His campaign against 'scroungers' has already won the thumbs up from old ladies in Hove and such veteran nasties as Iain Sproat, M.P.


He is intending to spend £32 million of our money on employing 1,000 more DHSS snoopers to diligently seek out fraud in every corner of the land. This, he claims, will save the country £50 million a year.

However, official DHSS statistics indicate that only about £4 million a year is wrongly paid out - far less than 1% of total payments - so there doesn't seem to be much scope for the snoopense to pay their wages, much less have anything over for a grateful nation. "200-place carpark in Jubilee St., Now what about tax evasion? Well, only yards from the multi-storey this is altogether a more promising area. The Inland Revenue estimates that about £3,000 million is fiddled every year, i.e. seven hundred and fifty times the DHSS total, if my maths is right.

Only 260 people are employed to try and recover this, while the DHSS will now have 5,400 doing the job for them. This would be totally illogical, but for one thing: most people fiddling the DHSS are poor and most evading taxes are rich.

Anyone with half an eye can see that the supermarket war is hotting up again, with short-term gains in prospect for us, the till-fodder, as Sainsburys, Tescos, Fine Fare, etc. fight for our custom. But what happens when they 've all reduced their prices and we've gone back to where we shopped in the first place?

Since 1961, the proportion of income spent on food has gone down by a quarter, so the squabbling is for a falling market. The main companies are continually having to expand in order to stand still - think of the new or enlarged supermarkets built in Brighton and

Last week East Sussex parents were told of the 'new arrangements for School Milk, School Meals and School Transport'. Such a harmless phrase - new 'arrangements' - but what a load of 19th century Tory dogma underneath. The county, like other Tory strongholds in the country at large, is now moving deliberately towards a new and ever more vicious form of selective education.

An ordinary family with two kids at secondary school will now have to pay almost £8 A WEEK for school meals and transport. Less than a year ago it was £2.50.

## Money decides

But the staggering increase is only part of the story. The implications for education are ten times more serious.

It is well known that the middleclasses will pay almost anything for education, because they know that it eventually buys position and

influence. Working class families, who have been excluded from the educational privileges for so long and who still see only a tiny handful of their children going on to college and university, still need a lot of encouragement and persuasion to give education a try. One of the only ways forward to a more equal education is to offer these working class families real incentives to keep their children on after 16, and so we need Free transport and grants for for 16-18 yr olds. (We need a whole lot else of course - like a totally different kind of education ... ) The Tories know this and have callously decided to move in the opposite direction. Their policy is to make it even more difficult for working class kids to get a fair chance, by putting up the basic charges for what should be theirs FREE and BY RIGHT. The Anti-Nuclear Campaign is gathering momentum in response to the Tory proposals to build 20 new nuclear reactors, probably Pressurised Water Reactors. PWR's are an American design Thich has a highly questionable safety record. It was a PWR which was involved in the 'TMI-2 incident', as a recent publication from the nuclear research establishment at Harwell liked to call the near disaster at Three Mile Island, Harrisburg, last year.

This program will cost us around £20,000 million over the next decade. That's about 4 times what was spent alltogether on Concorde, British Leyland, Rolls Royce, and British Steel, burnt out by the white heat of technological change over the last decade.

All this is happening at a time when we are being told that we cannot afford basic social services. The CEGB has 60% over-capacity and many studies show that the rate of growth in electricity consumption is falling rapidly.

It is in this climate that the Anti-Nuclear Campaign is getting off the ground, providing a national umbrella organisation which has linked together both Trades Unions and environmental groups.

Brighton & Nuclear

Apart from the risks from radiation in the event of an accident at Dungeness or during the transport of nuclear waste to Windscale, Brighton jobs are at risk.

The SE region of the CEGB have no plans to close Brighton (formerly Shoreham B) power station at the moment. For although it is a relatively small power station(33MW (300 MW) and not used for base load generation it efficiently burns low grade coal and a small amount of pellatized household waste derived fuel from Eastbourne.


Thus the residents of Shoreham, Hove and Brighton would benifit in four ways: local jobs and others nationally would be guarrenteed; there would be no more 'smuts' falling on them; and they would get cheap central heating.

This compares with the capital intensive nature of nuclear power, £20,000 per job with nuclear energy versus £800 per job in coal mining. The fluidized bed and combined heat and power represents just one of the alternatives to nuclear power for Brighton. The others include wind, wave and solar energy but prehaps the most important being conservation.

