# OPPOSING THE FROM

On 26th April, during the election campaign, the NF planned to hold a meeting in Lewes Town Hall. Brighton anti-fascists caught the train to Lewes, along with the police who had carriages reserved for them. Many more of us joined the train at Falmer, amid enthusiastic cheering at such a large turnout. On arrival at Lewes we marched up to the Town Hall and joined other local anti-fascists outside the entrance in Fisher Street, hardly more than an alley-way. There were about 600 of us, and plenty of police (more and more of whom arrived as the evening went on). The meeting was to start at 8pm; we had arrived at 6.30 to find the bulk of NF supporters already inside, along with about 7 anti-fascists who had managed to get in. It was difficult to know what our best course of action would be. At first we were blocking the street except for a narrow corridor created by the police at each end, then there was a sudden violent attempt by some NF to break through. A shop window was smashed just down from the hall entrance, and we realised the potential danger - being squashed up against the wall on one side and the glass on the other. However we managed to keep our ranks together, although 2 or 3 fascists were let through by the police: "If you're going to the meeting go round the back quickly" one shouted - it was as if the police in conjunction with the NF were deciding who to let in. After this incident the anti-fascists stayed put, while the police brought in reinforcements and tried to spread across the street. Sudden ly they started pulling people out of the crowd, grabbing them and wrenching linked arms apart, hurling some of us out towards the 30 or

so jeering NF supporters across the High St. Nearly all of us were across the top of Fisher Street.

pushed out into the High St. and the police then formed a solid cordon People were unsure what to do next. There seemed little point in staying since the meeting was almost over but we wanted to make sure the anti-fascists inside got out safely. We waited about an hour when a few NF started coming out and wandering off, Eventually the main body of anti-fascists marched back to Lewes Station together, and returned to Brighton and Falmer escorted by the police.

# MEANWHILE ... inside the hall

Among the speakers were Betty Webb, Edward Budden, James Doule and Lady Dowager Birdwood. Seven antifascists - undeterred by a dozen heavies flexing their magic muscles by the door - heckled throughout.

Ms Webb's speech was short and full of apologies for her nervousness, but this "brave little woman" (as the rostrum called her) was obviously little more than cannon fodder. The worst was yet to come. The other speakers between them had some very strange things to say. Did you know, for example, that the Norman invasion ("dubious stock") never happened, and that the population of the Midlands is somehow more "English" than that of the coastlands of Northumbria, invaded some thousand years ago by the Danes? This lunatic fascist history was greeted by shouts of "bravo" and "hear hear". And what about continued page 9 ->





# **NF** attacks

Four anti-fascists, who had (unwisely) stayed for a drink in the town after the demonstration, met 20 NF supporters on Lewes Station. A woman was kicked in the head and stomach. She was taken to hospital for a check up, but allowed home the same evening. Please ... stick together after demos!

## Soul disco

The same night at about 11pm a group of young men were provoking trouble at the soul disco in the Crypt at the University. They were ignored, but around midnight about 25 others (who had been hanging around outside) stormed the Cryp throwing bottles and breaking windows. The person on the door was knocked to the ground, and a black student assaulted before the attackers were finally chucked out. They ran off to 3 cars and a van, and headed for Brighton.

There is no question that these attacks on the soul disco (run and frequented by many black students) were deliberate and planned, not merely scuffles which just happened on particular nights. Three weeks earlier an asian student had been attacked leaving the Crypt soul disco. The week before the Lewes demo, racist insults provoked a fight at the Crypt.

# BRGHTON MAY DAY





Monday May 7th was 'officially' May Day, and compared to last years dismal effort, this years workers day celebrations were much more of a success. The sun shone; 4-500 people took part in the march from the Municipal Market, along the sea front, ending up at the Co-op hall off London Road for the rally, while the many Bank Holiday trippers were cajoled into buying a variety of Left papers. The march was a relaxed, though fairly quiet affair.

