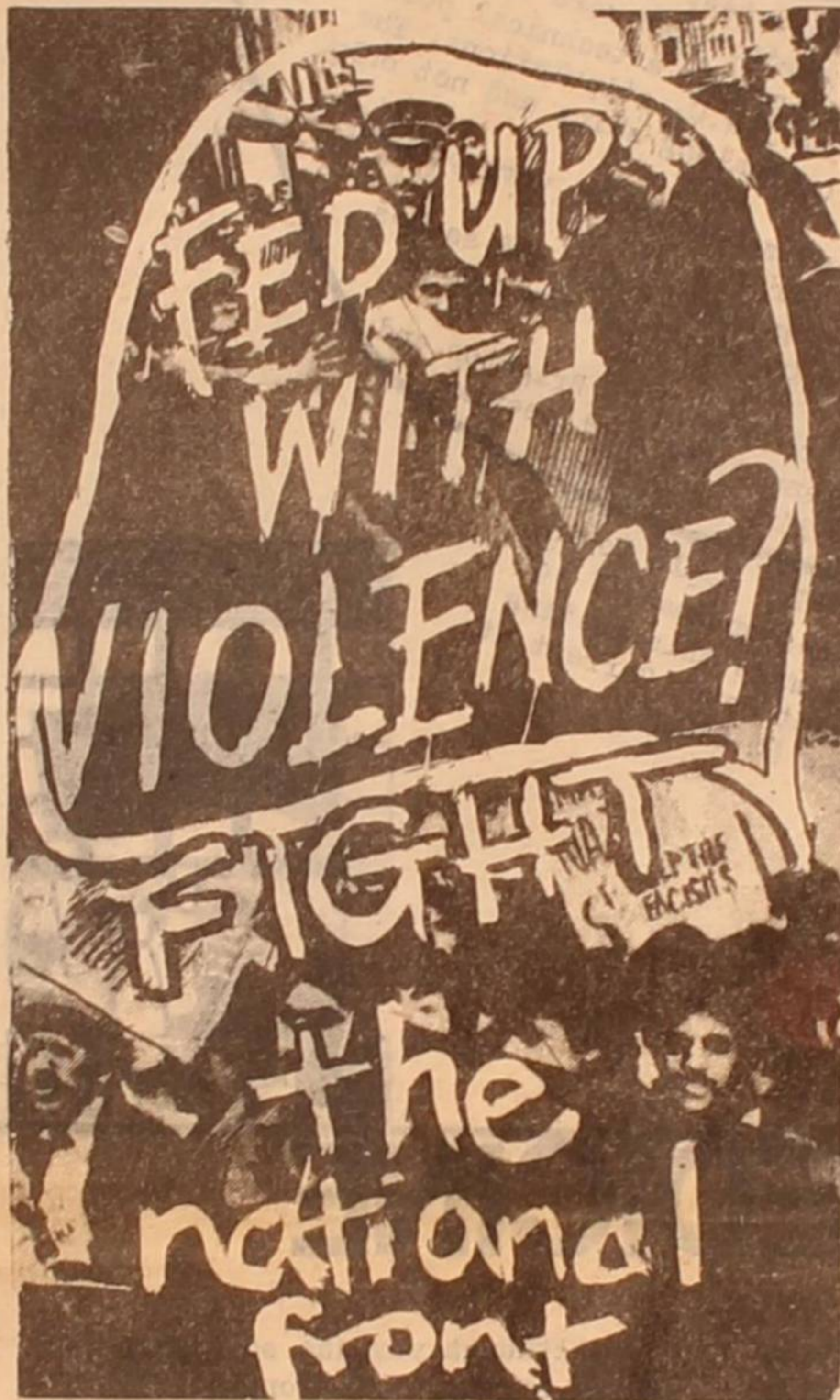

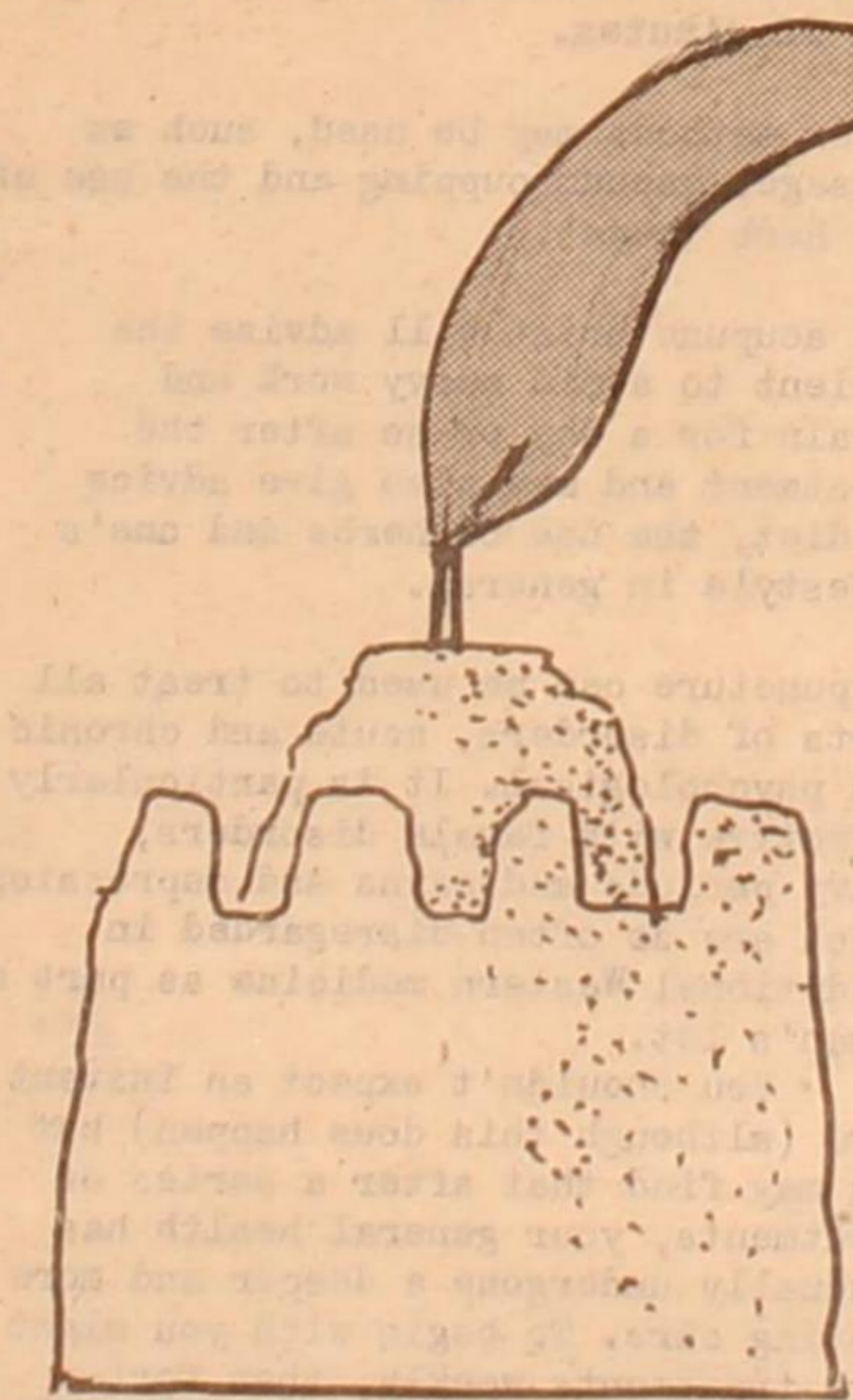

 However, unlike the article on the front page, I don't believe that "you, the employer, cares." Employers are in business - business enterprise can't afford to be kind - it needs to be profitable.

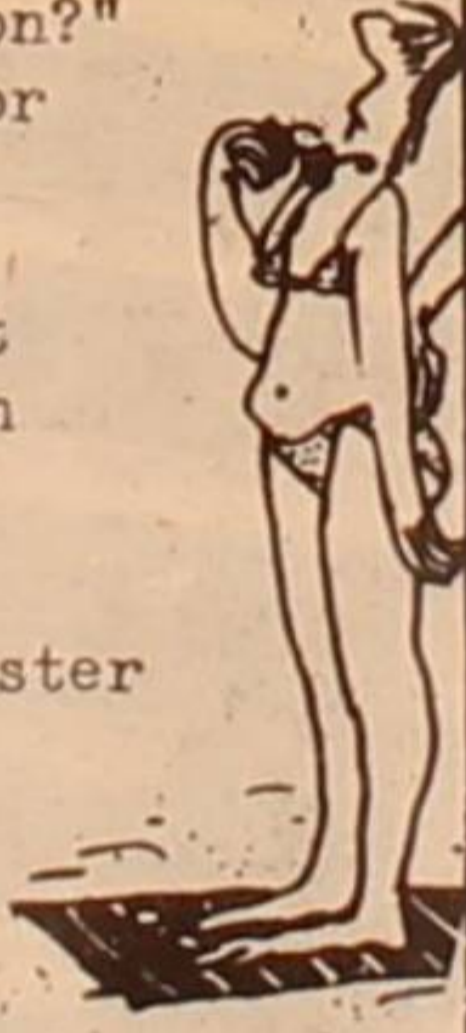
With a large group of unemployed, especially unemployed young people, employers can pick and choose as they see fit - sack anyone who doesn't toe the line, and pay low wages.

