroy our democratic society. As far as I am concerned I shall continue to oppose both Red and Black Facists of all types.

During the years I have been the MP for Kemp Town my wife and I have been subjected to physical violence and threats on many occasions by political extremists. I can understand your deep concern. However, I must remind you that the Brighton Voice specialises in pedalling the most revolting type of political filth and has itself supported and advocated violence against those groups to whom it is opposed. It is an evil publication, not in any way concerned with the truth and is doing its best to undermine the pillars of a civilised society. I have the utmost contempt for those who produce the publication and I often wonder if the shops who stock the paper ever take the trouble to read the contents.

I believe that your attack upon the Police, that they are not doing everything possible to apprehend those responsible, is totally unjustified and I am fully satisfied that the Brighton Police will do everything possible to ensure that law and order is fully upheld in the town of Brighton. I do find it rather ironic that those groups who have for years attempted to undermine the police are the first to demand protection when they feel that they are being threatened.

## **QUINTIN BARRY** LOW PAID AND

We asked for news of the electoral campaigns in Brighton, and received this from Quintin Barry prospective Labour candidate for Kemptown.....

Fersonally I have found the last few years disappointing, and I cannot conceal my disagreement with some of the policies pursued by this government. I think that disappointment is shared by a lot of Labour's traditional supporters. and so the problem of winning in Kemptown will be the problem of getting them to overcome their reluctance to turn out and vote. Another factor that I view with very great apprehension is that the election may well come in October, after both the local elections and the European election have taken their toll of political enthusiasm.

But there are some aspects of the situation that give me real hope. Although in organisational terms the Labour party has never been a particularly well-oiled machine there are some encouraging signs of local activity. And, notwithstanding the Government's incomes policies there is an underlying unity in the Labour movement that is strengthened by an awareness of what a Thatcher government would mean for the working class of Britain. I think I have felt closer in this past year to the realities of political life with the bakery workers picket outside Acres, or the dustmen outside Sheepcote tip than I have anywhere else. If I succeed in putting over one argument clearly at the General Election, I hope it will be the overwhelming case of the low paid.

On the credit side, there remains the possibility that Mr. Bowden's predeliction for calling quite moderate members of the Labour Party "marxist scum" will lead him to discover that I am a sinister left wing extremist which ought to improve my chances of preserving the Labour vote. And I have been described by the National Front as a filthy degenerate for supporting the Race Relations Act, so perhaps the message is getting through.

And, in terms of entertainment to come, the carefully staged photograph of Mrs. Bowden escorting a patient to hospital during the ambulance strike leads one shortly to expect a picture of her crossing the picket line at Sheepcote valley with armfuls of rubbish. With other industrial actions apparently inevitable, the scope for publicity of this kind seems endless.



### FIGHT FOR PLAY FAIR

52 metres square in the middle of fashionable Kemp Town hasn't been used for 4-5 years. Not since the Corporation pulled down the Brighton College Junior School. That was when there was much talk of widening Eastern Rd. and the top third of the site was to be a super highway from the Pavillion to Sussex Square and beyond.

Now that the East Sussex County Council seem likely to decide against the road widening, this desirable plot is up for grabs.

Over the past few years, local residents, and people working in the area, have used this site. They've walked on it, talked on it. They've sat on it, shat on it (at least their dogs have). They've thrown rubbish on it, played on it, and made footpaths across it.

Local residents have also cleaned up the rubbish, built flower beds, constructed a bench, and planted shrubs. This more positive action was mostly inspired by John Mackay, who for years has urged and agitated for the site to be controlled by the comm -unity as an open space.

Why an open space when so much housing is needed? The Clarendon Garden Action Group argue that human (and animal)life is densely packed in Kemp Town, mostly into flats and bedsits with little or no gardens. Social contact is made on the streets, and at places like the garden, with its three Elm trees. Also the Brighton Community Arts Workshop, who live 'round the corner at St. Annes Hall, see Clarendon Garden as a sort of village green where more organised events of many kinds could take place.

Furthermore there is a delicate balance between accommodation and open space in any community.

