A quarter of a century ago a similar small incident in the Bay of Tonkin was the excuse for American involvement in the Vietnam war. Now even American government historians concede that the story was manufactured. Even if there were hot pursuit across the border, America has excused this when South Africa has advanced far further into her neighbouring states.

Fourth Anniversary

- There are some Whodunnit writers, of whom one knows that if in the first chapter they establish for one character a cast-iron alibi, show that he or she was unacquainted with the deceased and can have had no possible alibi, and anyway was physically incapable of the deed; that it will emerge in the last page or so that this character by means & for reasons not prviously disclosed, was the culprit.
- Presumably on this basis the orthodox view has now been for nearly quarter of a century that Lee Harvey Oswald murdered President Kennedy; and West Mercia police have similarly relied for four years on the Whodunnit readers learnt tendency to assume that whoever apparently couldn't have committed the crime must be the culprit.
- The fictitious casual burglar who broke into Miss Murrell's house four years ago, took some small change, then dragged her upstairs to tie her up, and then down again, leaving jewellry & other valuables; drove at the height of the rush hour through the centre of Shrewsbury, turning right frequently acress the line of traffic to abduct her and then a few days later dumping the body in a wood East of Haughmond Hill might have thought a little 'over the top! even for the worst Whodunnit writer, but is nevertheless a worthy successor to Oswald.
- In these circumstances, it was with sorrow not unmixed with amazement, that I saw that in the New Statesman, (which three years ago had published some of the earliest independent research on the murder,) Duncan Campbell, of all people, in, inappropriately, a review of Stalker's book, chose to give credence to the police story; without producing any evidence whatsoever to make this story less incredible.
- However, going to press, as we do, a week before the fourth anniversary of Hilda's abduction and subsequent murder, it provides another occasion to stress that at the very least if the police story has any truth in it whatsoever, then they show themselves to have been criminally negligent; & the fact they cannot catch an obviously incompetant burglar-murderer doesn't inspire confidence. It is more probable that they are covering up something, for someone.

The Soft Sell- afield

The nuclear power industry wants to spend £400,000 on women this year. This is because their surveys have shown that more women are against nuclear power than men (two-thirds of women are against, compared to half of men).

The money is going on advertising. This will be geared to telling women that nuclear power is a good idea.

In fact, according to a leaked (!) report, people in general saw the nuclear industry as 'devious and secretive'. Apparently the old adverts saying how safe everything was had had the opposite effect of making everybody feel nervous.

So what will these new adverts for women say? Probably not that Sellafield radiation emissions can be measured as far afield as Spain and Poland. Perhaps instead there might be 'women to women' adverts?

Whatever is done, it'll be worth keeping an eye open for this latest attempt to influence an already nuclear-tainted world.

Prisoners for Peace

In last month's Chain Reaction Robert Saunders, in his article "The Ultimate Blasphemy", expressed admiration for those within the peace and justice movement who feel called to take part in actions which are in breach of the law.

As someone who has taken part in non-violent direct action, and has served time in prison as a result, I know that the price for such action is high, not only for oneself, but for one's family.

Support

What sustained me during the time of the court case and prison sentence was the enormous support I received from family, friends and fellow peace activists. During my four days in prison, I received 14 letters and cards of support, which not only raised my spirits considerably but led to the prison authorities (who read the correspondence before hand) and my fellow inmates being made aware of the support outside. In other cases, especially abroad, such support could save the life of a 'Prisoner for Peace', who may in ordinary circumstances be subject to brutal treatment from the prison authorities or from the police.

Prisoners of Peace

Cape Town doctor Ivan Toms is to stand trial for refusing to serve in the South African Defence force. An anti-apartheid campaigner of long standing and a committed Anglican his objections to military service are rooted in his religious and political beliefs.

He is one of a group of 23 young men who in August last year collectively announced they would not serve in the army because it defends apartheid. All could receive sentences of up to three years.



The Violence Around Us

In last month's chain reaction we drew attention to the flowering of militarist groups in and around Telford. We related this to a general increase in violence.

This month has given us no solace. First there was the Stalker/Samson report on the reputed 'shoot to kill' policy. Then in this last week there were the events in Gibraltar. The shootings themselves, in which people were shot by casually dressed men, who may or may not have issued a challenge, were enough of a cause for concern. In addition the almost unamimous approval in parliament and in the press, and the lack of a vociferous lobby calling for a full enquiry, leave us wondering about the increasing acceptance of violence. In particular we note the growing confidence of the state in resorting openly to force.

DANIEL BERRIGAN is a Jesuit priest, writer of prose and poetry, and long time worker for peace and justice. He works with the poor and the marginalised in New York City at the Catholic Worker and at hospices where the impoverished die or cancer and AIDS. His radical commitment to nonviolence has involved him in hundreds of acts of resistance to war and nuclear war preparations.

For a brief time during the Vietnam war he was exiled by his order to Latin America for his outspokenness against the war. In 1968, with eight others, he was imprisoned for napalming draft

card records in Cantonsville.

"We have assumed the name of pracemakers, but we have been, by and large, unwilling to pay any significant price. and because we want peace with half a heart and half a life and will, the war of course, continues because the waging of war, by its very nature is total - but the waging of peace, by our own cowardice, is partial."

In 1980, with seven others, he entered a General Electric nuclear weapons factory, poured their own blood over, and used hammers to destroy, Mark 12-A nuclear warheads. Currently his conviction and prison sentence of ten years is temporarily suspended due to an appeal to the US Supleme Court.

"And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nations shall not lift up swords against nation, neither shall they learn wir anymore." (Isaiah 2:4.)

"In confronting G.E. we choose to obey God's law of life, rather than a corporate summons to death. .. In our action we draw on a deep rooted faith in Christ who changed the course of history through His willingness to suffer rather than to kill. We are filled with the hope for our world and for our children as we join this act of resistance."

In 1984, he spent several weeks in El Salvador and Nicaragua.

"Into the sunlight that strikes one blind.

Into terror. Into gun sites and the pits of the gun barrels of 'he killers for whom killing is a momentary break from boredom.

I came because I wanted to learn from strangers, from Jesuits and peasants and students and anyone who would tell me how one lives with death. It was as simple as this."



IVAN TOMS: 21 months in prison

Following TANGs article on peace prisoners in this months
Chain Reaction we have received the news that Ivan Toms
was sentenced to 21 months in prison for refusing to
serve in the South African Defence Force. Ivan is the
first South African to be imprisoned for conscientious
objection under the 1984 Defence Act.
