NEW HOUSING ACT: WHAT WILL IT MEAN TO YOU?

Last year Parliament passed a new Housing Act, covering most aspects of housing. A short article cannot deal with the whole of the Act, so I am only covering here three aspects which are relevant to areas of older private housing such as Sneinton.

1: Private Rent Going Up

We've heard a lot about the increases in council rents, but private tenants are also b eing asked to pay huge increases. The new Housing Act means rents will be going up every two years instead of every three as before, and the previous limits to the increases have been abolished. As a result, some private and housing association tenants have had to







OUNTRY

The colder than normal spring delayed the arrival of most migrant birds such that at Colwick Park it was well into April before the House Martins arrived, joining the Sand Martins which had arrived a week or so earlier. The first Swallows were seen during the Easter period being followed a little later by the Swifts. Warblers and Yellow Wagtails arrived in about their usual numbers, but it was felt that fewer Terms passed through this year. The resident Skylarks, Buntings and Finches etc. also had their numbers increased with additional visitors.

During the "winter" weekend of 25/26 April the snow and gales kept the visitor level at the park to almost zero, but taking advantage of this human quiet was a pair of black tailed Godwit feeding in the waterlogged land areas and apparently quite satisfied with the park.

Early May saw 2 pairs of Canada

Geese showing off their young. These
being followed later in the month with
families of Mallard, Tufted Duck, Coot,
Moorhen and Great Crested Grebe. The
woodland and field birds nested in good
numbers and are currently very busy
feeding their young, although many seem
to have suffered quite extensively from
the egg collectors - which I would remind
is an illegal activity.

One pair of mute swans are nesting and the incubation period will soon be over, so we now wait to see how many cygnets are raised this year. Last year 5 were hatched but within 2 weeks this number was reduced to only 1. Here's hoping for a better success rate this year.

All the birds in the park will be busy during June bringing up their families with many of the parkland early breeders

raising second broods.

16 June sees the commencement of the coarse fishing season, a popular pastime at Colwick Park where good size fish of carp, chub, roach, bream, tench and pike are regularly caught in good quantities on the various waters. Anglers are reminded that before fishing they require a rod licence and if fishing at Colwick Park, a day permit as well.





face increases of up to 50% since last November. The Act also abolishes the old 'controlled tenancies' which applied to people who had lived in the same house since before 1957 - mainly OAPs. These tenants, formerly paying as little as £1 a week, have had to face immediate rises of several pounds a week, though they do also get improved rights to repairs and modernisation as a result. Rent increases can be appealed against. If you think your landlord is asking too much for the accommodation he's providing, approach the TRACS rights centre who will advise you and, if necessary, help with an appeal.

2. 'Shorthold' Tenancies

This is a new type of private tenancy which allows the landlord to get vacant possession of the house after a specified time - between one and five years. If your landlord tries to get you to sign anything changing your tenancy to a shorthold he is acting illegally - this part of the Act only applies to new tenancies. If you are a new tenant or have accepted a transfer to another property owned by your landlord and he asks you to sign a shorthold tenancy agreement, DON'T until you've taken advice from someone who knows about the situation. You could become homeless as a result. Again, the TRACS rights centre will help you. So will Mr. Rhodes at the Housing Advice Centre, Parliament St. (tel. 40314).

3: Improvement grants

At last the good news! The expense limits for grants have been raised to a realistic level - £8,500 for priority cases and £5,500 for others. 'Priority' cases are all houses in Housing Action Areas (Whittier Road and St. Stephens Road areas in Sneinton) plus houses which have been classed as unfit by the Council, or which lack basic amenities (hot water, bathroom etc) or are in need of substantial and structural repairs. The new system, while it is better than before, is also very complicated with all sorts of different levels of grant from 50% to 90% depending on the condition of the house, the area it's in, and the personal circumstances of the occupier. For advice about your case contact Mr. Williams at the Housing Department, King Street (tel: 411421) or, if you live in a Housing Action Area, the Housing Action Area Team on Radford Boulevard (tel:702825/6). The 'sting in the tail': grants are more generous, but the Council hasn't been given enough money to meet the need for home improvement. So no houses built after 1919 in Nottingham qualify for grants, and the money for others might run out during the year. So if you want your house improved, apply now.

PROBLEMS HOUSING

As housing is such a complex business each month there will be an article dealing with one specific issue. Information for these articles was derived from the Housing Rights Hand Book. Price 50p.

REPAIRS

The following are always the landlords responsibilities, whether Council, Housing Association or privatly owned.