It was ironic, then , that the second speaker, Tom Parsons of the Labour Party Young Socialists, in adopting an aggresive, dogmatic, repetitive style, actually chose to put women down during his speech. In refering to the labour movements ability to fight a reactionary Tory government, he said;

'There are twelve million of us(unionists) plus OUR WIVES and children ... ' He had obviously not been taking note of Ann's speech. The stunned silence in the hall indicated the shock his statement produced. Many women, and men, walked out during Parsons' sexist speech, and he was probably lucky not to be challenged in a more positive way by the audience. Certainly May Day could have done without him.

The Trades Council made an effort to organize an interesting labour day. It's part failure was due largely to unavoidable problems, but there is plenty of scope for making next years May Day much better.

The Government made a great fuss about losing one of its secret military reports to the Irish Republican Army recently. But none of the main news reports mentioned its main conclusion - the British Army cannot win in Ireland.

Indeed, the document exposes the British Government's propaganda position on Ireland for what it is a pack of lies.

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Take for example the claim that Provisional IRA are just gangsters. Brigadier J.M. Glover of Defence Intelligence Staff, the author of the report, says -

"Our evidence of the calibre of rank and file terrorists does not support the view that they are merely mindless hooligans drawn from the unemployed and unemployable."

When the new Northern Ireland secretary Humphrey Atkins makes his first speech saying that the Provos have no popular support, and are nearly beaten, remember the conclusion of this report -

"The Provisionals' campaign of violence is likely to continue while the British remain in Northern Ireland. We see little prospect of political development of a kind which would seriously undermine the Provisionals' position.

Provisional IRA will probably continue to recruit the men (sic) it needs. They will be able to attract enough people with leadership talent, good education and manual skills to enhance their all round professionalism. The Movement will retain popular support sufficient to maintain secure bases in the traditional Republican areas."



The report goes on to assess the Provisionals' armament. The army expects that the Provos will soon have sophisticated anti-tank and anti-aircraft weapons. This will probably drastically put up the cost of the war in both money and life.

This raises two questions. First, why has the Government lied so consistently on a matter as important as the conduct of a war. And secondly, knowing the truth about what is happening in Ireland, what will we do about it? It is ordinary people who pay the price of this war. The money to fight it comes out of our pockets, and the people killed on the streets of Belfast, or the lanes

Until it's profitable enough for private enterprise to build houses on the empty site at the corner of Dyke Road and Clifton Road, the local Liberals would like to see the space used by the community, perhaps as a community garden'. Probably, the Conservatives would call that a waste of ratepayers' money. But Liberals and Tories agree when they describe the wall surrounding the site as an "offensive poster site" and an "eyesore". As they both demanded, the wall is now being replaced by a "vandal proof" fence.

What are these "offensive posters"? The wall carries slogans in support of abortion and gay news plus posters advertising local gigs meetings, and films. Calling this material "offensive" and the people responsible "vandals" shows up clearly some of the limitations of

the Liberals' politics. In fact, sites like this are some of the very few means of communication that can be employed by groups without the resources to distribute thousands of leaflets or take space in the Argus. In this 'democratic' society, the means of communication are tightly controlled. You can speak in Brighton Voice to perhaps 3000 people, but to read it they have to make an effort and pay as well. Rare opportunities for free public communication, like this wall, should be encouraged, not destroyed.

If it's not the actual content but the 'untidy appearance' they object to, the Liberals have got their priorities upside down. Anyway, the main reason for any untidiness is simply that using the wall is illegal. Bill-posting and slogan-writing has to be done



of South Armagh are the family and friends of ordinary people, not politicians or Generals.

We in the United Troops Out Movement (UTOM) believe that the Irish people must decide their own future without interference from the British Government or Army. The events at Torness, and the reasons for them are as important to the people of Brighton as to the people of East Lothian.

The last year has seen the birth of an anti-nuclear movement in Britain. The direction the movement has taken se far has been, by and large, the result of short term tatics of groups making up the movement. There has been up until now little discussion

on how we will actually put an end to the international nuclear power programme in the long term, and change over to safer energy sources.