The first thing that the Clarendon Garden Action Group did, quite rightly, was to organise a party. With agreement from all the appropriate departments who have to be consulted about such things, a Bonfire Night Party was held. A mild evening, a huge bonfire, free firewoks, free eats. It added up to a lot of fun, no / aggresion, and a lot of goodwill all round. Then followed weekly Sunday morning clean ups in the garden. Steps were also taken by the Action Group towards officially taking over the site.

WALLRAFF THE UNDESIRABLE JOURNALIST PLUTO PRESS £2.50, pub Jan 1979.

Our monthly meetings are attended essentially by street reps, but all meetings of the Association are open. The North Laine area contains about 1300 people, 60% being Old Age Pensioners. There are v very few nuclear families and only 40

- 50 youngsters. We probably have 200 300 activists - a strange mixture active Old Age Pensioners and a smaller number of professional people (only 3 or 4 of them with any university connections, incidentally).

Voice: How is the Association funded?

Ray: By the usual mixture of things jumble sales, donations etc. Also by grants from various Council committees. But we don't believe in just using public funds. Because unless people in the community get involved, unless we become self-supporting, then



frankly as a Community Association it hasn't worked. We want to get people involved. What people really want from the C.A. is very much an excuse for getting together, helping each other. I think people are friendly and helpful, but there's a certain social reserve, and a Community Assoc -iation can break that down very easily.

Voice: Tell us about your newsletter.

Ray: We distribute 1500 copies of the North Laine Runner every 2 months. It's incredibly popular and as a means of communication does a lot to hold the Association together. We will print anything provided it's signed, and is not racist or 'immoral' etc.

The following is extracted from a very long, very interesting interview with Ray Curnow, chairperson of North Laine Community Association. For further info from him, phone 688538.

> Voice: What is the Association's view on all the empty houses in the area?

Voice: What of the NF, and the attacks on Infinity and Solstice?

Ray: We don't want the National Front. Everyone in the Association is strongly against encouraging or making any



facilities available to the NF. We also decided that we would not use any pub for our meetings used by the NF. We were very concerned about the attacks on the shops. Most people in the Community Association reacted very strongly and said these shops should be perfectly entitled to sell Brighton Voice.

Voice: What's the Community Association's relation to local politics?

Ray: The Association is a-political, has no religious or other affiliations. That doesn't mean of course that we don't have some very strong things to say about the activities of some councillors. I like to see a Community Association doing things that are short-term and practical, and at the same time becoming aware of what's going on, and coming to a viewpoint that people should take an interest and participate in local affairs. As individuals many of us

Voice: Does the Association feel powerful as a pressure group?

are active politically; but as a



Ray: I don't want to say we feel powerful ... what we've done is reverse the process where people feel helpless in the face of bureaucracy. They now have an organisation which will take up issues and get an answer. We want to see changes in the area, to see it improved and repopulated, to see the Council give more attention to the problems of old people. If in that sense you think we seek power, yes we do.

Voice: How about your relationships with the Council and your councillors?

Ray: Now we've organised ourselves the the Council takes far more notice of us than it does of individuals. In some of our working groups we get automatic attendance by representatives of council departments. That's quite a stride forward. However, two of our councillors have shown no interest at all in the area. One of them's different. Cllr. David Gee has shown a major interest, has been good at arguing out cases at various council committees, and has been very helpful. Only one of the councillors again, Cllr. Gee - has run a ward surgery. It was very poorly attended, largely because people have given up faith in the process of local representation. continued p. 18

#### By the Insidious Use of Police Power -

Over 100 Police, transported in . Southdown single-decker buses, two mounted police, motor-cycle police, 3 inspectors including Lewis, notorious for his activities in Belfast, and several CID - all for what at that time was a peaceful picket.

Why was Inspector Lewis, allowed to openly break the law by categorically refusing the pickets the right to approach the vehicles to put their case? Is it surprising that 43 were arrested, when such tactics, such overkill, were applied to what was simply a regular strike situation?



