## Militant Nalgo On Campus FIGHT AGAINST CUT <br> Why are the employers forcing a confrontation ? Well, as usual

## INREAL WAGES

NAIGO WORKERS AT TIE UNIVERSITY hav finally hac enoufh of low wazes and are taking industrial action. Secretaries, clerks, typists, telepkone operators,library assist $n t s$, nurses, domestic bursars,nursery and creche workers make up the NALGO branch at the university of Sussex as at other universities, and for years they have been providing many of the essential services on which the university depends at very low cost to the maragement. Now they want a fair wage and the managerent won't listen. Their employers won't even go to arbitration - they are afraid that the NAIGO workers would be awarded everything they are asking for.

So, reluctantly say NALGC, the worizers are hittine the university where, it hurts most - in the pocket. They are blacking all work to do with the registration of :tudents, and that means that the university will unable
will be unable to lay their hands on the hundreds of thousands of pounds which come by way of fees when the students are registered at the beginning of each year. Without this money the university is virtually perniless, ana so too is the Students' Union which takes a sum from each student at registration to pay for its activities.

What are NAIGO asking for? They reckon that according to the tables of the last government they are classed as low paid workers, since $90 \%$ of them earn less than $£ 70$ gross for a full working week. The management are offering a paltry $9 \%$ extra when inflation is currently running at $15.6 \%$ - in other words they are being offercd a cut in real wages. NALGO therefore are demanding a $24 \%$ increase which they quite reasonably point out is in line with other clerical workers elsewhere. (NHS clerical workers got 19-30\% and civil service clerical staff up to $34 \%$ ).
they estimate that clerical. workers are not a very strong union boäy and will soon back dorm. After all $90 \%$ of these workers are women, and according to the vicv of a male-dominated soci y should be grateful to the university for being able to come along and earm a little pocket money to supplemert the male's wagepacket. And then there are all the informal social pressures which the university can bring to bear. Most of the NALGO workers are in small offices, working for the university teachers or university administrators. The employers believe that once the university is back, the NALGO workers will individually be too embarrassed to refuse work for their immediate bosses, and all talk of milita action will collapse.

Eut this time NALGO means business, and they already have the support of the university teachers union who are backing the pay claim. Doubtless NUPE, ASTMS and the Studerts will do the same evan if they have reservations, like the teachers, about the action which NALGC have docided on. So there's a pretty strone unior line-up out on the campus.

ONE. WORD OF CAUTION, TTYOUGH. A solia union line-ry at the university is not always what it shculd be. The AUT (the teachers' union) doesn't like giving instructions to its merbers - it only gives advice. Individual members can act totally at odds with the union's policy and get away with it. ASTNS, the union to which most of the technicians belong is not much tougher, and the NUS, the students' union very rarely carries all the students with it. So when it comes to the actual working situation the employers can count on a lot of individual black-leg activity, and already this is happening.

Finally, there is a wider point at issue in the NALGO action. Universities are more than just collections of students, teachers and administrators and should not exist just for the benefit of these
three privileged groups. If the NALGC action can strike a real blow for the university as a resource centre for the whole community, in which all the workers, whether teachers, porters, secretaries or gardeners are equally valued, then they will have won an historic victory - as well as $24 \%$.

## TAK CUIS?

In the Inland Rovenue, the same philosophy of cutback pervades. The rating revaluation has been cancelled, leading to a loss of 1,400 jobs and continued inequities for rate payers. In raxes the massive outs in higher rate tax levels has meant forcunes for the most highly paid and again a job loss of some 1500 staft.
For the whole revenue the ban on recruitment, imposed in May, has led to enormous problems in the provision of a proper service to the pablic, and in tackling the problems of the 'black economy', which alone is reckoned to be losing £3, 000 m p.a. in revenue - more than the totality of cuts being oroposea for the public seotor as a whole.

## EDUCATION IN DANGER

Education for all, from the cradle to the grave, is a fundamental ideal of the Labour Movement. The education system as it developed after the war was slowly moving towards this dream. Now the dream is over' $~$ the nightmare has begun.

Tory cuts are carving deep wounds in the national and local education service - it will take years to repair the damage and in the meantime all children, except of course those with rich parents, will suffer.

The recent cuts come on top of six years of vicious attacks. The last Labour government must take a major responsibility for allowing Education to be sacrificed to the requirements or international capitalism in the shape of the I.M.F. as these figures show:
December 1973 - £182 mill. sut. November $1971_{+}$- £60 mill. cut. April 1975 - £ 76 mill. cut. February 1976 - £1030 mill. cut from planned spending for the years 1975-9.
July 1976 - £115 mill. cut from 1976-3 spending. Between 1977 and 1979, Local Authorities urderspent by £176.6 mill. on plamed spending.

The Tory Government proposes to cut £55 mill. of central govt. spending, $£ 300$ mill. off the rate support grant to looal authorities and 3\% off manpower costs for education.

These cuts mean that your chilimen sufier. Class size:s are too large. Children are being taught subjects by non-specialist staff. Spending on books and paper is severly restricted. Thildresi with special difiriculties, often from the poorer familics, do not get the help they need. School buildings are not maintained properly. The cuts also mean that local communities suffer with restrictions on the use of school buildings, increased charges and even the closure of some facilities。

The cuts are not over, the East Sussex County Council are at the moment discussing the following proposed. cuts, to reduce the 1930/81 budget by $£ 2.5$ mill.

1. Cutting $£ 139,000$ from the allowance for inflation in the price of school supplies.
Result: At least a $15 \%$ reduction in provision of teaching materials.
2. Cutting $£ 150,000$ budgetted for adilitional staff.
Result: 81 lost joks - reduction in standards.
3. Saving $£ 140,000$ by increasing Ad:llt Education fees again. Result: Fewe but more expensive evening classes.
4. Cutting Health and Safety Expenditure from $£ 50,000$ to $£ 25,000$.
Result: Less Health and Safety in Schools!
5. Saving $£ 80,000$ by either reducing places at FE colleges or charging higher fees.
Result: Greater difficulties for FE students.
6. Cutting $£ 136,000$ from budget for instrumental music teachers. Result: It may cost $£ 20.00$ e term for lessons - can you afford it?
