It is however ironic that the spearhead of the attack on liberty should be against people prepared to do some of the gornmentss dirtiest work. Nuclear advert - misleading

A ruclear waste advert by Nirex in a Middlesbrough paper was called misleading by the Advertising Standards Authority after two local people complained. Nirex (Nuclear Industry Radioactive Waste Executive) had put across the impression that the waste was to be dumped thousands of feet underground, but in actual fact the proposal is to dump it only a few hundred feet down.

So if you think that an advert is misleading in any way on nuclear issues, then write to the Advertising Standards Authority at 2 Torrington Place, London WCLE 7HN. Even if they don't agree, they do notify the advertiser that they have received complaints. PROTEST IN BROSELEY

Profit in nuclear waste

Some countries are falling over themselves to bury nuclear waste, as long as there is a few billion £££'s to accompany it.

An appropriately named West German firm called NUKEM is intending to sell waste to China to dump in the Gobi Desert. This deal costs £4.3 billion but is cheaper than paying another country like Britain to reprocess it at a place like Windscale/Sellafield.

If the political pressure against the dumping of waste grows in the Western countries, such selling to a country with open spaces several times the size of Britain could well be an attractive option.

Turkish peace prisoners In 1977 the Turkish Peace Association was founded. Its aims are the abolition of nuclear weapons, a stop to the arms race, peaceful co-existence and a respect for human rights. In September, 1980 the military coup in Turkey swept away the T.P.A. and subsequently its leading members were arrested.

In June, 1982 the trial began of The Executive Committee of The T.P.A. The trial came to an end in November, 1983. Gaol terms ranging from 5 to 8 years were handed down to 23 of the activists.

Turkey is an ally of Britain in N.A.T.O. an our government does not feel it appropriate to publicly pressurise Turkey on the issue of human rights.

More informal meetings We have not shown enough imagination in the way in which we involve people in the campaign in Telford. We have relied too much on monthly business meetings and our newsletter at the expense of more informal meetings. To put this right and attempt to involve more people, we are going to organise a regular number of house meetings to discuss issues related directly to the C.N.D. Making the links - nuclear energy A Public' Meeting has been organised for Fri. 23rd March at the Ironbridge Museum - Trust Room.