We would like this opportunity to give our view of the position regarding our dispute with the council. This situation has arisen directly because of action taken by the Tory party within Brighton Council (which met in private) to dock our wages for the week 5-9 February, and subsequently the following week. During this period the workforce of 140 men clocked in every day and therefore were available for work. Each day the management picked at random 20-30 men to undertake collection of essential services which we had agreed to do even though the rubbish tip at Sheepcote was closed due to strike action by the tip employees in support of their national pay claim. Those men who remained in the yard were there for 8 hours each day and willing to do any suitable work which the management chose to give them. When we went to collect our wages on the 15 Feb we picked up varying amounts from £3 - £42 (most were nearer £3) - an

obvious attempt to divide the workforce.

Contrary to the impression given in the Argus, the men are given every opportunity to debate the course of action they want to take and are in no way being manipulated by the union on either a national or local level. The next move by the council came on Monday 19 Feb. when scab labour was brought in to clear some of the backlog of rubbish. We had already agreed to continue coming to work whilst negotiating to get the wages that we were owed. As a result of the council's action we were left with no alternative other than to strike, in which we were supported by other council departments e.g. street sweepers, toilet attendants etc.

From Tuesday 20th we began the pickets at Sheepcote tip, and on that day we talked to several of the contractors' drivers and informed them of our wages grievance. They had been wrongly informed that the strike was a further extension of the national pay claim, and when they found out the real circumstances many refused to cross the picket line. Our action continued the next day in an orderly and peaceful manner without interference from the small police

presence. However on Thursday 22nd we found that the police presence had grown to between 80-100 men and two horses. It appeared that their instructions were not to allow us to approach the drivers which was our legal right, and presumably this decision had been taken because of our success with drivers on the previous two days. This led to frustration and friction and the first arrests as organised convoys of lorries were driven past the pickets on the order of the police. On 23 Feb. police outnumbered pickets at one point by 71 to 49.

Thankfully, in the afternoon we were allowed our picketing rights due to legal pressure from solicitor Quintin Barry, who explained to the police that they were obstructing the law. We could now talk to the drivers, and again we found many of them sympathetic.

This first. week of action at the tip showed that the council is willing to pay private contractors and police enormous sums out of ratepayers money far in excess of the wages which they had witheld from us. The council therefore were clearly determined to make it a political issue, and to blame the situation on the national pay claim. In fact the events at Sheepcote tip were entirely of the council's doing, when they first decided to dock our wages, even though we had reported for work, and then to turn to private

scab labour to do wo which can be done far more cheaply, quickly and efficiently by the regular dustmen.

The events of Monday 27 Feb, when the police arrested over 30 of our men, were merely an extension of the council and police combination against the dustmen. Private contractors were

# Engineers Support **Dust Strike**

On Monday 19th Feb. the Roadsweepers' and Highways sections held meetings with representatives from the House Refuse Collection (HRC) workforce, and were told by the HRC workers that, rather than exacerbate the situation, they should carry on working. This was wrongly reported in the 'Argus' that the

cil's attitude will modify to the extent that all his members can return to work. At a meeting with senior members of Council on 23rd Feb., NUPE officials stressed that it is their union's objective to get members back to work and provide a normal service, but under conditions which don't threaten the workforce.

The situation as it stands is a recipe for disaster and growing antagonism, and has been created solely by the bloody-minded attitude of the Council. The Council's lack of responsibility will probably deteriorate even more: who was it who skilfully cut the wires of 7 electric roadsweeping barrows? It certainly wasn't the workers, but it was a good attempt to discredit them.

The only hopeful sign from the Feb. 23rd meeting was the Council's assurance that officials from both unions would be invited to talks on the 27th - the meeting was still going on at the time of going to press. What the public should do is to urge their elected representatives to end an unnecessary dispute on the integrity of their workers, but also shows a complete lack of respect for its electors.

Engineering workers at Kearney and Treacher (K.T.M.) in Brighton have over the past month been subjected to continuous delay, prevarication and downright confrontation by the Vickers appointed management, over our annual wage negotiations.

