

THE VOICE OF THE DISABLED



Since the last Edition of the Voice of the Disabled a large amount of water has flowed under the bridge. The most important thing is that the Conservative Party are confirmed in government for up to five years, and that the largest district council in the County has also gone that way. This is disheartening, for despite the protestations of that party, a lot of the more severely disabled are going to be a lot worse off because of the recently passed Act coming into force next April. We have lost round one, maybe because we did not put our arguments cogently enough. However we would be failing ourselves and the disabled people that are children or yet unborn, if we throw in the towel now, or at any other stage. The fight will be won when we get real choice, over our own lives, and incidently carers have some rights and recognition as people doing a real and worthwhile job not only personally but for the economy.

The present Conservative Party believes as a matter of faith in the "philosophy of the market place". It wants therefore to obtain maximum value for every pound of taxpayers and ratepayers money that it puts into services; and like it or not we have to look to their agenda not ours. The most telling point will be that we ARE the consumers of Services, we have with our limited incomes in the shape of V.A.T. to pay the bill now, that in future when 20% of any rate bill comes thudding on the doormat, we shall pay more of the bill, and when Community Charges are levied we shall pay even more of the bill. Therefore we should have a larger say in what should be provided, and we constitute the only quality control which can really be effective.

Please then, if you have any complaint about the services

that you receive then get in touch with your councillor, if you feel dismayed at any benefits that you are not getting then write to your M.P., or go to his surgery and speak to him, after all he too is supported by your tax bill. If you can't find either then drop a line to any member of the committee, after all we are here to serve the membership not ourselves.

Thank you very much for your recent letter. I think the proposed community charge will be a fairer method of taxation than the present rating system because it will spread the costs of local government amongst the adult population who put their councillors into power. There will of course be compensating increases in pensions and benefit for those who require help with the bill. Given that most local government expenditure is already paid for out of general taxation, we will still have a situation where people on higher incomes will contribute much more of the cost of local government than those on low incomes. Pensioners in properties of high rateable value should particularly benefit from the system.

I think this will all become much clearer when the details of our proposals are published in the autumn. A great deal of the comment in the press at the moment is based on speculation about the effect of changes, when important details have not yet been finally decided in the discussions going on within the Government. We will obviously have to take account of the differing needs of deprived areas of the country and low income households, as well as those who are disabled or on benefit.

I can assure you that the disadvantaged in our society will not be overlooked in determining the new system for collecting local taxation.

Nottinghamshire Coalition OF Diasabled People, is a campaigning organisation of disabled People. We believe very much that disabled people should have full control of their own lives. We encourage the active participation of disabled people, in improving the overall quality of their lives.

We endeavour to work with statutory srvices and, serviceppowedess
Where and when possible, we prefer to consult rather than confront.

We were formally constituted in June 1984, since when my home has been our office. Our monthly committee m eetings are held in Mansfield, so that as far as possible no one has to travel from one end of the county to the other.

As you can imagine, trying to run such an organisation from ones sitting room, is not an ideal situation. Weare now looking forward to moving into our own peemises in december 1987.

We are currently funded by Nottinghamshire County Vouncil, Social Services Dept., for £1,500.00 p.a.. Officers are presently trying to find monies for the rent etc., and equipment we shall need. Remenue costs are likelyto increase due to demand. As far as we are able to ascertain they are not able to fund a worker for us, for some considerable time. However, they do admit that there is a need.

We do have sufficient numbers of members, prepared to staff the office on a voluntary BASIS. The benefits to them in doing this will I hope, be many. Not only will they be using skills which they already have, but will also be increasing their skills, apart from the personal satisfaction and improved confidence.

What I would like to be able to do, is to pay those members Theraputic Earnings, for hours worked. My problem, and it is a large one, is who would provede the money for this? It occurred to me that you maybe able to advise me on this matter. Would thre be any monies available from Central Government?

I' would appreciate any advice and help you are able to offer.
Could you possibly spare me some time, when you are in your constituency?

Dear Councillor Carter,

I refer to my telephone call of Tuesday with regard to the Community Charge proposals which are currently under scrutiny in the policy of the governing party of both the City and the United Kingdom. In essence my plea is that when the policy is finally settled disabled people should not be further disadvantaged by having their rates relief abolished with the rating system.

Under the Rating (Disabled Persons) Act 1978 reductions are available to those people with substantial and permanent disabilities

and are not means tested. These are :-

i) for a room other than a bathroom or a lavatory - according to the local rate in the L on L30

ii) an additional bathroom - according to the local rate in the L on L20.

iii) a garage - according to the local rate in the L on L25

iv) also additional relief may be granted on floor space for a wheelchair, central heating, additional lavatory or any other facility

that increases the rateable value of the home.

These are valuable reductions, in the fact that they reduce the hidden costs of disability, and when wisely used increase the stock and the condition of housing which can be accessed and used by people with disabilities. Can I urge the majority party of both national and local government to consider this point and the resultant hardship to people with disabilities whether working or not if the matter goes unnoticed? Perhaps a way forward would be to make a passport benefit any one of the following benefits:

i) the servere disability allowance.

ii) the attendance allowance.

iii) the mobility allowance.

In that way the relief could be monitored in such a way it would be available only to those people who were least able to stand such a charge.

I personally have extreme doubts at the wisdom of a community charge, believing that people who own property should be charged a levy on the amount of property that they own, and that the Banks, Building Societies, and other financial institutions have a far more accurate measure of peoples ability to pay for community services in granting credit facilities. However if the policy is to be a community charge then it has to be justly administered and with due account taken of individual circumstances as outlined above.

My colleague Cllr JOhn Carter has given me a photo copy of your letter to him dated the 24th July, and I write to assure you that my understanding of the proposed legislation is that the disabled will not be disadvantaged by the changes.

I enclose a photo copy of page eight of the Scottish bill which indicates the total exemption of those classified as severely mentally handicapped, and also page twenty one of the same bill, where in clause 24, it indicates the on-going provision for rebates under the Housing benefit mechanism.

Since until my transfer to the Home Office I was in the Department of Environment, I want to maintain a specific interest in these proposals, and will make enquiries and write to you again in due course.

Do please be assured that this particular aspect of the proposed legislation will be watched with great care.

Dear Martin,

Thank you for your letter of 30th July in response to my enquiry of Councillor Carter on the 24th. My congratulations at obtaining a post at the Home Office where perhaps you may have a little more chance, as a M.P. out of that department, to use your influence rather than toe the departmental line.

I am grateful for the enclosures and agree with this principle of exemption as far as it goes. However Scots Law is notoriously difficult to translate into English Law, and I know my friends and colleagues in the Notts. Coalition of Disabled People will be far from happy to be "lumped" together with the severely MENTALLY handicapped. I have already outlined some proposals with my letter of the 24th July, and these should stand as the criteria for exemption as they do now, in the present Rating System. The other approach is to analyse the O.P.C.S. data and not only use this in the determination of levels of Benefit, but also to determine the levels on which Community Charge ought to be exempted. This will determine the ability to pay in terms of needs balanced by disposable income.

I look forward to any consultion papers that may be forthcoming