We wonder why there are so few women in the pub in this cartoon. Perhaps they are all sat outside with the children, feeding them crisps and lemonade.

Not only do Britain's licensing laws discriminate against children, but they do also against parents, by association.

- Children are however allowed into pubs under certain conditions:-
- a) if they are a child of the licensee.
  - b) resident of the building.
  - c) passing through the bar when there is no other means of access.
  - d) over the age of 14 or a child in 'arms'. (under the age of one.)
  - e) when there is a specified dining area more than 6 ft from the bar, such as in a hotel.
  - f) when there is a room or garden divided off in some way (door or steps) from the dispensing bar. This includes a lobby or children's room.

Obviously all this is up to the discretion of the individual landlord, but some are welcoming than others and may even let a child sit in a corner of the bar.

The CAMRA guide will tell you of the real ale pubs that have facilities for children, but there are more. If anyone knows of anywhere we can get a comprehensive list without tugging round them all, I'd be very grateful. ( and I've tried the Licensed Victuallers Association-Thanks;)

A spectacular demonstration last week supported a motion put before the International Whaling Commission Conference held at the Hotel Metropole, to call a ban on all whaling for the foreseeable future (moratorium). The call for the moratorium, despite a majority vote, was defeated (3/4 majority needed) and most of the conservationist proposals rejected. Canada, not a great whaling nation, surprised the conference by voting against the moratorium. The number of whales officially to be killed was reduced- this, however is merely a technical point, as many countries already contravene rules claiming misunderstanding of the I.W.C. stipulations. The I.W.C. have, however agreed that 'outside observers' can be present on whaling ships and not only those from other whaling nations as before. The demonstration continued for the whole week of the conference and seemed to be very popular among seafront commuters; if you want to save the whales honk your horn!  
 The day of the vote on the moratorium voting against whales and sported the, by now famous large inflatable whale. Next year the I.W.C. again holds its conference in Brighton and an even bigger demonstration is planned. The next meeting Brighton Anti-Whaling Co-ordinating Committee is at the Eagle pub the 13th August.

**ALTERNATIVE MEDICINE**

A visit to an acupuncturist, despite popular belief, isn't going to fill you full of holes or be excruciatingly painful. In fact, unlike a visit to a G.P. where you can sit for hours in a waiting room, getting more and more tense and nervous, acupuncture is very relaxing.

On the first visit, which can last up to two hours, a good acupuncturist will ask questions about your general emotional state, diet, work, exercise, sleep, history and will note any symptoms, however small. It is lovely to be able to talk about all the odd pains and sensations without feeling like a hypochondriac. In fact he/she may even pick up on things that you had never thought of as significant.

Afterwards you will be asked to lie on a couch (you are not normally asked to undress) and the acupuncturist will note your general physical appearance, inspect your tongue and take the six pulses on each wrist which he/she will continue to monitor throughout.

The treatment involves using very fine stainless steel needles on a small number of acupuncture points on the body. There are hundreds of these but on my first visit he used three.

By stimulating these points the 'ch'i' (=energy) which flows through the 'meridians', and in denser form through the blood and body fluids, may, when there is an imbalance be redirected.

Although you can sometimes feel quite strong sensations at first, I often fall asleep at this stage. The needles usually stay in for up to 20 minutes.

Other methods may be used, such as massage, vacuum cupping and the use of the herb 'moxa'.

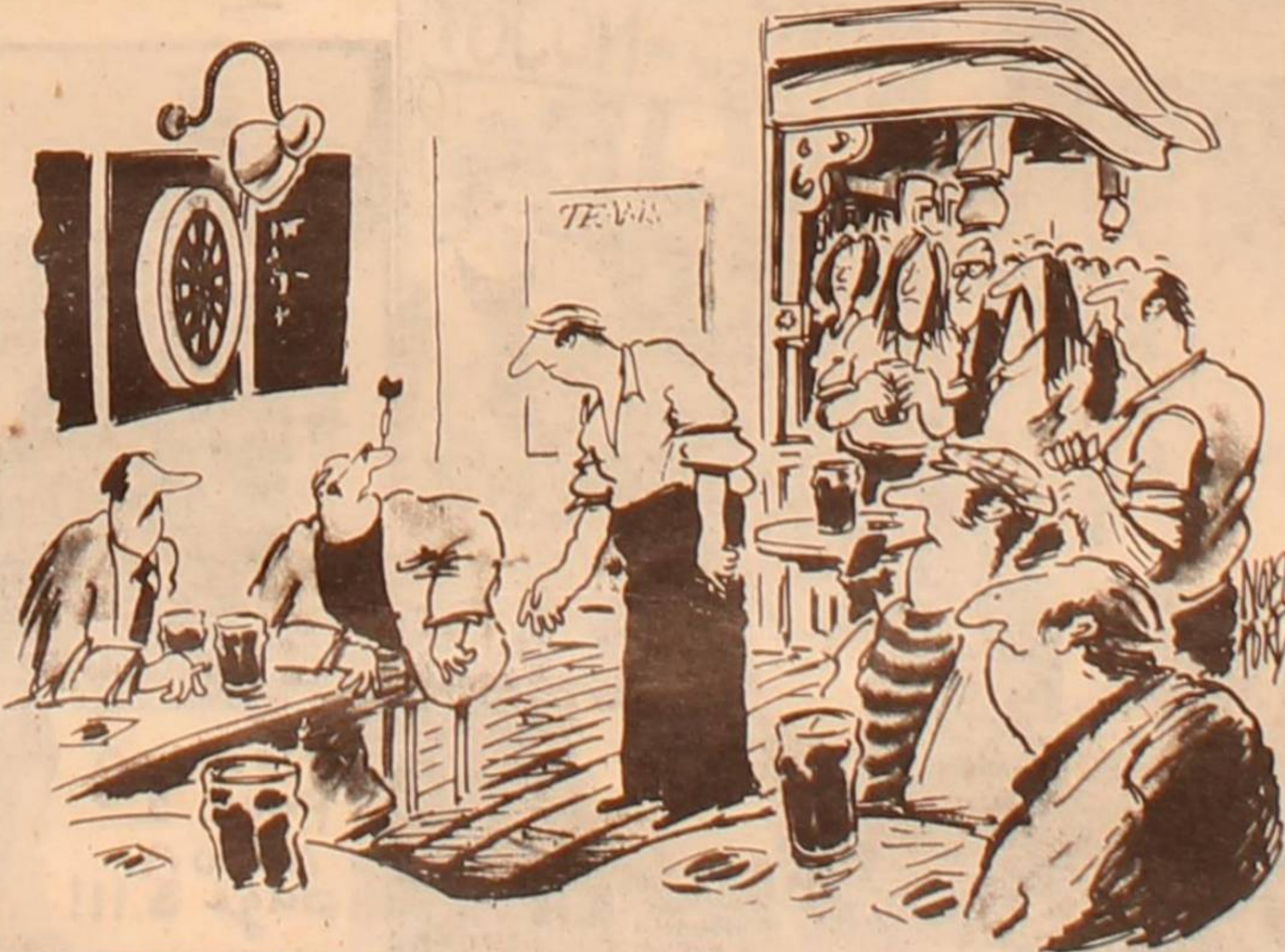
The acupuncturist will advise the patient to avoid heavy work and strain for a day or so after the treatment and may also give advice on diet, the use of herbs and one's lifestyle in general.

Acupuncture can be used to treat all sorts of disorders, acute and chronic and psychological. It is particularly effective with female disorders, heavy periods and pains and depressions which are so often disregarded in traditional Western medicine as part of woman's lot.

You shouldn't expect an instant cure (although this does happen) but you may find that after a series of treatments, your general health has gradually undergone a deeper and more lasting cure. To begin with you might have treatments weekly, then fortnightly and then occasional preventive checks. These all last up to an hour.

