

# Families Against The Bomb

### Rougham Tree Fayre - Sept 3 to 5

We made a display of news cuttings and photographs, and built ourselves a stall at this huge and very lovely fayre, presented by the Green desserts. We made a number of useful contacts, distributed leaflets and CND information. We sold badges and did some collecting for the camp. Our displays and banner were also taken on the Sizewell march and we held a stall at the pure energy fayre at the end of the march.

### Public Meeting - Sept 28

We did an adapted version of the citywide leaflet and leafletted the entire
Lakenheath area, advertising a showing
of Jonathan Dimbleby's film 'The Bomb',
and a public meeting on Sept 28th. At
the time there were only 9 people on
camp, but the turnout at the meeting was
amazing, about 100 people. After the
film, a man from Cambridge, Chris, gave
a general talk on disarmament, and when
he had finished everyone from the camp
went on stage to answer criticisms.
There was a particularly lively discussion which could have gone on longer but
we had to vacate the hall.

#### Petitioning - Oct 3rd

We plan a door-to door petitioning. If we get a lot of signatures we will hand the petition to the Lakenheath Parish Council in the hope that it might sway their decision or at least force them to reconsider it.

#### Land Problems

From the beginning we've been plagued by the land problem (too few own too much) and this, apart from detracting from our reasons for being here, is a big problem we're faced with now. We've looked into the land ownership all round the base, and beside the land we're on now, the rest is owned by M.O.D. or our previous 'land lord' Lord Iveagh. So now we're not sure what our future is, or even where it's going to be, and the camp is quite divided about what we'd like to do. One idea is to retire to a house for the winter, during which time we will print leaflets, badges, posters etc, write small sketches, plays, and music, and as from April/May, travel around all the bases in

East Anglia, putting on public meetings leafletting, and doing various kinds of direct action, on a larger scale and in more places than we have done in the past five months. The other idea is to become a travelling camp, just around Lakenheath, moving on before the owners evict us. The problems of coping with that may prove too much for those with children at school. We'll decide what we're doing as soon as we can, when the legal situation is more clear.

#### Future Action

Late in October, Prince Charles is coming to Mildenhall to ordain a window in the church, and we plan a vigil and leafletting of the base entrance for that day from 10.00 till 3.00pm.

Nov 6th: We thought it was about time we had a bit of a celebration on camp, so we thought we'd combine work and pleasure and have a vigil outside Lakenheath from 4.00pm until 7.00pm and a bonfire party at the camp afterwards. Everyone is welcome to this, and we're hoping womeone at NCND might organise a trip for that afternoon/evening.

#### REPORT ON LAKENHEATH PEACE CAMP

On 6th September, the Lakenheath Parish Council voted by 6 votes to 2 to give the F.A.B. peace camp 28 days notice to quit the camp site presently occupied. During the debate. Councillor Coleman proposed that the F.A.B. campers be allowed to stay on the site, paying a minimal rent, but it was revealed that the camp site is registered common land and that parishioners could sue the Parish Council should they rent it out. Naturally the campers are not taking this lying down and already plans are afoot to effect strong local support of their continued existence. Obviously it is vital to fight for this present site as the only alternative will be a travelling camp and frankly the campers are not mobile enough. They've recently acquired two more caravans (one purchased, the other donated) but if they were to become a travelling camp they'd realistically need three more caravans and a better motor - Moggy the Morris seems to be in a permanent state of ill-health.

Whatever course of action is adopted it is going to be expensive to mount a support

campaign and once again the campers need our support. The term 'campers' is probably erroneous because it gives the impression of holidaying and having a good time. Nothing could be further from the truth. Although morale is high, life continues to be a struggle in maintaining adequate levels of health and hygiene. The Families Against the Bomb peace campers have made a sacrifice few of us would dare make - they've given up the warmth and comfort of their homes, their jobs and all manner of luxuries for a tough demanding and unrelenting way of life, in order to actively campaign for what they and we believe to be true and good - ie the abandonment of nuclear arms, nuclear strategy and nuclear alliances for the protection of life, civilisation and nature. To this end should we not think of ourselves as Peace campers, part of the same campaign and subsequently maximising our efforts to ensure the practical struggles for the Peace campers at Lakenheath are minimised. The Peace camps will soon be the centre points of the most concerted action ever by C.N.D. in the very near future and it is essential that they are strong and prepared for the events to come.




