It is all too rarely that the anarchist press publishes a brand new title, and Rebel Press must be congratulated for the publication of this original work by Richard Parry.

Not only is it a new title, but it is also the first book on the subject in English, and one based on original research in the various libraries and collections in Paris, Amsterdam and London.

The impressive bibliography is proof that the author has ploughed his way through a mass of French texts, but the bulk of them simply rehashed contemporary news reports, so that the picture was only made clear as the police made arrests; the narrative in this book chronologically follows the activities of the participants from a sympathetic perspective.

Although the book is written as a history, the style is journalistic rather than stuffily academic, and paced so that the narrative gets progressively more exciting.

Particularly fascinating are the ironic similarities between the anarchist

movement then and now: the anarchist picnics, faredodging on the metro, arguments between vegetarians and nonvegetarians, squabbling between various factions, the problems of sexism and jealousy in supposedly 'open' relationships.

Even the backdrop to the story - riots, strikes and 'hit-squads' will sound familiar to many of us.

The story of the Bonnot Gang is a legend in itself in France, but is virtually unknown here. Suffice to say it is an exciting story, not dissimilar to that of Bonnie and Clyde, But with this difference - the Bonnot Gang were anarchists.

Marginalised by capitalism and the particular brutality of the French State, these young men valorised their own criminal activities, and became 'illegalists' determined on 'intense living'.

Above all, the Bonnot Gang had style - they apparently invented the armed hold-up and getaway car, and used luxury vehicles in their bank-robberies. Better armed and



equipped at first than their adversaries, the police, the showdown eventually came in massive gun-battles in the Parisian suburbs.

Besides the main body of the narrative, the author explores the background to 'illegalism' - how French anarchism was forced into clandestinity in the wake of the defeat of



the Paris Commune: the 'natural criminality' of the Parisian working class; the influences of the large (mainly Russian) refugee community of revolutionaries who were used to taking direct action against their oppressors; the vicious repression of working-class struggles; and the anarchists' theoretical justifications for theft.


It was against this historical background that, around the turn of the century, a new and vigorous anarchist current arose - that of anarchist individualism. This new tendency believed in living the revolution here and now, and drew its main theoretical inspiration from Max Stirner's classic work, the 'most revolutionary ever written', The Ego and Its Own. (Also available courtesy of Rebel Press.) It is not known whether any of the gang ever read it, but all of them were involved, to varying degrees, with the individualist movement and its weekly paper l'anarchie. And it was here that 'illegalism' evolved - a theory which valorised criminality as a mode of existence operating outside and against society's laws; a theory that did not believe in the need to justify criminal acts by reference to an ideal.

One of the more interes-

ting aspects of the book is the role of Victor Serge, who (many latter-day bolsheviks may be interested to know), was at this time one of the most ardent anarchist individualists. praised for his 'combativeness', editor of the movement's paper, and participant in riots and 'interventions'.

It's clear from this book that Victor Serge's

There is much wringing of hands in the individualist milieu and much screaming 'i'accuse' from certain anarcho-syndicalists and anarcho-communists, who go on to exclude the individualists from Anarchist Congresses. The author presents both sides of the argument, although the final impression is one of sympathy for the members of the gang.



Memoirs of a Revolutionary presents a distorted view of this period in his life, and his account is here scrutinised and reappraised.

The final chapter looks at the debate that raged about illegalism as the survivors were packed off to prison, Devil's Island or the quillotine.

All in all this is that rare book indeed. It is a good read and action-packed; but also meticulously researched, with an impressive attention to detail. A fascinating series of photographs is included, and there are also maps.

Rebel Press expects to have the book on the shelves by May 1987.

Starting from an analysis of nineteenth century Russian populism, Camatte discusses the role of the peasant communities before and during the revolution. He discards notions of progress that aim at following the Western European model of industrialisation. He proposes an approach to communism which calls for the direct transformation of non-capitalist relations into a world human community, rather than suggesting that those areas where capitalist relations are undeveloped need to experience the full horrors of generalised commodity production before communism can be put on the agenda.