The individual is treated as a physical and psychological whole and as such the practitioner does not respond to the malfunction of any one part of the body by treating that and that alone. He or she seeks to restore the balance and concentration of energy that will alone resist disease.

The Clinic of Chinese Acupuncture, 6, Old Steine, Brighton have recently published a very interesting leaflet which goes much further than this article has been able to do. Charges from 1st August are £10 for the first session and £7 thereafter. In cases of financial hardship reductions will be made.

# No Fun at the picket

On the 22nd July a picket of 300 demonstrated against the National Front holding a bye-election meeting at Fairlight School in Pevensey Rd., Brighton. Knowledge of the meeting had caused anger amongst parents of this multi-racial school, and subsequently both the headmistress and the head master wrote a letter to parents saying that they were against the NF holding a meeting in the school but were required by law to allow any public election meetings to take place.

Brighton Voice spoke to Mrs. Henrietta Dombey, Chairperson of the Board of Managers of the Middle School. She said: "I have come here to see whether there is any infringement of electoral law, particularly with respect to the public nature of the meeting, because if the public is refused admittance it is not truly a public meeting and that should have implications for the East Sussex policy covering any future applications by the NF to hold such meetings."

As is usual at National Front marches and meetings the police turned out in full strength to, seemingly give the NF protection. The Voice was told that they had, in fact, been in the building since 11pm. the previous evening. If this is so the cost of this operation, plus the cost of the other coach loads of police who arrived on the day, must have gone well into the thousands.

The atmosphere amongst the demonstrators was emotional and strained. Parents with children at Fairlight School were amongst those who were picketing the meeting, shouting "You're not welcome in our school," while members of the Front yelled back abuse (commies, nigger lovers) from the windows of the Middle School at the waiting anti-fascist demonstrators.

People queued for 3 hours in an orderly fashion to gain access to the 'public' meeting. Harold Jones, the NF candidate, and 30 or so of his supporters (followed an hour later by the Eastbourne contingent) gained immediate entrance to the meeting; whereas anti-front demonstrators were required to be photographed and frisked by the NF to gain admittance. One high ranking police officer said that the organisers were entitled to ensure themselves that no person is carrying an offensive weapon. "Not seeing how a photograph was an insurance of any such thing, most people would not be submitted to this obvious intimidation by the NF, and were refused entry. However a few demonstrators did go into the meeting. Here is one of those people's experiences:

"Getting In- we stood outside for a long time, queuing to get into the meeting and making a lot of noise. The NF had announced that they would search us first and the police seemed happy to let them do this. Inside, we protested, were given

## SWP in Front line of fire

Frighteningly, the National Front again feel confident enough to beat people up on the streets. At 12.30 on Saturday, 26th July, 4 Socialist Worker paper sellers were attacked by between 7 and 9 National Front members outside the Open Market on London Road. An elderly woman was knocked over and injured in the fracas and SWP members suffered cuts and bruises. Efforts (?) by the police to find the Front members proved fruitless - they had obviously crept back into the woodwork.

This is only one of the incidents of violence out of a possible 6 that we know of by the NF. After the picket of their meeting near Fairlight School, they were involved in many attacks on anti-Front demonstrators and other bystanders.

the choice of being searched or leaving the building and were frisked by an NF woman.

The Meeting- It was small, male-dominated and ugly. We filtered in, in two's and three's and sat together at the back; very noticeably not NF supporters and very noticeably female. Martin Webster was speaking, trying to look respectable in a suit, against a background of Union Jacks. Predictable stuff about the multi-racial society not working, black and white kids not mixing, our standard of living dropping, unemployment rising and the country falling apart. I didn't hear anything about NF economic policy or their solution to these problems, except the implied one of getting rid of blacks. He attacked the 'violence' of the left, producing an argument to show that the trouble at Southall was not

caused by NF supporters, and complained of attempts to prevent NF meetings and marches taking place. The appeal was to the working-class, unemployed male: opponents of the NF were 'reds' and 'bourgeois intellectuals'. It was a noisy, heated meeting - we jeered, whistled and shouted. Webster's retorts were mainly of a personal nature and very sexist, whilst the heavies there reacted to us with aggressive, intimidating stares. A woman was escorted out for us heckling too much and some of us left before the end.

Afterwards- Mixed feelings. Delight that a small, mainly female group had gone in, caused disruption and not shown fear; this was combined with disgust at this open exhibition of fascism. There was a heavy, oppressive atmosphere about and I felt weighed down by it for days afterwards."

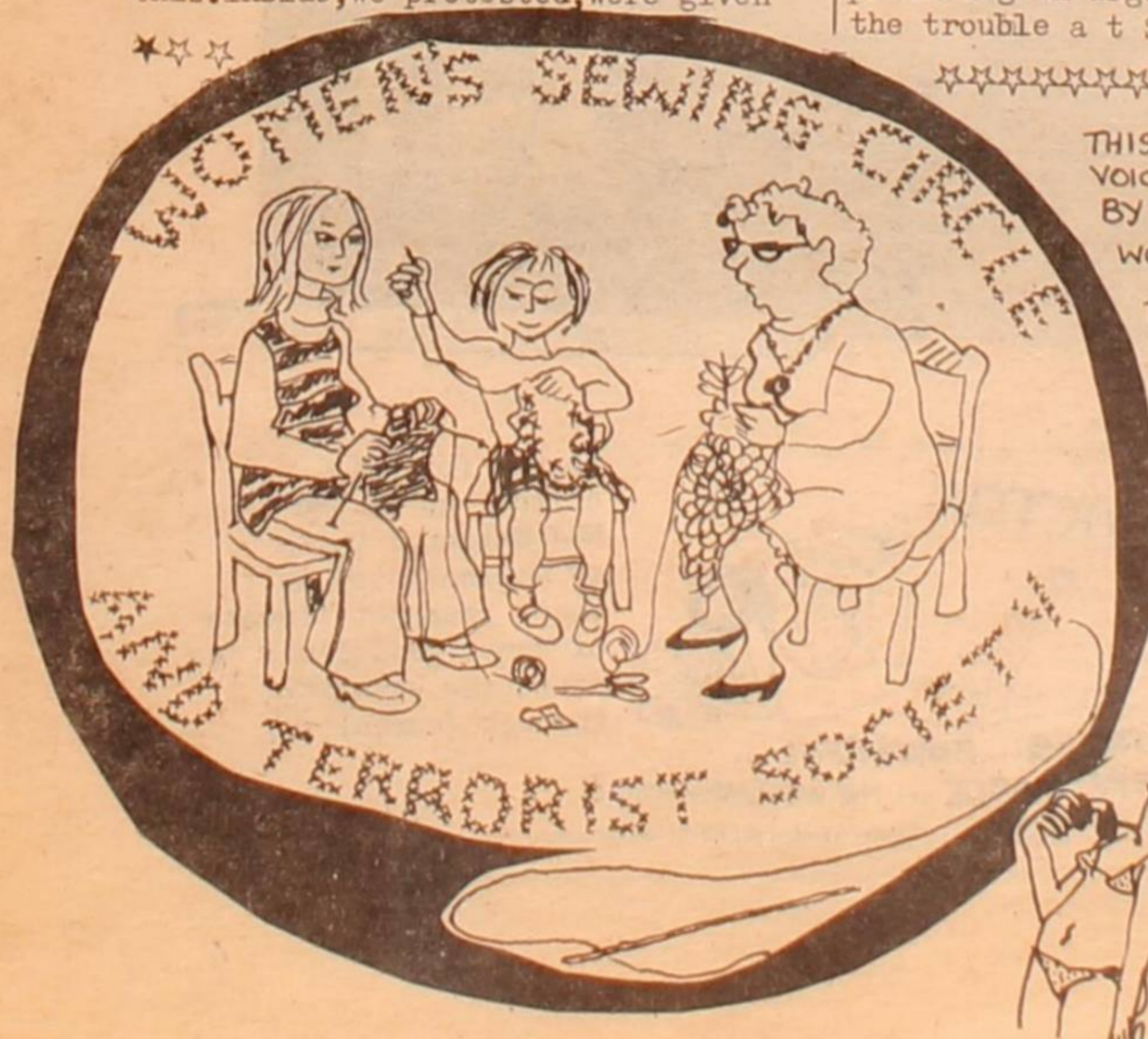

## SEAJET WORKERS MAKE MANAGEMENT SEA SENSE



Porters, being underpaid for overtime work, took industrial action at the Marina Seajet terminal earlier this month. (see July issue, Brighton Voice).

A disorganised middle management and cabin crew took over when porters refused to secure the seajet on docking or to deal with baggage..

