Community Centre to watch a film called 'The Threat of Nuclear War' and discuss a campaign for peace. at the meeting ideas emerged on how people could express their fear and revulsion about the nuclear threat. No formal organisation was created, instead some ideas for action were suggested with the aim of uniting people and effectively expressing concern. It is hoped that everyone will be able to participate in the campaign - old and young, families and individuals. The events and action proposed were: a Christmas Campaign for Peace; the publication of a book providing both information on the nuclear threat and peoples' responses in drawings, poems, etc.; and a weekend event in the New Year. In addition it is intended that 'Chain Reaction' be continued as a way of informing people of the campaign's progress and of involving new people. About 90 people from Telford went down to London in two coaches to the massive C.N.D. demonstration .


The Government is hell bent on making the

- in a broad based movement to demand
- 1. Stop Nuclear Power.
- 2. Stop Nuclear Weapons.
- 3. Reduce energy waste.
- 4. Develop alternative energy programmes.
- 5. Guarantee employment during the changeover."