This has been organised by Friends of the Earth and sponsored by Anti-Nuclear Campaign, Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, Conservation SOciety, Greenpeace, Socialist Environment and Resources Association, Students against Nuclear Energy, and the World Information Service on Energy. The march is seen as a major demonstration showing the extent of anti-nuclear feeling in

## 'Bloody disgusting'

As reported in the last issue of the BRIGHTON VOICE, two of the people campaigning for the reinstatement of the lollipop patrols in Moulsecoomb were arrested for their part in the protest actions. On February 15th their case came up before the magistrates in Brighton Court.

The two, a woman and a man, were jointly charged with damaging public property i.e. painting zebra crossing in Hodshrove Road. The East Sussex County Council claimed compensation of £221.80. In addition, the man was charged with two cases of assault on t' police, and with damaging public perty to the value of £2 (a ripped anorak worn by a plainclothes policeman;). Both pleaded guilty to the charges.

On the 15th of November last at around midnight, the police were waiting in ambush for a repetition of the zebracrossing painting. The two who were later arrested were seen painting a zebra on the road - this is not disputed. But what happened next led to the more serious charges of assault being brought.

What is clear is that after finishing the crossing, the two split up to walk home. As soon as this had happened a burly policeman in plainclothes jumped out of the bushes and attacked ("arrested") the woman, but WITHOUT identifying himself as a policeman - he claimed that he didn't realise that it was a woman he was attacking !! Perhaps this explains why he grabbed ner round the neck in a stranglehold. Surprisingly, the woman struggled, and screamed for help.

The man involved, a little distance away, ran back to stop what he thought was a vicious attack and jumped on the assailant, ripping his anorak in the process. He was immediately set on from behind by another policeman, and in the fight a uniformed P.C. was kicked.

This then was the gist of the case. The magistrates were clearly sympathetic to the Moulsecoomb campaign, but they were duty-bound to be seen to be tough on 'assaults' on the police, even where the defendant could not have known savage increases. Outside the that it was the police. Accordingly, the two were bound over for 12 months, and ordered to share court costs of £25. More importantly, only £14.80 was held to be due to the Council, since the remaining £207 was for the services of the private contractors hired to remove the crossings, and it was far from certain that the two involved could be held responsible for Council workmen refusing to do the job. The Council still has the option of taking

These are not 'arrangements' they are not even 'cuts' or 'economies'. They are a carefully planned attack on the educational futures of millions of ordinary kids. They are a massive step backwards by a government that is going backwards faster than any in living memory. The campaign against it must therefore be more than a campaign 'against the cuts'. Resistance must be total.

# PAINTING THE SCHOOLS TORY IBLUE

East Sussex County Council's cuts in education spending are beginning to be felt in many schools in the Brighton area. Some are more obvious, such as the cuts in travel subsidies for rural children. Others are more subtle.

ESCC have recently told all local schools that they will not be redecorated in the forseeable future, but have offered paint to schools who can get teachers and students to do the work for them.

You might think that getting children to decorate their own classroom is a good idea; it fosters the idea that the room 'belongs' to the children; gives them pride in their workplace etc. These are all good reasons for involving students in painting- and many other activities (course organisation, evaluation, teacher assessment?)

However, we must realise that ESCC have not suddenly gained an enlightened new approach to education, but are MAKING CUTS. By getting children to do the work, the Council is causing unemployment now and/or in the future (the schools must be painted sometime). A precedent



is being created which will be used as an excuse to get other schools/ kids/teachers to do painting; and painting is merely the beginning. What else will ESCC expect teachers and students to do for themselvesrepairs to buildings, raising money for textbooks?



The ruling class is getting panicky. "I have never known in my35 years as a Member of Parliment such fear, apprehension and despondency," admitted Callagan this Febuary, as section after section of workers moved into the front line of the class battle now impending.



Collision, too, with the N.H.S. bureaucracy.





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

#### ABORTION: NOT AN EASY CHOICE

At present, a number of pressures surround the woman who is making a decision about abortion. Not only are there the emotional and ethical aspects that can prove very distressing for the woman, but there are also the problems of gaining access to abortion facilities. Often the decision to have an abortion can be a difficult one. For some women who are clear about what they want the decision is not so traumatic. In all case, however, the woman is obliged to go through a series of steps that can be upsetting and humiliating.

