What's Happening?

BANDITZ COME-BACK THRAWTED




However within minutes, ex-0533 editor Gary Knight and axe-hero Cameron Lindo had formed a poetry/must thang under the title gary & cameron in embrace!

Dear BUTF FUTURE TOYS 1914-1918

Future Toys started life quietly at Countesthorpe College circa 1979. Anyone who saw them then, could not have failed to recognise that they didn't really fit in with what was going down Maaan. Unfortunately, by the time they were in a position to make themselves known to a wider audience, 'fashion' had caught up with them.

Future Toysmanaged to play virtually every venue in the Leicester Area, including the De Montfort Hall, as well as further afield (i.e. Birmingham, Manchester), though with a name so (un)'fashion'able, audiences seemed to develop pre-conceived ideas of what to expect, and were often disapponited.

After an initial burst of energy following the release of the 'Perfect Strangers' single, things went slack. New material was written but never rehearsed, because one faction believed rehearsals unimportant. In the end the only time the group met as a whole was at the increasingly repetitive and laboured gigs. Faced with this situation, the nucleus of Andy Boyle, Paul Cullen and Dave Simms decided to call a halt, and are presently assembling a new company that, with the knowledge of what went before, should not fall into the same traps. They would like to say a big "thank You" to all those who have helped them over the last couple of years REUBENSTEIN, Team manager.

It's just about two years since I got my Is earful of the Amber Squad, and it's obvious from this demo tape of recent material that the aims and motives that guided them then remain the same today. They have not

compromised their sound in any great way at all, the only difference being the evident influence of new-boy Chris Vye, his style of guitar work appearing to the fore. The Feelgoods/Only Ones guidelines still rule supreme.

PAUL FAIREY

Ground Control Oct/Nov.

The Amber Squad guitarist/songwriter putting on tape some of his material not suited to the Squad style. Mainly slow guitar numbers, with Fairey also supplying vocals and bass, leaving the drums to somebody else after a lack-lustre initial attempt to do the lot. Apparant Elvis Costello/Springsteen influences, although he manages to sound like a young Cliff Richard at times!




JUGGERNAUT FA WARD

Shield Records SH OOI

At last, the first vinyl from what I would rate as one of the premier Reggae bands in this country; why they have not made it big is anybodys guess. Two tracks on this I2" - the first, Juggernaut, is a haunting instrumental featuring clever interplay between Sax. and Harmonica. The other, Fa Ward features vocals and is probably more mainstream than the other, though there is an intriguing chord sequence change in the middle highlighted by tinkly keyboards. The song finishes with a bit of dub at the end. A good, if somewhat belated, debut from the Highfields band, though probably not strong enough to break them this time. Best bet would be to follow it up with an Lp some time in the new year, because I reckon that the market for a home-grown Reggae band is currently wide open.

Footnote: - Would have been nice to have had a copy from the band. Initially, neither Radio Leicester or Centre recieved promo copies either, which has got to bea sin for a group trying to sell records.





"The Amber Squad, as we know, can pack a punch...". The words of reviewer Des Moines in SOUNDS on April IIth last year. It seems that people in influence are aware of the band and what they do; yet after two singles. as well as a track on the "Where The Hell Is ... Leicester" LP. the boys are back at square One. Where do they go from here?

One of the things to ask band members PAUL FAIREY and DICK BEECHEY, with the able assistance of fellow ex-S+Ter, Paul Lacia-Betts.

THERE'S OBVIOUSLY BEEN CHANGES IN THE BAND SINCE LAST WE SPOKE. WHATS BEEN HAPPENING?

PF: "Well, we were down to a four-piece for quite a few months when Dusty, our original rhythm guitarist, left earlier this year. That was just before our second single "Can We Go Dancing" came out, although he did play on it. Then last month Chris Vye joined us from Last Resort".

BUTF: WHAT HAPPENED WITH LAST RESORT?

PF: "Chris versus the other two. They didn't see eye-to-eye musically...they were into modern new romantic stuff, and Chris was still into Feelgoods and Only Ones".

