MINERS UNITED WILL NEVER BE DEFEATED.


APPEAL

We are fully aware of the support which is already being given. It is only out of desperation that we urge you again to do anything in your power to get funds through to the Nott's Women's Support Groups.




THROUGH THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE


Over the Xmas break offers of holidays abroad for strikers kids came from Holland, France & Belgium.

On a hot summers night at Gedling . a peaceful womens picket was quickly transformed into a show of police strength. You can guess why. As a result 3 women were arrested & whipped off to the nick escorted, of course. by a few "friendly" bobbies. They were then moved to Mansfield & later charged with offences such as "obstructing a policeman in the course of his duty " & "besetting" (yet again ).

The women were then tried in december. Maureen Featherstone was found guilty & bound over to keep the peace & fined; Linda ward didnt turn up & Jackie Naylor was found guilty of "behaviour likely to cause a breach of the peace" (the besetting charge was dropped). Jackie was fined £100 + £70 costs. She stated in court that she wasn't going to pay, & awas given till january 31 to pay. Shes now waiting for an appeal..... should be interesting. And lets hope Linda manages to keep out of their sight. We will keep you posted.

A policeman who did picket line duty at Kent's Tilmanstone pit was in Canterbury Hospital vesterday after a vicious attack which damaged his jaw.


# Women and Welfare ....

This is working well and at last it seems Welbeck are able to feed their families without having to face hostility from trustees who tried to demoralise families from Welbeck.


### CRESSWELL-A PLEA FOR HELP

The bath house in Cresswell is where the womens support have their soup kitchen. Before xmas it was burnt down. They lost everything, food, pots and pans, cutlery and most of all a place to feed the children.

Through the network of womens support groups phone calls could be made to other groups to give support. The Council is now undertaking to help, they have already begun to decorate.

Cresswell premises are now restored, and able to function as before.







### REPORT ON GREENHAM COMMON

On Sunday the 23rd Sept the women of Blidworth action roup answered the call from Greenham Common women to go to Greenham Common for the day. We arrived about lunch time at Blue Gate and met the women from Nottingham women for peace. We heard that there was a road block at Indiro so we walked about half a mile down the road to Indiro Cate. Two women had already been arrested when we got there, there was about 70 women on one side of the entrance blocked in by the police, on either side of the road there were worken with banners who were singing peace songs. Police on horseback were pusiting and shoving us all over the place, and if we crossed the road we were arrested.

We stayed for about 11 hours then went back to Blue Gate. We met some women there and sat having a cup of tea and a chat with them they asked us if we would like to go and see the Silos, which was a good walk away. As we were walking women were singing. We were shocked to see 16 year old youths mirding the Nuclear Weapons, the youths dressed in army uniforms, we were also told by the women that the soldiers were on drugs because they know what they are doing is wrong. The Silos were disguised by turf which had been planted for that reason.

Soldiers who are on duty live in there a week at a time with their families and dont see daylight for a week.

The trip to Greenham got me, it made me realise if we dont win our fight, then the Greenham women have no chance of winning their's, and when we have won, it is important that we go to Greenham and give our support to these terrified but brave women who at the moment are fighting alone.
