Turn Brighton into Genoa!!!

THE ANTI-CAPITALIST movement has shown great imagination, developing from its roots with a total rejection of traditional leftwing politics. As part of this movement we at GR believe that the struggle must go on.

Thousands of anti-capitalists are to descend on Brighton on 30th September as Globalise Resistance leads the anger against New Labours privatisation and neo-liberal agenda. It is amazing that a party which when elected to power could have achieved so much, only to carry on where the Tories left off. We voted for them back in 1997, we got Tony Blair in to power and now he has turned his back on us and the rest of the people of Britain.

The plan for the day itself is to have street theatre, free speech areas, chanting, paper selling, petition signing, recruiting and other direct actions.

Some people may be worried by the anarchy which direct ac-

tion creates. But direct action doesn't mean anarchy, as GR's other leader Chris Banbury showed in Genoa, direct action can be well ordered and disciplined. Historically socialists have always favoured direct action, with the crushing of the Kronstadt rebellion being the shining example. So the threat of direct action need not concern anyone. We are confident that elements looking to disrupt the days activities will be marginalised by the well ordered main demonstration.

Hopefully, with time, the more uncontrolable elements in the movement will realise that the best form of direct action is to march from Embankment tube station to Trafalgar square, creating a proper left-wing alternative on our streets.

At your next union meeting you must pass this motion in support of the demonstration:

1. That New Labour plan to in-

troduce widescale privatisation into our public services

2. That this is very bad

3. That New Labour aren't very nice

4. That the best thing to do about it is to go to Brighton, stand two miles away from their conference, hold a placard, sign a petition, chant, buy three socialist papers from people who keep pestering you, go home thoroughly bored and dejected.

5. Abandon all hope of social change. Amen.




Is another world possible?

Trotskyist tips

Lenin's own words:

"What have you been up to out there? How could you take such a step without consulting the Central Committee? This is a breach of elementary Party discipline. For such things we shall shoot people."

Lenin to the Bolshevik Raskolnikov, disapproving about events at the Kronstadt naval base April 1917.

"There will not be any famine in Russia, if we take a full census of grain and other products at our disposal and if we show ourselves ready to mete out the harshes punishments for the violation of the established order."

The next tasks of Soviet power, Vol 15.

"Without big banks socialism would be impossible of realisation. The big banks are a 'stable apparatus' we need for the realisation of socialism and which we shall take from capitalism ready made...A single huge state bank with branches in every rural district and every factory - that will be 9/10ths of the socialist apparatus."

Can the Bolsheviks Retain State Power? October 1917

And Trotsky's:

"The introduction of the compulsory labour service is unthinkable without the application to a greater or lesser degree, of the methods of militarisation of labour."

Terrorism and Communism, p135.

"The unions should discipline the workers and teach them to place the interests of production above their own needs and demands." ibid, p137.

"We must replace irresponsible agitators with production minded trade unionists."

Speech at a meeting of the plenum of The Central Committee, 8-9th Nov, 1920.

"A competent, hierarchically organised civil service had its merits. Russia suffered not from the excess but from the lack of an efficient bureaucracy...

The militarisation of the trade unions and the militarisation of transport required an internal, ideological militarisation."