BUTF: CHRIS IS USUALLY A LEAD GUITARIST. HOW DOES HE FITIMTO THE EXISTING SET-UP?

PF: "Really well. We handle Lead work on a 50-50 basis; there's no ego problems, and he fits in really well, because there's always been room for two guitars and we sound better that way. It fills the sound out a bit more. The tape we've just made is the best-recorded sound we've had. He's a good-looking lad as well...moves around!".

BUTF: JUDGING BY THE DEMO MATERIAL, YOU'VE NOT CHANGED YOUR STYLE A GREAT DEAL IN TWO YEARS. THE R'N'B AUDIENCE IS PRETTY LIMITED NOWADAYS.

PF: "Would you say that's what we are then, R'n'B? It's just that we all enjoy playing this sort of material. I write all the songs and I'm influenced by what I listen to. I've never seen us as an R'n'B band".

DB: "I think we're probably R'n'B orientated".

BUTF: LAST TIME I INTERVIEWED YOU WAS IN MAY 1980 L AND YOUR FIRST SINGLE WAS RECIEVING SOME GOOD AIRPLAY. HOW MID YOU VIEW THAT SINGLE?

PF: "The fact is, it could have done well for us, but I've often looked back and thought that if we'd have had a manager at the time, we could have handled it a lot better"

YOU MANAGED TO GET IT PLAYED ON RADIO ONE'S ROUND TABLE.

PF: "We sent them that copy in a re-addres- r sed Jiffy bag. You've got your EMI's etc taking themout for dinners if you know what I mean, yet we were fortunate enough to U get the single on the show ... "



- BUTF: THERE WAS A GOOD REVIEWIN 'SMASH HITS', THOUGH THEY SEEMED MORE CON-CERNED WITH THE LABEL DESIGN MORE THAN ANYTHING.
 - PF: "They said that we had 'Mod Leanings'. The next issue somebody signed Punkette from Oakham we only found out who it was recently wrote in to say 'they are definately not a Mod band, they're more into Punk'".
- BUTF: DO YOU THINK THAT YOUR SECOND SINGLE CLEARED UP ANY MISUNDERSTANDING AS TO WHAT SORT OF MUSIC YOU PLAYED?
 - PF: "At the time we considered it a better single than the first, and we had the benefit of the deal with Dead Good who sold a lot to distributers straight away. What we'd like now is another single".
- BUTF: YOU'VE BEEN A BIT QUIET IN THE NINE MONTHS OR SO SINCE THE LAST SINGLE. HAS THAT TIME BEEN WASTED?
 - PF: "On looking back, if say 'Finger' or 'Dancing' had been very successful, we wouldn't have had any more good songs to back it up with; but now we've got a lot of good material. The tape we've just done is to see how things are working out as a five-piece again, although we've started getting gigs in London, and we need tapes of new material for that. We're with an agency now, after a lot of effort, and we're 'on the circuit'. As regards recording deals, theres nothing concrete in the offing at the moment; I think we've got to get something sorted out pretty soon, or everyones going to lose interest. You've got to keep going...look how long it took the Beatles!"
 - DB: "I'm convinced that we've got enough creative songwriting ability in the band to sit down for a few hours, maybe even a week, and write perfect material. We've just got to sit down and do it".
- BUTF: WHAT SORT OF REACTION DO YOU GET PLAYING LOCALLY THESE DAYS?
 - PF: "Not much in Leicester. We played the Fosseway in early December and it was very quiet. When we first played there in 1980 it was the monday after 'Finger' had been on Round Table...everything was going for us, and it was absolutely packed; I think it had been like..someone from Leicester being played on the radio, people were inquisitive. h our home area, Oakham, Rutland, though, It's the most popular we've been. We played in London early in December, and there was a busload went down with us 53 seater and it was a hell of a night, best gig we've ever done. Last time we played the Rutland Angler in Oakham, there were fifty or so people standing in the rain waiting for the doors to open".

BUTF: YOU PLAYED SOME GIGS WITH GENO WASHINGTON, DIDN'T YOU?