### Appeal for Manager and Volunteers

### CND SOLDIER SACKED

MEMS

(From the Guardian 24.9.82)

Members of the armed forces may be discharged if they are 'active' members of CND. This was admitted by the Ministry of Defence in commenting on the case of Gunner Jeffrey Clare, who was dismisseed from his artillery regiment because he was a member of CND.

Officially he was given an 'administrative discharge' because he had 'lost interest' in his army career. However, in private he was told that his dismissal resulted from his involvement in CND. (CND are hoping to make this case a political issue.)

The Ministry of defence have declined to elaborate on the reason for the discharge, but a spokesman said that as a matter of general policy, whereas 'passive membership of CND is not a reason for discharge, active membership may be.' Jeffrey Clare claimed his involvement was limited to putting up posters and discussing matters with his mates, but one factor that may have influenced the army is that, as a gunner, he could have been posted to a regiment using 8" howitzers, which can fire nuclear as well as high explosive shells.

### PEACE STUDIES

The County Council's plans to introduce Peace Studies in Notti nghamshire schools are still meeting considerable opposition from the Tories. Every school governing body will be discussing the Peace Studies proposals at meetings during the current school term, and Tory leader Michael Spungin is urging school governors to vote against the introduction of this "monstrosity".

If you are a teacher, parent, governor or pupil, lobby your governing body to ensure they realise the value of Peace Studies in school and to agree with their introduction.

### LABOUR SUPPORT

THE LABOUR PARTY PLEDGES
UNILATERAL NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT

At the Labour Party Conference
a \( \frac{2}{3} \) rds majority passed a resolution
calling for unilateral Nuclear
Disarmament and the closure of all
Nuclear Bases in the U.K. It will,
unless the minority in the Labour
Party manage to fudge the issue,
become part of the Labour Party's
official program at the next General
election. Michael Foot has since
then confirmed that, as long as he
is leader of the Party, this program will be started as soon as
practicably feasible after Labour
take office.

This move is welcomed by CND as the first of the three major parties to publicly state that Unilateral Disarmament will become Government policy on their election.

### THE ANTI CRUISE MISSILE CAMPAIGN

Cruise missiles are due in Britain within the next twelve months - unless we stop them. NCND's Anti Cruise Missile Campaign has therefore been launched with an emphasis on urgent pressure now, and on continued pressure until Cruise is banned. The first Anti Cruise meeting, at the Factshop on September 30th, suggested the following ideas:

- 1. Support for the Anti Cruise London Demo on October 24th. Buses from Nottingham £4.00 waged, £2.50 unwaged. Contact the office for further details and to order tickets. Tel. 582561.)
- 2. A three-day around the county walk. (About 45 miles, carrying banners, leafletting passers-by. Approx. May 1st. Going through local centres everyone come and walk a bit.)
- 3. A mass county or city wide leafletting. (This entails considerable expense. Emphasis on possible dispersal of Cruise at the bottom of your garden.)
- 4. NCND's own general Anti Cruise leaflet. (Sell around the country.)
- 5. Direct Action. (Has been generally agreed but specifics are yet to be worked out.)
- 6. Travelling Cruise Missile.
  (On the back of a lorry with leafletting in neighbourhood centres.
  Emphasis on the mobility of Cruise
  missiles, and the lack of British
  control. Possibly with a shelter
  building demonstration. Possibly
  with Nuclear Victims bandaged
  and made up bodies to lie silently
  on the pavement at various strategic locations, possibly five
  minutes at busy bus-stops.)
- 7. Mini Stickers to be plastered everywhere.
- 8. Informal Publicity Campaign.
- 9. Sandwich Boards. (Possibly up to 100 people to walk around major shopping centres in neighbourhoods and the city centre.)
- 10. Trunk Road Placarding.
  (People carrying placards to walk slowly along major traffic routes)

- 11. November 5th Bonfire. (Burn Cruise/Thatcher/Brezhnev/Reagan effigies.)
- 12. Torchlight Procession. (Near Christmas.)
- 13. Flooding Newspaper letters columns with Anti Cruise letters.
- 14. Cruise Exhibitions. (Must not conflict with Medical Exhibits.)