The strategy so far, focusing on stopping construction at Torness, has been inspired by a mass occupation of the Seabrook nuclear power plant (USA) in May 1977, and Seabrook, in turn, was inspired by the sucess at Whyl in West Germany where thirty to fourty thousand people successfully stopped a nuclear plant by establishing a permanant occupation at the construction site.

If you want to live autside the law you must at least be honest.

However the anti-nuclear move-ment in Britain is in an apparent dilemma: demonstrations and festivals are applauded but ineffectual; more direct action might be more effective but will be deplored by the 'responsible' authorities and could

damage our image as 'nice' people. Many people (though not all) in the anti-nuclear movement, faced with this situation and with the clear danger to life and liberty presented. by nuclear technology, feel that effective sabotage, neseccarily involving the destruction of

machinery and property are justified, and consistent with the principles of non-violence. It does not hurt people; nuclear technology does. The press has picked up on the question of sabotage but has presented it as if it represented a political division in the anti-nuclear movement.



The present pattern of social and economic forces makes the issue of nuclear energy an urgent one, not just here in Britain, but almost throughout the world. Why?

The Energy Gap ?

Estimates of future energy (electricity) demands rise at a seemingly alarming rate but these projections are loaded. Like all similar extrapolations, they assume that what will happen at some future time is governed by the present situation and that the factors affecting the way we use energy will remain the same as today. This does not allow for the sort of fundamental social change that would produce a just, less wasteful, less exploitative and more responsible utilisation of energy. This society has produced this sort of enery policy.

we think that this is a distortion of a political question which represents the experience of the antinuclear movement itself and which will be answered by that experience. No one in the anti-nuclear movement wants to live in a nuclear society and they will act accordingly.

Questioning this energy policy questions this society (and the other way about).

On another level these estimates of energy demand often disagree with each other substantially according to the commercial interest of those making the projections. This leads naturally enough to overproduction. in 1974/5 the Central Electricity Generating Board's capacity was more than 50% greater than the maximum demand on the system. By October 1975 the board closed down prematurely 48 power stations or parts of stations with the loss of 5,000 jobs.

The reason why capitalism requires nuclear power is not altogether unconnected with the fact that it serves its interests ideally. The oil and coal options are open to pressure from the organized third world. Insulation and conservation do not offer breathtaking profits (BP!) On the other hand Uranium, the raw material for nuclear energy is,

like Canada, USA, Australia, and SA. 'Politicaly safe' means that the multinational Rio Tinto Zinc can. maintain a virtual mining monopoly in 'illegally' occupied Namibia. In Queensland, Australia, it means that industrial action or demonstrat -ions against uranium production are outlawed. And if we add the fact that here in Britain an increase in dependance on nuclear installations

ed technical objections can be defused by reassuring 'experts'. and the erosion of safty standards means that industrial hazards are not only confined to nuclear reactors! Just as sensatioal dangers have been ignored in the past, the more widespread hazards (causing deafness, back pains, stress etc.) common to all capital intens-

will mean a decrease in the capacity of organised labour to affect the flow of energy to domestic industry it hopefully becomes clearer why the nuclear option is being pushed with such vigour.

Safety and Security

Safety and security reasons (the Official Secrets Act ) makes effective trades union organization within nuclear installations almost impossible. An armed police force was created under the orders of the Atomic Energy Authority in 1976, without a murmur of protest, even though it has far wider powers than the ordinary police.

The major opposition to the expansion of nuclear power is centred around the question of safety. Nuclear accidents, it is true, have raised serious doubts about nuclear safty. However, the Windscale enq-



ive industries continue to be ignored.At Transfynydd nuclear power station noise levels in the turbine room are over 90 decibels and the problem is'dealt' with by displaying notices saying 'wear your ear plugs'.