- 3) No Scotswood employee to be re-employed elsewhere by Vickers until settlement.
- 4) Strike action in all Vickers (UK) factories and a call on the Nat Comm of the Union to make this official.

## Where do we go from here

At the Trades Union Council meeting of 21.2.79 I was asked to edit and produce our contribution to Brighton Voice. I will be responsible for any errors, however I will try to . reflect the policy of Council as expressed in resolutions and discussions.

A week or even a month is a long time in politics and even trade union events. We have seen the Bakers' strike, the lorry drivers' strike and - at the time of writingthe public service low paid workers' strike. The one real growth experienced in this country over the last decade has been the vast growth in low paid workers.

In fact, take away overtime, take bonus schemes, take away shift work and the vast majority of in this country are low paid. Those that are not low paid in this sense are probably low paid in relation to workers in other countries anyway.

A new kind of McArthyism is crreping into the present scene. Any group of workers fighting against low pay and injustice is supposed to be ruining the country. Workers in the health industry are being told that their increase should be at the expense of the public and the sick. Workers are being made to feel guilt guilty because they are fighting back against poverty. A Labour Prime Minister tells people to cross the picket line. David Owen was even pleased to cross the civil service picket line. Thatcher is getting so excited at taking on the trade union movement that some of her own supporters are getting concerned. Frank C ple equates low paid workers when terrorists. The TUC rushes to raise from the ashes a concordat to get the Labour government re-elected.

Locally, we have been involved in many struggles. We have made it clear that, if requested, we will support our members involoved in industrial action for improved conditions and wages. We have received a letter of thanks from one of the workers involved in the Bakers' dispute. LEN COOMBES.

# GAY RIGHTS

The gay community is finding a voice and we do not intend to be silenced by the irrational fears and prejudices of a few people, who don't know what gay people are really like, and who make no effort to find out, before they leap into action.

Once upon a time I was about 10 or 11, and I had a hope. It was that if I behaved 'nicely', and didn't hurt anyone, then in return, people would leave me alone to go about my business It didn't work. I guess I should have known that, since I was gay, it was a forlorn hope. Now I am 25, living in Brighton, and it is beginning to come home to me very strongly, that if I want to live any sort of a rewarding life, then I am going to have to fight for it. Some people, it seems, are just not prepared to live and let live.

Last month the police closed down the most popular gay club in Brighton the NEW CURTAIN CLUB.

It had a membership of well over 3000 and I used to enjoy going for a drink and a dance after the pubs shut, and to meet other gay people socially. No one is doubting that the police could, if they so wished, legally close down any night club of their choice for their infringement of the licensing laws. What is in doubt is the fairness with which they scrutinize the gay clubs. The New Curtain Club is not the first gay club to be closed down recently, and it will probably not be the last - until finally there will be no place where gay people can meet socially and in safety. We will be forced into nongay clubs, with the constant threat of a beating-up because we don't fit someone's inflated idea of 'normality' Or will gay people be pushed back into the public toilets we were just beginning to get away from? How about going to see a film instead?

I went to see:

" WORD IS OUT " last month - a documentary film on gay people which received high critical acclaim at the Edinburgh Festival. It

consists of a series of interviews Gay people no longer intend to put with gay women and men in A merica, up with this kind of pressure. telling of their lives, their childhood We have a lot to work out, but and how eventually they found the certain requirements are already courage to 'come-out' as gay. becoming clear:

It was evident that many of the 300 people in the Wagner Hall felt that the film related to their lives, to the real gay person. Not the mocking parody so often portrayed in the mass media...not the unfeeling pervert screamed at from the pulpit ... not the 'sick' and 'afflicted' deviant beloved by doctor and psychiatrist alike ... not the pitiful, suicidal ineffective creature in some of the worst novels. Simply a group of people, as varied as any other group, whose greatest crime is to love members of their own sex. About a third of the way through the film, an organized gang of thugs sporting anti-communist stickers(?:) burst

into the Wagner Hall, and beat up people at the back, sending two men to hospital with a broken rib and a broken finger. It was all over in minutes, they made off and the police who arrived 2 minutes later, were unable to find them. They are still pursuing their enquiries.