- 1. Upkeep of the structure and exterior of the building
- 2. Maintenance and keeping in good working order, all plumbing, electrical wiring, gas-piping and fixtures for heating rooms and water if they were installed by the landlord.
- 3. Keeping common areas, such as stairs landing, rubbish chutes, lifts in proper working order. The landlord is NOT responsible for damage caused by tenants neglect or misuse or by fire, flood or other unavoidable accidents.

Reporting Repairs

Always report repairs in writing (keep a copy) so that if damage is caused by the repair not being done, you can prove that the landlord was notified and the damage is not your fault.

Failure to Carry out Repairs

If you are a private tenant and your landlord does not do the repairs you have requested contact Environmental Health Dept. They can serve a legal 'notice' on your landlord telling him to carry out the repairs within a certain time. If your landlord ignores this the council can take court action. If you are a council tenant you are at a disadvantage here as the environmental health office will not serve legal notice on another department of the same council.

Try to list your complaint to the Environmental Health officer in writing or visit at the office. Don't telephone or leave messages. In either case, if this does not work you can try putting pressure on your landlord by contacting councillors, local papers, radio or your tenants association. Or you may be able to take action yourself.

Do it Yourself Repairs

It is now recognised that there is a common law right to pay for repairs from the rent if the landlord refuses to do them, whether you are a private or a council tenant:

- 1. You must first notify the landlord of this need for repairs (in writing - keep a copy) having first made sure that they are his responsibility.
- 2. If there is no response within about 3 weeks, get three estimates of the cost or, if you can do the work yourself, prepare an estimate of the cost of material
- 3. Send a copy of the cheapest estimate to the landlord, saying that if the repairs are not done within 7 days you will go ahead with the work and deduct the cost from the rent. Keep a copy of your letter.
- 4. Once the time is up get the work done and send the receipted bill to the landlord asking for payment. Keep a copy of the bill and your letter. If the landlord refuses to pay, withold rent until the costs are paid.

Important

This is not the same as simply witholding rent because of the state of the property. If your landlord starts eviction proceedings for arrears you must be able to show that you have spent the rent on repairs which were the landlords responsibility.



PUB SPOT THE LORD NELSON



In the second of our occasional series on the pubs of Sneinton, we turn our attention to perhaps the best known of the local 'watering-holes'. When I first moved into the area the first thing people asked me when I told them my new address, was 'Near the Lord Nelson?'. This is some indication of the reputation that the 'Nelson' holds both in and out of the Sneinton area.

The Lord Nelson, or the 'White House' as it is also referred to locally has been a pub for some 200 years, but the building is over 500 years old - perhaps replacing an earlier one on the site. Originally two cottages, they were knocked together when the pub opened, and the building has not greatly changed since then. Luckily the building was spared when the surrounding terraced houses were built around the turn of the century.

The Lord Nelson is a Kimberley tied house, selling Kimberley bitter (unfortunately no mild is sold), Heineken Lager and draught Guinness, along with the full range of spirits, wines and soft drinks. One nice touch is that the orange juice is not in individual bottles, but from a bottle such as that used for 'breakfast orange'. And the 'Snowballs' make Carmen Mirandas hats look quite modest - there is a full fruit salad on top.

There are four rooms served by one central and one side bar area, each offering comfortable seating amid pleasant surroundings - brass abounds in one room. In winter coal fires add to the attractions by giving warmth to the rooms.

The side room is used to serve the excellent lunch-time snacks and meals.

Meals ranging from ploughmans lunches to full plate-meals are served.

The Lord Nelson is one of only two
Nottingham pubs appearing in the Egon
Ronay Good Pub Guide (the other is the
Trip to Jerusalem which is a coincidence
that I will mention later), and has
appeared in the CAMRA good beer guide for
many years now. Through these two
publications and the word-of-mouth
reputation that the pub has built up
there are many people from outside the
Sneinton area that visit, but there is still
room for locals and a regular clientelle
has built up over the years.

The connection with the 'Trip' is twofold. As well as being two of Nottingham's
older pubs, both have cellars which are
caves hollowed out of the sandstone. It
is hoped that the Nottingham Historical
Arts Society will be allowed to excavate
the caves as part of the general policy
of saving the caves of Nottingham, combined
with taking details for the Sneinton Cave
Survey.

All in all the Lord Nelson is a splendid pub, landlord Chris Smith and his staff give a happy atmosphere to the place, and combining this to the pleasant surroundigs and excellent quality of drinks and meals it makes the Lord Nelson a pub for Sneinton to be proud of.



We cannot give medical aid of any type. What we can give is practical help, love and understanding. We are all patients, relatives and friends who have all faced the same problem.