TOWARDS A GAY COMMUNISM Mario Mieli **Paperback** 90p **Pirate Productions**

Mieli directly challenges those notions of communism that tack on a few phrases about sexual liberation at the end of the usual revolutionary rhetoric. His analysis places patriarchy and the heterosexual norm as crucial institutions. As well as the more familiar question of the suppression of sexuality in the reproduction of family life he also deals with such suppression as being a crucial ingredient of modern production relations. He also rejects those approaches developed by various Freudians who want to resolve the contradictions of the sexuality that has evolved alongside the evolution of capitalism - "Our revolution is opposed to capital and its norm, and its goal is universal liberation. Death and gratuitous violence we can unwittingly leave to capital and those still in thrall to its inhuman ideology".





STATE OF SIEGE Jim Coulter, Susan Miller, Martin Walker **Paperback** £3.50

State of Siege documents and analyses the role of the police in the first six months of the 1984-85 miners' strike. Based on first-hand interviews and research in the mining communities of the Nottinghamshire and Yorkshire coalfields, it is not only acknowledged as one of the most important books on the strike, but represents the first serious look at what are dangerous political developments with a much wider implication.

A TURN OF THE SCREW Martin Walker **Paperback** £3.95

A Turn of the Screw is the story of an unfinished struggle. Following the year-long 1984-85 miners' strike, a wave of repression swept over the coal-

experienced during the dispute, this repression was economic, cultural and legal, harder to identify than the violence handed out by the police on the picket lines. It was met with a series of short strikes as the miners continued to fight back. The strike ended with seven hundred men sacked, over sixty in prison and those back at work harassed by management and in some areas a breakaway union. A Turn of the Screw tells the story in the miners' own words, with analysis and short pieces of fiction. Most importantly the book describes the new consciousness developing among those who were victims of state violence, sackings and imprisonment.

SHIFTING HORIZONS Lvnn Beaton **Paperback** £5.65

Shifting Horizons describes the part played by two Nottinghamshire miners' wives in the 1984-85 strike. Both women were born and grew up in mining communities and during the strike they fought not just for their future but to preserve their

fields. Less overt than that history as well. But as they were to find out, this history had not prepared them for the struggle which was pressed upon them. Forced by events into a new awareness and identity, they found new roles as organisers and activists. Shifting Horizons charts the political journey of two working class women through Thatcher's Britain; two women who fought amongst thousands more for their communities and their dignity. A story of courage and fortitude, of resilience and learning, it is at times touching and filled with raw humour, at other times chilling and painful. It is the story of everywoman in struggle.


LET THEM EAT COAL The Political Use of Social Security During the Miners' Strike Leslev Sutcliffe and Brian Hill **Paperback** £1.95

Let Them Eat Coal explains the political and legislative background to the Thatcher government's policies on welfare benefits. It centres upon the treatment which striking miners in the 1984-85 strike received at the hands of the DHSS

and is based upon information received from welfare rights workers throughout the country, together with first hand accounts and interviews with striking miners and their families. The booklet explains the political use of the benefits system by the Conservative government to break the National Union of Mineworkers and starve the strikers and their families back to work.

STRIKE BREAKING IN **ESSEX** Moira Abdel-Rahim **Paperback** £2.50


Strike Breaking in Essex reports on the policing of the miners' picket lines at the Essex ports for the six months from the beginning of April to the end of September 1984. It also includes an examination of the Dartford Tunnel incident, road blocks and



other illegal police activity, the operation of the police 'mutual aid' scheme and an assessment of the cost of the operation. Based on interviews and first hand experience of the picket lines, it exposes not only the role of the police, but the attitude of the Essex Police Authority and the view of the Chief Constables during a ruthless campaign to deny picketing rights, crush the miners and step up police powers.

DEATH IN THE CITY Melissa Ben and Ken Worpole **Paperback** £3.95

Death in the City is an examination of police-related deaths in London. Between 1970 and 1985 over 300 people died in London police stations or in other circumstances related to police activity. Towards the end of the 1970s the numbers rose dramatically. Based upon the personal experience of families and friends, and evidence given at inquests, the book documents some of these deaths and describes the struggle of individuals and communities who set out to find how they occurred. What emerges is a catalogue of official indifference, neglect, institutional racism and sexism, human folly and legal maladministration. The book also identi-



fies pointers to the increasing number of deaths in the growing powers of the police, their tactics and their organisation.

