



11 Bread Not Bombs Week

If you saw the last issue of 'Listings' (and if not, why not?), then on page 4 you'll have seen a short article entitled 'Rainbow'-the Next Move'. The reasoning behind the piece is this: the centre hopes to move premises in the Summer of 1988, when the lease runs out.

The present site here at Mansfield Road is unsatisfactory in a number of ways. Firstly, it's too small. We've only just found room for everything we hoped to include in the centre. We are hoping to expand further over the next year, and by mid-'88, 180 Mansfield Road won't be large enough. Secondly it would obviously be better if the centre were situated in the middle of Nottingham, closer to the main shopping thoroughfares. It is, as you can imagine, quite difficult to lure people half way up Mansfield Road.

For these reasons, we hope that when the Rainbow Centre moves it will move into a larger city-centre site. As well as the library, the shop and so on, we would like the new improved Rainbow Centre to include such things as a cafe, office space, and educational & craft workshops. There is also the chance of some performance space becoming available. As was mentioned in the last issue, if anyone is interested in coming in on such a move, then please get a message to the Centre as soon as possible, as proposals have to be put together by the middle of May.

NOTTINGHAM WOMEN'S CENTRE OPEN DAY

Saturday June 27th sees the official opening day of the new Nottingham Women's Centre. Cramped for a long time into premises on Shakespeare Street, the Women's Centre will be celebrating the completion of its new premises on Chaucer Street. There will be a full entertainments and exhibitions programme for this women-only day, which will run from 10 a.m. until midnight. On display will be some of the services and interests that the Centre will be able to offer women in the area. MOLESWORTH COURT CASE

Everyone arrived at Huntingdon Magistrates Court by 10 a.m. There were 16 of us, 12 from Nottingham. We discussed the best way to plead and decided that it would be better if we didn't plead guilty but didn't deny the facts. If we pleaded not guilty the case would be adjourned, but we didn't feel guilty of a crime.

The case started at 11.30 a.m. The first person was charged with sowing seeds on Government property. She, along with another person, sowed seeds on a piece of wasteland outside the base. She said she was trying to show what land could be used for instead of what it was being used for: Global destruction. She was fined £25 with £10 costs but refused to pay, saying she never pays fines and spent 28 days in Holloway for not paying the last one. Everyone else was charged with obstructing the Queen's Highway at Crockbrook Lane at the Main gate of Molesworth Airbase.

Four people pleaded not guilty and had their case adjourned - three until 13 May and one (a girl from Upper Heyford Peace Camp) until 20 May.

Everyone else was found guilty and fined £25 with £10 costs. The Magistrate gave us all a chance to speak, but just ignored everything that was said.

The arguments included the fact that we were preventing a bigger crime than we committed, i.e. genocide.

This was expressed in various ways. One lady, a nurse, stated that she was tired of trying to keep people alive and well on such a small amount of government funds, while they spent a fortune on bombs and missiles to destroy people.