Not only does the woman have to face delays in pregnancy-test results, appointments to see doctors and consultants, but she is also often put in a position of having to make out a case and plead with the doctors - some of whom will be reluctant to grant her request. If she is able to have the operation she is again subject to moralistic attitudes of those that are involved in it. It is vital that women should not have to undergo these delays and pressures and that they have full rights to make their own decisions about whether to have an abortion or not, as well as having access to safe, quick and efficient services."

#### THE STORY SO FAR ...

John Corrie's Abortion (Amendments) Bill was due for its third reading in Parliament on Friday 8th Feb. In fact the debate has been continued on the 15th and the 29th Feb So far no conclusion has been reached, and this is going to print too early for the result of the 29th. If no conclusion is reached this time, the bill must either go to the bottom of the pile of private members bills, or granted extra time - this can only be granted by the Leader of the House, but he is Norman St John-Stevas, an antiabortion catholic.

Compromise talks between opponents and sponsors of the bill have been held over the past fortnight. Sponsors offered to accept the proposal to make the upper time limit for legal abortions 24 weeks, instead of 20. They were also prepared to change the word "serious" to "substantial", with reference to the risk to the mother as grounds for abortion. But opponents of the bill are rightly refusing to accept the Corrie bill in any form whatsoever.

Usually kids come out of school clutching their drawings and a note from the headteacher about jumble sales. This time they came out of Balfour First and Middle schools with a moral sermon from the friends of Mrs Mary Whitehouse. Oh yes, no kidding. It was a pamphlet headed 'A Challenge to Parents from the Year of the Child' (see below) but it wasn't from the year of the child at all, but from a private local pressure group dedicated to cleaning up Brighton and Hove families and enrolling their children in to the Girl Guides and the Boy Scouts. (Now who could possibly object to that ??)

At first parents couldn't believe it. 'Who gave you this? The school? Surely not. It's from a private moral campaign. It says so - the Brighton and Hove Community Standards Association. Who are they, anyway? Scientologists? Festival of Light? The soft centre of the National Front? The pro-Corrie lobby ? Everyday country folk?'

Murmurs grew into protests. Divorced parents objected to the stress on marriage, and coloured parents, French parents, Welsh parents - all parentsobjected to the mysterious threat contained in the promise to 'combat undesirable outside influences!. So they wrote to Mr Kendall the Brighton Education Officer.

WE ARE RESPONSIBLE for bringing them into the world, for feeding, clothing and caring for them. Our standards of behaviour are most likely to be the standards that they follow.

WE HAVE DECIDED:

TO UPHOLD the values of love and marriage and a stable family life;

TO STRESS the value of discipline and consideron for others, as a countermeasure to violence and aggression;

TO MAKE SURE that the standards we expect from our children are those that we are living ourselves;

TO CAMPAIGN for higher standards in films, TV magazines, etc., and to try to get offensive material banned from view;

TO DISCOURAGE children from drinking and drug-taking. The numbers of young alcoholics are on the increase;

TO ENCOURAGE children to join Youth Clubs, Scouts and Guides, Boys and Girls Brigades and other recreational and sporting activities. Children who do not learn to serve, learn to exploit, and a happy and fulfilled child is much less likely to get into trouble;

TO BUILD for future generations a society in which they will be proud to live.

In order to further these aims and combat undesirable outside influences, some of us have joined Community Standards Associations.



Black Rock Pool - mid 1960's


# -time for action



#### Us and Them

Just about the first thing the Tories did when they got back to power was to abolish the Royal Commission on the Distribution of Income and Wealth, and after reading its conclusions it's easy to see why.

The Commission's report, 'An A-Z of Income and Wealth' is a fascinating account of the divisions in our society, showing that the top 1% of the population own as much as the bottom 80% and that the top tenth earn (or at any rate, get) five times the average income of the bottom half, whose share of the total has not changed in the last thirty years.

The A-Z also shows that although women's earnings have increased 50% faster than men's over the last twenty years, they still make up nearly three-quarters of the lowest paid workers.

The report costs £1.25 from HM Stationery Office, or via decent bookshops.

## CHEAP AT THE PRICE

A Nottingham group has exploded the economic rubbish behind plans to sell off the best of the country's five million council

Their report, just published, shows that between 1976 and 1979, Nottingham Council sold off 5,356 houses, resulting in an eventual loss of £75 million (1977 prices) when interest charges are paid. If the Tory target of 100,000 houses a year nationally is reached, the annual loss will be £1,200 million, up to £35,000 on each house.

The report, which goes into great detail, is available from Nottingham Alternative Publications, 83, Beauvale Rd., The Meadows, Nottingham, price £1 plus 15p postage.

