

The Rainbow Centre offers small meeting rooms and box numbers for the use of campaigning and community groups. We ask for a donation for the use of the rooms and box numbers are £5 a year.

Maybe you are worried about war, violence, terrorism, the threat of nuclear accidents or wars. Perhaps you are unhappy about present political activities, the state of the world and our national economy.

Maybe you are already in Friends of the Earth, Greenpeace, C.N.D., R.S.P.B., Pedals, Nature Conservation Trust, Earthlife, and more - its a long list. There are millions of us in the U.K. but what are YOU doing politically to change things, to save this planet and make it a better place for generations to come. Go Green!

Join a political party and make your voice heard and your vote count.

Liberal and Conservative Ecology groups exist and there is a strong Socialist Environmental and Resources Group. They need support to move the major parties' policies from being 'green' round the edges to a much more coherent and central role.

But, of course, there is a Green Party which has clear policies about a sustainable economy, satisfying employment, alternative energy sources, a respect for the contribution of both sexes and other races, a positive programme for peace and the third world aid, a spiritual and moral concern for the earth and all its species. Don't sit back and leave it to them. Democracy is not about parliaments, it should mean YOU, YOUR rights and - your responsibilities.

Get active, go green. The greens are gathering. Why not attend one of our local Green Party meetings - there are 3 groups in the area: Nottingham, Rushcliffe and Broxtowe. All are informal and welcoming. We have candidates for General and local elections. We need your support, votes, money, commitment.



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### THREADS OF THE ISSUE

The World Development Movement is a pressure group which aims to change British policies towards the third world. One of our recent successful campaigns 'Threads of the Issue' fought to free the Bangladeshi textile industry from the stranglehold of British protectionism.




#### Shirts from Bangladesh

Over the past 5 years Bangladesh has developed a textile industry manufacturing cheap shirts for export. This is the beginnings of a move to reduce the country's dependence on foreign aid and to develop its first labour-intensive export industry. The rapid growth of the garment factories has brought desperately needed employment to the poverty-stricken country. The work force of around 100 000 mainly consists of young, single women. For the first time these women have economic and social status and contribute the essential income which means the difference between food and hunger for their families. As a new entrant to the international market, a small supplier and as one of the world's poorest countries, Bangladesh deserves all the international support it can receive.

#### The Multi-Fibre Arrangement

Although this lifeline for Bangladesh represented a mere 2% of Britain's non-EEC shirt imports, the government chose to restrict the imports of the cheap Bangladeshi shirts claiming that they posed a threat to Britain's own textile industry. These trade restrictions were imposed under the terms of the Multi-Fibre Arrangement (MFA), an international trade agreement set up in 1974 to allow the expansion of trade in the textile industry. Originally the MFA agreed to impose temporary measures to allow the



developed countries time to adjust their industries to meet changing world demands and to introduce new technology. These temporary measures still existed in 1985! The MFA may be supported by the British textile firms but it placed other industries at a disadvantage and resulted in higher clothing prices in this country. In particular it reduced the supply of children's clothing and low price products which has affected low income families.

#### WDM Campaigns for a Fairer Deal

In 1985 the MFA became the focus of a campaign by WDM. Material was written to keep members up to date and informed of the situation and a Parliamentary Briefing Paper produced in February 1986. Members lobbied MPs and EMPs and the campaign was one of the issues raised during the mass lobby of Parliament last October. The MFA came up for renegotiation in July 1986 and in spite of successful pressure from the USA to tighten most restrictions, we were delighted to see the complete removal of quotas for Bangladesh. This allows the Bangladeshi industry to expand and flourish. However many other poor countries remain affected by the MFA and WDM will continue to campaign with the developing world for fair trade in the rag trade.

### RAINBOW CENTRE LIBRARY

The Rainbow Library was set up to provide information on those subjects which don't seem to be covered by the established libraries. Issues such as World Development, Human and Animal Rights, Feminism, Civil Liberties, Peace, Ecology and Conservation as well as material on co-ops, campaigns and other groups.

Since the Rainbow Centre opened, two workers have started in the library dealing with information and displays. Their jobs are designed to make it easier for groups who are concerned with any of the above issues to research campaigns and projects, advertise their events and causes and to generally help as much as possible.

As part of this aim, we have been working on directories of Nottingham groups which we have loosely classified under the term 'alternative', although some groups have objected to this because they feel that they are the only people providing such a service. If you can think of a better title, please let us know. It is hoped that the first of these directories will be out soon and we hope they will prove comprehensive and useful.

Providing study packs on subjects which seem important to us is another of the services supplied by the library. We have already written one on world development and its links with the arms trade, which is available from the Rainbow Centre Shop. Another pack is on the way all about nuclear power, a subject which we know everyone is worried about since the accident at Chernobyl.

As any community or campaigning group will know, it is very important to advertise your service or cause and the display worker at the library can provide you with posters etc to help you - all for the price of materials.

If you have enjoyed reading this magazine and find the dates useful you will have benefited from another service the Rainbow Centre has provided. It is our aim to try and prevent clashes of dates within Nottingham, especially fundraising.

A special pack will be distributed to 34,500 schools including Midlands Region during the month of The Appeal inviting school children to participate.

For the launch on September 16, Britain will be doing something it has never done before. 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### SUPPORTERS OF GREENPEACE

GREEN PEACE is an international organisation which carries out peaceful direct actions throughout the world to stop environmental abuse and to reverse the slide to eco-suicide. Greenpeace is politically independent, yet has forged important alliances with trades unions, MP's and MEP's from across the political spectrum.

Amongst the successes of its fifteen year existence, Greenpeace has prevented nuclear tests; taken direct action to protect seals and whales, often leading to important legislation and hunting or import bans; and helped to stop the dumping of nuclear waste into the Atlantic, and campaigned against other "routine" discharges and pollution.

There have been more steps forward and other campaigns, but there remains much to be done. The work of Greenpeace is financed by members' subscriptions and publically raised funds. Merchandise is available, and local groups help in fund-raising and publicity. Nottingham Supporters of Greenpeace has recently begun a series of events and monthly meetings for anyone interested in helping Greenpeace, or simply wanting to find out more.

### PEDALS

Pedals has now been in existence for well over seven years. Our main aims are to get more people on bikes and to campaign for safer and more attractive conditions for local cyclists.

Each summer we help to organise the Great Nottinghamshire Bike Ride, an event that we first started in 1982, and which this year attracted well over 2000 riders!

Our campaigning efforts have recently begun to bear much fruit, with the development of the first new cycle facilities forming part of the Greater Nottingham Cycle Route Network.

This major project to be completed in full over the next three years, is being promoted jointly by the County Council and Central Government (the Dept. of Transport) to see to what extent a network of cycle routes rather than just one or two facilities do encourage more people to cycle and make them feel safer.

We are also much concerned about getting a better deal for cyclists generally in traffic, e.g. at major roundabouts and other locations where cyclists are so vulnerable. We are soon to launch a new publicity campaign, including car stickers to encourage motorists to give cyclists more space.

Leaflets describing some of the new cycle facilities have recently been published by the County Council. These cover the following areas:
1. Beeston and Lenton. 2. Wilford and Clifton, and 3. West Bridgford.