Management quickly abandoned its usual bargaining position of 'Work or get out' and met the porters' demands. Since then workers representatives and management have met under the guidance of a new managing director Allison. However, although terminal staff have all received a weekly premium of £10, the hourly rate and thus the overtime rate remains the same.

Boss - you shouldn't have DONE it £10 premium! This means EVERYTHING ... Paris ... Vienna ... winters in the South of France!



In another example of their contempt for the people of Brighton, Tory councillors and their expert advisers in the Borough Engineer's Department want to convert the 'temporary' car park on Belmont Street behind London Road into a lorry and coach park for 100 vehicles.

Residents from surrounding areas, parents of the schoolchildren of St. Bartholomews School (whose entrance faces the entrance to the planned lorry park) and St. Barts' church goers were tipped off by a leak from a secret Council meeting. Just in time they mounted a massive campaign to express their outrage.

They organised protest meetings and a petition, and have lobbied councillors with a 7-page report, redoing the work of the 'experts' who have been accused by a Labour Councillor of either incompetence or maladministration; the briefing papers to the Highways committee did not even show the school, the church or the tech. next door, nor were there any traffic generation surveys!! The protestors have clearly embarrassed the Borough Council, and even persuaded many Tory councillors that their votes are at risk, causing Clr. Jim Saunders, the main protagonist, to withdraw it hastily from the Council Meeting on 3rd July.

Now, a modified scheme for a 'temporary' lorry park with added palliatives may be put forward but the protestors are convinced that this will not fool anyone. The scheme, permanent or temporary, ignores all environmental considerations, is a danger to schoolchildren and shoppers, and will cause considerable increases in heavy commercial traffic in the centre of Brighton-adding to the juggernauts already thundering through from Newhaven ferry.

Even the Department of Environment and County Council recognise the need to keep such traffic out of towns and the Borough has the statutory right to do so, if it wishes to. But the backwardness of our own Borough, serving the interests of the exhibition and tourist trade, the hoteliers, and its closest friends National Car Parks, means that the people of Brighton must continuously fight schemes so clearly at odds with their own well-being.

Brighton's housing situation is notorious, and the protestors insist that they will not rest until the Belmont Street site is used constructively to recreate the community which existed there until the Council demolition mania of the 1960s.

They are pressing for housing, or recreation facilities for the school.

**WAR GAME at the FRIENDS CENTRE**

Support for Southern African Liberation in Brighton.



On the morning of June 14 at the Friends Centre in Brighton a meeting of the southern African "front line states" got underway. Present were delegations representing Angola, Mozambique, Zambia and Zimbabwe and also delegates from South Africa and the West. Intense military and economic pressure by the South African and Western delegations prevented the black African states adopting a resolution reaffirming support for the Namibian people in their struggle for liberation from South Africa. This pressure also prevented substantial moves towards establishing regional economic links, which would have allowed these countries to weaken the South African domination of their economies.

No, the Friends Centre hasn't become part of the international political conference circuit. The meeting was a simulation organised by the Zimbabwe Emergency Campaign Committee (ZEEC) and the Workers Education Association. The purpose was to raise the level of understanding in Brighton of the liberation struggles in South Africa. Rather than listening passively to a speaker we were able to act as our own educators in the process of preparing for the simulation and of delivering conference speeches and taking part in negotiations. The simulation was the centrepiece of a day of activities in solidarity with the southern African liberation struggle. Other activities involved literature stalls, a film on the struggle in Namibia and a talk on solidarity work. All told 13 organisations participated in various capacities in making the day a success for some 40 participants and 20 spectators.

The main lesson that came out of the simulation was that liberation in southern Africa is not simply a matter of the liberation movement becoming the government. It is a protracted struggle to wrest control of the

economy from Western multinationals and from South Africa. At the same time South Africa is fighting to reverse the tide of liberation that has been flowing since the victories of the people in Angola and Mozambique. South Africa maintains, in defiance of the U.N., its illegal occupation of Namibia. To do this it is forced to make war on the Namibian people and their liberation movement, SWAPO. South Africa has also struck repeatedly at neighbouring Angola, which acts as a rear base for SWAPO. South Africa also continues to support terrorist opposition to the governments in Zimbabwe and Mozambique as well as in Angola. Clearly there can be no stable liberation in the region so long as the racist regime in South Africa persists.

And what has this got to do with us in Britain? Well, Britain is one of the "contact group" of 5 nations which is supposed to be pressuring South Africa to vacate Namibia and is failing to do so. Britain is the single largest foreign investor in South Africa and so is one of the major props of the apartheid regime. That is why it is so vital that we correct the shameful lack of southern African solidarity work in this country. For this reason ZEEC is reconstituting itself as a general southern Africa group (the Southern African Liberation Support Committee) in order to continue and extend solidarity work to the entire region. The simulation was a success in itself. We mobilised 60 people over an issue which is a very unfamiliar one. We urge all progressive minded people in Brighton to help us build on this success. Organising a liberation struggle is a major responsibility for southern Africans. Don't let's lumber them with our responsibility too - the responsibility for organising support work in Britain. # WED LOCKED



BY  
THEATRE AGAINST SEXISM  
at the Marlborough Hotel,  
27th/28th June

The Marlborough Hotel is a new discovery for me; a small place tucked away in a tiny road at the bottom of Edward Street. In the pub downstairs a group of about twelve folk singers, gathered in a circle, sit relaxedly, instruments on their knees, singing old-world tunes. A regular Saturday night event. The room where the play is being held is crammed and stuffy, but somehow with Fringe you never seem to mind, half-expecting poorer conditions as a part of the medium. (After all, it's the message that counts.)

The play is a take-off of a T.V. Marriage Game, only this time the couple are ready to tear one another to pieces. It has all the ingredients: smooth-talking compere with flashy grin and bow-tie; lipsticked, hip-swinging assistant; and panel of 'experts', including Barabara Cart-horse, Dr Sigmund Skiffing, Diana Doorway, and Micky Macho. The aim-of-the-game is to bring the couple back together and restore to them their Marital Bliss, (in the form of a spin-drier for Her and a hand-drill for Him.) A series of flashbacks to childhood and adolescence highlight the forceful and obvious conditioning that has reproduced the uncomfortable stereotypical types of Husband and Wife. The situations are over-simplified, but I think necessarily so. Subtlety reaches the converted, but what about the rest?

The performance was colourful and lively, and I especially liked Nicky Gibson's strong Young Liz, and Tony Steyger's revoltingly suave Johnny Cool. The only real disappointment for me was that the play offered no positive alternatives, and no support for Liz.

My own relief was in sitting beside a woman friend with whom I smiled knowingly throughout.

