



FREE ESOL FOR ALL?

Recently the government announced that from September asylum seekers would no longer be allowed to have free English classes (ESOL).

Refugee Forum along with many other organisations locally and nationally campaigned against this.

We are pleased that the government has now said that free ESOL classes will continue for the following 2 groups of asylum seekers:

Those people whose cases are still being considered and it has taken more than 6 months

People whose asylum claims have not been successful but who are not able to return to their home country.

This is good to hear, but it is still not clear how this will work. It does mean that asylum seekers who have been here less than 6 months will be expected to pay for their ESOL classes.

Congratulations to all of you involved in this campaign. It is a start and we hope the campaign will continue to allow free ESOL classes for all asylum seekers.


Zimbabwe appeal allowed at the High Court.

The High Court allowed the Refugee Legal Centre appeal. This now means that this test case will be reheard by the Asylum and Immigration Tribunal.

What is the case about? RLC are putting forward a case that Zimbabweans that are being returned face further persecution upon return. This is one thing that the UK government are not allowed to do.

What does this mean for Zimbabweans?

This means that at the moment people from Zimbabwe cannot be returned home forcibly. This does not stop them voluntarily returning if they wish. This obviously leaves Zimbabweans in a state of "limbo" until this case has been decided. We believe that Zimbabweans, who have no outstanding claim, may still be able to apply for Section 4 support.

Section 4

A reminder that if you are from the following countries you may be able to apply for Section 4 support without having to sign for voluntary return. These countries are:

- Zimbabwe (temporarily until the court case is heard)
- Palestine (as they are unable to return you as it is not possible to obtain travel documents to Palestine)
- Iraq (If someone is from central and southern Iraq and this is stated either in their SEF (Statement of Evidence Form) or their initial Refusal papers then they may be able to apply temporarily)
- Afghanistan (Women who are the head of a household)

NO BORDERS NOTTINGHAN



What does No Borders believe?

This is from the national statement: 'People are on the move around the world. In response to the globalisation of capitalist relations that bring poverty, starvation and war; in response to the world getting smaller; in response to the adverse affects of climate change, in response to our needs. The attempts by states to control the movement of people leads only to criminalisation, apartheid and death. People are divided into those with and without documents, workers divided into those with and without rights, and countries divided into a strict hierarchy of wealth. Thousands die as they try to cross borders, as the conditions of detention become unbearable or as the threat of return to unbearable conditions get closer. Selective inclusion and 'illegality' are methods to divide and control us all. No One Is Illegal!'

In Nottingham, we want to challenge the government's lies about immigration and security and the role of private companies who benefit from the incarceration of people coming here for help. We want an end to borders and to the deportation of Asylum Seekers. We want an end to the forced destitution

of Asylum Seekers and support their right and opportunity to work.

UK's Asylum System is "degrading and inhumane"

says Parliamentary Joint Committee on Human Rights and concludes that "No human being should have to suffer such appalling treatment".

Members of Parliament have concerns about:

- the greater use of detention against children, pregnant women
- and those with serious health problems
- a dying asylum seeker being deported
- pregnant women denied access to proper care
- lack of advice about available support
- total withdrawal of support to desperate and destitute people

The director of Positive Action in Housing in Glasgow said: "The treatment these people receive amounts to them being tortured in a country which they have come to because they are fleeing persecution from their own."

STOP DEPORTATIONS



On Wednesday March 28th in the Old/ NewMarket Square, people gathered to protest at the continued deportations to the DR Congo. After a while the protesters walked across town to the Bridewell Police Station [next to the Magistrates Court] and made their feeling know about government policies.

The Home Office plans to deport more Congolese people from the UK in spite of evidence that it is not only still unsafe for them to return but that the situation is worsening.

In March a United Nations report described the situation there as 'deteriorating'. The Bishop of Winchester objected recently in the Lords to government claims that the country was now safe, noting that every independent organisation with first-hand experience finds ministerial assurances of safety "simply incredible". He said that the Country Guidance Case on April 12th, at which the situation could be re-evaluated by the government, "will hear fresh evidence of ill-treatment, torture and rape of returned refugees, both at the airport and at associated holding centres".

Demonstration against Deportation to Sudan

On Thursday 22nd March at least 8 Sudanese asylum seekers were detained when signing at the Loughborough Reporting Centre. A member from the Sudanese embassy was present to 'help' with their travel documents!

Three of the men were known to us. All of them were brought back to Nottingham to the police holding centre, the Bridewell. On Saturday morning about 60 people gathered outside the Bridewell to protest loudly against the injustice of deporting those who have fled from genocide back to the Sudan, whose government fully supports the genocide in Darfur.

It was important to see that almost half of the demonstrators were from the Sudanese community together with students from both universities and No Borders Nottingham.
