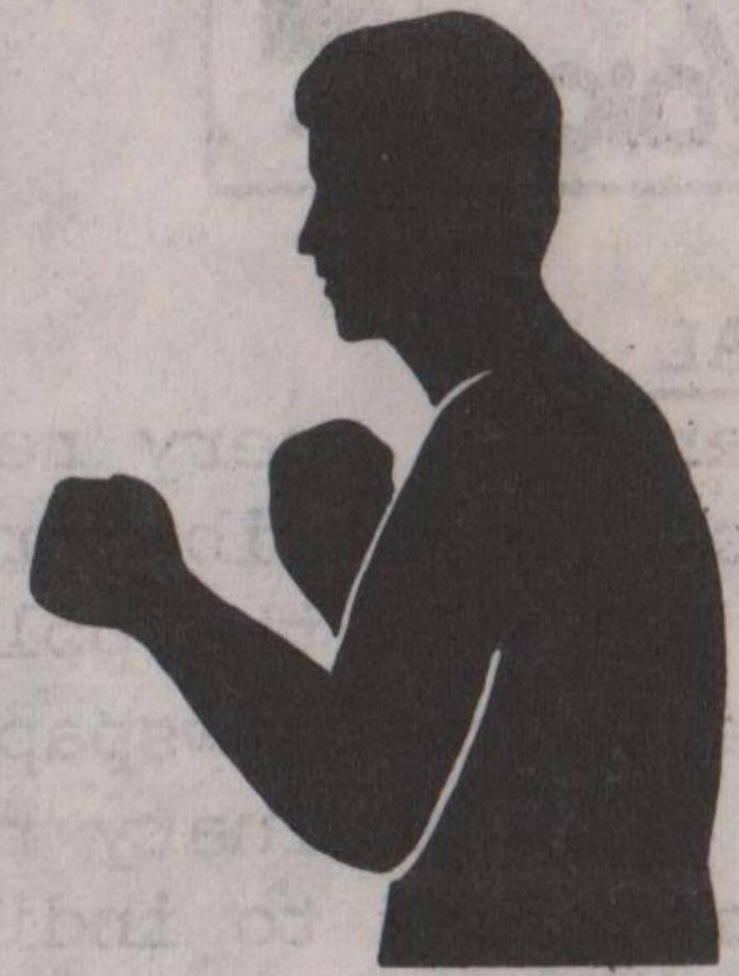

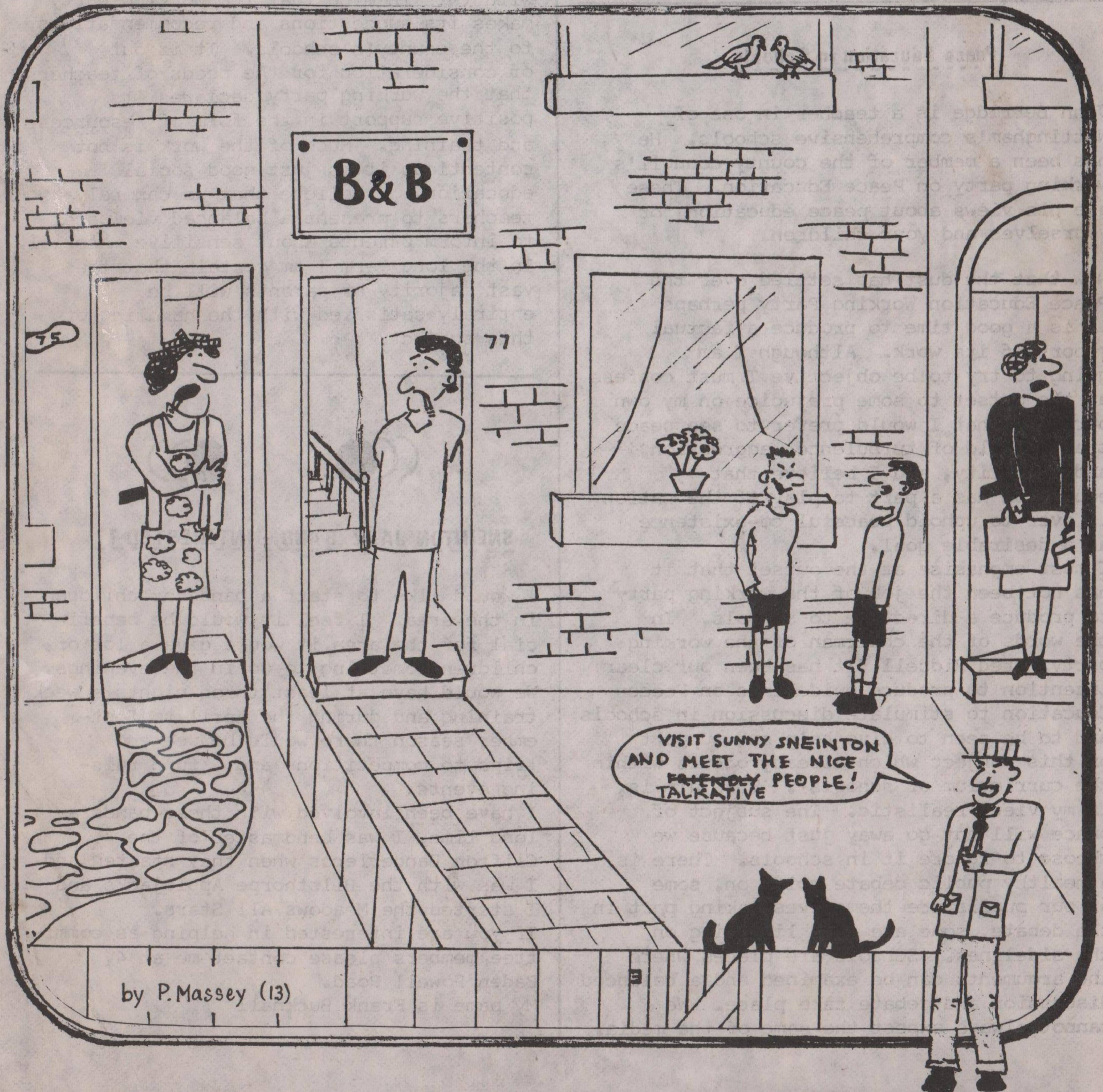

EDITORIAL

In answer to a query regarding publication of names of contributors to Sneinton Voice, we have adopted the policy which is normal practice in the newspaper world.

That is that ordinary reporting of events is not ascribed to individuals but is the responsibility of the editorial structure; special features such as pastimes, sport, etc, generally carry an identifying signature; finally, letters to the Voice carry the ascription chosen by the contributor, these letters can always be seen by interested parties, by appointment with the editor, at the office of the Voice.

Peace Education in Schools

John Berridge is a teacher in one of Nottingham's comprehensive schools. He has been a member of the county council's working party on Peace Education. These are his views about peace education for yourselves and your children.

Now that the dust has settled over the Peace Education Working Party perhaps it is a good time to produce a factual report of its work. Although I am going to try to be objective I must confess at the outset to some prejudice on my own part, in that I would prefer to see peace than a world of turbulence, aggression, and hostility, and I believe that education has a part to play if the nation is ever to uphold peaceful co-existence as a desirable goal.

I must emphasise at the outset that it has not been the job of the working party to produce a directive to schools. In the words of the chairman of the working party, Fred Riddell "It has been our clear intention to produce guidelines on Peace Education to stimulate discussion in schools and to be seen to give help and support on this subject which already occurs within the curriculum of schools". This aim is, in my view, realistic. The subject of peace will not go away just because we choose to ignore it in schools. There is a healthy public debate going on, some of our pupils are themselves taking part in the debate, some are just listening on the sidelines. Schools are places where the arguments can be examined and a balanced discussion and debate take place. We cannot always expect the same of the media.

Let me hasten to add that, although the popular view of the peace debate is about nuclear weapons, peace should and can be encouraged at all levels, the individual, the family, the school, the community, all can benefit from peaceful co-existence and an absence of aggressions, all can benefit from a search for alternative, non-violent solutions to problems. If such studies at school led to a situation in which families could safely return to the terraces at football matches I, for one, would applaud the result. But peace is more than an absence of conflict, it's a state of mind in which fellow human beings and their freedoms and rights are respected, in which young people are helped to co-operate and work together for the common good. Peace is as welcome at school and home and work-place as it is on the battlefield and it is with this in mind that the working party makes its suggestions and recommendations to the county's schools. It is out of consideration for the needs of teachers that the working party declares its positive support in the form of resources and training. Much of the work is not contentious it is just good social education. I believe that we can rely on teachers to present a balanced view and to inform parents about sensitive material. In the long term I am certain that the vast majority of parents will be entirely satisfied with the handling of this subject.