I spent the rest of the film unable to stop glancing over my shoulder, every few minutes, and even now, I realize it has changed my behaviour ... Not perhaps in the way these fascist thugs might have wished ... Instead of intimidating me to the point of ineffectiveness, it has made me angry. In fact the whole gay community is: ANGRY .

Lesbian discos have also been receiving pressure to close and basically the whole set-up smells!

So, things were not helped by an EVENING ARGUS OPINION COLUMN which came close to suggesting that these attacks were uor own fault, and that we should stay quiet in future, referring to gay people in highly insulting terms ('odd', 'abnormal', 'afflicted' etc,). This resulted in a PICKET

## GAY FIGHTS

For a long time there has been an implicit assumption in the Trades Union Movement that sexuality has nothing to do with the 'Cause'. Women have been hammering away at the doors for a long time now, and have only started to get somewhere within the movement in the past decade, This has made some people aware that there are areas other than pay differentials about which they should be concerned, and that discrimination on the grounds of sex or race are legitimate causes to be espoused by a trades union movement worth its salt. Both of the latter now have a considerable body of legislation providing certain safeguards against such discrimination But what about those discriminated against on the grounds of sexual orientation? - They're left without union support, and certainly without any from the law.

Within the last few years there have been at least three clear-cut cases of such discrimination known to local gay groups - and many more which never get mentioned because some gay people are still too timid and ashamed to stand up for themselves The cases we hear of are the ones where people have been open about their gayness, and have been forced by their employers to leave their jobs as a result of this - the ones we don't hear about are the ones where the person has been intimidated into resigning, after being forced to reveal their orientation because of a 'gross indecency' conviction (of which there are on average about 2 to 4 a week in Brighton).

It's not only the complete lack of protection afforded to gay people which concerns us, it is also the level of ignorance about homosexuality which sometimes staggers us.

Terry Casey (General Secretary of the National Association of Schoolmasters/Union of Women Teachers)

recently commented on the C.H.E. Education Kit (which he hadn't seen) that it was a waste of time, and as far as he knew, his union never took on homosexuals, and never would, (there are at least 5000 gay teachers in his union - and 30000 in the country as a whole). The leader of the bakers' union has been known to come out with similar outbursts of bigotry, and - let's face it - crass ignorance.

The local N.U.T., A.P.E.X. and other branches which sent delegates to the recent regional conference on Gay Rights organized by C.H.E. in Brighton, have since been much more open to the issues involved, as has the local Trades Council, but many others remain sadly ignorant of the fact that at least one in twenty of their members is open to such discrimination, and cannot fight alone. We don't just want things from the unions - we also feel that we have a lot to contribute. We are a group of (mostly) working people; many of us are committed union members, and would like to take our places in the trades union movement, fighting for the same rights as all other members. But - we are not prepared to go in on

false pretences.

We will work within unions as long as we are afforded the right to be respected for what we are, and not for what others think we shuold be.



Greenstein's article:

The assumption that racism is equal to sexism was never made in the original article 'Rock Against Cock Rock'. On the contrary, it was asking the question whether one could attempt to combat one form of oppres sion, racism, at the expense of another, sexism. Rock against racism is very much a question of entertain ment per se - black and white people enjoying black and white music. Rock against sexism on the other hand is a calling into question of all traditional forms of male-dominated entertainment. It is much easier to feel in racial harmony whilst listen ing and dancing to rock music than it is to feel sexually equal in an atmostphere that assumes all-male bands and macho lyrics. Tony makes the point that the main divide between the NF and other part

parties is overt racism. Aside from ignoring the extreme racism of both Tory and Labour policies, this is a mistake all too frequently made by the ANL - failing to see the fight against fascism as anything other