Nuclear power sets the course for a form of economic and social development seriously at odds with our needs. It requires a massive inv investment for the return of a disproportionally small number of jobs,

Terroristo

Production of nuclear power stations 'is as competitive as the production of radios. Previously the exportation of nuclear plants was prohibited, but now obvious commercial interests have taken over.France, Britain, West Germany and the U.S.A. are all nuclear exporters. The real 'terrorists' are not the dispossesed whose situation is so desperate that they have nothing left to lose, but the 'responsible nuclear authorities' whose greed is putting world safty and freedom (what there is of it) at risk.

Last year 8 people walking in Brighton were killed by cars. Over 250 were injured. Hundreds more pedestrians must take their lives in their hands everytime they come in contact with the town's dangerous road system. This not only staggered into the 1970s without pedestrians in mind, but also ignores the most efficient form of wheeled transport - the bicycle.

Now, Brighton Transport Study Group is raising the question of the town's transport and encouraging better planning. The group arose out of a Workers Educational Association class and has produced two excellent discussion papers -

### FEET FIRST

This challenges the car-oriented policies of a local state which seems unconcerned that nearly  $\frac{2}{3}$  of all trips in Brighton's Central Area are on foot. Yet priority is always given to the car - ever managed to cross the top of North Road on foot with measured breathing and low pulse rate? The paper therefore argues for genuine pedestrian priority in the shape of: a pedestrian network, enviromental zones and shopping precincts. It also points out the stupidity of policies which ievitably generate more traffic in the town centre. It shows the need to encourage the development of "urban villages", rather than the depersonalised metropolis.

### ON YOUR BIKE

Brighton planners must all be

relations of Henry Ford because they don't seem to recognise the advantages of the bicycle to the cyclist and the urban environment. This discussion paper seeks to put cycling back on the map-literally. It proposes several cycle routes and points out that "bicycle planning gives people motorways for the price of footpaths".

There are useful information and address sections on the back page with suggestions for what the reader can do. The paper shows that cycles are very efficient users of urban space and has a beautiful suggestion for Brighton planners -

"How about a multi-storey bicycle park on the King St-Bond St site?" (NBP V. NCP ?) Just one word of criticism - why is the cartoon on the front page dominated by men? The Study Group promises further discussion papers on public transport, community transport and cars. They also hope to produce a detailed analysis of accidents in the town. For anyone concerned with fighting policies dictated by profits, not by our needs this is something to look forward to.

# Anti-racist March

On Saturday 16 June people will be taking to the streets of London to demonstrate against racism. The march aims to unite all those fighting state and NF racism which is directed at Black, Asian and Irish people.

Racism is built in to the British State. It was used to justify the exploitation of other countries when Britain was an expanding imperial power. When people from these countries are driven to Britain to provide cheap labour, they are treated as second-class citizens.

Racist laws such as the 'SUS' law and the Immigration Acts are used by the police to terrorise black people. The 'temporary' Prevention of Terrorism Act is used to harass Irish

eople. The most extreme form of acism, however, is war against an entire people. This is happening in Ireland now (see p.6). The lessons from the war are being applied against people in Britain ....

The Special Patrol Group is used to intimidate ethnic minorities in London and was responsible for Blair Peach's death. The SPG was built up from an experimental force within the RUC - Britain's police force in Ireland. After the Southall events, the racist MP Powell said he foresaw troops being used in Black areas in Britain in the same way they are now used in Northern Ireland.

East London UTOM organised this march after a march commemorating Bloody Sunday was attacked by the NF and British Movement. Fascist parties and the State see the connections between racism in Britain d the war in Ireland. We too have recognise that they are one struggle and support this march. # C.O.I.S?

Brighton Voluntary Service Centre have recently put together reports from a variety of Brighton organisations with the aim of keeping them informed about each others activities. The Community Organisations Information Service newsletter is 16 closley typed pages of reports, events and comments.

It starts with a report from a new phone in group Parents Helpline. This provides a Samaritans type of telephone support service for parents who feel driven to bash their kids around, or who cannot cope in other ways with them. (They can be contacted on BRIGHTON 688633).