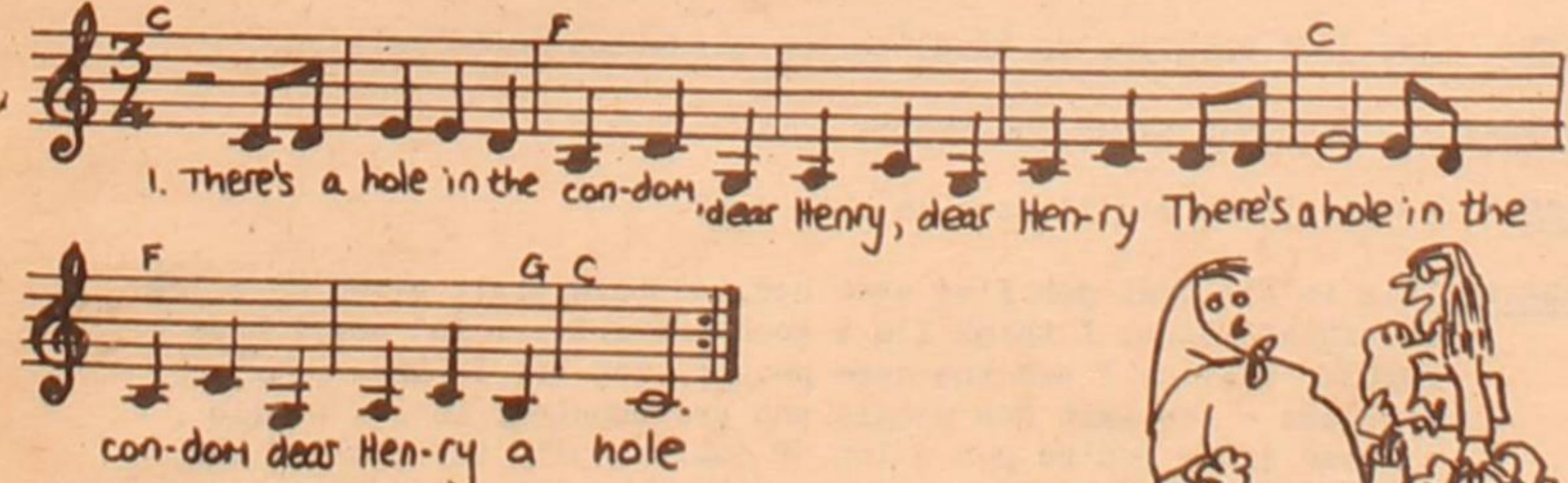

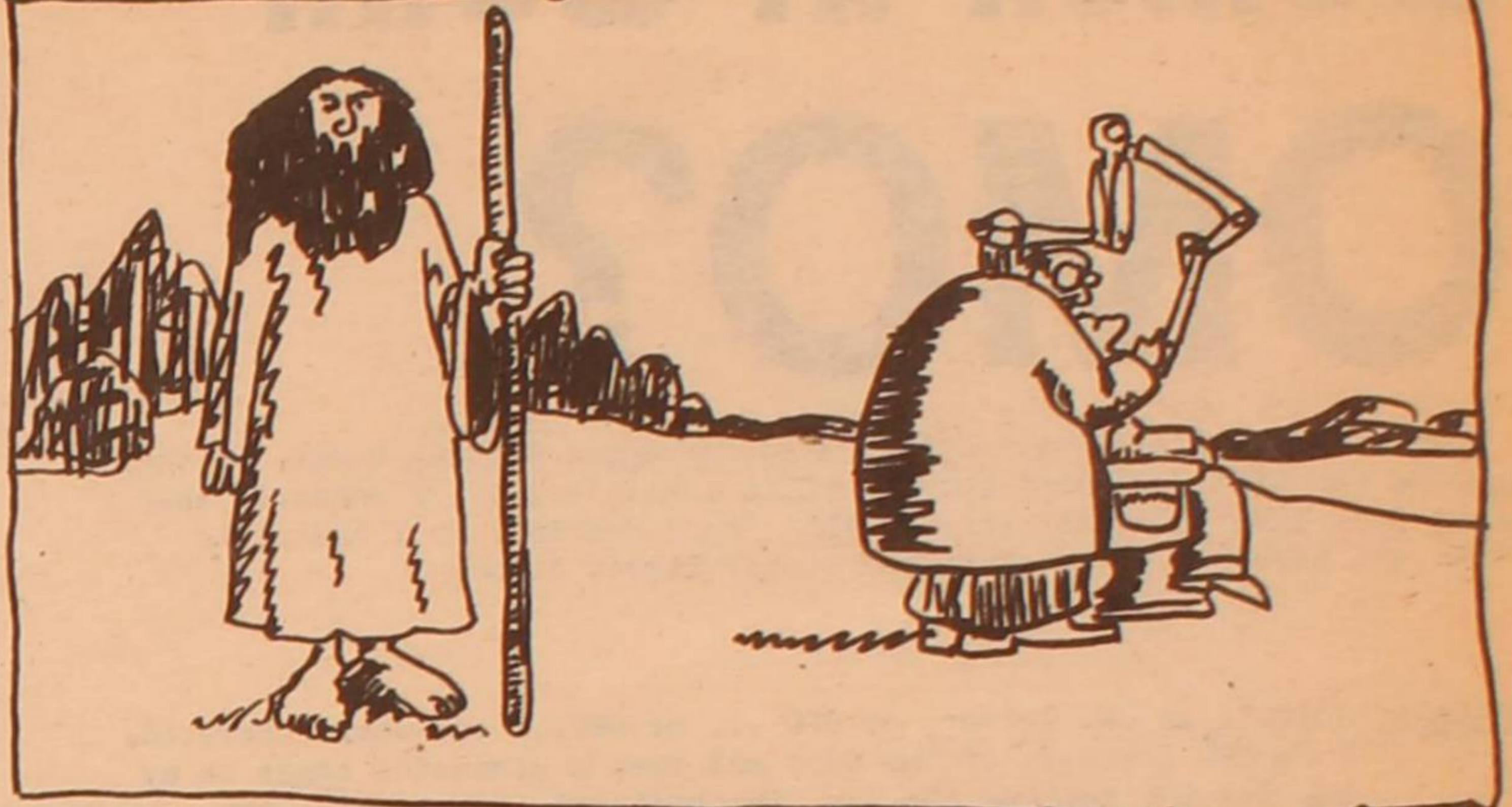

East Sussex County Council is on the verge of launching a unique experiment which will send public services to new depths of degradation.

A high-level working party, including senior staff from all the main departments, is examining various schemes for the commercial sponsorship of Council services. If and when suitable arrangements can be made, the way will be open for local, national or multi-national firms to peddle their wares with full council backing.

This could mean, for example, directing residential workers and foster parents to go to Mothercare or Marks and Spencer for children's clothes, and these shops using children in care to boost sales. Or maybe: "Old People in East Sussex homes use Complian", or advertising sweets and ice-cream in school playgrounds; or firemen pushing some supposed thirst-quencher, or, or, or...

The possibilities are endless and there have already been pilot projects. Last year's Foster Jamboree a free show for kids in care and their foster parents - was sponsored by the Abbey National Building Society, who were more than happy with the publicity. Suggestions for this year's sponsor included the Conservative Party, which was reluctantly turned down because "the other parties might object."

A senior official of the Social Services Dept., who did not wish to be named, told the Voice that "the whole idea is really gaining favour among the Chief Officers and could take off in a big way." He gave the Brighton-based firm of ITT Creed as an example of a company that "might wish to improve its image by being seen to support the local community".

The implications of all this are appalling; the Tories seem set on reducing public spending past rock bottom level and making the money up by commercialising services, and those who use them. Everyone uses some county council services. Once we accept private financing for essential public services, we lose all hope of demanding our right to better services. We will have even less control over 'our' welfare state: once they have a foot in the door, the admen and the capitalists will be able to dictate their own terms. It is not too late to stop the bandwagon; the long-term contracts have not yet been signed. Write to your councillors, ask the right questions and demand answers - shame the council into back-tracking!

## Sid the Dentist

### NHS PATIENTS DOWN IN THE MOUTH

If you want dental treatment on the National Health Service, be it a filling, dentures or a check up, the chances are that you'll never get it done in Brighton. The N.H.S. dental service, unlike the medical one, is not a "guaranteed" service. As the East Sussex Family Practitioner Committee stated recently, "It is stressed...that the dentists are in no way obliged to accept you for N.H.S. treatment."

In real terms this means that if, for example, you need new dentures, then out of the 69 dentists in Brighton, only 3 offer even the possibility of N.H.S. facilities. The alternative (rapidly becoming the norm) is a £100+ private bill.

Brighton and Hove Trades Union Council have issued a strong statement in support of a totally free Dental Service, but protests must come from the public too.

As one unfortunate victim of the dentist's "get rich quick" system says:- "The question I ask myself is quite simply, if the dentists do not accept N.H.S. patients, then how can the pay increases recently granted (by the Govt) be justified!"

# WOMEN AT WORK

# OMO?

Over the past year I've noticed a lot of women driving buses. As this job has (up till now) been thought of as a "man's job", I wondered what women felt like when they entered this "male domain". So I talked to Julie and Barbara, who work at the Conway Street depot.

**BARBARA:** Julie's an OMO driver, or OPO ... or OWO... one-woman operated. I do OWO for part of the day, and then a conductor comes on my bus for the rest of the day. The official term is 'one-man operator'. We've got about 12 women drivers. We've also got a woman driving instructor. She was the first in the country - she's a terrific driver.



# OPO?

**VOICE:** Why did you decide to do this job?

**JULIE:** I needed a job which paid well, cos I'd got into debt ... through being unemployed for a long time. It's a good job, because you're free, you're your own boss really. Obviously you've got the odd inspector getting on, but they're not there to be nasty to you or to catch you out - they're there to be your friend and to help you out. And most of them do.

**BARBARA:** And that's a shame, there isn't a woman inspector. They've offered the job to a woman who's been driving there a long time, and she was a conductor before that, but she doesn't want it because you've got to work weekends. How I started the job was, I saw the yellow training bus driving about. The last job I had was in a factory in Worthing. I was a typist before, a long time ago. But I don't enjoy typing. I don't enjoy being inside. I saw an advert for conductors so I went for an interview. When they found out I could drive they took me on as a driver.

**VOICE:** What's the pay like?

**BARBARA:** When we first started we were getting £1.08 per hour. That was only last year - £1.08 for a crew driver, which is pittance really. Our union managed to scrape a bit more for us. Now I get £1.58

**JULIE:** I get £1.82. It's complicated because you've got three different sorts of drivers.

**VOICE:** Which union is it?

**JULIE:** TGWU (Transport & General Workers UniOn)

**BARBARA:** We had a midnight meeting last night. There's a new plan that management want to bring in - reorganising some of the bus route routes in Brighton.