Your involvement in the campaign is essential. All ideas are welcome. The next meeting is on October 28th at 8.00pm at the Factshop.

# NATIONAL CONFERENCE

The October monthly meeting of NCND debated some of the resolutions that will be discussed at the annual conference of National CND which is being held in Sheffield at the end of November.

We mandated our delegates on which way to vote on some of the more contentious issues.

We discussed whether non-violent direct action could always be peaceful, and decided not to agree with the resolution that would mean that any CND member who acted in a non-peaceful manner on behalf of CND would automatically have their membership of CND revoked.

We looked at the role of the peace camps and agreed to back the resolution which asked the national council to look into ways of raising funds to help pay the legal fees of people involved in non-violent direct action.

We discussed the links between nuclear power and nuclear weapons and agreed to ask the national council to look into finding money for the Sizewell enquiry. We also agreed to campaign about local councils (especially those who are 'nuclear free') who have investments in Rio Tinto Zine, and to try to get them to disinvest. We would also make links with other groups who are concerned about the activities of RTZ, which is a multinational mining company which extracts uranium from Namibia, Australia and elsewhere and has a noor track record for its attitude towards indigenous people, trades unions and international law.

We decided not to back a resolution which which would allow the paid CND national staff to be paid honoraria, because we were not too sure why this resolution was being proposed we agreed to allow the delegates to use their discretion if it was altered or explained in a different way at the conference.

We debated how to organise an effective anti-cruise campaign and save our back-ing to arresolution requesting local groups groups to plan non-violent direct action

at the proposed sites etc, and which asked national CND to co-ordinate all the local action in order to ensure an effective campaign.

We also backed the idea of building up the movement through work place groups, and ih particular in the armed forces.

The meeting discussed the problems now arising because of the advancements in conventional weapons but felt that it would not be appropriate for CND to be campaigning against the development manufacture & sale of these advanced weapons as this could alienate some people who were sympathetic to CND but favoured retaining more conventional weapons.

The question of Britains alliance with NATO was debated and in the end we decided to back two resolutions, one which committed CND to campaign to get Britain out of NATO and the other which asked the national conference to campaign to get NATO to reply positively to the offer by Brezhnev not to be the first to make use of nuclear weapons, by making a similar statement on behalf of NATO.

One of the resolutions suggested that all those campaigning for nuclear disarmament shouls join and become active within the Labour party, this was unanimously defeated as we felt that CND had to remain non party political.

We agreed with a resolution which made the Youth CND conference the soverign body of Youth CND and allowed for a representative from YCND to sit on all national council meetings.

Finally we agreed to back an admendment to CND's constitution which would mean that individual members of national CND could not attend the annual conference and have their own individual votes. We felt that people should be involved in their local groups and that the delegates from these groups should have the power to makethe decisions.

# How the Home Office gets it wrong

Supporters of the present civil defence programme give unrealistically assessments of the casualties likely to be sustained after a nuclear attack on the UK. Since the Government is vigourously promoting the idea that there is an effective civil defence against nuclear war Scientists Against Nuclear Armageddon (SANA) has carried out an examination of the effects of nuclear weapons and the ways in which casualty calculations should be carried out. This examination has revealed several misleading assumptions and errors in the Home Office data and methods.

When a nulcear bomb explodes the first major effect is from heat; casualties who are exposed to this and to the fires that it starts are normally not included in any estimates. The 'radii of blast damage rings' used by the Home Office are significantly smaller than those used by the U.S. Departments of Defence and energy.

The psi values measure the peak blast pressure in excess of atmospheric pressure in pounds per square inch.

This work is based on U.S. Nuclear Weapons Tests so the only explanation for the discrepancy appears to be home office error.

The casualty rates the Home Office use for a given level of blast are lower than those used in the U.S. The figures below compare U.S office of Technology Assessment (described as relatively conservative) with data provided for the Home Office scientific advisors.

The Home Office appear to take trapped = killed in casualty calculations, though we cannot confirm this.


The discrepancies in the range 2-5psi are particularly large, which is not explained by differences in house construction between the USA and the UK but by the fact that the Home Office bases its figures on conventional explosives from World War 11 and consequently they greatly underestimate casualties and the damage caused by the blast.