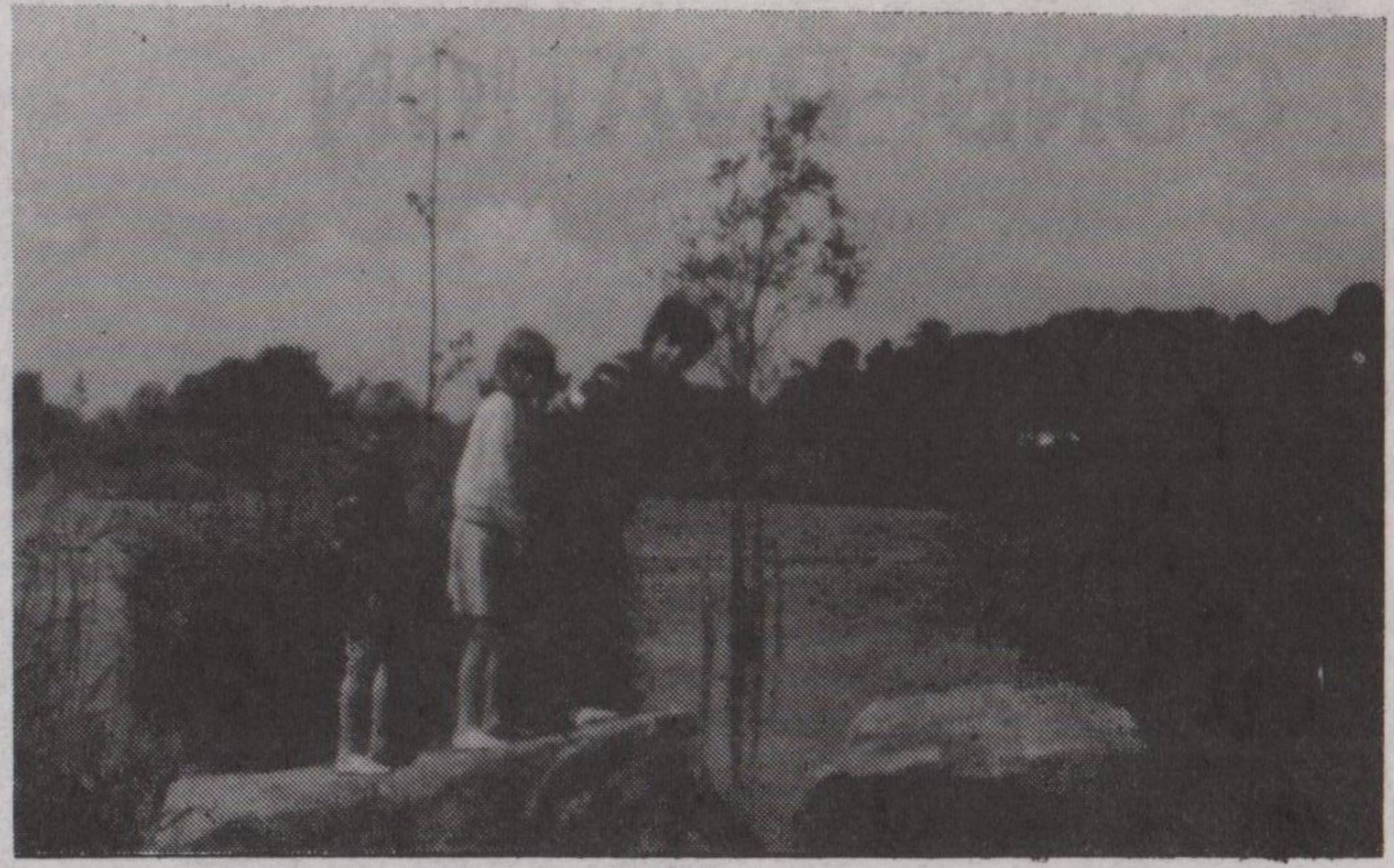
Swimming



APPRAISING THE ENVIRONMENT OF SNEINTON

Sneinton at the present time is divided into two district areas by Dale Street; north of the street is the area containing the Mill and Greens Gardens, with some good terraces of Victorian artisan cottages and town houses; south of Dale Street are the hilly, winding roads around Castle Street and the Hollows near to the original site of the early settlement. Of the few buildings of importance which still exist are St Stephens church with its panorama of the city centre; the Vicarage which is architecturally attractive; Windmill; Nottintone Place with its association with General Booth, and its well-preserved early 19th century houses. Other interesting features are: No2-8 and 19-21 Dale Street which are 19th century Victorian houses, the latter pair have second floor windows which are typical stocking frame type although now reduced in width. Holroyd and Perlethorpe Avenues are also attractive by any standard.

PROBLEMS IN THE AREA

Although decline of the area has been arrested, there is an overall air of delapidation caused by lack of investment and uncertainty about its future.

Some of the problems which are not yet resolved are outlined below: but there may be others, better known to local residents, which the City Planning Officer would like to know about. Any reader who has suggestions to make could write to the CITY PLANNING DEPT directly, or through the 'Voice' by writing to the paper at the office in 26 Lyndhurst Road, Sneinton.

- 1) Sites cleared as unfit were Lillie Terrace; and 2-6 Castle St, which has been allocated for private residential development.
- 2) Dale St, opposite Belvoir Hill, is a vacant site which is included in the current Council Housing Programme scheduled to start in 1982.
- 3) Other problems are the poor state of repair of many Victorian houses in the area and in appropriate 'improvements' to individual houses in a terrace or other group of buildings.

