




More Bunker Madness

One of the many preparations made for nuclear war is the Royal Observer Core Network of monitoring bunkers.


In October several members of NCND spent an interesting day bunker hunting. Armed with map references we found three of the six bunkers which lie within easy reach of Nottingham.

It was strange to stand on the small mounds of earth, discretely tucked behind neat hedges complete with neat wooden gates, knowing that underneath was a room where up to four men would be expected to spend a week monitoring the effects of a nuclear war - horrifying to think that during that claustrophobic week millions of those unfortunate enough not to have a tidy bunker would have died.

There are 870 R.O.C. bunkers forming a network over the country. Using sensory devices, they feed information about nuclear bomb bursts and radiation fall-out to group controls (Nottingham bunkers report to Fiskerton in Lincoln) which in turn reports to one of five sector controls that keep the government and NATO authorities informed of attack details.

At one level the information is supposed to be of use in helping the civilian populations to survive - (a dubious proposition). On another, they are there to assist NATO to continue fighting either conventionally or otherwise in a nuclear war by informing military commanders which airfields, ports and communication links are still open.

To a military mind it may make sense; to anyone who is simply going to be a nuclear victim it is obscene.



CIVIL DEFENCE AND NUCLEAR WAR -

A one day Conference to examine the issues. Saturday, 13th October. County Offices, Matlock.

After opening remarks from Derbyshiro County Council leader, David Bookbinder the Conference began with a presentation by Air Marshall Sir Leslie Mavor, president of the Association of Civil Defence and Emergency Planning Officers, on the case for Civil Defence. address was eloquently presented but its persuasive qualities were both simplistic and general and were quickly dispelled by the next two speakers Owen Greene and Dr. David Caplin, from SANA, whose factual approach illustrated to all assembled the insignificance of Civil Defence. After a short question and answer session, Owen Greene gave a brief description of the Nuclear Winter and its catastrophic effect on Human, Animal and Plant life around the Globe.

The afternoon session began with a superb presentation by Duncan Campbell. His speech, exposing the truth behind the Government's War planning was both informative and frightening. He quoted at length from classified documentation concerning Civil Defence, highlighting the sinister consequences for us all of secret Government planning for Nuclear War. Duncan described in graphic detail the inconsistencies between what the public are told and what is discussed in Whitehall.

Mr. Eric Alley, President of the Institute of Civil Defence, had the unenviable task of following Duncan Campbell. He spoke on 'Civil Defence Planning for the People,' giving the overall impression that Civil Defence was merely a token gesture to the public.

A short film was shown which underlined the paternalistic attitude to CD planning. Made with the co-operation of Gwent Council, it purported to show how 'sensible' CD could offer a degree of protection in the 'unlikely' event of a nuclear exchange involving this country. What the film actually did, was, by showing a representation of a nuclear strike, burning buildings, etc., and concerned Council faces in their bunkers, strengthen the argument against Civil Defence, not for it.

After tea, a tripartite platform consisting of representatives from NUPE (Rodney Bickerstaffe), Fire Brigades Union (Ken Cameron) and MCANW (our own Nick Armstrong) gave short speeches explaining their respective organisations' attitude to CD planning. Another question and answer session produced many enquiries of Sir Leslie Mavor. He did his best to uphold the Civil Defence argument but was always on the wane, finally resorting to criticism of the humorous tone of some speakers. The conference closed with a lighthearted and optimistic look at the role of Local Authorities and Peace organisations in Civil Defence planning by members of Derby Playhouse Studio Theatre Group. This came as welcome relief for the conference - seven hours ic a long time to think seriously about the nuclear holocaust without going spare: I was left feeling very tired but uplifted by the thought that, once again, we are not alone and that, in the end - WE WILL WIN.



Nottingham Peace Conference

Plans are now under way for an ambitious Nottingham Peace Conference in the Spring to be called by all the Peace Organisations in the city under the auspices of the Freeze Council. Delegates will be invited from as wide a range of organisations as possible including churches, community and ethnic groups, trade union and professional organisations, etc.

The Conference itself will take the form of a one day session with a variety of speakers, as well as some sort of big name entertainment. However, the actual Conference is neither the beginning nor the end of the matter!

