Sneinton F.C. heading for PROMOTION

Sneinton Football Club, founded in 1904, has the distinction of being one of only six clubs in the county who are - like Forest and Notts County - full members of the F.A.

Starting the season last year in Division 2 of the Alliance League, they were promoted to Division 1 for this season. As they are currently second in their division they confidently anticipate promotion to the Senior Division next season, especially after a recent success against Collingham F.C. with the score at 9 - 1.

Home IMPROVEMENTS?

There's a lot of building work going on in Sneinton - some of it improving the area; some of it not. The City Council have produced a free guide to help make sure that building improvements really do improve. Its called 'Home Improvements' and is available from the Planning Dept, Guildhall, Nottm and anyone applying for planning permission will be expected to comply with it.

As well as giving guidance on the appearance of a building, it contains useful tips eg: if your house needs re-pointing, make sure the mortar

mix is not too strong or it will actually encourage the bricks to deteriorate! (The standard 1 part cement to 3 parts sand is too hard for old bricks).

There are also guidance notes for building contractors laying down what they can and can't do. We've all seen it....sand all over the pavement, ramps and barrows forcing us to step into the street. Pavements must have a clear 1 metre wide path left, materials must not be left so as to cause a nuisance or mess. If left over night, they must be marked by cones and lights, and skips should be emptied within 2 working days of being filled. Help contractors by NOT dumping your own rubbish in their skips and if these guides are broken - COMPLAIN.

Our Land ~ or their's?

On 21st. January in the Guildhall, the Public Inquiry on the Jesse Boot school playing field Planning Application took place. The interests of local people were well represented by BANCA, TRACS and individuals.

Standens, you might recall, have made an application to build a number of houses which no-one locally wants and which will cause a great deal of aggravation and loss of amenity. The City Council refused the original Planning Application. Standens appealed, hence the Inquiry.

There is one more very interesting fact. Usually the decision of the Inspector who presides over the Inquiry is final. On this occasion he will only report the 'evidence' to the Department of Environment. The Minister himself will make the actual decision on whether Standens can build or not. It would therefore be worthwhile writing to our local M.P. Michael Knowles, c/o House of Commons, Westminster, London SW1A OAA. It's his Minister - Kenneth Baker - who will decide. We only hope that Kenneth Baker will listen to the local people. He must say NO. It's our land not their's.

Practically everyone who spoke opposed the Standen plan. Even local political parties were united in their opposition. The plain and simple fact is that we do not want that development on that site. One man seemed determined to stand against the local tide. His name - Maitland Hyslop CEng, Dip TP, FICE, MRTPI. His brief was simple. Rattle the locals! He thought that by harassing lay people, by asking over-complicated questions and by being generally objectionable he would frighten us. Well if that was his intention it didn't work. A dozen people spoke back. At times he was rattled - particularly when he got some of his own medicine back from some of the Planning professionals who were opposing his employers -Standens.

The main thing about a co-op is that its workers are its shareholders. Many are run by women. It looks as if the flexible structure offers a good way for women especially those with young children - to work alongside friends, earning what money they can. If a worker leaves, their shareholding is sold or given back to the company. Income and profit is retained within the co-op, to be shared out equally or not, depending on the members' philosophy, or to be

ploughed back into the business. Each member has one vote.

About 4 out of 5 co-ops start from scratch. Another 15% grow from a staff takeover of a failing business. To start a co-op you first need to do some market research, to work out whether anyone will buy the goods or the services you want to offer, and how much it will cost to make them and market them. Ask

your local authority or Co-operative Development Agency about grants to pay for this initial research. Some will also pay for you to go on a business or book-keeping course; and ICOM has a pack which includes a paper on how to present your idea to potential moneybags.

ICOM is the Industrial Common Ownership Movement. Most co-ops register with it. It holds meetings, campaigns and publishes regular news. It issues a folder called "How to form an Industrial Co-operative", with model rules and application forms. A women's group has been set up within ICOM to link women in co-ops with those who provide back-up services. ICOM is at 7/8 The Corn

Two years before we registered the company (in November 1983) we, the founder members of Nottingham Cycle, realised that facing the rest of our lives with only 2 alternatives - wage slavery or the dole - was not for us.

The CDA was set up in 1978 to promote and help develop co-ops, and is now made up of a network of local CDA's. Notts CDA is at Dunkirk Road, Nottingham, NG7 2PH, phone 705700. It has 2 particularly useful publications "The Directory of Industrial and Service Co-operatives", an A to Z, and "Setting up an Industrial Co-operative", a guide to the law and sources of finance.



Taking into account the skills and talents that we had between us, we decided to start a bicycle shop with manufacture of special cycle parts. The Nottinghamshire Co-operative Development Agency helped us with our market research, business plan, cash flow forecast and a loan big enough to start a small business, as none of us had any money of our own.

Looking back now on almost 2 years of trading, we sometimes wonder how we got here in one piece. Being our own boss is not a bad feeling.....doing it the co-operative way isn't always easy. Some people think you can't be serious if you don't want to make a personal gain, but put all profits back into the business to create more jobs. Many of our difficulties are the same as in conventional businesses of course, but in a worker co-operative these and the rewards are shared.

Support WORKERS' CO-OPS



It's been hard work so far, and there is no comfortable end in sight yet, but with the enthusiasm that got us this far, the encouragement from lots of supporters and the many nice people walking into our shop, we'll get there.

Sometimes in the midst of our difficulties it is heartening to realise that over 60% of all conventional businesses fail within the first 2 years, and in the same period only 15% of worker co-ops go the same way! Vic, Pauline, Geoff, Dave, Bridget & Adrian



nesses in these and other areas can all too easily lead to failure and disillusionment. In response, many local authorities have established local CDA's (Co-operative Development Agencies) to provide information, support, training and practical assistance to groups of people who wish to take control of their working lives.