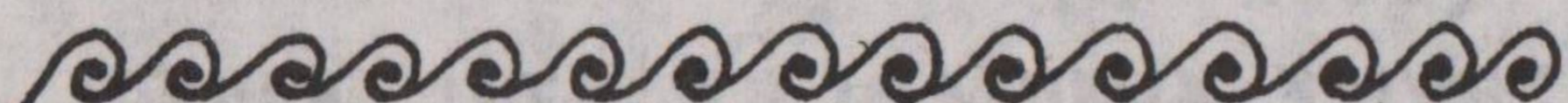

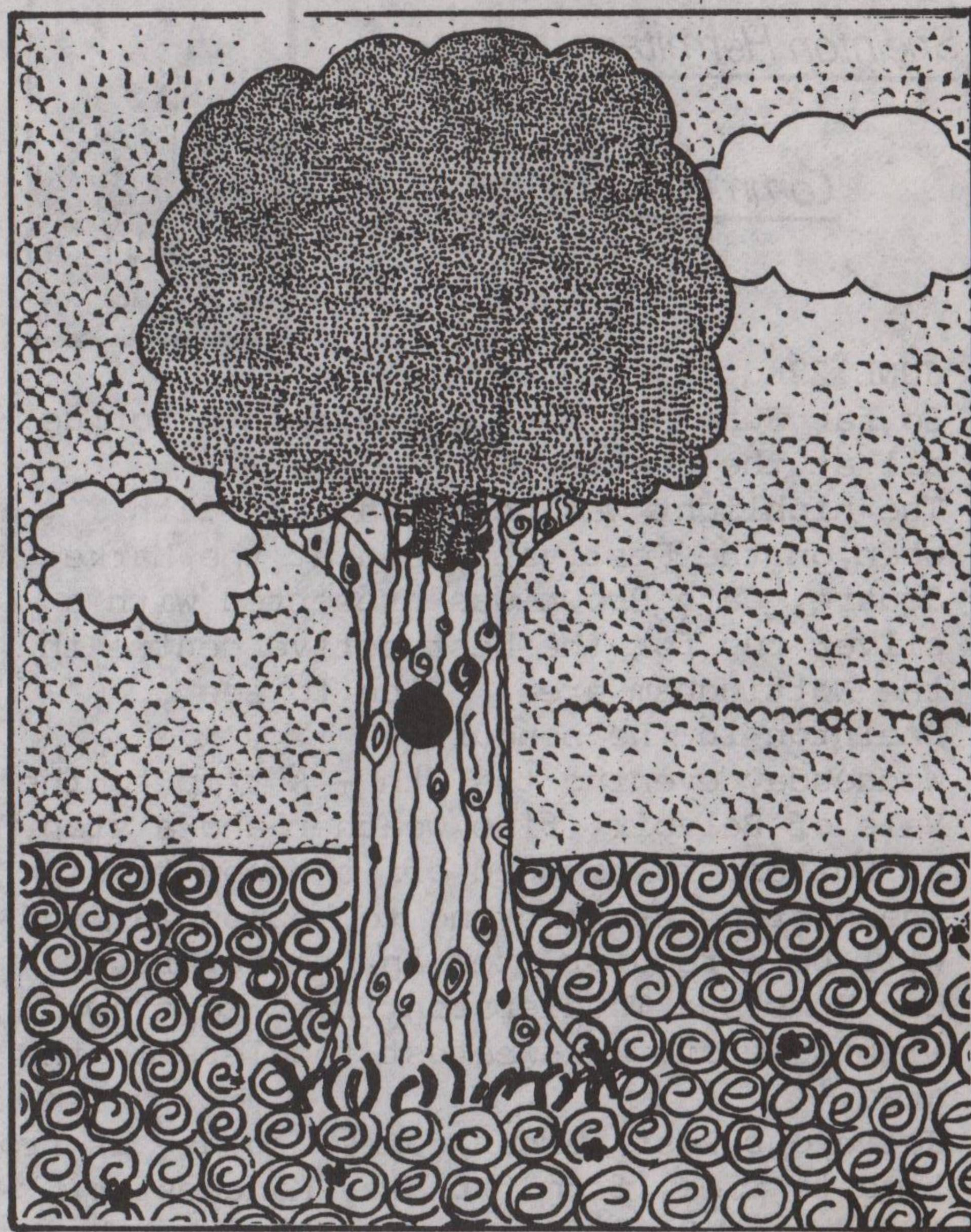

Time for Reflection

by F J. Parham on his retirement

I love Sneinton. When I took up my appointment as Headmaster of the Greenwood Bilateral School 20 years ago, I knew nothing about this area. My appreciation grew as I learned more and more about its people and environment.