Without vast expenditure nothing can be done to reduce the blast casualties. In any credible attack on the UK even if 'limited' and aimed at 'military targets' most people would be in areas with 'blast pressure levels' which would be sufficient to destroy any makeshift shelters - windows are smashed with over-pressure levels lower than 0.5psi!

The Home Office also uses unrealistic figures in calculating the casualties from radiation.

All these factors lead to a serious underestimation of casualties arising from a nuclear attack; eg the GLC Emergency planning officer calculated 600,000 deaths as a consequence of the nuclear attack assumed in the 'Square Leg' excercise; a study by 5 scientists using US data and more realistic assumptions calculated 5 million deaths! Also our government does not take into account the additional deaths which are caused through lack of facilities, epidemics, cancers etc etc.

This is only a limited introduction to some of the work undertaken by S.A.N.A. For more information on this topic contact the NCND office.

# NEIGHBOURHOOD NEWS

PUBLIC DEBATE AT LONG EATON

ANGLE gathered an impressive array of speakers to debate on the arms race at the Pavilion Hotel recently.

They included Peter Rost M.P.(Con.); the prospective Labour candidate for S.E. Derbyshire, Bill Moore; the Rector of Sawley and Dean of Ilkeston, the Rev. John Warman; a number of councillors; and Tony Claydon for The Society of Friends. The chairperson was the Rev. Philip David, Chaplain of Trent College.

Labour and Conservative supporters were there in force, but despite extensive advertising, not many ordinary members of the public came along.

ANGLE members were reasonably satisfied with the meeting nevertheless, especially since it had good coverage in the local press.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD TELEPHONE TREE

To facilitate good communication wwithin NCND and neighbourhood groups, it is useful if groups draw up a telephone tree of regular members' phone numbers.

When relevent information is received or there is a need to call an emergency local neighbourhood meeting, the first person starts by phoning the next person on the list and getting them to pass the message on, etc. The first three names should also be given to the NCND Office to help with information dispersal. (The process is repeated to all members and in the event of someone being unavailable they are temporarily passed over. When the message reaches the last member, that person should phone the original member, thus confirming that the chain has not been broken and that the information has remained correct.)

. Using this method each member generally makes only one phone call thus spreading out the cost and the time involved amongst the whole group.

### NUCLEAR ATTACK ON NOTTINGHAM

WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF THERE WERE A NUCLEAR ATTACK ON NOTTINGHAM?

Although the government has carried out a number of civil defence exercises to assess the scale of death & destruction in the event of a nuclear attack on Britain, they have never informed the public of their likely fate. Now a group of concerned scientists have used a computer to produce the first national breakdown of the effects of such an attack. In assessing the scale of the attack and the devastation which would be caused, they consciously erred on the side of conservatism. They assumed that Cruise missiles would not be dispersed & that therefore the region would be less of a target than it might actually be.

They assumed one megaton airbursts directly over the city of Nottingham and over Ratcliffe power station, and a direct hit from a one megaton SS11 missile at Ruddington. RAF stations at Syston and Newton were destroyed by one 15 kiloton SS20. In the north of the county they assumed two strikes from one megaton ground burst bombs at High Marnham and Cottam and a 15 kiloton blast from a SS20 missile at Finninglay, Lincs.. Nottinghamshire was also affected by radiation and firestorms from the bombings of Derby and Leicester.

These bombings would immediately obliterate the areas and people of Nottingham, Beeston, Stapleford, Long Eaton, Eastwood, Hucknall, Arnold, Ruddington, Radcliffe-on-Trent, Ollerton and Retford (100% casualties). During the following two weeks the toll of injuries and deaths would soon account for half the population of Mansfield and a quarter of the population of Worksop.

Altogether, 60% of the county population would be killed, and 20% more would be seriously injuried in the first few days, more casualties would of course follow, and no account has been taken of the high incidence of cancers amongst the few survivors nor of the possibility of star-

vation and epidemics that would follow.

Even on the conservative basis used by the scientists, it is clear that the county would be faced with deaths, injury and disaster on a colossal scale. Essential services and medical facilities would also be virtually obliterated. The Government is right to fear that an informed public would be likely to challenge the whole of Britain's insane involvement in the nuclear arms race.

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