The most useful section to activists is a detailed report of the plans of the local authorities, as viewed by



A plan to build 30,000 square feet of offices on the corner of Dyke Rd and Clifton Rd has been submitted. Even by Brighton standards that's a monsterous proposition. Brighton Planning Department has set aside few enough sites as it is for building houses in the Central Area. The Dyke Rd site is one of the largest of these . There are about 300 homeless people in Brighton, and many others living in poor or unsuitable conditions. More houses are desperately needed.

Only the development company concerned would benefit from more office space in the town on top of the existing 300,000 sq.ft. of vacant office space and the further 250,000sq.ft. the Council has already agreed to which hasn't yet been built. Even the Planning Dept's Central Area Plan suggests a total limit of 20,000 sq.ft. additional

Much of the information contained in this first issue is very useful to any group involved in voluntary work. private office development over the next 13 years. If accepted, the new development would exceed that limit before the Plan even becomes adopted!

The plan doesn't have much support. The local community is almost totally opposed to it, and has already sent in a petition. The Montpelier Liberals used it successfully as the main issue in their local election campaign. Even the local Conservative councillors,

trying hard to retain control of the ward, stated their opposition. And a Planning Dept spokesperson said that he would be "surprised" and "appalled" if the plan was accepted when it comes before the Planning Committee on June 5. So, although it's not unknown for the extremist Tories on the Council to oppose even their own Planning Dept Dept's recommendations, it seems likely that it'll be rejected.

So what will happen to the site? Perhaps another proposal will follow which might now appear as an acceptable compromise to the Council, although if it had been submitted at first would have been itself rejected. Perhaps that's the point of the present proposal: to soften up the opposition. But most likely



the site will remain empty and derelict, as it has done for years ever since the Congregational Church and Institute there were demolished.

The man from the Planning Dept summed it up: "we expected the site to remain empty for another ten years. But now house prices are rising again, it could be less than that." In other words, the only time houses can be built in Brighton is when prices are high and the people who need them most can't afford them! What else can happen when houses are treated as commodities to make profits from, rather than seen as they are: an essential social need?

Building council houses on the site would be a step in the right direction. But that would reduce the scarcity of housing and tend to bring house prices down. The Tory councillors who control Brighton's housing act in the interests of the people who profit from a housing shortage. Profits which depend upon the misery of the homeless.

### WILTSHIRE

Stonar School, Melksham, has lots of kids with parents paying up to £3000 a year for the priveledge. However, not much of this goes to the domestic staff, who receive a stupendous 66p an hour, compared with £1.06 an hour for those in state schools. After a protest about this, 17 were locked out on March 1st and are still out.Parents have not exavtly supported the pickets on the gate - one was knocked onto the bonnet of a new Rover and carried for a hundred yards by the enraged owner. The strike is being supported by local Trades Unions womens groups and the Labour Party. (Bath Spark)

### Manchester

People who've written to the North West Road Construction Unit objecting to the proposed outer ring road, have been told that, 'at this stage we are receiving views on

the proposals, rather than objections' Apparently 'views' can only be positi positive or neutral; objections, being negative, are not views, and are therefore not acceptable. (Manchester Enquirer)

There are regular gay discos on campus, plus a weekly radio programme run by Gay Soc members, and occasional evenings when a group of volunteers, all wearing badges, take over one of the bars - an exercise in heterosexual consciousness raising. This proauces a rew peculiar looks, but in the main, a lot of solidarity.

Sussex Gay Soc has always kept in touch with the broader gay scene in Brighton. The links between them have now become even closer, with plans for the town's new gay centre project whose impetus grew out of a long spate of hostility and harassment. First, there was the police shut-down of four gay clubs; next, the vicious attack on gays by a right wing group during the showing of the film 'Word Is Out'. There was also the Evening Argus' virulently antigay editorial, resulting in a massive picket of the Argus offices. A delegation to the editor led to a substantial retraction and an opportunity for gays to present their case. The fundamental aim of the new centre is to provide an environment where gays are free to meet, socialise and politicise. It is not intended in any way as a commercial venture, but as a place where gay people can be active without being ripped-off or patronised - a centre run by gays for gays. Jonathan Dollimore explained: "The centre will be both a social and political base - in the sense of changing the ways people think about themselves and the ways in which others perceive them .... The more oppression outside, the more unity inside."