One of the main aims is to raise the question of Peace as widely as possible in the community, particularly in organisations which would not normally consider the issue as being particularly relevant to them. Consequently, the Conference will partly be used as a launching pad for a number of 'spin-off' conferences held by affinity groups such as churches, scientists, medics, trade unions, community organisations etc. to discuss the issue as it affects them and, hopefully, the contribution they can make to preserving Peace.

Another important aim will be to establish international links between Nottingham and all the twin cities specifically on the issue of Peace.

We are aiming to publish a Peace Charter signed by the Peace Movements in Nottingham (England), Minsk (USSR), Karlsruhe (West Germany), Lubjana (Yugoslavia) and Nottingham (Pennsylvania, USA). The Peace Movements in all these cities will also be invited to send a representative or a message to the Conference.

More information later. In the meantime, any suggestions about organisations to invite, ideas for 'spin-off' conferences, or general offers of help will be very welcome.



Dear Members,

Some time ago we circulated a discussion document to the Neighbourhood groups entitled 'Time for a Change.'

Although as we pointed out, NCND has much to be proud of, we made two criticisms:

- 1. That we are not always as efficient as we could be, and
- 2. that we don't involve enough of our members in the campaign work.

We believe that these two criticisms are linked and that NCND would be more effective if we had a greater amount of membership involvement.

The usual response to this kind of criticism is that "things are always like that." We do not believe that it has to be.

We proposed, as a basis for discussion that some changes are made to the structure of NCND. That working groups be set up to cover all aspects of the campaign (as already exists for some areas).

They should meet regularly, the meetings should be publicised in the Bulletin. They would on the one hand respond to the needs and requirements of the membership and on the other hand provide initiatives and ideas for that membership.

An executive member should be responsible for one group, making sure it is functioning healthily and going out to the Neighbourhood groups to explain what the group does and what help it needs. With one executive member involved in each working group an overall picture of the campaign would be available.

We believe that everyone in NCND has something to offer, we hope that these working groups will make it easier for those skills and talents to be used in the campaign.

We hope that the proposals will be discussed at every level in NCND, because we believe that the oriticisms we have raised will not simply be solved by changes in structure, but also by changes in how we think. If we believe we can change, then we are more likely to act for change. And when we act, the change will come.

YOU COULD TRAIN/FACILITATE PEOPLE IN NON-VIOLENT DIRECT ACTION



Arrangements will be finalized at the next co-ordinating meeting.






BUSKERS FOR DEFENCE & AID FUND



The more knowledge members of CND have of human nature and what motivates people, the more likely they are to speak the same language as the many people who still have to be converted to the Peace Movement.

The first reaction of people in a time of great social change like ours is one of fear. People cannot make sense of their experience. The present Government has increased the climate of fear by adding the fear of unemployment and of police brutality. It is almost impossible in any circumstances to get people to accept truths which they do not like. Thus it is impossible to get the Peace Movement to accept the fact that 20% of all people who now have a vote are over 65 and more likely to be afraid of further social change and also afraid of what the Media tells them to be afraid of, mugging and rising crime. Sadly their own experience and the Media confirms their fears. They see anything vaguely left wing as likely to lead to further unpalatable social change. Very soon Mrs Thatcher's Government will persuade them that the Right holds more unpalatable change for them than the Left!

The extent to which people are unwilling to accept painful things is very well illustrated by the mechanism of projection. This shifts the pain of disagree able feelings. We blame our bad feelings onto other people and thus we do not need to own them as our own.

Scenes of violence on TV always attract a larger audience than scenes of peace and tranquility, because people can project out their own aggression, it being less painful than to come to terms with our own aggressive feelings. Thus you will find the most mild mannered people speaking with relish of birchings and capital punishment. Of cours being in favour of such negative attitudes is not the monopoly of the less aggressive.

There is, of course, an infinite gradation in peoples attitudes. For example, many people who cannot own their own aggressive feelings still, thank goodness, reject the kind of brutality displayed by a mounted policeman charging a woman at Orgreave.

Being a woman I cannot say if men are more likely than women to disown aggressive feelings.

Next time someone mentions the Russians as a good reason for not supporting our disarmament policy, just use your know-ledge of Projection to see how people are projecting out their feelings onto not just another person, but a whole nation.


