SPORTS COLUMN 1 OCT 87 Crowd of youths attack police

Police were attacked last night when a crowd of about 300 youths, mainly Rastafarian, gathered outside a cafe in Lozells, Birmingham, where a man suspected of robbery was being arrested.

Missiles were thrown and fighting between police and youths stopped traffic. Part of Lozells Road, where two Asian shopkeepers died when their premises were set on fire in riots two years ago, was sealed off and the youths dispersed.

Fortunately, the remainder found a sidedoor open 40 minutes later, and via two flights of stairs and two corridors we found our way through the main door of the chamber.

An hour long discussion against council cuts and evictions took place with squatters, council-workers and tenants speaking. This was a bit disjointed, although there were some good things said. A sound suggestion was made to squat a suitable empty building for further meetings. A paragraph was found in the Council Meeting notes stating evictions were to be reprioritised' - the Council looking for a scapegoat for its own inadequecy.

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No doubt resistance to the Poll Tax will grow as more info is distributed across the country. Badges and posters have already been made, and its time to start co-ordinating our actions <u>now</u> not 1989 or 1990! A general, nonalligned, but non-compromising campaign to distribute leaflets, information and solidarity will encourage people that there are thousands and, hopefully, eventually millions who are

A helicopter with searchlights was called in by police to help disperse a crowd of several hundred after a panda car was overturned and missiles were thrown at officers in Birmingham.

Three men were charged with assault and public order offences after the incidents in the Lozells area.

Five policemen were injured and a patrol car was pelted with stones as more than 40 youths rampaged in the centre of Camberley, Surrey. Two officers were attacked as they tried to hold a man. Seven youths were arrested.

As the gales subsided gangs of youths ran amok in town centres along the Sussex coast. They grabbed what they could from stores battered by the storm.

In Brighton, looting was reported at the Gateway supermarket in Western Road and at Sainsbury's in London Road.

Police were hampered in their efforts to protect the stores because of blocked roads.

In Eastbourne, video equipment and compact disc players worth £3,000 were stolen through the smashed windows of Debenhams.

And in Worthing gangs of youths rampaged through Montague Street. Several damaged shops were raided by

looters and extra police were drafted into the town

A police spokesman said: "There were a number of youths taking advantage of the situation, running around and misbehaving."

At the Army and Navy store in Hove, an elderly caretaker could only watch as thieves stole goods worth thousands of pounds.

Manager Mr William Welstead said: "I was told there were people just coming in and running out with things. The security man said he saw them in the shadows. But he was on his own and there was little he could do."

Mr Welstead said he told caretaker Mr Ted Jones, 70, not to challenge the thieves.

"I don't know what the cost will be. These people were just taking advantage of someone's misfortune. But they were taking a risk to their own lives.

"Some of the windows had jagged edges and were very dangerous in the dark."

The goods taken included china, bronze, porcelain and crystal.

Manager of Les Smith Motor Mart, in Chapel Road, Worthing, Mr Bryan Sinclair, said: "Police called me at home at six o'clock in the morning because they were worried about looting. The goods were totally exposed."

When Superintendant John Black shows his concern about kids hanging around on the street, he should look again at the situation the local council is creating.

CIVII alsorder

A REQUEST to exclude the press during a discussion on civil disorder at Monday's meeting of Bexley's Police Liaison Committee was turned down. John Watson asked for the item to be dealt with in confidence, but Councillor Ron Barman opposed the application and it was thrown out.

Nice to see S.E. London's schools suffering from the arson wave hitting schools across the UK. in 1987. According to a report in August, the arson rate in schools is currently running at 2000 fires a year, and last year this caused £150m worth of damage.

Car attacked

VANDALS caused hundreds of pounds of damage to an unmarked police car last Saturday night when they overturned it in a busy Sidcup road. The car, a red Vauxhall Cavalier worth around £6,000, was parked while its driver, a uniformed police officer, was making a licencing inquiry in the area. It was turned over on to one side, a window was broken and a door and wing mirror severely damaged.

Police believe it would have taken at. least three people to lift the car, and are asking anyone who saw anything suspicious at around 11.40 pm on Saturday to contact them.

DRUNKEN 500-strong mob hurls stones and glasses at police during 90-minute orgy of destruction on housing estate. 22 arrests.

Police car turned over as more than 100 officers attempt

to restore order. Crowds block roads and chant abuse.

One house stoned after three women accused of grassing to police. Woman warned to expect petrol bomb because eight-yearold daughter gave statement.

Launceston and Torbay police units rush to city. Navy and Marine helicopters hover over city's night club strip.

Violence triggered when officers try to arrest two youths. Six friends fight them off. Acting Superintendent John Campbell-Beattie: 'We've got an element that seems hell-bent on causing major trouble.'

Lincoln,

January 1, 1987

CROWD of 300 drunken thugs attacks police with bricks, bottles and staves.

More than 70 police reinforced by another 65 officers from neighbouring forces, 23 police officers hurt, one treated to remove six pieces of jagged glass from face. Ambulancemen attacked by mob.

