

ITALY FORSAKES THE NUCLEAR INDUSTRY

Italy has just taken a decision which will have the effect of halting nuclear power. A referendum on 9 November now allows local authorities to veto nuclear plants; it halts financial incentives given to encourage communities to accept nuclear stations, and it withdraws Italy's 33% stake in the Fast Breeder programme. Joining Austria, Sweden, Denmark, Greece, Norway, Portugal and Luxembourg as 'non-nuclear' nations, there is now strong pressure for Switzerland to follow suit in a forthcoming referendum next year.

Those Talks.

- What is estimated at around 4% of the world's nuclear weapons are to be abolished if the tentative agreement reached between Gorbachov & Reagan is finalised & then ratified.
- Already governments in the West & probably in the East as well, but that we don't knew, are talking of compensation; (news programmes suggest that Britain is ordering new air launch missiles as part of this.)
- Tory propagandists Richey in the Salop. Star, Younger:
 elsewhere have claimed that this would have come earlier had it not been for the activities of the peace
 movement. Given that only a few months ago the Government was worried that the present proposals would leave
 Britain undefended, this is a palpable lie.
- It could be a step forward, provided that it is the first of many; provided that is that the pressure on politications is maintained. The danger is that it everyone thinks that the agreement means more than it does, that that pressure will not be.
- The Greenham & Molesworth demos made this point, & are to be welcomed; more to the point join us on the coach next Easter to the Aldermaston March.

"Nothing to celebrate in '88"

January 26, 1988 marks the bicentennial of British colonisation of Australia and 1988 will be a year of celebration. The indigenous Aboriginal population feel they have "Nothing to Celebrate" and plan to use the white celebrations as a poignant counterpoint to their publicisation of the two hundred years of exploitation and brutality that Aboriginal people have suffered under white rule. 1988 will be a year of

mourning for the many thousands killed; even in present-day Australia a black person dies in police custody every eleven days on average.

However, Aboriginals are making demands. They say—"We want land for our tribe ... We want our own way of life ... We are willing to live side-by-side with others but we want to live our own culture and traditions."

Survival International and other groups are campaigning throughout 1988 and visits to Australia are planned. Aboriginal representatives will also visit this

country to protest at British involvement in the celebrations. 

The Ultimate Blasphemy

Recently, I was fortunate in hearing Fr Alfred Willetts speak to the TANG public meeting. He is a long-time campaigner for peace and disarmament- his determination and beliefs being rooted in his Christian faith.

Rev. Rex Hallam, in his introduction, spoke of the statements made by the Methodist Church, and others, on war, both recently and earlier this century. Sadly, few ministers have taken up the challenge to repeat these.

Alfred told of several occasions when he had been verbally abused, specifically because of his clerical position. To complement that he has also been applauded for his stand by people who welcome a 'man of the cloth' standing up for his Christian beliefs. For many people, seeing a cleric outside a nuclear base is such a challenge that they dismiss him/her as a communist, or less critically as well-intentioned but misled. It is thought provoking to consider what Jesus would have done were he a young man today.

Alfred later spoke of meeting a woman from the Pacific Islands (a description suggesting peacefulness, but now foully tainted by the nuclear powers). She told him of the repeated still births of babies, the cure of cancer, and ill health due to diseased fish (a consequence of breaking coral in the atomic tests). This was deeply moving for me. It can be understood countries at war having civilian casualities (however distressing) but it is obscene that Pacific Islanders, at war with no-one, are suffering at the hands of the French military, who in turn are not fighting a war, only enhancing the evil power of their nuclear arsenal.

What horrors a nuclear war would release when this happens in a time of 'peace' (sic).
