

WHY ALDERMASTON

This Easter a series of marches will converge on the Atomic Weapons Establishment at Aldermaston.

First built in the 50s, Aldermaston is both a nuclear weapons laboratory and production facility it designs, develops and tests warheads for:

- I. British submarines ie Polaris with its updated and costly Chevline warheads and Trident.
- 2. The RAF's nuclear capable aircraft
- 3. The Royal Navy's depth charges

In addition it;

4. Manages special collaborative arrangements for nuclear cooperation and transfers nuclear materials with the United States.

Britains first nuclear bomb was built in Aldermaston's AI building which is now being replaced by the new A90 weapons manufacturing complex at an estimated cost of £35,000. When completed the A90 building will consist of four bays. Two of these bays will be used for the making of plutonium billets for Trident warheads and these will be the first to go into production, possibly in the Spring/Summer'88. The third bay will be used to dismantle obsolete nuclear weapons and to recover plutonium for further use. The fourth will be used to design, develop and manufacture 'future' generations of nuclear weapons.

There have been many accidents and leaks at Aldermaston, only some have been made public. The most recent was in December 1987 when contaminated water was discharged into the Thames at Pangbourne.



NO NEW DEPLOYMENTS

Even before the ink is dry on the INF Treaty, NATO is discussing new deployments of nuclear weapons in Europe.

Three new generations of nuclear weapons are on NATOs agenda: a short-range cruise missile that can be conventional or nuclear armed; across the board modernisation of battlefield nuclear weapons and increased deployment of sea launched cruise missiles.

On April 26-27th NATO defence ministers will meet at the 'Nuclear Planning Group' in Kolding, Denmark. It is believed the group will give the go ahead for new deployments.

The European peace movement is in the process of organising its opposition. Peace groups in each NATO country will be lobbying their governments on new NATO deployments. Whereas in the past these sorts of decisions have been made behind closed doors, we shall force them out into the open.

Peace groups in each country will be circulating a letter of protest and gathering signatures from groups and individuals.

WHAT WE MUST DO

1) Circulate the letter overleaf and gather as many signatures as possible. Petition forms are available from CND and from TANG. We should aim to gather at least 500 names. Approach local organisations such as churches, trades unions, political parties. All petitions and letters should be sent to CND national office by April 15th.

To the Rt Hon George Younger, ... Secretary of State for Defence

We call on you to continue the process of disarmament started by the INF treaty signed by Reagan and Gorbachev by:

- 1. making no further nuclear or nuclear capable deployments of any kind in the NATO area, including at sea.
- 2. continuing negotiations to secure further zero-zero options covering other classes of weapons both nuclear and conventional, and troops and equipment (e.g. tanks, submarines).
- 3. opening up political frameworks and discussions to move towards a new common security for the whole of Europe based on demilitarisation and the dissolution of the bloc system that separates Europe into East and West alliances.

In particular, Britain should contribute in the short term by immediately scrapping the Trident programme and by refusing to permit any new deployments of nuclear weapons or nuclear capable vessels or aircraft in Britain.

We pledge to resist the remaining nuclear weapons in Europe and any new deployments, with the same spirit of protest with which we confronted the deployment of cruise and pershing missiles.

2) Help lobby the British Parliament and our own MP. It'll be hard to squeeze any concessions out of the Thatcher Government, but we can make them take their decisions more publicly and it's important to inform all MPs, whatever their party, about possible new deployments. The Northern Friends Peace Board has suggested that groups or individuals could write to key senators or state/national U.S. newspapers asking them to ratify the INF Treaty. Ratification seems fairly certain but one never knows.

Letters should be written from your own experience and can include instances of local or national action against the siting of Euro-missiles in Britain etc.


It is suggested that you stress your hope that the INF negotiations have set an important precedent etc., and perhaps congratulate the US administration on its efforts to date.

People in the U.S. know very little about the European Peace Movement and the sustained opposition to Cruise and Pershing deployment in Europe. Demonstrations or actions which they have heard about have often been presented as anti-American. It is important to point out that our position is anti-nuclear not anti-American.

There is a very large constituency concerned with peace issues in the US which regularly takes up peace issues with their Senators. The following information lists US Senators who have been identified as being so called "swing voters", that is who are undecided on the issue. Two key Senators are Sam Nunn from Georgia who is chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and Robert Dole from Kansas who leads the Republican Party in the Senate. Bob Packwood-(R). Warren B. Rudman-(R). Also Sam Nunn(D). He is already voting favourably, but he could be very important in helping to swing other votes, and should be written to and encouraged.



Production of the Trident system seems to be hitting a few problems.