Police pelted with stones, kicked, battered and bitten by the rioters. Drink-crazed looters smash plate-glass windows of electrical shops. 27 arrests.

Mayor John Plant: 'It was lucky no-one was killed. It was sheer, mindless hooliganism.'

Gloucester January 1, 1987

NINE police injured, 12 arrests, when crowd of 40 throws bottles and stones at city's historic Roman Cross. Troublemakers respond with more violence when police reinforcements called. Dozens injured.

Superintendent John Pearce: 'We got too many people, who had too much to drink and went out with the specific aim

of fighting. People are much quicker to respond with violence than in the past.'

Oxford

April 11, 1987

FIGHT breaks out at food vending van in main street. Nearly 150 youths grapple with police and reinforcements drafted in.

Four police injured, ten people charged with causing violent disorder, assault and obstructing police.

Streets littered with broken glass, bottles; staves and rubble used by rioters.

Oxford magistrates chairman Eric Lord: 'It appears to take place on an organised basis. They are coming into the city for a bust-up, to bait police and make a nuisance of themselves. People seem frightened to go into Oxford now, particularly in the evenings and at weekends.'



Bournemouth, Dorset April 19, 1987

GANG of youths set fire to pile of 150 deckchairs on promenade. Firemen pelted with stones.

Twenty police needed to disperse crowd of 300 people. Three arrests. Damage: £2,000.

Dorset Police spokesman: 'It's particularly nasty for firemen to be attacked as they go about their duty of saving lives and property.'

Murton, County Durham May 8, 1987

TWO policemen investigate disturbance at disco at Victoria working men's club.

Officers surrounded by screaming mob of 250 and radio for help. Panda car overturned, bricks thrown, windows smashed.

Fifty police with dogs rush in. Several people, including three policemen, hurt, 11 men charged with public order offences.

Bracknell, Berkshire May 17, 1987

POLICE face angry mob of 200. Believe trouble triggered by closure of nightclub due to vicious fight night before, in which man lost sight of one eye and needed plastic surgery after attack by man wielding shovel.

Hundreds gather outside club's barred doors. Police reinforcements called. Jeering and taunting turns to full-scale brawling.

One police officer hospitalised. Several youths medically treated. Six arrests. Lethal weapons confiscated.

Thames Valley Police said it was third outbreak of largescale violence. In two earlier disturbances, CS gas used.

Shrewsbury, Shropshire June 9, 1987

YOUTHS rampage through medieval streets hurling bricks and CS gas canisters. Early morning outside a nightclub 500 thugs involved as local youths battle with gang from Wrexham.

Police try to separate rival factions. Rioters turn on officers, spraying CS gas. Two officers hospitalised. Five treated for CS gas irritation to eyes. One man escaped serious injury as mob kick in his car.

Third disturbance that week in which gas canisters used. Inspector John Manley, of West Mercia Police: 'We can't understand how they got the stuff. It is illegal here but can be bought on the Continent, where it is used for self-defence.'

Stroud, Gloucestershire July 24, 1987

PEACE shattered by 150 bottlethrowing youths. Trouble begins at Victoria Inn, when woman spits in face of plainclothes policeman.

Woman flees, police catch her, then angry group forces two officers to release her.

Both officers beaten. Police reinforcements arrive but 100

Mansfield, Nottinghamshire May 25, 1987

HUNDREDS of youths rampage through mining town just minutes after the team parades Freight Rover football cup in front of fans.

Police officers in riot gear take two hours to contain 400 hooligans after fighting outside town-centre pub. 27 arrested, 23 charged with public order offences and causing criminal damage. 17 police officers injured, 30 youths receive medical treatment.

Great Yarmouth, Norfolk August 30, 1987

UP to 200 youths rampage along sea front causing damage and fighting. Clashes between local youths and holidaymakers. Five arrested with offensive weapons. Two treated for head injuries. Ilford, Essex September 3, 1987

EIGHT police injured, nine men arrested after stag party gets out of control in early hours. About 30 people at party.

Two officers treated at hospital. Nine men charged with causing bodily injury.

Police tell in streets of battle

A POLICEMAN hit by a milk bottle during mob violence in the centre of Lincoln on New Year's Eve said yesterday "Another inch and my eye would have been gouged out."

Six jagged pieces of glass were removed from P-c Kenneth Vickers' left eye during hospital treatment. P-c Michael Kemp, 26, had to have six stitches inserted in his cheek after being hit by a half-brick.

Twenty-three police were injured, five seriously, as youths hurled bricks, bottles coins and even snooker balls. Dozens of shop windows were smashed and their contents looted.

Police said six men and youths, aged between 17 and 24, had been charged with various offences and bailed to appear before magistrates. Nineteen more were out on police bail awaiting possible charges.

More arrests are expected. Police took a number of photographs of youths during the disturbances and are seeking to identify them.

'Very party-like'

Bearded P-c Vickers, 27 said that initially the atmosphere in the city centre was "very partylike with families, including many children, celebrating the arrival of the New Year".
