


BLACK CONSULTATION PLANS REJECTED

PROPOSALS by the City Labour Group for consultation with the black community have been rejected "out of hand" by a unanimous decision of the Afro-Caribbean and Asian Forum. The Forum claims to represent virtually all of the major black organisations in the city including the Pakistan Centre, Indian Centre and West Indian Nationals Association.

The Labour Group had proposed equal representation from the Forum and the Nottingham African-Caribbean Convention.

The Forum says in a letter to Labour Leader Betty Higgins that "speaker after speaker expressed real anger and frustration, not only at the very idea of a split system of consultation but also about the bizarre basis on which you suggested it. We believe that your Group seriously misunderstands the whole picture of black organisa-

tions within the City". The District Labour Party agreed early in 1984 that the City Council should open formal consultations with the Forum. This was agreed at one stage by the Equal Opportunities Committee but never acted on.



JOBS AND INDUSTRY

A LOCAL working party has been established to develop the Labour Party's Jobs and Industry Campaign. It is intended to stage a number of events leading up to a one-day Jobs and Industry Festival in October.

The Festival will consist of local and national speakers, workshops, theatre, stalls and music. The aim will be to involve local party members and supporters in the campaign and to provide an opportunity for them to have an input into a sound jobs and industry policy. CENTRAL AMERICA CAMPAIGN


THE US militarisation of Central America has plunged the region into a crisis that is worsening by the day.

POLITICAL FUND BALLOTS

ALL trade unions have until March 1986 to ballot their members if they wish to have a political fund. Without such a fund unions will not be allowed to assist a political party or produce literature which expresses an opinion for or against a party's policy.

A number of unions have already voted in favour of a political fund including SOGAT 82 (printworkers), ISTC (steelworkers) and FTAT (timberworkers).

APOLOGISE RIDDELL!

BLACK groups are still waiting for County Education Chair Fred Riddell to apologise for comments he made on Radio Nottingham in January, a National Council for Civil Liberties meeting was told in May.

Diane Skerit, from the Black Women's Group was explaining the problems faced by black schoolchildren, who are six times more likely to be suspen-

ded than white children. She asked Labour Party branches and councillors to press Coun Riddell for an apology.

Riddell had claimed that black children are more likely to be suspended because of social conditions in the black community.

NCCL agreed to back demands for the Education Department to release the facts about suspensions.

FREE NELSON MANDELA

BOTH City and County Councils gave their support to a national demonstration in June against the imprisonment of Nelson Mandela, the black South African leader who has served 21 years of a life sentence.

The County also intends to adopt an anti-apartheid policy boycotting South African goods and investment in companies with South African interests. The City adopted a similar policy last year and named the sports hall in the new John Carroll Leisure Centre in Radford after Nelson Mandela.

MEETING FOR WOMEN WORKERS

WOMEN who work for the City Council will be encouraged to attend a meeting to discuss a Council report on Employment of Women. Two women-only meetings will be held to explain progress on the Equal Opportunities Policy, to get the views of women employees, and to encourage them to get involved. The Tories opposed these meetings.

Figures presented to the Equal Opportunities Committee over the past year show that only one out of the Council's top 177 officers is a woman, and only 59 out of the top 675. Most women are concentrated in the lower clerical grades.

WHEELCHAIR HIRE

DISABLED people may soon be able to hire a wheelchair at the Broadmarsh Centre to help with shopping, etc. The City's Equal Opportunities Committee has backed a scheme to provide battery operated and hand propelled wheelchairs six days a week for hire free of charge.

It could be run by disabled people employed by the Council's Manpower Services Commission Community Programme Agency, and

would take telephone bookings. If it is a success it may be extended to the Victoria Centre and other places.

TEN GAY YEARS

NOTTINGHAM GAY SWITCHBOARD is celebrating its 10th anniversary. This telephone advice service has been operating since 1975 and is now available 7pm-10pm, Mon-Thurs on 411454. It gives information on gay pubs and clubs, gay groups and organisations; help with legal problems, job problems, medical problems; advice on coming to terms with being gay, ending isolation, parental problems, transvestism and transsexuality, etc, etc. For further information write to the group at 31A Mansfield Road.



HEALTH ACTION CAMPAIGN

A CAMPAIGN against cuts in the health service was launched at the May meeting of the City Council's Health Sub Committee. 1,000 copies of an Action Pack have been produced with support from the City Council and labour movement organisations.

A workshop is being held at 2pm on Saturday 6th July to explain how groups can use the pack to get over the problems faced by the NHS to the public.

THE CAMPAIGN FOR SINGLE HOMELESS PEOPLE

STOP DHSS EVICTIONS

SEVERAL hundred young people locally are threatened with being made homeless as a result of changes in DHSS rules.

People under 26 in board and lodging are being given 28 days to find a flat, or their money will be cut and they will be evicted.

CHAR, the Campaign for Single Homeless, is asking all housing departments in the county, social workers, and DHSS to use loopholes in the rules to allow people to stay in board and lodging until they can be rehoused off a council waiting list.

ECONOMIC STRATEGIES GROUP

UNEMPLOYMENT and the economy must be seen as the key issue for the Labour Party. Yet many areas of the Party's economic strategy remain undeveloped or ambiguous. And most party members have little opportunity to contribute their knowledge and experience to the development of policy.