HEARTS AND MINDS Joan Witham **Paperback** £4.95

Hearts and Minds tells the story of the women of Nottinghamshire in the 1984-85 miners' strike. With the help of interviews, photographs and written material from the strike period, it documents their feelings, their activities and their changing consciousness. Not only did the strikers and their families in Nottinghamshire share the hardship experienced by strikers in other areas, they also suffered some of the worst police brutality of the dispute and the overt hostility of their own friends, families and communities. Yet they are often forgotten amongst the mass of their colleagues who were instrumental in defeating the

NUM. This book sets the record straight, in particular on behalf of the women, who struggled against massive odds for their rights, their com-

munities and their self-respect.

WITH EXTREME PREJUDICE An Investigation into Police Vigilantism in Manchester Martin Walker Paperback £3.50

On February 2nd 1986, Steven Shaw, a twentythree year old police researcher, was badly beaten up in Longsight, an inner city area of Manchester. He was beaten about the face and body before one of his assailants stubbed a cigarette on his face three times. He recognised the two men as the same ones who had held him in Bootle Street police station almost a year before. With Extreme Prejudice tells the story of the year long campaign of harassment which led up to this attack. It is a hard-hitting expose of the police violence and intimidation which grew out of a peaceful student demonstration and of aspects of police culture and organisation which the author argues lead inevitably to this kind of vigilantism.

NICARAGUA — A
SUITABLE CASE FOR
DEMYSTIFICATION
Terry Liddle
Free Spirit Publications

Against the illusions of both left and right concerning Nicaragua. On the one hand Liddle traces the history of US armed intervention to overthrow governments with a measure of popular support and install repressive dictatorships friendly to the US. On the other hand Liddle shows that the FSLN who took power in 1979 are turning Nicaragua into a typical Marxist-Leninist dictatorship. "One cannot help feeling that history, the tragic history of the Russian and Cuban revolutions, is repeating itself."

THE RETREAT FROM LIBERTY Michael Moorcock Zomba Books 96 pages £2.25

Moorcock is a best-selling writer and an anarchist sympathiser. Instead of his usual fiction he has written a non-fiction work giving his views on the current period of Thatcherite reaction. He sees the overall "retreat from liberty" as being made up retreats from liberalism, internationalism, feminism and individualism, all of these


retreats from the ideals of the radicalism of the sixties. A personal memoir and analysis that encompasses state patronage, the royal family, the Falklands war, patriotism, maternity and more. Plus an appendix on the prosecution in the early eighties of a Manchester publisher and bookseller for obscenity.

VOICES OF DISSENT Ed. Farquhar McLay Clydeside Press Paperback £1.95

Fresh from Clydeside Press we have *Voices of Dissent* (£1.95), which is a collection of People's Poems, selected and introduced by Farguhar McLay.

In the words of the introduction: "With the individual crushed, day by day ever further into docility, with every facet of social living invaded and laid claim to and increasingly corrupted to the State's own ends — there can only be one kind of poetry that matters — the poetry of dissent".

J'ACCUSE Claude Robinson Peoples Publications Paperback £1.89

The second autobiographical work by Claude Robinson, J'Accuse tells the story of a Jarrow headmaster from 1934-1963. It's a fascinating account of his life and struggles through the depths of the depression and beyond. The author was one of the original Jarrow Marchers (the book has recently been included on a Channel 4 sheet of reference sources on the March), but this was just one of the battles he took part in. One reviewer's "uncommon insight" describes him as coming "as a sort of refugee, to the Labour dominated County Durham, expecting it to be a haven of burgeoning democratic socialism; to his immense disillusionment...he found himself dealing with a rigid authoritarian education authority."

MOOT POINT Various authors Phoenix Press/San Fairy Ann 32 pages £1

Reprinted from articles that appeared in the anarchist periodical Freedom in 1983, a large number of writers argue for different positions on a number of subjects of importance to anarchists. Are you for or against the death penalty, free speech, pornography, Marxist economics...? The articles have a new introduction and conclusion that pose the problem of how we unite in spite of our differences.

MARXISM AND ITS FAILURES (ARGUMENTS FOR ANARCHIST COMMUNISM) Sussex University **Anarchist Collective** 32 pages

Compiled from articles in Virus (quarterly discussion journal of the Anarchist Communist Federation)

and Black Sheep (anarchist paper from Swansea). An introductory, libertarian analysis of the flaws in Marxist theory, the disastrous consequences of its practice, and the failures of the organisations of its adherents.