PF: "Thats right, they were good. He's brilliant, he is, larger than life. It was around the time that Dexys tribute 'Geno' was in the charts, and at one of the gigs they turned up to see him, expecting him to be doing the old soul and r'n'b stuff; but at that time he had this American rock band backing him - it was horrible, loose as anything, & Dexys cleared off; they didn't want to know him. Fortunately, he's got a British band now - one of thems from Melton Mowbray - and he's back to the old stuff again".

BUTF: SO WHATS THE NEXT STEP?

DB: "Another single out. There's no way we'd lose money on it".

BUTF: BUT IS THAT ENOUGH?

PF: "I believe we're in a better position now than we ever have been. We're fresh, new guitarist, new manager, new material, and still retaining our local following. Dick disagrees"

DB: "I think we're in a good position, but..."

PF: "Well, when do you think we were in a better position?"

BUTF: 69?

DB: "I'd only be ten, then..."



Ah well, into another new year, and sorry for being a bit late this month, but the criggy holiday got in the way! Anyway, if I982 turns out to be as good a year for music in this area as last year was, then we should be in for a treat. JANUARY

The year starts on a comparatively quiet note. I980 had seen the first releases on the Leicester-based S+T Label, and the talk in the new year is about the impending launch of Where The Hell Is...Leicester, the compilation originally scheduled for release the previous October. One of the bands featured on it, the OBSERVERS, decide to disband after a trial seperation. The NORTHERN COMPERES also call it a day.

MARCH

1981 finally begins to come alive, although there's a quick death in the family as the last issue of '0533' (No. 7) appears. The TITANICS announce a singles deal with Scratch records, via RCA; and two members of FARMLIFE form the Explicit Corpse label to launch the single "That Day. Before". The SOUNDLAB studio and rehearsal rooms on Chatham Street open up to provide facilities for even the most embryo of bands; whilst one of the more established outfits. Oakhams THE AMBER SQUAD release their second single "Can We Go Dancing?" on the Dead Good label. Non-futurist futurists FUTURE TOYS play the De Mont on the Classix Nouveaux 2002 Revue.



FEBRUARY

'Where The Hell Is...Leicester' finally sees the light of day on the 13th (a friday) and the world goes to sleep. S+T sell out in three weeks, and copies end up as far away as Poland and the U.S.A. The Launch is celebrated with a party at the Fosseway, where the notorious RONNIE SLICKER & THE BANDITZ make their final appearance. MODERN LIVINGS track "Drink Is The Drug" is the first to get played by Peely.

APRIL

The Leicester Musicians Union decide to do their bit for up-and-coming Leicester bands and hold a competition at the Polytechnic, which is won by a Coventry band!

John Peel knows whats best, and invites GROUNDATION to do a session for his late night show. Two firsts...


"Happy Feeling" is the first single from the SINATRAS, and appears via the London-based Dining Out label; and the first issue of 'BIGGLES-UP-THE-FOSSE' is published, to carry on the work that '0533' had started.

MAY

Not much going off in May, everybody obviuosly getting keyed up for the royal wedding (yawn). Modern Living get a bit tired of life, and call it quits.

JUNE

The SINATRAS have their bust-up, and go their seperate ways. The TITANICS much-heralded singles deal with Scratch is off when RCA opt out. The Leicester Festival goes off with a bang (or is it whimper), and a good idea gets the wrong rewards.



JULY

Two singles debuts by Leicester bands, namely the NEWMATICS and FUTURE TOYS are the high-spots of this month, though there is no shortage of other action, with a reshuffle in the ranks of IL Y A VOLKSWAGENS on the eve of their vinyl releases, and the inevitable reaction in the TITANICS ranks to their recording disappointments - they split. SYNDICATE IV suffer the death of bassist Nick Freeman, and they go into mothballs. Theres some good news with the re-opening of the Saracens Head for regular Live gigs.

SEPTEMBER

CENTRE RADIO emerges with 'Rockola' and goes mad on local stuff! - for a week! The first NEW AGE single eventually sees the inside of the record shops, whilst the LP "Attacking Vessels" from KELV is reportedly launched (although I've yet to see a copy!). The BLACK SWAN opens up for sunday night gigs.