During my time here I have seen changes notably the amalgamation in 1968 of the Greenwood Boys School and the Dale Girls School to form the Greenwood Dale School. In the early 1970's the numbers on roll grew, especially when the school leaving age was raised to 16 and when the school became a comprehensive school.

In the early years of my headship I became aware of the large number of elderly people living in the area. I met people of over 80, some of whom had, soon after the turn of the century, moved into new houses as young brides. These houses are those in Mafeking Street, Ladysmith Street and Kimberley Street, names made famous by the Boer War. I have sought over the years to involve pupils in the problems of old age, the annual Christmas party with the distribution of parcels becoming a tradition of the school.

Sneinton has many attractions. Colwick Woods border the school, and they have given me many moments of delight. George Green's mill is a recent attraction and his grave is nearby in St Stephen's churchyard. Across the way is the birthplace of William Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army, and not too far away is the striking tombstone of Bendigo, the pugilist.

But it is the people who give a place its character. Sneinton children are open, friendly and helpful, and many of them are talented. Their parents are to be

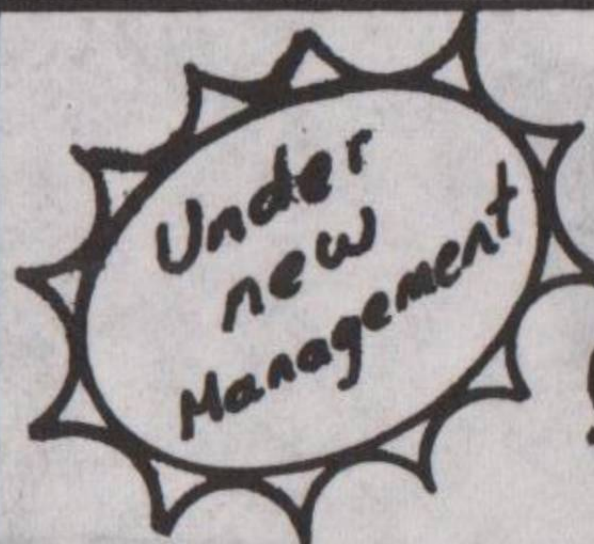

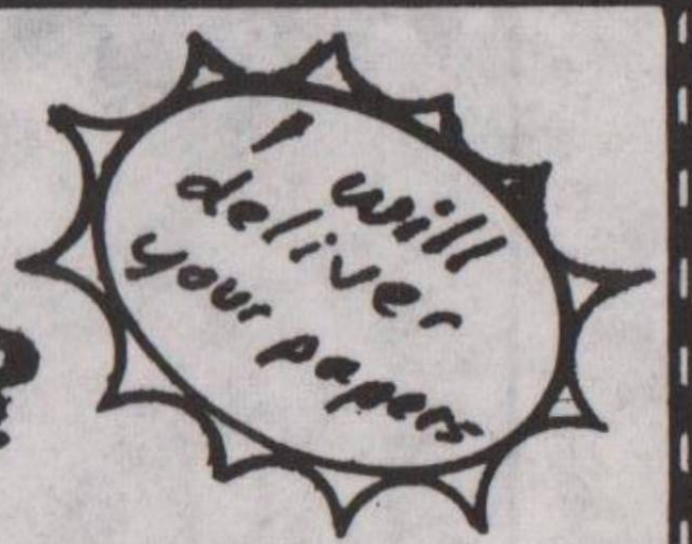

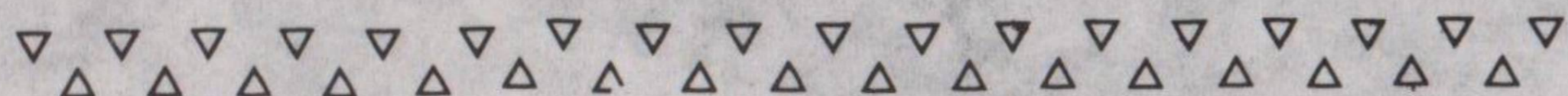

CARLTON FOLD

Shortly opening is the new warden-aided complex for senior citizens, situated between Trent Lane, Hutton St and Hoten Rd. There are 82 flats, three being accommodation for the resident wardens, two community lounges where residents can meet and have a cup of coffee or a game of bingo or whist. There is a launderette with automatic washers spin-dryers and tumble dryers. Lifts to the upper floors make life easier for the not so able and a telephone, complete with kiosk, is available to the residents. A hairdresser comes in once a week, and the ladies are invited to take advantage of the special facilities. A guest room is available for any of the residents visitors to stay overnight.

