the movement, it was when the Communist-run union, the CGT, successfully prevented student demonstrators from entering the occupied Renault factory at Boulogne-Billancourt. When it became clear that most workers were simply remaining imprisoned in their occupied factories, they became easy prey for the union bosses, and the movement collapsed after a few, final, savage battles with the riot police.

If the May events were provoked by students, perhaps the most vital theoretical influence was contributed by the infamous Situationist International. Initially a small group of declassé Left Bank artists, searching for the supersession of Art, their intellectual dérive led to a thorough-going critique of the totality of modern capitalist society, a state of affairs that they characterised as the 'Spectacle'.

Their membership always remained small, averaging between 10 and 20, in order to preserve theoretical clarity and radical credibility. They aimed to do their utmost 'to bring back revolutionary contestation to modern society'.

One of their most scandalous interventions was at the University of Strasbourg in 1966, where they

aided some disaffected students in the publication of a scurrilous attack on the role of the student, who was urged to abandon his separate status and join the proletarian revolt. On the Poverty of Student Life, with half a million copies printed, is the most widely circulated situationist text.

The following year two members of the SI published what have been called the Capital and What is to be Done of modern revolutionary theory. Guy Debord realised his aim - 'to give the SI a book of theory' in The Society of the Spectacle, a critique of the modern commodity economy including a critical overview of the development

of capital, and its negation the revolutionary project. The Revolution of Everyday Life, Raoul Vaneigem's theoretical trajectory, was to trace the shortest path from individual subjectivity to its realisation in an era of generalised self-management. The Situationists were as concerned to change the structure of daily life as they were to transform the world.

Although there were never more than a dozen members of the SI in Paris in May '68, they exercised an influence out of all proportion to their numbers. Allied to the Enrages they reconstituted an 'Occupa-

Subtitled 'A True Story with Pictures by Paddington Bear', this is a personal account of twenty years in Notting Hill Gate. It's sketchy here but detailed there, focusing on the main event: the Notting Hill Carnival, particularly the '87 riot and the years of conflict on All Saints Road.

This pamphlet is not a funk History Workshop, its



central theme is simple. Far more than elsewhere, the lower slopes of Notting Hill sponsored the entrance of post-war 'anarchism' - more precisely an anarchic sentiment - into the political arena and party system. Lacking in rigour from the start, the 'Gate's' eventual kaleidoscopic dispersal which covered an enormous range of issues, acted finally as a buttress supporting the nation state.

Here are the passionate, impatient memories of the French Communard leader; a hero, saint and martyr to the socialists and anarchists battling the injustices of the French Third Republic and awaiting the Revolutionary Dawn. Larry Law takes a controversial look at Semiotext(e)'s new title . . .

Bolo'bolo is a dangerous book. It is not dangerous because of its content and ideas, nor is it dangerous because it will incite people to rebellion and revolution. It is dangerous because it is a recuperation of real desires for a more sane, free and co-operative world. We are presented with a naive, liberal, fantasy masquerading as revolutionary theory. Far from provoking rebellion, I believe such fantasies induce passivity and an unreal view of what oppresses us now and how we can build the world we really want.

The title comes from one of many new words introduced in the book. A 'bolo' is an autonomous collective living and working cooperatively in one place. Bolo'bolo has lots of new words, which seem to have been invented by picking Scrabble letters out of a bag at random. They would really be more suitable as names for aliens in a Star Trek episode.

The situationists were criticised for introducing new words, which some people considered jargon. At least the situationists had the excuse that they were describing new concepts. Bolo'bolo doesn't have this excuse at all; the concepts are familiar and well worn, and some are very tired indeed. You won't have to struggle with any new concepts in this book, just with new, rootless and meaningless words. No attempt is made to explore the contradictions between concepts so

arbitrarily joined together.

Many of the new words refer to the rights of the land, but not how these rights will be established or maintained. Other new words include 'taku' - a box in which each ibu (person) will hold his or her private property. There is also 'yaka', which is the 'right' for any ibu to challenge another ibu, or the entire community, to a duel! In fact the whole section on violence suggests that the anonymous Swiss author of Bolo'bolo has very little understanding of

why people resort to violence in the first place.

The 'nugo' is an interesting new system of social support for those who are depressed or dissatisfied with living in Bolo'bolo land. The 'nugo' is a suicide pill which everyone will wear around their neck on a chain.

When it comes to bringing about this new society, the author suggests 'strikes, sabotage, demonstrations, riots, looting and squatting." (I wonder why we never thought of those things!) What is so irritating about Bolo'bolo is its unmitigated pretentiousness.

I had long hoped that Bolo'bolo was one of those elaborate situationist stunts such as Sanguinetti pulled in Italy. I expected that at any moment some wildcat individual in Bolo'bolo situationist would spring up shouting 'April Fools! We only wrote it to show you how stupid and gullible you are!' Hope for this release is fading fast.



If the legacy of the Situationists is still impressive it is because the radicality of their critique of modern society has not been superseded. They departed from most anarchists because the latter generally lacked theoretical understanding of historical processes, and it is still not enough to disregard theory.

# QUESTIONING TECHNOLOGY

John Zerzan & Alice Carnes Freedom Press 222pp £5.00 (A, F, H)

Questioning Technology is a purgative, an antidote to the transparent bunkum trafficked by techno-wallahs. To question technology is to look askance at what our lives are made of, to wonder how our cultural experience has distorted our vision and deformed our human nature. We may be empty of answers and alternatives, but we are full suddenly of the need to search them out.

In short, this book is intended to make you mad, wake you up, and get you thinking and talking. Heaving it at the wall is an expected response. Unplugging your computer (or unplugging yourself from one) may be an unexpected outcome, one with happy results for your personal life, health and future well-being.

# ACT FOR YOURSELVES

Peter Kropotkin

Soon to be published, this book consists of eighteen articles which Peter Kropotkin contributed to the anarchist paper *Freedom* during the first 21 years of its existence. It is only after a century that they are at last published as he wanted.

Act for Yourselves is not one of Kropotkin's great works, but it is a valuable lost work, written when he was at the height of his

powers, and well worth reading as a minor classic of anarchist journalism.