**JULIE:** Basically what they're doing is saving money. What they've done is, they've cut out 2000 miles of driving out of our garage per week. Which means about three people's jobs down the drain. The union wanted to fight it because they said that we shouldn't give up people's jobs. And we are, if we don't fight what the company are doing. But our union is so weak ... there's no backing for it.

**VOICE:** What about attitudes from the people you work with, and the general public, because you're women doing what's considered to be a man's job?

**JULIE:** Some passengers come up and say "thank you very much, that was a nice drive ... how does someone like you manage to drive such big buses?!" But driving a bus is like driving a car when you've done it for a while. When you're outside or sitting at the back of the bus, it does look big, but when you're in the driving seat ...

**VOICE:** Is it heavy to drive?

**JULIE:** Some of them are very heavy. Some are power-assisted steering and power-assisted throttle. The thing about the job is that if women do it they've got to accept it is a hard job in a way. It has been up till now a man's job, but women are quite capable of doing it. And they accept that at work, but they expect you to be treated equally - if a man's got to do a job, you've got to do it.

**VOICE:** Do you find that you do get treated differently?

**JULIE & BARBARA:** No ...

**JULIE:** Sometimes men drivers, on the road, they'll see a woman and they they'll cut you up.

**BARBARA:** When I went for the interview they told me "you can either work at Conway Street or Edward Street. Mind you, at Edward St they haven't got any lady drivers yet, and they've said that they wouldn't have any."

**VOICE:** And have they got any now?

**BARBARA:** Yes. One of the drivers there, his wife came into the job, and nothing was said in the end, because it was a bus driver's wife anyway! I've never had any ribs, never had my leg pulled or anything. Mind you, in the bar the other day one of the inspectors said he still didn't reckon it was a woman's job. I had to go outside, I couldn't talk to him any more.

# or OWO!

**VOICE:** Do you have any problems late at night - drunks getting on the bus and so forth?

**JULIE:** No. Basically I think it's how you handle yourself. If someone's going to cause trouble on my bus I don't encourage him. If you're cheeky or you start being sarcastic and someone can't take it ...

**BARBARA:** That doesn't mean you act submissive. But if a bloke gets on and says "I'm not paying my fucking fare", you say "All right mate, go and sit down then". Usually they're so surprised ... I think with most blokes, - most drivers and conductors - it's the old male ego bit, they have to be nasty back.

I had a couple of young drunks at tea-time. They weren't drunk, just merry. Just young lads. They weren't going to sit down, it was obvious, so I just carried on driving, and they were chatting to me and falling around the place. At the Steine I had all these passengers getting on. So I was dashing out tick tickets, still chatting to these lads as they were getting off. They were getting pushed out by all the passengers getting on. There happened to be another driver - a bloke - upstairs, going to Edward Street. He came down and pushed these two lads, really pushed them hard, out of the door. That's why he came down. There was nothing happening there, but he obviously thought he was protecting me, I didn't like that. Pushing my passengers around...

**VOICE:** And just when you're handling the situation quite well ...

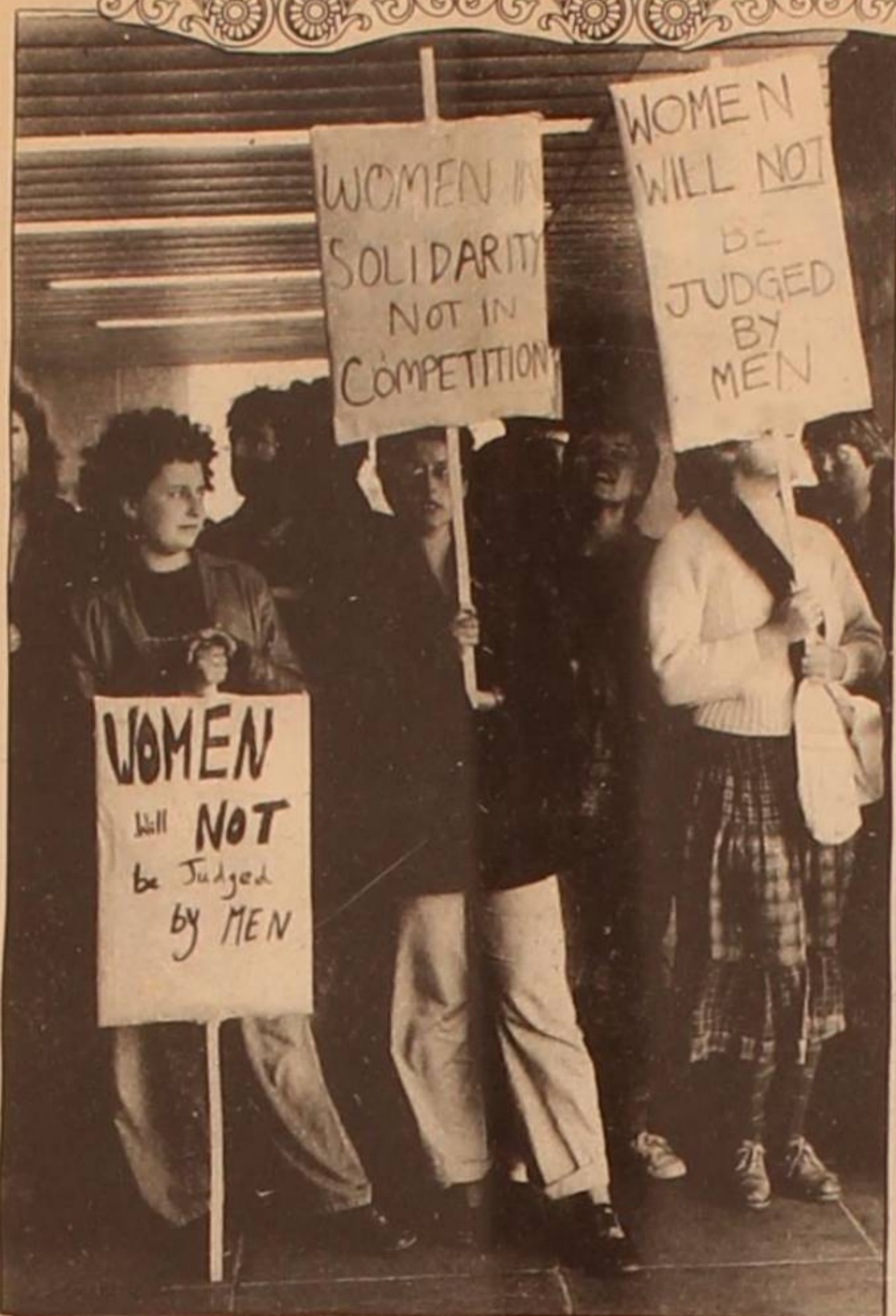
**BARBARA:** ... He comes along and upsets them.

**VOICE:** Do you think you'll stay in this job?

**BARBARA:** This is the best job I've ever had, certainly. It gives me a lot of satisfaction. I think I'm a good bus driver. And now I have a regular service I see the same people. You get to know your regulars - you wait for people who are running! It's a public service job - you've got a lot of contact with the public, and I enjoy that.