We have produced information sheets and fact sheets explaining in layperson's terms the law on a wide variety of legal and welfare problems (We are about to produce some new, up-to-date, factsheets.)

We have run legal and welfare rights courses, at present is a 10-week course running at the Centre in conjunction with the Workers Educational Association.

We run the legal and welfare info. desk, which is open every Sat. from 10am till 4pm, to give people 'On the Spot' advice. We are attempting to work with Community Associations. Recently,



What is needed most is money. Various fund-raising events both on and off campus are being organised (including part of Gay Pride Week), and donations Church Mice are forthcoming from, among others, Brighton Gay Switchboard and the University Union. Emerging as it does out of the growing mood of anger among Brighton gays, the proposed new centre is symbolic. It is a sign of change, of the desire for collective involvement and of the need to counteract in a positive way the current right wing backlash. It will provide a valuable alternative outlet for women and men unsure about their sexual identity. The number of openly gay people, even on campus, is thought to be only the tip of the iceberg. A recent questionaire compiled by Gay Soc produced some revealing responses. For instance, well over half of those questioned admitted that they had experienced a homosexual relationship, or that they would like one.

Services 'Old & Cold' workers we campaigned sucessfully with West Hill Community Assoc. to encourage people to take-up electricity discounts in that area.

To sum up - the Brighton Rights Centre offers FREE legal and welfare advice and assistance to groups and individuals from Brighton and Hove. It can follow a case through to its conclusion, and currently provides representation for individual before the various tribunals: Supplementary Benefit, Rent, National Insurance, Industrial, Mental Health, etc.

Lastly, but by no means least, we are attempting to make contact with

groups and individuals who have a legal problem or a problem with legal aspects but who never approach any appropriate agency.

# BLAIR PEACH

Everything's been pretty quiet since the first immediate outcry over Blair Peach's death.

He was killed at Southall when the mainly black community and other anti-fascists tried to stop a National Front election meeting.

The police have started a closed inquiry into what happened. But as it was the police who killed him in their great enthusiasm to defend the NF, we can't expect any truth or justice from that.

There was two minutes' silence for him at an election meeting called by the anti-fascist committee in Brighton.

Blair Peach was a teacher. A colleague of his from the NUT came to talk at the last Anti-Nazi League general meeting about his funeral (the police still have his body as I'm writing this), and about the campaign demanding an open and fair inquiry into how he died. We can't forget Blair Peach and we can't forget the stupid violence that killed him and where it came from.

# THE TRUTH ABOUT LEWES

It gives us no pleasure to take issue with a comrade who has given long service to the Labour and Trade Union Movement, but Denis Hill's letter to the Argus cannot go unanswered. Coming from a past General Secretary of the Trades Union Council, it is naive, and offensive to all those trade unionists past and present who have continually fought against racialism and fascism. We are happy to use the Trade Union page in the Voice to take these matters up, unlike Brother Hill who is prepared to use the hostile press, which is only too willing to publish views which attempt to divide our movement. We should not forget that this letter was published during the General Election, which saw hysterical atteks on the TU and labour movement in the press locally and nationally. Bro. Hill's letter was a gift to the Tories, and reflected statements put out by them (and by the NF) pretty closely.

were denied entrance to the meeting, while people producing NF membership cards were being admitted. To oppose this sham we decided to seal off the entrance to the hall and were successful in keeping out over 20 fascists. If Bro. Hill was there we are sorry he did not join us. His charge that we were part of a ruthless mob was not born out by Chief Supt S.Cooper, one of the senior police officers on duty, who was reported in the Argus as saying, "Most of the crowd behaved in a reasonable manner, though there were a few hotheads among them."