The flats are compact with everything within easy reach, the kitchens are equipped with an electric cooker and a refrigerator. Constant hot water and central heating are included in the rent and of course help with the rent can be obtained from Supp. Benefit or by applying for a rent rebate.

BUS PASSES

Good news for the pensioners and disabled of Nottingham! -

In conjunction with the County Council the City Council has introduced two types of passes for residents of the City:

1. Covering the City and joint-service routes.
2. Covering the same routes plus those operated by other companies in the County areas.

TYPE 1: For Nottingham City, and joint services, a pass for off-peak free travel is available to senior citizens on application.

TYPE 2: This type entitles the owner to the same concession as above, and additionally to approximately half-fare, off peak travel on other operators' services in Nottinghamshire. Application for this pass needs to be accompanied by a recent photograph of the applicant.

Applying for the correct type of pass in the first instance will help the staff at the City bus pass office, on Milton Street.



GYMNASTIC DISPLAY TEAM

THE ZANSHIN SHOTOKAN KARATE DOJO

The Zanshin Shotokan Karate Dojo was formed in April 1980, and since then has increased its membership from an original five to the present sixty. It is affiliated to the Martial Arts Commission, the British Shotokan Karate Shinboku Association, the Japan Karate Association and the English Karate Federation.

The chief instructor is Cyril Cook Sensei who has been training for 7 years and holds a 1st Dan black belt. (Sensei is a Japanese word meaning 'teacher' and is a term of respect). Club secretary and instructor is Simon Oliver Sensei who has been training in various martial arts of a about 12 years but for 7 in Shotokan Karate. He holds a 1st Dan black belt. The club receives regular visits from other high grade instructors.

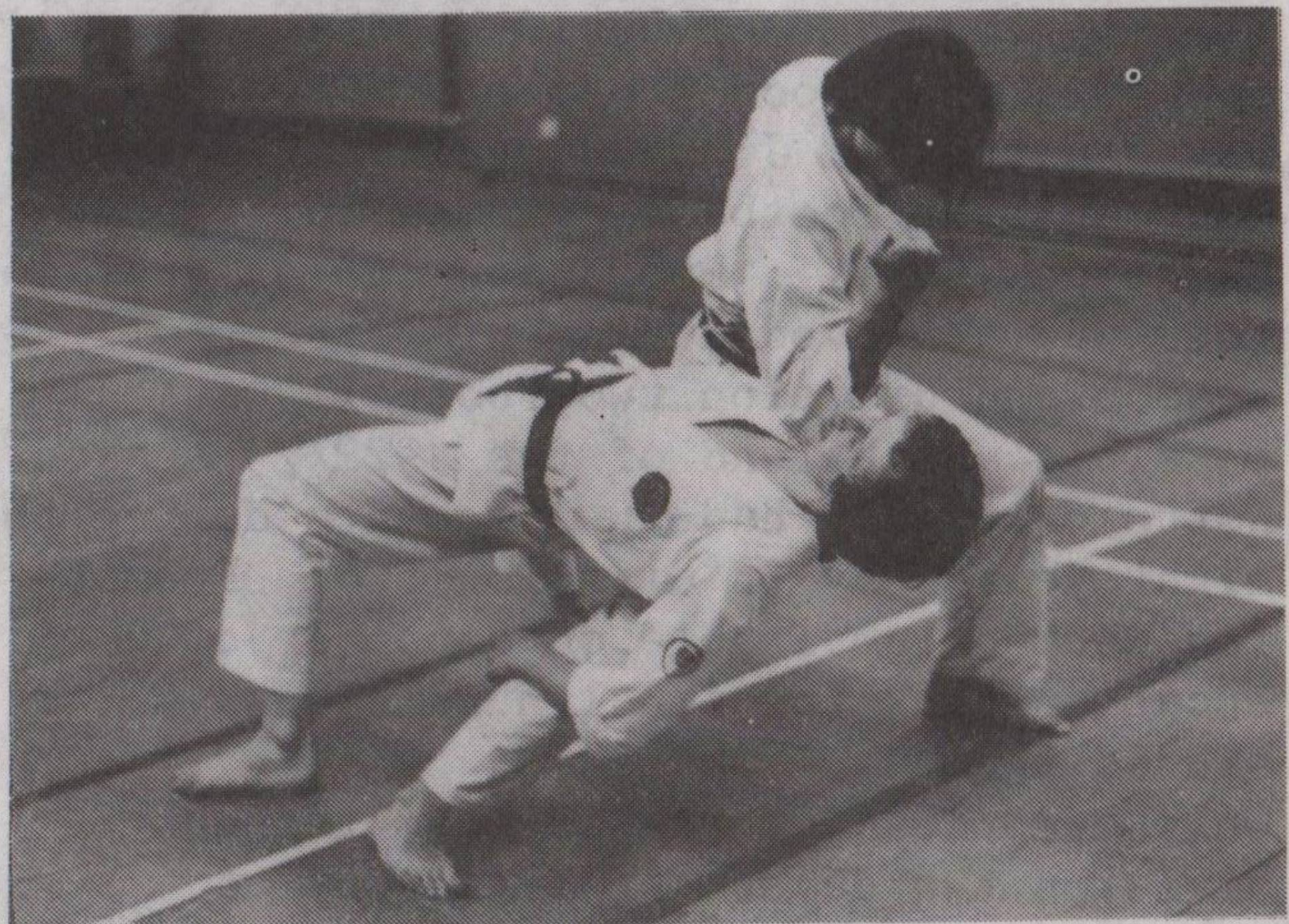
Karate is composed of two Okinawan words; 'Kara' meaning empty and 'Te' meaning hand. Empty hand. It is a system of unarmed combat developed from Chinese origins by Okinawan farmers and peasants during the 1st century to defend themselves against invading Samurai warriors who had conquered the islands and banned natives from carrying weapons.

