Christian Peace Pilgrimage

Holy Week and Easter are at the heart of the Christian year. Through the cross and resurection God redeems the world, breaks the chains of fear and evil. The Easter message has great relevance for our world today, caught in the grip of the nuclear arms race. This Easter a peace pilgrimage and peace camp have been jointly organised by several Christian peace organisations. Those taking part will pray and witness together for peace at a number of places in Southern England where there is active preparation for nuclear war.

The pilgrimage willstart at Greenham Common base on palm Sunday, 15th April and continue throughout Easter week visiting bases such as USAF Baws Hill (Cruise control centre), RAF Molesworth, USAF Alconbury (intelligence centre), USAF Mildenhall and USAF Lakenheath, where it will finish on the 23rd April with a march and celebration from Mildenhall to Lakenheath (it is hoped that many more people will join at this point).

Coping with nuclear casualties

No health service in the world would be capable of dealing with the casulties of a single one-megaton nuclear bomb according to a World Health Organisation (WHO) report.

This follows the British Medical Association report in 1982 which said that the British medical resources could not cope with one nuclear bomb.

The WHO report was compiled by an international committee including doctors from Britain, USA and USSR. They concluded:

"it is not for the committee to say how the threat (of nuclear weapons) can be removed, but mankind cannot be secure until that is done."

Fuel for the arms race

American nuclear weapons by exporting specially made plutonium. This admission by the USA's Energy Secretary was made last week. It follows denials by Britain over a number of years that this had taken place.

This gives the lie to the policy of 'Atoms for Peace' which has been presented by our government ever since the first nuclear power station was opened by the Queen at Calder Hall in 1956.

The British Department of Energy said that they had no knowledge of this and said that the USA were not supposed to use the plutonium for nuclear weapons.

The farmers held a conference in Oxford recently and concluded that merely being in the countryside would not ensure long-term survival. A nuclear war in summer would destroy crops and livestock much more than in winter, thus making the ensuing nuclear winter even more desperate.

Letter - The Miners, Workers' power not nuclear power!

The Tory government and the National Coal Board are systematically butchering the coal mining industry to give them the excuse they need to go ahead with the 15 more nuclear power stations they plan to build in the next two decades.

The Central Electricity Generating Board has juggled figures and deliberately lied about the true cost of the nuclear power programme in comparisson to the cost of alternative energy. A House of Commons select committee on energy described the figures as "highly misleading" in claiming that nuclear power produced cheaper electricity than coal. In reality, nuclear power is nearly twice as expensive.

The government is prepared to pour millions of pounds of taxpayers' money into the development of nuclear technology because it has two main advantages for them. Nuclear power provides a cheap and steady supply of weapon-grade plutonium for NATO and it provides a "security" excuse to destroy workers' organisation (as they did at GCHQ).

The government claims that the coal industry is "uneconomical" and "highly subsidised". In fact, Britain produces the cheapest deepmined coal in the world and half the "subsidy" goes on pit closure costs and interest payments to the banks. Meanwhile, the C.E.G.B. is going ahead with two new reactors at Torness and Heysham at a cost of over £900 million - the most expensive nuclear power stations ever built in the world. The electricity they produce will cost nearly three times as much as coal-generated electricity. After twenty-five years of building nuclear power stations at a cost of £20,000 million, they still only manage to produce 1.5% of the energy we use. Despite all this, the government has deliberately pushed up the prices of other energy - coal, oil and gas - so that electricity remains "competitive" even in areas where it is wasteful and expensive.

Of course we would rather see more investment and research into "renewable" energy sources that do not involve the filthy and dangerous work of coal mining, but this is not what the government has in mind. If they succeed in defeating the miners now, it will be a green light for them to destroy the coal mining industry and proceed with its plans to build more inefficient, dangerous nuclear reactors. This will mean more unemployment, higher fuel bills for the poor, more attacks on civil liberties and trade union rights and more plutonium for Thatcher's bombs.

Letter - Authoritariumism & the police

Increasingly during the past few months we have seen a more authoritarian approach to dealing with Trade Unions, groups and individuals in society. Hand in hand with this alarming development has been the increased action of the police and courts in dealing with 'criminal' action. Civil liberties and the rights of individuals are being eroded step by step.

Larger numbers of women have been arrested and sentenced in courts in Newbury during the last few months and only last week a six month sentence was imposed on Sarah Tisdall for the leak in information concerning the date of deployment of Cruise missiles. This was vindictive and brutal.

Recent attacks on Trade Unions - the bribe offered to workers at GCHQ is one sign of the trend, so are the laws pertaining to Trade Unions. Last week, police turned back miners at Dartford tunnel. Two coachloads of miners were ordered out of their vehicles on the M6 at Cannock and the drivers ordered to return with empty coaches to South Wales, leaving the passengers stranded. Police have been contacting coach owners in South Wales in an attempt to dissuade them from taking bookings from miners.

One can begin to see an authoritarian trend that has wider implications for the peace movement. The Police and Criminal Evidence Bill now passing through Parliament will give the police extra powers to detain, search and control, which clearly threaten the freedom of individuals and have serious implications for organisations like T.A.N.G. who are actively involved in questioning government policy.

FINAL EVICTION OF GREENHAM WOMEN'S PEACE CAMP MARCH-APRIL 1984

This is the most urgent Greenham Appeal so far. There is a Court Injunction for the final eviction of the camp from March 22nd till April 2nd.

The signs that this country is on a war footing are becoming increasingly obvious. After stripping G.C.H.Q. Workers' Union rights from them, Thatcher's Government is now depriving the people of their basic democratic right — the means of effective protest. Heseltine has repeatedly declared that the existence of the G.C. Women's Peace Camp is proof of, and a tribute to British democracy. This has been no more than softsoaping before the iron heel descends brutally in the last week of March.

We are appealing urgently for all women to support Greenham at this desperate time. Please come for as long as you can from March 22nd, but particularly from April 2nd, when the eviction is supposed to be completed.

Your response to this appeal is crucial. The survival of Greenham hangs in the balance. Thousands of women are needed to support our sisters, who have endured enough already. Together we must prove to this government that women are saying NO! to Nuclear Weapons and to Military Dictatorship.