### **Red Fascists?**

Let us get down to the real issue issues, because it is necessary to expose the confusions of Bro Hill's letter. He follows the same course as the Tories follow, likening those people who actively challenge the Front to Red Fascists. We make the challenge to defend rights which were fought for and won by the Labour Movement. Let nobody forget that it is only the Labour Movement who will continue that defence, whether it be of the right to strike, to demonstate, or even to vote. Were these rights upheld in Hitler's Germany, in Mussolini's Italy or Franco's Spain?

"When we take over the reins of government, as one day we shall, the moment the mobsters try physical intimidation to prevent British workers doing their jobs, these mobsters will find themselves in police cells so quickly they won't know what hit them". (Guardian 22.1.79)

Now that the National Front have been humiliated and rejected in the elections, and with demoralisation sweeping its ranks, the lunatic fringe is trying to hold it together by more unprovoked attacks upon our movement and those of its members who have fought against this degenerate party of thugs. In Brighton in recent months, a number of Trade Unionists have been violently assaulted, shops have been attacked. socialist meetings have also been attacked. Following the Lewes meeting the University Disco was attacked by fascists. Even as I write, a Trade 'nionist from Brighton lies in hospital with his jaw broken in three places by a fascist gang. Is all this to go unchallenged?

### Democracy

Now let's get the events in Lewes in context. Bro Hill talks about democratic rights. Everyone ought to know by now that the NF sought to hold a meeting in Southall, a "public" meeting to which the public were not to be admitted. As an expression of true democracy thousands of local people turned out on the streets to stop them, because they were sick of the intimidation by the fascist thugs which had previously led to three deaths in the area. This resistance is a necessary exercise of democratic right in te same way that Trade Unionists ed their democratic right to march against the Industrial Relations Act. The right wing press would have its readers believe that this was an action by bloodthirsty ruthless mob of outside "agitators". Later, however, the Observer reported that = of those arrested were non-white local residents.

The struggle in this country against Moseley in the thirties was greeted with the same hypocritical hysteria in the press which is now being turned on those prepared to stand up and resist the oppressive racialism of the new Nazis. If Bro. Hill thinks a measure of freedom in our society should be the freedom of racialists to encourage thugs to attack and intimidate people because they don't like the colour of their skin, or to plan to expel people from the country because their husbands, wives or children are not white, then he should consider whether the name of freedom is not being abused. The argument that "if we ignore these people they will go away" has been used before. The

# The Way Forward!

Finally, the events of the past few years must be put in perspective. The capitalist system is in chaos, the economic and social system in massive crisis, with mass unemployment, falling living standards, bad housing, lack of educational opportunities. In thse conditions, the fascist gangsters must be seen as the rotten pus of our society coming to the surface, exploiting these problems, and using black people as a scapegoat to gain an ear within the demoralised sections of our society. The Labour Movement must do everything in its power to defend all our people, and at the same time make the fundamental shift towards Socialism. On the way we must deal with the racialist, and with the fascist, wherever we find them. And we must stop any attempt to divide our movement. We can do without our own members trying to stab us in the back. Let us get on with the job. Hitler would have known what we are doing; he said in 1933 - "Only one thing could have stopped our movement - if our adversaries had understood its principle and from the first day had smashed with the utmost brutality the nucleus of our new movement."

Following the events at Southall a Trade Unionist was murdered. If we are concerned with democratic rights we should demand a full public enquiry into that death, not the cover-up which seems likely. On this matter Hill's silence is deafening.

In the Brighton area, and particularly in the Anti-Fascist Committee the Trades Union Council have a long record of fighting racialism and fascism. Despite what Hill says, many Trade unionists were present at Lewes, when again the NF denied access to a meeting they had advertised as "public". A number of us Fascists did not go away, and millions paid the price. They will not go away now, unless we are prepared to fight this evil with every weapon we have.