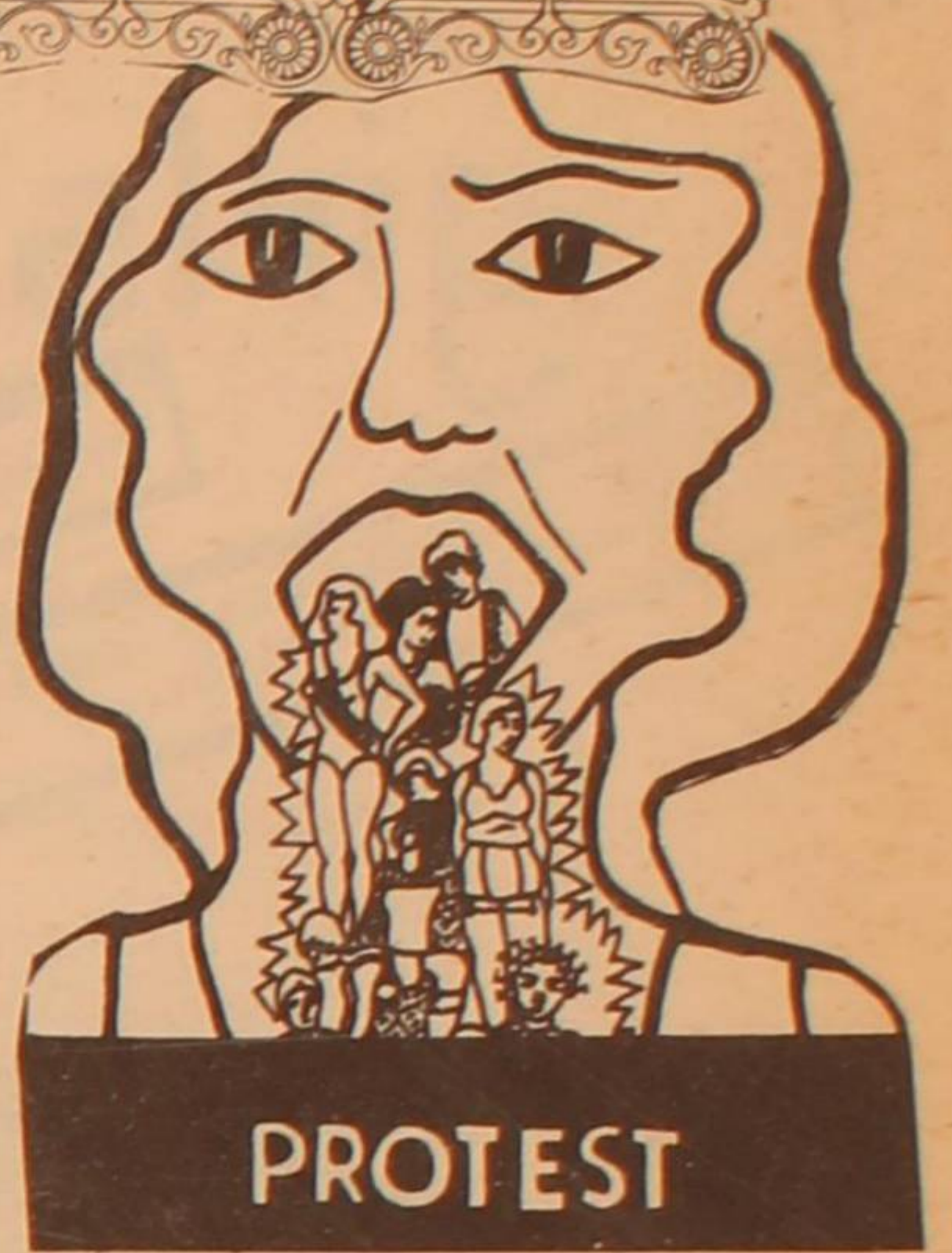

WHEN WALKING DOWN ELM GROVE FROM THE RACE COURSE, THE PAVEMENT RUNS BY THE Workhouse wall. There would be seen a row of old ladies holding their aprons out in case some lucky punter would care to give a copper or two. A little further down the wall the men would dangle their caps for the same purpose.

Depending on the time of day, you might see the pony and trap, taking the toddlers back to Warren Farm School at Woodingdean, after being cared for during the day by the ladies in the Workhouse.

It seemed like the "Haves" on the pavement, and the "Have Nots" on the other side of the wall.

The man on the gate had the unhappy task of splitting up the families when they arrived. The men were sent to one block and women to another. The children were sent to Warren Farm School, where they would stay till 14 years of age, then the boys were sent to work on farms and the girls put into domestic service.

The seafront had plenty of attractions. There were bands that played on the pier, two concert parties, the one near Black Rock was called Jack Shephard's Entertainers, the one near the West Pier was Ellison's Entertainers.

At this one, talent contests were held on Saturday afternoons, but onewas only eligible to compete if sitting in a paid seat. The cheapest was 6d.

I had earned 5d that morning, and after a lot of persuasion my sister Emily gave me the other 1d if I would sing her my favourite song at the moment: God send you back to me". She had been friendly with a South African wounded soldier, and he had gone home. So we walked there and back but happy because I won a Teddy Bear as first prize.

When I told Mum she said it was given me out of sympathy because I went in my weekday clothes. She said I looked like a 'Sal Hatch', whoever she might be, but I was quite pleased, and entered again at a later date. I only got third prize, which looked like a tin bucket of pebbles. they were humbugs but a bit disappointing as there was only a layer on top, the rest was paper.....

People on the Pier would throw pennies down to the sands, and boys would scramble for them. All sorts of vendors were on the beach with newspapers, Brighton Rock and the Whelk stalls where one could buy a small plate of Whelks, cockles, mussels or winkles, and one could leave the plate on the beach to be collected.

## THE TOWN BEEHIVE

BETWEEN PALACE PIER AND BLACK ROCK WAS TO BE SEEN THE SAND ARTIST WHO HAD HIS square of sand on the beach but near enough for promenaders to view his work. On this large square of sand he would scratch likenesses of England's stately homes, and in relief he would do a very realistic wounded soldier lying down. Each day he would renew it. Then sit with his cap waiting for an appreciative passer by to give him money. He had his own rhyme in the sand which read: 'Some carve their name in stone, I carve mine in sand, and I hope to carve my dinner with the aid of a generous hand.'

Plenty of deck chairs for 2d. but one could sit on a wooden seat which sat five persons for 1d each. this was painted on the back of the seat for one to read. And on the Dalton's Beach kites would be flying, their strings attached to the back of one of these seats.

On the Promenade were the goat carts and large carriages which were pulled manually between the piers, where ladies holding parasols could ride in comfort.

Sandwich board men would walk behind each other, inviting you to 'dine at Joes', or some other place they wish to advertise. The boards back and front were held on the shoulders by straps.

Men on the beach would ply for the hire of boats, for a jolly ride out, mostly rowboats, but there was 'The Skylark' between the piers which was motorised, and I had a ride in it, while a man was playing 'Over the Waves'.

If one went in the Kemp Town direction, what better than a ride in 'Volks Electric Railway. He was the first man to have electricity in his house in Brighton. He tried to sell the idea to Brighton Corporation, but they were not at all interested.

## Brighton Birth Centre

The Brighton Birth Centre came into being in November 1978, out of a need for an organization which could deal with queries and problems related to pregnancy, childbirth and childcare in an informal way. None of our members are necessarily 'experts', but all are parents with a desire to share whatever knowledge we've acquired through our own experiences and through our individual studies.

Since our beginning we've come across a few stumbling blocks, the main ones being...lack of funds, lack of premises (leading to some confusion as we are called a 'centre'), problems in organisation and communication (as we are all parents of young children, our meetings tend to be rather chaotic, half our time being spent out-shouting children). For these reasons a lot of our activities have been scattered and we're not reaching as many people as we'd like to. However we have achieved quite a lot over the last two years. Our activities and projects have included: classes in Yoga for pregnant women, infant swimming classes (now an informal swimming group meeting Thursdays 10.30 a.m. at King Alfred pool), semi-regular evening talks on such topics as Acupuncture, Herbalism, Homeopathy, nutrition, breastfeeding, home birth, and the production of our Birth Centre Leaflets.

As you can see, our interests and aims are wide and range from answering queries like "Why do I feel so tired when I thought I'd feel great being pregnant?" to giving information on the effects of pollution on our children. I think if we had to consider an overall objective it would be to encourage parents in the pursuit of knowledge. Knowledge is power. We hope that the more pregnant women who attend their ante-natal clinics feeling confident and informed, and who go into labour feeling responsible and in possession of their own bodies, the less the medical profession will treat them like children or pieces of meat. The more parents who demand a better deal for their children, the greater the chances of a healthier world for the future.



So far we're on fairly good terms with the local hospital (R.S.C.H.) and we give advice on how to make confinements here as easy as possible; but one of our most frequent queries is about home birth in Brighton. We have been trying to wade through the confusion built up around this subject and give accurate information, (a task that's harder than it sounds!) - also, to get G.P.'s to be more sympathetic to women who wish to have their babies at home.

Where there are gaps in both the NHS and community groups we try to fill them in. Wherever appropriate we refer people to other organisations which we feel might be able to help them. For example, we might refer parents-to-be to the National Childbirth Trust for relaxation classes, or parents in distress to Parent's Helpline. We also encourage shared childcare and non-sexist childrearing, and obtain information on alternative types of education.



Recently we became an associate member of the Hanover Community Centre in Southover Street. Consequently, we are in the process of changing the way we operate. Having a permanent address means that we will be able to hold regular weekly 'open' afternoons, as well as evening talks and films, where parents or parents-to-be can stop in, look at our leaflets, talk to one of our members, have a cup of tea and just chat... Watch your local notice boards for more information.