There are four regular training sessions each week held at the Sneinton Hermitage Community Centre. Monday evenings from 6.00 p.m. - 7.00 p.m. this session is directed towards lower-graded students.

Wednesday from 8.30 p.m. - 10.00 p.m.; this session is for beginners but is attended by most club members since it is followed by a special training session on self defence. Friday night from 7.15 p.m. - 10.00 p.m. is the main training session and is for all grades. Saturday mornings from 10.00a.m - 12.00 a.m. The first hour of this session is for junior students up to 14 years old.

Karate is not merely a way of fighting, nor is it the glamorous affair portrayed by TV and cinema. It is hard work, often unpleasant and painful and most definitely not for the lazy. For some students it is a method of developing the mind and body to act in harmony, to some it is a sport to keep them fit and supple, and to others it



is a system of self-defence and learning how to cope with ugly situations.

Lastly, for anyone interested, there will be another beginners course starting on Wednesday April 7th, and costing £8.50 for a course of 10 lessons. Further details may be obtained by calling in at the club at the start or finish of any training session.

COUNTY'S RISE TO THE TOP

It seemed like a dream come true when Notts County were promoted to division one at the end of the 1980/81 season. Having watched Notts from 1966, the prospect of watching first division was well worth the wait. Names that come to mind during those early days include George Smith, Stan Marshall, Brian Bates, Dick Edwards, Alex Gibson but to name a few. There was also a youngster by the name of David Needham who looked a very good prospect.

It wasn't until Jimmy Sirrel arrived as manager that football started to improve at Meadow Lane. Promotion out of division four was achieved during his first full season and division two football was possible at the end of the 1972/73 season. Notts certainly had their moments during the eight year stay in division two. Promotion seemed inevitable on a number of occasions but the final hurdle always eluded them.

Only memories now remain from those division two days. The victory at Crystal Palace on the opening day of the 1973/4 season, the battles with neighbours Forest, Ian Scanlon's hat-trick against Sheffield Wednesday as well as the famous victory at Leeds.

Apart from the victory at Leeds, 1975 was the year when Don Masson went to Q.P.R. and Ron Fenton took over as manager when Sirrel departed for Sheffield United. But both returned to play their parts in County's promotion run.

David Needham was another Meadow Lane favourite to taste first division football via Q.P.R.

The arrival of Ian McCulloch, Raddy Avramovic, Eddie Kelly, David Hunt and the improving Brian Kilcline all made contributions as Notts finally reached their objectives in reaching division one. Before a ball had been kicked in the top flight the question being asked was who would accompany Notts back to division two? But football is unpredictable and Notts unexpectedly defeated Villa on the opening day of the season. Notts did have their share of disappointments but also surprised a number of teams with their adventurous football. Opposing managers were quick to praise the standard of football played by the men from Meadow Lane.

County have certainly adapted to the demands of top class football but as always there is room for improvement. If they continue to make progress who knows what they may achieve in the next couple of years.

