## REPORT ON BUSINESS MEETINGS, 20.9.79 AND 4.10.79.

At these two meetings the following decisions were taken:-

- 1. That £10 should be sent to the Gay Pride Week Committee in response to their request for donations to clear the £3,000 deficit after Gay Pride Week.
- 2. That David (Edgley) should investigate the possibility of producing some inexpensive compliments slips.
- 3. That Tony should bring up to date the CHE Information Sheet, ready for issue in January 1980.
- 4. That £2-50 should be paid to Don by way of his petrol expenses in taking members of the group to speak to Tutbury Housewive's Register.
- 5. That Tony should order 10 of the CHE pocket diaries for resale to group members.
- 6. That the group should meet expenses up to the sum of £5.00 incurred by Martin in giving a party during the visit of the Colchester Group.
- 7. That David (Hicks) should become the new cheque signatory.
- 8. That in the event that the Library declined to continue to take "Gay News" from us on account of government cut-backs, the Group should offer to supply it to them at its own expense.
- 9. Other matters discussed were:-

The visit of Peter Price to speak to the Group; a letter from the South Nottingham Community Health Council about their list of useful telephone numbers; the Blair Peach Memorial Fund; the report of the working party looking at voting in Gay Switchboard meetings; the NAC demonstration on 28th October; the state of the Group's membership; the visit by Carol, Don and David(Edgley) to talk to Tutbury Housewives' Register; reported attacks on gay people leaving Shades; the early meetings of the Gaysoc at the University; a possible showing of the Tape/slide kit to a governor and teacher of Clarement School; the state of the "Gay News" deliveriers.

Chris also brought us up to date on his campaigning activities - details can be read elsewhere in the newsletter.

## CAMPAIGNING REPORT

Since the last newsletter there have been two positive advances to report. The Regional Administrator of the Trent Regional Health Authority has added Nottingham CHE to the list of organisations which will be consulted prior to the review of membership of the North Nottingham, South Nottingham Central Notts and Worksop and Retford Community Health Councils. This will take place in the Spring of next year. Anyone interested in being nominated for a place on one of the CHCs should be considering the matter in the coming months.

The other positive report is the reply from Dr. Jamieson Craig, lecturer in Psychiatry at Mapperley Hospital. We had queried the use of 'Behavioural Modification' at the hospital, and he assures us that he is not aware that such a treatment is being used to alter sexual orientation at Mapperley. His own field is apparently not related to this sort of treatment anyway, and therefore he would not feel qualified to speak to the group as requested.

The Trades Council apologised for not replying earlier and cannot promise us a date to speak to them until their programme of speakers is drawn up for the whole of 1980. However, this will be done very soon and we should be hearing from them again.

No replies have been received from the Telephone Samaritans, the Nottingham NUT or Roy Burns. We had asked to meet the SmaSamaritans and the NUT and to be informed by Roy Burns whether the CHE telephone tree still exists. (It seems that the CHE letter tree certainly doesn't).

The Nottingham CHE banner will be on the anti-Corrie Abortion Bill demo this week; by thetime you read this you may have already seen our presence on TV.

Lastly, there are copies of the Working Party Report on the Age of Consent circulating among members and hopefully we can produce a series of observations to the Committee at our meeting on Thursday November 15th,

Dear Members,

My first thought for using your farewell record token was to buy the Schubert Mass I've been wanting. Then I paused. Was I always to remember Nottingham CHE Group with a mass? It hardly seemed to fit the new spirit of reconciliation in the group. I remembered the second of my 'wants': your token would buy me precisely half of Beatrice and Benedict, and as a souvenir, half of Berlioz' version of Much Ado About Nothing seems to be ideal.

Over the past eighteen months I seem to have come in for some hammer from the direction of CHE. In the eyes of some former colleagues and friends your old convenor seemed to have been transformed into a monstrous rival marching at the head of a marouding gang. It hurt. Was this me, whose loyalty to the aims of CHE will soon be entering its tenth year? I think in general most of us underestimate our capacity for hurting one another. We aren't a bunch of knockabout politicos but ordinary people who happen to have got themselves involved and who often need support. Yet we pretend to be far too macho to be capable of being hurt. We just hurl something back or boil inside. We injure ourselves and our struggle every time we do so.

For me the emergence of Friend has been an important landmark in thegay cause, but not one that supercedes the work of CHE. I felt it was time CHE had new blood and new ideas, so I kept away. I felt I needed to renew my own life and that kept me away as well. Finally I found I had no stomach for internecine arguments and fights and that kept me away completely. Maybe a bit more explanation and a bit less pride on my part would have helped.

I've said before and I still believe that a movement such as ours hasn't the resources to give hand-outs to old hands. Yet personally I'm delighted with my token. Suddenly I'm not a monster any more and I'm not forgotten. I can go away and start all over again the slow and painful, but also exhilarating process of coming out with that thought in my mind. Thank you all very much indeed. But please remember that monsters are easily created. Hets have been helping gays turn themselves into them for centuriss. We don't want to create them, of either gender, in a CHE group.