In the United States, test firing of the missile recently resulted in a spectacular failure when it exploded in midair. Meanwhile in Britain production of the warhead components is way beyond schedule. The most recent mishaps to befall the system happened in two consecutive days last month when two sections of the submarine hull fell off their cargo ships and sunk off the coast of Scotland. The MOD is now busy trying to find the best way of salvaging the £1.5 million worth of components. Our hope is that they remain in their watery grave to Rust In Peace.





Instead of everyone frantically trying to get to one rally site, we propose having a number of mini rallies and/or moving the speakers around the base. Each gate at Aldermaston will have a particular theme.

Regretably its nothing new but two items of early February news demonstrate just how hypocritical the claims of the Cold Warriors of both sides; (that "their bombs are for imperialist aggression, our bombs defend Democracy/Socialism";) are.

After the Bophutswana military, which had been trained by South Africa, is officered by people chosen by South African officials, had - for whatever reasons - turned against that country's puppet President; South African forces were sent in to quell the insurrection.

It turned out that South Africa and the "independent"
Bantustans have an agreement whereby South African forces will intervene to protect the general good. Readers will recall learning of a similar agreement by the Warsaw Pact countries in 1968, - (or at least those readers who are old enough to remember Czech events in that year.)

Though nowadays it is common, even for Thatcherites, to pay lip service to opposing Apartheid one can assume that criticism will be less raucous from Tory benches than it was when Russia invaded Afghanistan. But equally, though Gorbachov has made it respectable for apologists for Russia to deplore the invasion of Czechoslovakia, they will, nevertheless, fail to see the parallel.

Meanwhile the U.S.A. is allowing itself to be partially diverted from hounding the Sandanista, in that it has found a new hate figure in Central America. General Noriega, trained as he was by both the Pentagon & the C.I.A., might seem a surprising bogeyman for the Americans; (but then after all Colonel Gaddaffi was also helped to power by the C.I.A.)

Of course the denunciations appear to suggest that the U.S.A. has suddenly learnt that he is a dictator; (which is rather like Margaret Thatcher suddenly learning that her fellow monetarist and trading partner, General Galtieri, was a fascist) but as he and his predecessor, General Torrijos, have maintained a dictatorship in Panama, for about a quarter of a century, with only a very brief previous American objection, ("coincidentally" at the time of Torrijo's replacement,) this seems unconvincing.

Alternative accounts claim that America has learnt that General Noriega protects, (& takes bribes from,) drug smugglers. Again what is new? Quite apart from the fact that the Panamanian economy has been linked since the war to the drug trade, and the U.S.A. has known this, & been happy to see its people thereby diverted from any political involvement; America's international role on drugs resembles that of Britain in the days of the Opium Wars with China.

In Nicaragua, in Kampuchea, & in Afghanistan, the U.S.A. subsidizes guerrillas ("freedom fighters") whom according to her own Congress investigations are heavily involved in heroin traffic.

The Iran-Contragate investigations have shewn that at the very time that the Reagans were supposedly launching a campaign against drug abuse, "say no to..", national security officials were deliberately turning a blind eye to the import of drugs to Florida, both by Nicaraguan Contras, and by anti-Communist Cubans.

So why can't General Noriega have his share of the cake?

Panama was created as a separate country so as to allow control of the Canal area; control that is financially highly profitable. Consequently from its inception, - created by an externally-funded revolt demanding secession of the region from Columbia, just at the time when American engineers had decided that it would be too costly to implement their previous planned canal, (ironically through Nicaranua,) - Panama has been a puppet ruled by people loyal to the U.S.A.

Every so often, international pressures convince one such that his country (or he personally) would gain more by a less one-sided commitment. Each time that happens, America suddenly awakes to the fact that there is something less than perfect about Panamanian Democracy. The last time that happened was when General Noriega - with CIA support - overthrew Torrijos.

The Ultimate Blasphemyconclusion

In January's Chain Reaction I wrote 'The Ultimate Blasphemy', a report on the public meeting with Father Alfred Willetts as our guest speaker. Now I write the sequel to that article concluding my report and thoughts on the evening.

Alfred compared the conveyer belt of death for the Jews, and others, in Nazi Germany, with the nuclear weapons programmes of the nuclear states today. There are indeed similarities.

An extensive industrial effort was required to supply all the equipment, material and services for the concentration camps and their machinery of death. Many hundreds of companies and many thousands of people were involved in this supply, with greater or lesser awareness of the endresult of their labour. Some people spoke out and were punished accordingly. Most passively accepted the situation.