NOVEMBER

Another 'local' music-mag, TNK is launched, along with a band of the same name, by ex-Syndicate IV person Stuart Robinson. After losing personel to the SINATRAS reshuffle, both SPITTING CATS and HANDSHAKES IN HIDING (nee Absolutes) re-appear fit and active. GROUNDATION release their debut single, as does fellow-Highfieldsiam JONID. The PRELUDE CLUB, also known as The Nags Head & Star, opens it's doors. STANDING ROOM ONLY and SINATRAS get Radio One coverage. as do NEW AGE. The latter play with FUTURE TOYS on the John Peel bill at the Poly. The second SINATRAS single is released.

The first single from the VOLKSWAGENS finally sees the light of day, and the SINATRAS re-emerge with a new line-up to continue where they left off. The first single by the SWINGING LAURELS appears

on Albion, and Dining Out announce

LIFE. Radio Leicesters Rock Magazine

plans to release material from NEW AGE,

the SINATRAS, the VOLKSWAGENS and FARM

programme "Prime Time" comes on stream.

OCTOBER

Autumn arrives, and so does the second album from the DEEP FREEZE MICE, musicians extraordinaire. New venues galore as the HORSEFAIR amd WINSTONS open up, whilst details are announced about the medium-size venue in the Bus station, later to be called 'THE ELECTRIC THEATRE'. Original Leicester music promoters S+T decide that their job is done, and call it a day. Oh, and 3-WAY DANCE split, but not before getting a track(s) on the "World Of Glass' LP.

DECEMBER

And finally it's Christmas time again, and to celebrate FUTURE TOYS decide to call it a day. Manager REUBEN REUBENSTEIN revues it all from a hospital bed, wherin he is tempararily resident. The ELECTRIC THEATRE opens a success (Haircut IOO), then suffers a bit for the rest of the month, whilst another new venue, the MAGAZINE, has a promising baptism. To end the year on a bright note, the SINATRA'S support the Belle Stars and U2 in London, and look set to land a deal in '82.

FUTURE TOYS

Horsefair

Monday November 30th

The joke seems to be these days, that if anybody wants to find me and I'm not at home, then look no further than the nearest Future Toys gig; which might be a slight exaggeration though it is fair to say that I've enjoyed watching them progress during 1981. By co-incidence, it seems that this Horsefair gig will turn out to be the last time that the Toys will be seen in their present format. As detailed elsewhere, the band split in early December, although word is that they will re-appear in some shape or form in the new year. On this performance, I would say that the break-up will enable them to work quicker to acheive the change in style evidently taking place. In the six months following the release of the 'Perfect Strangers' single, they have progressed away from the obvious 'Futurist' stance that possibly held back their recognition as a creative unit; and were threatening to produce some really original material when the split came.

Some of this material was on show at the Horsefair gig - new Andy Boyle compositions including the impressive opener "Love (pulls Us down)" and "The Ideal", projected as a potential single. The best track is definately the slower "Sometimes" (I think that was the title), one of the best numbers they've ever done. What was still holding them back was an apparant reluctance to discard some of the older, more cumbersome songs. "Into The War" has always served the dual purpose of boring an audience, and over-taxing Fifes vocal cords. It should go the same way as"RC.U.". The following number in the set, a track they've been doing for over a year (yet for the life of me I can't remeber what it's called), is even more sterile.

Those apart, the set was as lively as always, but bands need more than vitality to make inroads these days, and hopefully the re-organisation, if that's what it turns out to be, will see the best of the late '8I Toys cobine with a more adventurous outlook into the new year.

The Cats have undergone personal changes following the departure of original drummer Sparky. As well as a new sticksman, they've also added keyboards, although evidently as a backing instrument. The emphasis on the back line and rhythm guitar has remained from the Spitting Cat style of last summer. They remain fine exponents of fast-reggae, with the odd touch of mid-sixties orientated beat music, Phils sax well to the fore. They should be making a big impact in '82.

3). A generally duff level of shooting.


I got the impression that it was a take-off of those old private eye 'B' movies, with lots of shoot-outs and talking from the side of the mouth.