than combatting racism. The NF is sexist, not just like any other party, as the article says, but overtly so. Their views on women, proper womanhood etc. are integral to the whole of fascist ideology. He asserts that the ANL was set up to combat racism, whereas it was in fact set up to 'smash the NF' in the pre-election period. The ANL has never seriously attempted to analyse racism and its relation to fascism - it has had and still has many shortcomings. The WAFAR group and RARAS have taken a considerable initiative in developing an analysis (eg. the ANL meeting on sexism). As members of the WAFAR group we feel it is only here that we have develop ed any real understanding of the nature of fascism as a whole, in relation to us as women, and the very specific connection between racism and sexism. If we were to combat merely racism, we would be making the mistake of ignoring other important aspects of the personal appeal of the NF. Our response to



the NF should strike not only at more obvious and tangible manifestations, such as racism, but the subtle way in which they appeal to people's sense of loss of power, through offering 'clean', 'warm', ' 'secure', 'national', 'maternal' alternatives. All of which are wrong because they're founded lies, prejud ices and misconceptions. The article says that women have alienated people from the ANL. WAFAR never 'intended that half the places on the ANL committee should be allocated to them - but that it should be open to any women. If any confusion arose it was most likely due to the poor chairing of the meeting! The WAFAR group recognises the value of selfcriticism and is aware of the problems in reaching other women. What has really alienated people from the ANL is the constant bickering between different left groups, and between the left as a whole and those more liberal anti-fascists. In short, we feel that the typical male competitive way of conducting meetings has been a major source of decline in support for them.

Finally Tony says that there have been no attempts to take discussions on sexism outside the ANL. In fact this has been done by a lot of people, mainly women, on both a personal and organisational level talking to people in pubs, at local bands, going into schools, trade union involvement, Workers' Education courses on Women's Studies and on Fascism etc.

LINK-UP is the name of the Student Community Action Group at Sussex University. Often referred to as the



'fools on the hill' (students, that is!) Link-Up's been going nearly ten years, now. We do lots of things with a lot of different people - most of it useful! The community action we're involved in is very diverse and many-faceted, but we still have to accept the limitations of a group such as ours. These limitations are not so much what we can get involved in, but how.

Students have some really useful qualities to offer, when it comes to community action, but it would be really silly to ignore the LIMITAT-IONS. Students are only around for at best 35 weeks of the year, and also are only available for 3 years, before they move on. We're in Brighton to study, first of all, and unfortunately, community action has to come second. Students who put community action work first, invariably end up doing no course-work at all, which isn't a good plan.

The TIME that students spend working in the community through Link-Up, is perhaps one of the most valuable resources we have. Most people are tied to a routine of bringing up a family and doing a job of work, and their time is severely limited. University life, on the other hand, is about having time, as nowhere else in society, and through Link-Up, this can be put to good use.

We also feel that it is wrong for students to take the lead in community matters in any way. Our role is to be behind the community, adding enthusiasm, new ideas, and of course time to ensure that whatever projects are under way that they can come to fruition. The very fact that students are only here for 3 or 4 years is a positive advantage here because they are keen and want to spend their time in Brighton usefully. They can often re-vitalise flagging projects by merely giving to them their sheer enthusiasm.



Although some Link Up projects are pretty well self running, contacts with community based agencies is always very important. A good example of a project which relies heavily on on a town based group for its success is the adult Literacy-Numeracy scheme.Here Link Up acts very much a as a volunter source for the project which is run by the Friends centre. They are responsible for finding and matching pupils to the volunter, supplying teaching aids, and basic training that the tutor might need. We are indeed lucky to have such an organization as the Friends Centre in Brighton-in many areas , groups teaching Literacy and numeracy have to fend for themselves.

The band didn't exactly turn out in force for the interview - only Carol, vocalist, and Mark, the bassist, turned up (the others had marriages to arrange). The thing most on Mark's mind - he being the most politically aware member of the band - was the criticism that the band was sexist.