The Labour Party Economic Strategies Group is currently being set up to meet these needs by providing a forum in which a cross-section of party members can be involved. The Group - which will be formally launched at a major conference in London on June 29th - will operate in a highly decentralised way with the bulk of the work being done by local groups to reflect local needs and priorities.

PAY HOSPITAL INTERPRETERS

INTERPRETERS should be provided by the Health Authority and paid a proper wage, says the Nottingham Health Strategy Group. The Group agreed to write to the Health Authority after hearing Parveen Mirza from the Asian Women's Project talk about the work they had been doing at the Queen's Medical Centre.

The QMC relied on interpreters from their Project who were only paid expenses, said Parveen, while the JIPAC Ladies Circle was doing similar work at the City Hospital. (JIPAC is the Joint Indian Pakistan and Afro Caribbean project funded by the Man-

power Services Commission.)

The Asian Women's Project had also worked hard to get the QMC to provide a range of Asian meals for patients, said Parveen. Many Asian women who had their children at the QMC had not been eating because they could not eat western food. The Project had got a lot of support from Liz Haggard at the Community Health Council and the QMC Nursing Officer.

They had not yet tackled the need for more women doctors.

WAITING LIST UP

14,907 families were on the City Council's waiting list for a council house in March 1985. This is an increase of 1,494 over the figure a year earlier.

But government cuts have meant that the number of new council houses started in the last year (1984/85) was only 111, with only 50 planned for this year. 766 council houses were sold in 1984/85 under the Tories' Right to Buy legislation.

PUBLIC SERVICES GROUP

A NEW national Working Group on Public Services has been set up by the Conference of Socialist Economists. The first meeting was being held in Sheffield on 22nd June.

"The government's attack on public services and the welfare state is intensifying", says the handout for the meeting, but "the labour movement's response has often been too little too late" and "there appears to be less and less debate on developing alternative policies".

YOUTH SERVICE REVIEW

A MAJOR review of youth service management is being carried out by the County Council, following a damning report produced by senior officers last year. Drastic changes are expected.

HEATING PROBE DEMANDED

ST ANN'S Heating Group is demanding an independent investigation into their District Heating Scheme. Following a public meeting last November the group organised a postcard campaign asking tenants to report problems.

Over 500 cards were handed to the City Labour leader Betty Higgins in April showing 80% complaining about high costs and inadequate heat, and 26% about inadequate repair and maintenance.

The scheme has always had problems. The idea was that the city's rubbish would be burned at Eastcroft to produce hot water to heat inner city council estates. But there have been problems with the incinerators breaking down, heat loss from the hot water mains, too little heat getting to some houses, and the notoriously inaccurate heat meters used by Clorius Meters (now called Mainmet) to calculate people's bills.

The June Housing Committee referred the group's demands to the Eastcroft Consumers Committee which includes all the agencies who have conspired to produce such a lousy heating system.

REVERSE THE GILLICK RULING

MRS Victoria Gillick, mother of ten children, has been successful in her endeavour to outlaw contraceptive advice (given by their doctors or through sex education at school) or treatment for girls under 16 without

parental consent.


Prior to the Gillick ruling, under-age pregnancies and the number of under-age abortions had declined sharply as a result of DHSS advice to doctors allowing them to give treatment or advice. Now it is feared there will be a return to under-age pregnancies, abortions or unwanted children.

The legislation effectively makes under 16 year old girls the "property" of their parents. Yet another area for grave concern is incest.

On June 24th the DHSS was appealing to the Lords against the ruling. The National Abortion Campaign was organising a national demonstration for June 23rd and also a petition.

MANIFESTATIONS of institutional racism in the Labour Party have compelled black people in Nottingham to question their loyalty to the party.


A lot of anger was shown by black people on the misuse of section 11 funds by the Labour controlled County Council. Pickets were organised outside different schools to protest against the high number of suspensions of black children. A big demonstration took place at County Hall against racism in education and lack of consultation with the black community. A group of black people called for a boycott of County Council elections to protest against racism and suspen-

sions.

Black sections are about more representation of black people at all levels in Labour Party organisation as well as in local councils and Parliament. They are trying to get a direct say for black people in the fight against racism and oppression. It is first and foremost a duty of every socialist to join the struggle of black comrades to put an end to the disadvantage and oppression of black people.

HIGH UNEMPLOYMENT IN CITY

UNEMPLOYMENT in Nottingham City is running at 5.6% higher than the national average. And in Nottingham East it is 11.7% higher, according to figures calculated by the City Planning Department for April.

These showed the rate of unemployment nationally was 13.5% compared to 19.1% in the city and 25.2% in Nottingham East. For men the rate was 30.6% in Nottingham East compared to 16.3% nationally, and for women 16.8% compared to 9.8%.

The official totals of unemployed in April were 23,632 in the city, 44,736 in the Nottingham Travel to Work Area, 59,026 in the County and 3,272,565 nationally.

the lives of 120 in Britain. Upto 400 cases can be expected before 1985 is out.

Current government policy is to direct growth money in the NHS away from the inner cities, the very areas where AIDS will hit the hardest. This crisis could be partly eased in the short term if available NHS growth monies were reallocated back to the inner cities to help fight this killer disease of the 21st century.

This was one of the messages coming from the European conference on AIDS which took place in London in early June organised by the Terrence Higgins Trust, named after the first British AIDS victim to die.