The number of trading worker co-ops in Britain is now over 1,000; the majority are small and localised, most with less than 10 members. However, their flexibility and the committment of the workers assists their viability in a difficult commercial environment; although many still suffer from inadequate access to capital.

Notts CDA was established in 1983 with funding from the County Council. In its first 3 years, it has assisted in the development of over 20 new worker co-ops in the county. These enterprises, it is hoped, will form the basis of a dynamic new sector in the local economy, the foundation for a growing movement towards an industrial democracy and common ownership. Notts CDA works closely with the 2 national membership bodies promoting worker co-ops (ICOM) Industrial Common Ownership Movement and the national network of local CDA's.

DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

In these times of high unemployment and the decline of traditional industries, many people are looking at alternative ways of organising work and wealth creation. They are looking for ways which will put the needs of people before private gain. They are looking for ways of creating employment which is stable and rewarding, and which will provide goods and services that are of social benefit.

At the centre of this movement is the steadily growing number of worker cooperatives: commercial enterprises owned and controlled by those who work in them, businesses which pursue social as well as financial aims. Operating on a basis of collective ownership and democratic control, worker co-operatives constitute a "third sector" in the British economy, a viable and accessible alternative to private and state owned industry.



The path to the creation of a new worker co-operative however, is not an easy one. Management skills, legal knowledge, access to finance, marketing expertise; weak-

This view does not seem to be shared by the County Councils Planning and Transportation Department. Indeed officers from this Department were asked to attend the public meeting but declined the invitation! They seem to feel that the public should only be given the facts immediately prior to final decisions being made.

Our local County Councillor - Roger Stenson, was left in no doubt that the people of Sneinton - especially those who live in close proximity to the proposed route - do not want this new road. He assured the meeting that he would do everything in his power to make sure that this road would not be built. He did in fact indicate that as a result of his pressure and that of TRACS the timetable, at least, for building the road would be put back. It became clear however, that residents did not want the timetable to simply be extended, but that this development be taken out of the timetable altogether. You can be assured that TRACS will do everything it can to make sure that this happens.

The CHANCE of a LIFETIME

It's 6.00am on a freezing cold Thursday morning. Snow lies thickly across the frozen fields, it's still dark. Along the narrow country lanes walk over 300 people from Nottingham including some from Sneinton, suitably dressed for the arctic conditions. They have to walk over 3 miles and at last reach a large locked gate. They spread blankets, paper and cushions on the road and sit down. The snow begins to fall. Some of the group pass the time by singing or playing games. They sit in that road for 3 hours and at 9.00am their place is taken by people from other towns and cities. Throughout the day the roads are blocked by over 4,000 people who take it in turns to prevent work going on within the locked gates.



frozen countryside a year earlier an old air-base is surrounded by ploughed fields. Another photograph shows the landscape a few weeks later in February 1985, but now the base and fields are surrounded by razor wire, guarded by police and dogs.

Two days later, a group from Sneinton hold a stall and display at Listergate (near Marks and Spencer), they hand out leaflets telling people about the action on the previous Thursday. Many people stop to buy badges and look at the display, it's maps and photographs which show the

On February 6th, 1986, 4,000 people from all over the country braved the icy weather to blockade Molesworth U.S. Cruise Missile base, on the anniversary of an invasion, when 1,800 police and troops evicted a peace camp and encircled the base with wire. The demonstration was to prevent construction on the base for one day, to show that together we can stop them building a base that will house 64 nuclear missiles under the sole control of the American Government. Members of Sneinton CND not only went to the Molesworth blockade but also ran the stall in Nottingham to tell local people about the danger that threatens us, only 70 miles away, closer than Skegness. We have the



Chance of a Lifetime to stop this nuclear madness - we must not condemn ourselves and our children to a Lifetime of Chance.

What's in Store?

A huge new retail store may one day appear on the outskirts of Sneinton - at least if British Rail have their way.

On January 16th. the City Council considered the application, in principle, for planning permission to build a 50,000 square foot retail outlet on a site which is currently a train shed, near the low-level station on London Road.

Ordinarily, the council would not consider such an application outside the established retail centres, but they have had to give this application full and sympathetic consideration because the future of the low level station is at stake. It, along with some of its neighbours, is a listed building and although partial restoration has been done, the Council do not have enough money to complete the process.

The City Council did not reach a decision on the 16th, but decided to consider the development of all the land B.R. will be selling off as a whole, including the routing of the Manvers Loop road.

It seems unlikely that there will be a public meeting in Sneinton this year to hear requests for funding from local groups since there is virtually no money available for new projects!

Discussions continue between the umbrella community organisation the Nottingham Inner City Executive, the City and County Councils and the Health Authority about the future of Area meetings, including Sneinton's. There could still be meetings to hear your views on what the Councils should be doing locally but the real sticking point in the discussions is the Councils' refusal to make future meetings more meaningful for local people. The Executive wants the Councils to agree to:a)set up joint local committees with residents from Sneinton to chase up progress on issues raised at the meetings; b)to have Area meetings every six months;

c)to have more meetings for the wider area of Sneinton - i.e. an extra meeting for Bakersfield; d)to provide more money to publicise the meetings properly in English and Urdu etc.

The Councils are caught in a trap hard demands from local groups to improve services and cuts in support from Central Government leading them to cut services. The Executive wants local people in Sneinton to get a real chance to tell the Councils what and how much to spend their money on!