Today, are we not in a similar situation? There is an intensive industrial effort in manufacturing nuclear weapons; supplying components, materials, services, the nuclear material, and also maintaining the bases where they are stored, the aircraft, ships and launchers of various kinds. Again hundreds of companies and thousands of people are involved. Perhaps we have a greater knowledge today of the end result of these activities and our role practically in them. In addition, nearly every one of us is financially involved in paying for the creation and maintanance of these nuclear weapons.

Who will speak out today?

Many have spoken out, through letters to the press, to MPs, by attending demonstrations, going on marches, supporting the women at Greenham Common, and in many other ways. But is this not relatively easy? By doing so we need fear nothing like the consequences which befell those in Nazi Germany. ...over

Should we be doing more? I know I am frightened of breaking the law and being arrested, for a variety of reasons. Today we are quite affluent in Britain generally and so believe ourselves to have much more to lose. Consequently I envy those with the courage to break the law because of their commitment to peace. Future generations may condemn us as previously others were condemned in the Nuremburg trials for obeying orders.

Alfred spoke of the Marines creed, stating how he and his rifle are one, united as a killing machine. I believe this was featured in Stanley Kubrick's film, 'Full Metal Jacket', on the Vietnam war. It is part of a process soldiers undergo in training to make them kill others without hesitation and with a clear conscience. This strikes me as being truly evil. From a Christian perspective the Bible states 'Thou shall not kill' and Luke quotes Jesus saying 'Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, and pray for those who ill-treat you.' Whether the Russians are our enemies is open to debate.

Alfred spoke of the despair and pessimism he found in young people today. this reflects the apathy apparent across all generations. It may be that apathy can be seen as a force of evil and conversely action as a force of good.

Some occasional readers of Chain Reaction have criticised TANG's coal welcome to the I.N.F. deal. Saying that cynicism is only the reaction of a minority, & that the mass of people welcome it, implying that it should be accepted that such mass good sense must be right.

Apart from the fact that those who argue this way are somewhat selective; - they don't generally assume, fortunately that because Mrs Thatcher won the elections we should all troop over to the Tory Party, & starte the N.H.S. & the education system; nor that because the Sun is widely read that redical papers should feature page 3 girls; - our critics haven't looked at the news.

The Observer reports that <u>already</u> the Western powers have introduced more nuclear weapons, (allegedly to replace those that will be abolished by I.N.F.,) than will be - if the I.N.F. is ever actually ompleted and ratified - abolished by the treaty.

But it is not only in this respect that brinkmanship continues. Chain Reaction, at the time of the Gulf of Sidre affair, stressed that that sort of display of big power arrogance could easily spark off a war. Far more so when American ships insist on sailing through Russian territorial waters in the Black Sea; (one has only to think what American reaction would be to similar Soviet naval incursions into, say, Apalachee Bay;) near Russian military ports. That is deliberately provoking a risk of war, & hardly testifies to a spirit of detente.

The Guardian (Feb. 15) has a picture of a Nicuraguan Contra leader called Commandante Hitler. Remembering that Reagan insists on calling the contras "Freedom fighters" & argues that money for them is essential to the free world, that too is a demonstration of brinkmanship; if Reagan believed any of his own case, he would have insisted that the contras (at least partially) clean up their image; that one should boast of his admiration for Hitler is reminiscent of a stage in the Vietnam War, when Vice-President Cy did the same. It doesn't suggest that the world leaders want to make peace.

State Insecurity

"The Arrogence of Uncontested Power", (25p, available from TANG) a Wrekin Libertarian pamphlet by Laurens Otter, attempte to put the continuing mystery of the murder of Hilda Murrell into the context of other contemporary scandals, - such as Spycatcher, Stalker, - concerning state security functions.

"People used to be hanged for Treason, (& still can be.) Now we make them Prime Ministers."

(Anon. 1939.)

Treason in conventional politics in this country is the most serious change that can be made. It is made, advisedly, in this document. We all know that there is one law for the rich and one for the rest; it deliniates another divide, - one for government & one for the people, - not claiming this as original, but as one which of late has increased by leaps & bounds.

Revelations of duplicity come in in an ever more rapid flow. The Sec et Services, the suppression of information, withholding facts from Parliament on nuclear weapons, silencing individuals and the Media by courts, threats & foul deeds.

The Intelligence Services, in particular, are seen as out of control; yet whether their misdeeds are known or not, the government has attempted to draw a ragged cloth of denials & injunctions over events. Occasionally some slip through - Clive Ponting & Peter Wright - others are less fortunate - Sarah Tisdall & Hilda Murrell.

Hilda Murrell knew too much & was a thorn in the flesh. More important she was seen as part of a threatening wider movement, challenging the state. Someone decided she had to go, not just because of herself, but 'pour decourager nous autres'. Hence the deliberate questions left unanswered concerning her unsolved murder.

Governments claim to be the judge of national interest,