Meanwhile, housing starts in the last year were the lowest since 1948, only 60,000 in the public sector.

#### How:

The Sursex 5'

#### Dear Readers,

As a member of Sussex University Students Union I would like to comment on Mike O'Neil who recently took out a writ against the Union. It outlawed a decision taken by numerous Union General Meetings to pay the fines of the 'Sussex 5'. The 'Sussex 5' were among over 300 stud-

ents (including myself) involved in disruption of Disciplinary Resit exams set for boycotters of 'Preliminary ' exams. The by now famous union policy to disrupt these resits was passed in response to an appeal from a mass-meeting of the boycotters who feared expulsion should they boycott a 2nd time; thus they came to the Union for support.

Union General Meetings were held on average every 4 days through the 'heat of the summer, attended by between 500

and 200C students. Every meeting consistently re-affirmed our policy of support for the Boycott re-sitters. It was these meetings that directed the campaign, NOT a handfull of loonie lefties. The issues at stake were not whether one agreed with disrupting exams, but whether one had the right to democratically discuss, decide and act upon what concerns the student membership...basic Union perogatives were being threatened. For this reason

ge numbers of 'moderates', 'a-pol-

itical people', and even Tories involved themselves to defend their Union rights.

The arrest of the Sussex 5' was, then, clearly victimisation of 5 individuals among 300; they were convicted on Police identifications written after their arrests some 3 hours after they were sopposedly spotted among a "seething mass of left wing violence"

The Union membership shared this view by proposing to pay their fines. Thus O'Neil was not only threatening the 5 with jail when he sought his injunction, but he was condoning the victimisation of the 5 from the crowd of 300, he was paying gross insult to everyone of the 2000 students who collectively involved themselves

in directing the events of last summer; most terribly, he has dismissed all democratic concepts of decision-making as structurally provided for by our Union meetings. Most students are angry with O'Neil. Some want to expel him.But most realised that to expel him would divert the issue from defending the 'Sussex 5'. It was this that saved O'Neil.

# LEN MURRAY

#### A PERSONAL VIEW


Anyone attending the Annual General Meeting of Brighton Trades Council in the hope of inspiration, or at least an experience in constructive leadership to transmit to their members, must have felt sadly deflated by the address of its guest speaker. Mr Len Murray.

In a speech punctuated with rallying calls to educate those comrades still unconvinced by the merits of Trades Unions and punch drunk from further rounds of expenditure cuts, the audience were reminded of the necessity for 'positive' action - to win back the support of trade unionists (many disillusioned by past labour govs) with a strategy of education and example.

Once again the Trade Union movement was being forced to adopt a 'defensive posture' by a government intent on confrontation and regression. Its narrow-minded leadership might do well to take a lesson from history, often referred to as 'learning from experience'; attacks on unorganised workers, in the main women and the low paid, legislation against the closed op and the interference of judges weaned on the finer arts of capitalism, by no means innovations. In his address to the United Front Congress in Bermondsey on Feb 24 1934, Harry Pollitt from the Unemployed Workers Movement referred to the current government's legislation - 'The congress has also to note the steady encroachments on free speech and public assembly (East Sussex County Council please note). They are also now making a great drive for the establishment of compulsory arbitration in their efforts to smash fighting trade unions and the right to strike' Further, though not specifically referred to by Mr Murray, Harry Pollitt went on, 'Above all the congress must note the feverish and open preparations for a new imperialist war, and a counter-revolutionary war against the Soviet Union - the increased expenditure on all forms of war preparations, the demand for larger armed services, and the dropping of any pretence at disarmament, and the whole line of the government in its foreign policy reveal it as the stronghold of all the world's reactionary forces'. References to the positive advantages that would be gained when the TUC could once again work hand in hand with a Labour government reflected Mr Murray's short memory, as did the attitude that people were beginning to sense that British Socialism, as we have come to know it, should be given a second chance. The policies which have been implemented under previous Labour/TUC coalitions have been, at best, mildly reformist. As long as politicians continue to tackle the long-term problems of industry and our welfare state with short-term policies they are merely patching holes in an already threadbare system.

As one member of the audience would have asked, had the opportunity n available:

'How long will it be before the Trade Union movement offers a cohesive alternative to capitalism rather than acquiescing in a temporary amelioration of its evils??'

It also means the acceptance of increased spending on the arms race (a major source for most of the new technology) and nuclear power.Whilst spending is being shifted into these destructive and anti-social processes, huge spending cuts on welfare are taking place.
