The day after the news broke of a 'secret' meeting between the leaders of the Tory & Labour groups on the County Council and representatives of CVS at which the councillors tried to sit on CHE, Richard - courtesy of Chris - was talking to the Fabian Society as a result of which Michael Gallagher, Labour Group Leader, learned subsequently that not a few Labour Party stalwarts strongly dissapproved of his Roman Catholic marriage of convenience to Tory leader Peter Wright.

And we learned that although Tory Brenda Borrett, Chairman (sic) of the Social Services Committee, hasn't replied to our invitation to meet the group, she fully intends to accept it. We look forward to her visit.

Another spin-off of the great cufuffle - front page news of January's "Nottingham Voice" is the incresed hope of getting a Gay Rights motion through one of the local constituency Labour Parties.

He doesn't seem inclined to meet us though and tell us face to face. Our next moves are being taken on the advice of Michael English (one of our two M.P. visitors in the last 2 months). Michael, who sits for Nottingham West and believes that the sex laws are a load of nonsense: "Nobody should be allowed to do anything below the age of 35" Michael apologised for not turning up when he should have done but when he did appear he was good.

Jack Dunnett was the other M.P. who came to meet us. He turned up again at the Fabians so he should be well briefed on gay grievances and lack of rights. We hope members won't groan at the prospect of another M.P. visitor in January but this time it's a Tory - Kenneth Clarke who sits for Rushcliffe.

November and December may have been a bit thin on the social side, something we hope we've rectified in the January and February programme, but now when the knives are out is the time when we should be making - and mobilising - friends.

We were pleased that John Horner, Minister at the Albert Hall, found time to pop in one Monday evening and we are delighted at the continued support given us by Ron Collier and CVS. WE NEED YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT AS WELL: so we can go on battering the nasties as they crawl out from beneath their stones; so we can devise interesting social programmes for you too. We are looking again for a pub with private room and, who knows, 1978 may yet see us getting a regular disco going.

CHE NATIONAL COUNCIL

The first National Council since the Nottingham Conference was held in Chester from December 2nd - 4th 1977. One would hardly have realised that the arrangements had been disrupted by fire.

On the Friday evening there was a welcoming disco before getting down to business on Saturday. The Hampstead group were officially recognised whilst the Mansfield group were derecognised keeping the number of local groups at 112. The delegates then heard new Chairman, David Jenkerson, give his report. He stressed the need for all groups to act against the increasingly anti-gay climate that was developing and criticised the lack of response to the National Gay News Defence Committee: only 16 groups had affiliated (Nottingham included) and some groups had even dissociated themselves from it on the grounds of the effect it may have on public opinion. He also spoke of the efforts being made both to encourage and work with womens groups.

Treasurer, Robert Palmer, gave happier news of CHE's finances which would show a surplus, but emphasised the importance of continued recruiting. A speaker from Gay Lobby asked groups to make more effort in contacting their M.P's and ascertaining their views on various aspects of gay law reform. Any information should be passed on to Gay Lobby so that they can keep their records of M.P's views up to date.

The first part of the afternoon session was devoted to separate workshops: Local Groups and Campaigning, Trades Unions, Teachers and proposed Federal structure of CHE. There followed a more general session in which varied matters were raised. Local Groups Organiser, Philip Hickson, was asked to remind CHE Convenors that they must be CHE members (a surprisingly large number were not at that time!) What was virtually a motion of condemnation of the Leicester group for not acting against the fulminations of the Leicester Mercury was rejected convincingly, but all groups were asked to kake support a demonstration in Leicester on January 7th. (See Page 8). York CHE had undertaken to organise a telephone tree and handed out details to Convenors. Finally, Council gave its support to an emergency resolution condeming the murder of Steve Biko and calling for renewed efforts to cobat state oppression and to maintain individual liberties.

On Saturday evening another disco was followed by Gay Sweatshop's performance of "As Time Goes By" which was much appreciated by the audience but which I personally did not think as good as the one I saw in Nottingham, Sadly the Sunday morning performance had to be cancelled when only a handful of people turned up.

The Sunday planned sightseeing tour of Chester was called off due to the intensely cold weather. However, Chester CHE threw open their newly acquired (rented) premises to visitors and since I called in the afternoon such sandwiches and goodies as remained from the Executive Committee's lunch were also available. Finally visitors were invited to the regular Chester Group Disco held each Sunday at Melanie's Club, but, by that time I was on my way back to Nottingham.

CHE NATIONAL COUNCIL

The weekend seemed to be well organised (I know that such events can often be chaotic behind the scenes) and the Chester Group certainly deserved the thanks that the delegates voted them.

Future meetings of the National Council will take place in Croydon in March, York in June and Leeds in December, with the National Conference being held in Coventry on the Late Bank Holiday Weekend.

Here I sit writing in bumblingly inefficient isolation, just like Harold Wilson did. The difference between me and Harold is that I just want to be a member of a happy family out of which everybody gets something because everybody contributes something. I can't make it that way (!! ## ?? Ed.) but we can together (!!!!.......Ed) And now's the time when we can do it. With just one gay club left and with just one pub we can even give Nottingham an alternative gay scene. When Ian and I (and others) natter, it's often about the things we might do but by ourselves cannot . . I forsee our private room in a pub (because I'm on the Inside of the Boozers) and after that our monthly discos: Why not? Five of us at the first one (disaster!), ten at the next and after that everyone clamouring to get in and join us. It could happen as it did in Chester - but it's up to you.