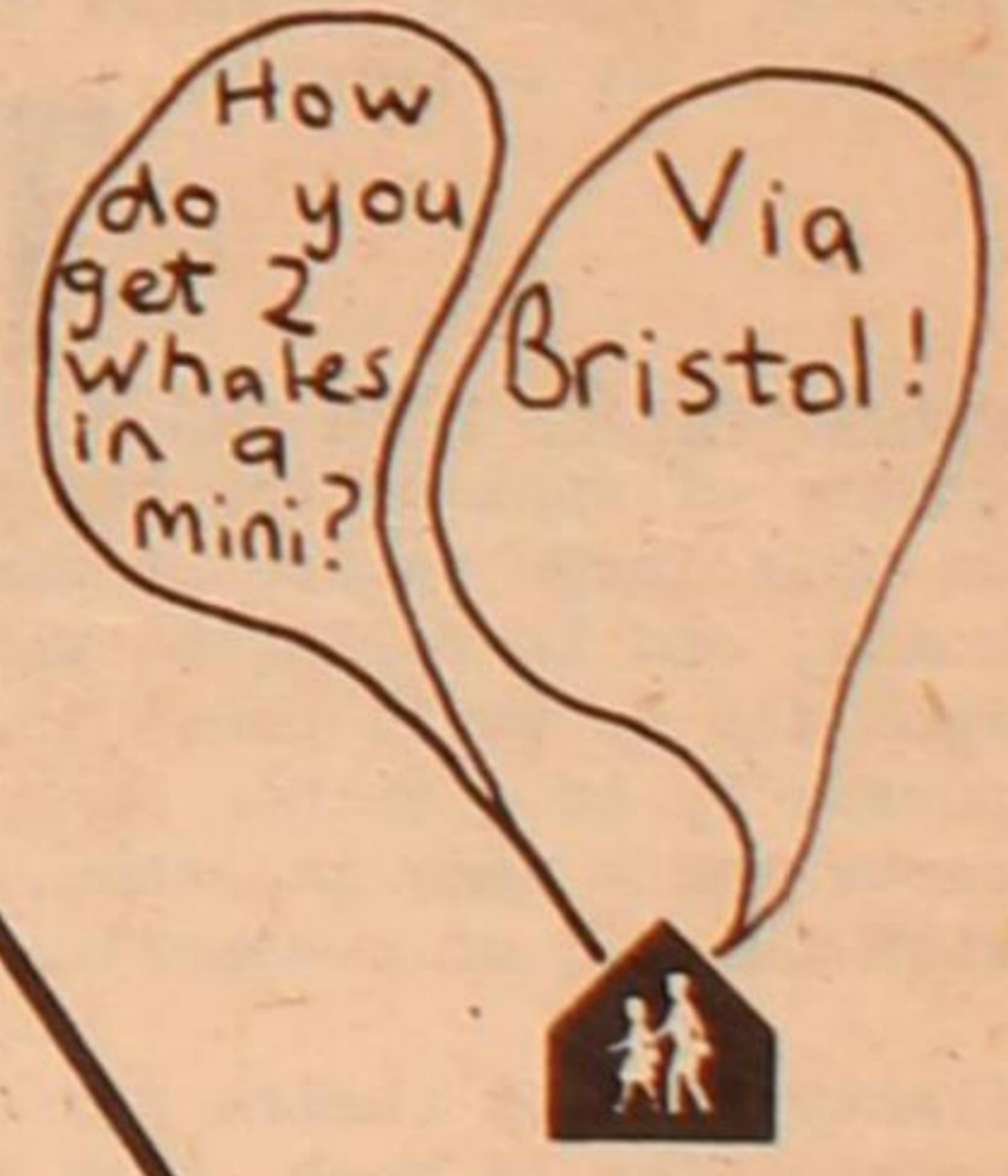

## National childcare campaign

There are only 2 state nurseries in Brighton & Hove, each with 50 places. The National Childcare Campaign grew out of a need to coordinate local struggles for better childcare facilities...before and after school and holiday provision, as well as for the under 5's. As well as defending existing provision, against the cuts, the campaign wants to see that facilities really fulfil the needs of the community. It is also concerned with training, wages and conditions for nursery and childcare workers; and is also worried that an employer may pay lower wages because they have the only work-place nursery in the area, thus forcing women to work there. We hope to draw support from as wide a section of people as possible: STATE NURSERIES, PRIVATE PLAYGROUPS, CHILD MINDERS, TEACHERS, WORKPLACE NURSERIES, TRADE UNIONISTS, WOMEN'S GROUPS, and any individuals willing to help fight for better provisions for children. # Cuts make women bleed

"Quite frankly, I don't think mothers have the same right to go out to work as fathers. If the Good Lord had intended us to have equal rights to go out to work, he wouldn't have created man and woman."

"A mother is by far the best person to look after her young children. She knows them best, and her love, guidance, and care are crucial to their well-being"

Patrick Jenkin, Social Services Secretary. The message from the Government is clear: a woman's rightful place is in the home, and her job is to provide care for the young, elderly and sick. In short, women are to provide the same services that were once provided by the Welfare State. And to do so for free, in their own homes.

It is women who are bearing the real burden of the cuts. Women, in their roles of wife, mother, sister, housekeeper, cook, neighbour and friend, call on the services of the Welfare State more often. Women as workers are the main source of labour for those services.

So the attack on the Welfare State is a direct attack on women. And it's coming in every area - health, housing, education, social services. What's more, it's not just a matter of spending cuts in these services. Rather, there is a whole new policy of supporting the replacement of public services with private business; private medicine, private housing, private schools, and even private practice within social work.

Importantly, underlying the whole move towards free enterprise is the assumption that women should stay at home and do more for themselves and their families, instead of 'selfishly' going out to work. And with fewer services, fewer women will be needed in the workforce, thus "freeing" them to do more at home and in their communities.

## cheap labour

Of course, women are already providing "home oriented", "community based" cheap service. The vast majority of old people are still looked after by relations and friends, (women). The 5% in residential homes is no higher today than 50 years ago. But the idea now is that more is required of women.

With fewer hospital beds, home helps, district nurses, chiropodists, meals-on-wheels, women will undoubtedly end up doing more.

This comment made by the Director of Kent Social Services reveals the conscious exploitation of traditional women's caring role: "By paying neighbours (all 60 of them so far are women) fairly little we get quite excellent, loyal, devoted service. You pay a neighbour £15 a week and get a £50 service. When you've got

male unemployment, how much better that women, who more naturally incline to a community-based lifestyle, do this sort of thing. Some liberated women would question this, but a lot of older women find great fulfilment in home oriented things, dealing with people rather than machines. Perhaps that's arguable, but what is certain is that it's cheaper."



Under the guise of "freedom of choice" our choices, as women, are being drastically reduced. At the same time as cutting and closing F.P.A clinics, attempting to introduce restrictive abortion legislation, eroding the present abortion facilities facilities for having children are being rapidly cutback. Despite Britain's very poor perinatal mortality rate, there are increasingly fewer health visitors, no maternity grant, and no heating discount. Nationally respected facilities such as the Mile End Antenatal Clinic in London's East End are due to close, along with all the other maternity services in the hospital.



What is more, the state is taking less and less responsibility for the upbringing of children. Nursery provision - inadequate as it is - is being slashed. Maternity leave is threatened. The state preaches the philosophy that parents (mothers?) should be solely responsible for the care of young children. Patrick Jenkin remarked that

As far as Jenkin is concerned, state help for working mothers should be restricted to particularly needy cases only. The whole moral climate casts women sharply into the role of wife and mother - juvenile delinquency and societal problems generally are blamed on inadequate mothering and the fact that women have been going out to work. Moullescomb mothers protesting at the redundancy of their lollipop lady were told by a councillor that any decent mother would make sure that she accompanied her own child to school.

Meanwhile, keeping mothers at home with young children reap dividends for the drug business, with 46% of a sample of inner city mothers at home with children under five being treated with drugs for depression.

## caring

It is not an accidental fact that the public services being cut are predominantly staffed by women. "Caring" jobs within the Welfare State are traditionally filled by women. And because they are women they get a raw deal. In 1978, 63% of female nurses earned less than £60 per week, compared with 11% of male non-manual workers. The eagerly awaited Clegg Commission Report will mean that some nurses will have to repay the £2 per week they won last year, as they will not qualify for any increase from August 1979.

Women workers are often poorly unionized and are particularly vulnerable to redundancies. Trade unionists wonder why women are put off and don't hold to strict trade union lines on certain issues. But they fail to appreciate that women are as interested in saving the services as in saving their jobs.

It is quite clear that women as workers and consumers are at the forefront of struggles against the cuts. It's vital that more and more women come together within their trade unions and with others in the community to make their voice heard against the cuts. And at the same time women can begin to define a welfare state that serves our collective needs - which doesn't rest on our unequal position as women - and over which, as workers and consumers we can have some collective control.