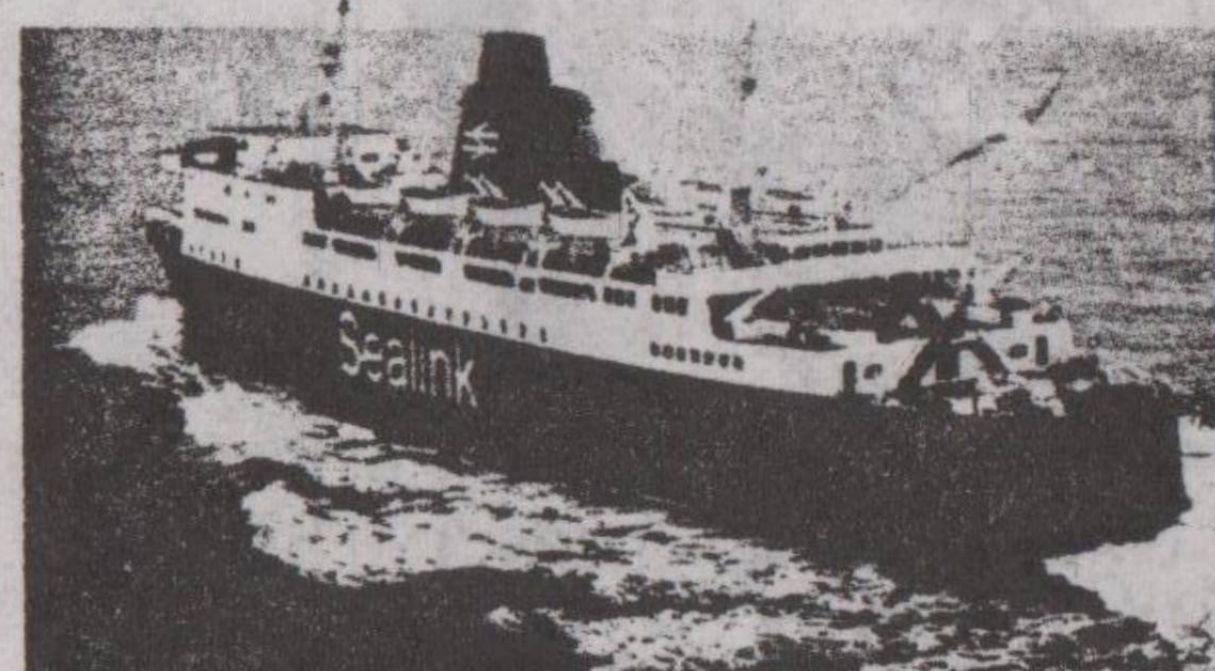
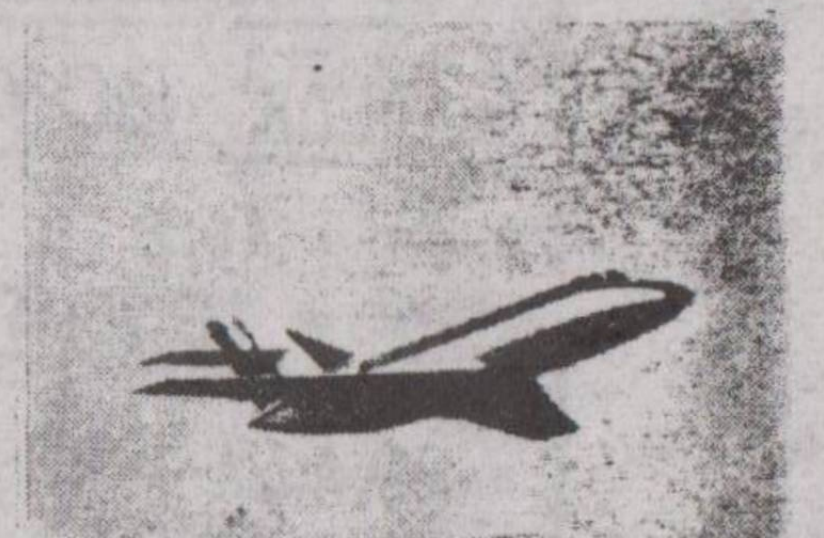

The Melting Pot



PAELLA

The ingredients for this traditional Spanish dish can be varied greatly. Obviously lobsters do not appear on the shopping list of many local families, but crab can be used instead.

Ingredients

- 6-8 mussels
- 4oz Dublin Bay prawns (or frozen scampi)
- Lobster or crab meat, (cooked)
- 4 tbsps olive oil
- 1 garlic clove
- 1 onion, skinned and chopped
- 1 green pepper, seeded and chopped
- 4 tomatoes, skinned and chopped
- 8-12 oz long grain rice
- Chicken meat
- 2-3 pints chicken stock (use a cube)
- Small packet frozen peas.

Shell or drain the mussels, and if using fresh prawns peel them. Remove the meat from the lobster (or crab) and cut it and the chicken meat into small pieces. Fry the garlic, onion, and green pepper in the oil for about 5 minutes, stir in the tomatoes and chicken, and fry until the chicken is browning. Add the rice and half of the stock, season (with a little saffron to taste) and bring to the boil. Simmer for 25 minutes, adding more stock if it's necessary, until the rice is cooked.

Stir in the mussels, prawns, lobster and peas and simmer for another 10 minutes.

This recipe serves about eight people, but the quantities can easily be reduced.