THE FUTURE IN THE **PRESENT (No 1 Critical** Anarchy) No authors credited Libertarian Organisation & Structure 64 pages 60p

"This pamphlet takes a careful look at anarchism as it is talked about and in practice. By exploding some myths and exploring some new viewpoints that might be useful, it aims at an anarchism which bears a closer relation to how real people and groups operate. It seeks to begin a task of reconstructing libertarian ideas so that they can be used without dogma and are instead relevant to the needs and aspirations of working people, the poor, the unemployed and oppressed."

THE SPANISH CIVIL WAR - ANARCHISM IN **ACTION Eddie Conlon** Workers Solidarity Movement 40 pages £1.35

This pamphlet was written

to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Spanish Revolution. It begins by describing the events which led to the fascist coup and the immediate resistance to it by the anarchists. It shows how the workers and peasants formed militias and goes on to describe the collectivisation of land and industry. It uncovers the hidden history of a truly anarchist social revolution. In chapter three the counter-revolution of the Communist Party is exposed. Finally, the pamphlet gives a critical account of the CNT's failure to smash political power and their eventual entry into government. It stresses the need for a political anarchist organisation to complete the social revolution.

AGAINST ALL ODDS No author **Arc Print** 118 pages £1.95

In April 1984 the animal liberation movement enjoyed widespread public support and in that year anti-vivisection groups staged mass raids at six animal research laboratories. This book traces the growth of the movement and details the major court case arising out of the 1984 campaign. It is vital reading for anyone wanting to see an end to vivisection.

A CRITIQUE OF STATE SOCIALISM Michael Bakunin and Richard Warren B Books 48 pages (large format) £1.50

Half a century before a state socialist society existed, Michael Bakunin (1814-1876) predicted, in an essay published here in shortened form, that it would be "the most offensive and despicable government in the world". Bakunin's short text is heavily supplemented here with humorous cartoons by Richard Warren which illustrate Bakunin's ideas, in particular how the history of the twentieth century has proved them correct. In his foreword Warren says he wanted to avoid the "patronising 'Lenin-for idiots' style of some Marxist comic books". Who can he mean? (This edition is taken from the Cienfuegos Press edition of 1981.)

WHY WORK? Various authors Freedom Press 210 pages £3.50

Just reprinted, sixteen different authors from the obscure to the famous on the subject of work. Distinguishes between useful work and useless toil, between pleasurable work and boring, well-paid, useless employment. Doesn't try to solve capitalism's problems for it and instead points out that capitalism is the problem. With six fold-out illustrations.

JOURNEY THROUGH UTOPIA Marie Louise Berneri Freedom Press **Paperback** £3.50

Before her death in 1949 at the age of thirty-one, Marie Louise Berneri, daughter of Camillo, was one of the main figures in the Freedom Press group and a joint editor of Spain and the World, followed by War Commentary and Freedom. Journey Through Utopia is Marie Louise Berneri's "description and critical assessment of the most important utopian writings since Plato's Republic".

QUIET RUMOURS Various authors **Rebel Press** £1.80 when reprinted

Quiet Rumours, the Anarcha-Feminist Anthology, has just gone out of print. Originally published as the separate Black Bear pamphlets, it is one of the all-too-few published works on Anarcha-Feminism, so it is consequently in great demand.

Rebel Press and Dark Star assure us that a reprint of two thousand copies is planned. These will be appearing shortly.

PLIER KROPOTKIN 1111 GREAT FRENCH REVOLUTION

THE GREAT FRENCH REVOLUTION Peter Kropotkin **Elephant Editions** 602 pages (in two volumes) £3.95 each volume

Modern history is reckoned to start from the French Revolution, and it is therefore useful to have an anarchist account of this event. Peter Kropotkin (1842-1921), anarchism's best-known writer, wrote 'the popular history of the revolution' as opposed to the usual histories. In his opinion "modern socialism has added absolutely nothing to the ideas which were circulating among the French people between 1789 and 1794". In his introduction to this edition of Kropotkin's only historical book, Alfredo Bonanno says that "the origins of the authoritarianism of Marxism and Leninism- 13 ...can be traced to the Jacobin tendency in the French Revolution".