VOICE: How would you answer the allegations of sexism that have been brought against you? MARK: We don't actually know what they have been complaining about. Noone's really come up to us and told us what we're doing wrong; we've just had these snide accusations in Brighton Voice among other things along with Nicky and the Dots and the Piranhas - no-one's really told us what they don't like. VOICE: Were they criticising the lyrics or the presentation? When I went to find out what MARK: people didn't like, they said: "We chatted to members of the band after

(The Molesters' Press Release claims the female vocalists "flesh out" the music, but "are not present solely as a visual attraction" - a rather sex+ ist objectification in itself.) MARK: We certainly don't tell the girls they must wear low-cut dresses and show as large an expanse of flesh as possible - no-one tells anyone what to wear or do in the band. VOICE: A characteristic of New Wave bands is to identify with the politics of the local community, through the lyrics and by playing local benefits. Do you think playing something like the Voice Shops benefit, which you are doing on some future date, is more important than playing a large London gig? MARK(again): There's a question of ideals and a question of practicality in this. A gig is a gig and any gig is important. Obviously if we were asked to do a National Front benefit we wouldn't do it; it's a question of occasionally not being 100% behind something but wanting to do the gig, but on the other hand if we weren't behind it to some extent then we wouldn't do it at all.





VOICE: How much do you think that rock music is a medium for political ideas?

MARK: To be honest, not much. On a general sense you've got all these bands like Sham 69 and reggae bands urging people to unite but I don't want the band to descend into sloganeering.

CAROL: Politics is social behaviour, everything. Every song that you sing has got something to do with politics

- politics just isn't in the Houses of Commons.

VOICE: The more successful you bee: come, don't you think you have some responsibility to the audience you influence?

MARK: A number of the songs we have written have commented on social issues. We wrote 'Modern Homes' on the social stereotype of two-up two-down happy families. We used to have songs about South Africa, the National Front and various other things. Most of those have gone by the wayside now.

Success seems to get the better of most bands. How many New Wave bands genuinely support the politics of their lyrics and how many, like the Molesters, exploit their cynicism for public credibility? It is ironic that their most recent publicity has been a front page photo in the 'Argus' on ! the marriage between the guitarist Paul and their other vocalist, Tracy. That's show business.

This is, in fact, exactly what has happened in the States, where typesetters have achieved very generous settlements; with up to \$1600 per year for retraining ( only for those under 50). But it is very unlikely that the Argus will provide for the workers it puts on the scrap heap here in the same way. Their excuse is that it costs more per page than other papers, but this is in blatant contradiction to the facts. It is the provincials which make the money, not Fleet Street. How else could a little firm like the Argus make £1.29m profit in 1977, while its owner, Westminster Press, made :6.2 m in 1977 - 55% up on the year before. Indeed, Holland has openly stated that he will bore the compositors out of a job, has no intention of paying redundancy money and will gradually introduce VDT's, word processors and keyboard terminals linked to a central computer store.

Thus, by 'natural (forced) wastage', Westminster Press, through Southern Publishing and the Argus, get NT on the cheap. Could the benefits ever really compensate for the costs in human terms? It is extremely doubtful, but of course this does not worry the bosses.

Unfortunately, it does not seem to worry the print unions either, for their attitude seems to be one of 'selling' the jobs, through productivity carve-ups and wastage. With the introduction of photocomposition and fast presses, 63000 jobs were lost from a total of only 159000 between 1967 and 1976. These 'advances' take skills away from the worker and make him more and more dispensible. Control of production is centralised and the effectiveness of

strikes neutralised. In the rush to effect this and accommodate expanding capital, the health and welfare of the printworker have been callously ignored. . loss of jobs. Since the British Opthalmic Opticians Association ( which discovered this) recommends screening of workers for the job, the older worker would inevitably be disqualified. What is more, four workers on the New York Times using VDT's have developed eye cataracts. The inan afterthought.

But progressive blindness and radiation cancers are not the only 'benefits' of the NT. During photocomposition, ultra violet light etches onto a toxic polymer. This substance, called toluene diisocyanate (TDI) is highly volatile and inflammable and, after its introduction at Robert Street, ag -itation was necessary to get extractor fans installed. The polymer



has been found to be responsible for for asthma, heart disease and unpleasant skin rashes( dermatitis).