Does the comrade really believe that in stopping the circulation of racialist filth, in not letting meetings to spread such filth go unchallenged, we are infringing his democratic rights? He suggests that he is something of an expert on National Socialism. If he wants a reminder, an echo of the thirties, let him hear Tyndall in reference

# THE NUT AND TEACHERS PAY



At the time of writing agreement between the teachers negotiating panel and Management has just been announced.Whether the general membership of the NUT will accept the offer will be known after a special salaries conference next month. (june) However, the teachers pay dispute is not past history; the issues involved are still of great importance. Many more groups of workers may find that they are being confronted by the

and representatives of the DES.Any agreement reached must then be ratified by Parliament.

The erosion of the Houghton Award has been patently obvious to teachers but not to the Management Panel.We were forced in April 1978 to take action to secure a written commitment to the so-called 'principles of Houghton' . A joint Working Party was set up and reported last January-the figures contained in the report, agreed by Management, form the basis of our 36.5% claim.

Negotiations began on March 7; while the meeting was in progress the Government announced the setting up of the Standing Commission on Comparability.Coincidence?

The teachers wanted to negotiate in the normal way-the Management wanted a reference to the Commission. ### Attacks On Teachers

Standing Commission on Comparability. Thus I believe that the teachers struggle for a fair wage holds lessons for all workers.

### Why Did The NUT Take Action.

Because the Government refused to allow an offer to teachers which could have lead to a settlement on April 27. Even though it had known of the issues for some time. The teachers pay claim was lodged over 2 months ago. The package being offered to teachers was far inferior to that being given to other groups like manual workers, nurses and civil servants. Why? . Was it because teachers entered negotiations wanting to talk rather than take action? However, action was forced upon them and in this article I will attempt to briefly outline the issues involved.

The teachers claim was to restore a pay level set by independent inquiry (the Houghton Report ) in 1974. The Government at that time were forcdecade teachers pay had fallen far behind that of comparable workers in other areas, such as civil servants. When the 1974 'Houghton Award' was agreed by parliament the then Secretary for Education said; 'For teachers to fall behind, year after year, then have a special catching up exercise at long intervals would be to sell teachers short in the future as we did in the past' Having acted 'responsibly'and settled within the various incomes policies during the past 5 years we have been'sold short'. By the very nature of our work teachers cannot negotiate produvtivity deals, bonus schemes, etc., and so the value of the Houghton Award has been eroded year after year.



Reference To The Standing Commission.

Before any group of workers goes to the Commission terms of reference must be agreed jointly by the Management and the Unions. The teachers wanted some mention made of the Houghton relativities; the Management did notwere they attempting to renege on their previous commitment to Houghton? Some members of the panel have said ed to. accept that during the preceeding that teachers only received the Houghton Award because, at that time, there was a shortage of teachers, implying that now there are tens of thousands of teachers unemployed, there is no need to pay them more than a minimum. What teachers were demanding was that they be treated no worse than manual workers and civil servants were by the last government, and no worse than the Police and Armed Forces by the present government. Our action has forced the Management Panel to accept that the terms of reference should include some mention of Houghton. This is why the NUT considers the Commission is more likely to produce an acceptable offer if the dispute had gone to arbitration-another possibility.Under arbitration the teachers would hace no say in any terms of reference.

expense. Their tactics paralleled those used to discredit other groups of workers such as the nurses and civil servants. Many pages of Brighton Voice could be taken up exposing this innuendo for what it is However I will take up just one issue-that is, the claim that teachers have a 'cushy' life.Anyone who has taught in state schools, starved of finance and resources as they are, will know just how un founded this claim is. The National Foundation for Educatioal Research carried out an extensive survey (in 72 secondary schools in surrey) and report ed that if teachers were to receive 45 minute lunch breaks like other workers and 4 weeks holiday a year, their hours would work out at nearly 43 a week.

### The Future.

By the time you read this article the agreement, that is , the interim award and reference to the Standing Commission on Comparability, may have been ratified by the general membership of the NUT; however, even if it has, this will not be the end of the NUTs fight for a good and fair educatioal system. The majority of the NUTs finances and energies are directed toward improving the educational provision in this country.Our schools are being starved of resources, as are our Health and Social Services. We must oppose any further cuts and actively earpaign for real improvement.