Such a list of horrors only makes a mockery of the cynical claims for NT, that it is clean and safe and pleasant to work with. However, permaps the most dangerous and sinister aspect of technology is the concentration of power it gives the bosses. Management control of the news can now be implemented by its control of production and the systematic replacement of human skills by machines. Jake Eccleston of the Times NUJ suggests that managements aim is to reduce 'overstaffing' in the machine room ( if TDI doesn't get you first ), but the real reason behind massive investment in NT is that in a strike it would be easier than ever before for subs and editors to get a paper out.

So it is not suprising to find that, among others waiting in the wings, the owners of the Glasgow Herald ( the Tiny Rowlands - Sir Hugh Fraser empire have invested £10m in direct input. Threats of redundancy, nostrike agreements and calls for higher output are all results of NT on many papers ( eg the Nottingham Post and Daily Mirror ) and only serve to strengthen management's hand.

The ultimate horror is a unique centralised news agency with a monopoly on information. Imagine computer on-line systems for the National News Network, as American Express have at present. Any story could be tapped by regional newspapers as from a 'phone network. And if you think the Westminster Press wouldn't reduce its staff to the minimal one roving reporter linked to a central processing unit and from that to all UK papers, just remember that they are members of Aims for Industry - an organis ation not unrelated to the Nat ional Association for Freedom, for whom the late Ross McWhirter organised newsprint delivery during the strike.

## Whose Democracy Whose Terrorism

To a lot of people West-Germany means: economic wealth, high standard of living, a democratic parliamentary system, justice etc. Tis is one side, but there is another side, which is not very often published and therefore widely unknown. The German left-wing movement in reality, has not got the same democratic rights as everybody else. Since 1972 a number of laws have been passed - in some cases constitutional changes - to intimidate leftwing people and stop them from criticising the W-German system.

#### "Berufsverbote"

'The law against " enemies of the nstitution" in the public service Serufsverbot); which was passed in 1972, banned graduates from becoming teachers in state schools. The official reason given for the Berufsverbote was, that a " small number of enemies of the constitution" who try to infiltrate the system silently, had to be excluded from the public service. For about two years mainly teachers were affected by the Berufsverbote. Today there are victims of this law in almost every field of the public service: teachers, postmen, train drivers, unskilled workers.

who is an enemy of the constitution?

The political activities of every applicant are checked thoroughly. According to the law there must be a guarantee that the applicant will actively stand up for the constitution at any time. If there is any doubt about that, the application can be refused - disregarding the

pfessional ability of the applicant. A principle of a constitutional state is completely reversed: not that the prosecution has to prove the applicant guilty but he has to produce evidence of his loyalty towards the state. A Berufsverbot usually becomes operative for the following reasons: membership in organisations like Amnesty International, the communist parties, antifascist league etc.; holidays and visits in East Germany, participation in demonstrations, signing of petitions



and supporting the campaign against Berufsverbote.

Not only people who lose their jobs (many after years of employment) are victims of this law but everybody in Germany. All the information about political groups collected by the "office for the protection of the constitution" (secret service) might one day be used against one of their members. It might even affect his employment in industry as the transmission of information from the secret service to security departments of private companies is not illegal.

Although freedom of speech and freedom to demonstrate are part of the constitution, hundreds of people lost their jobs for using those rights. Political abstinence and isolation are the intended results.

#### police equipped for civil war

Against those who lost faith in government and police and began to defend their rights by publishing papers, demonstrating against nuclear power stations etc . there are more effective means to keep the political peace. An army of policemen, border guards and special police units have been built up, each of them well enough equipped for civil war. Every policeman is armed, some of them with submachine guns; the special units are equipped with tanks, granates, waterguns and gasbombs. Well over a hundred people have been killed by policemen acting in socalled self-defence. Some of the victims were not even armed. Only a few of those policemen have been taken to court for that, some got promoted.

Thousands of houses and offices of leftwing people have been searched By policemen armed to the teeth. without producing a search warrant papers and books were confiscated. During those raids the security of state is usually far more important than the protection of live and property.
