

Under that old Act, when a riot took place a magistrate would read a proelamation and after an interval anyone found in the streets of the area would be liable for summary arrest and trial without jury and with every prospect of six or twelve months in prison.

THE ORIGINAL RIOT ACT ... TO BE BROWGET GACK?

AN ACT FOR PREVENTING TUMULTS AND RIOTOUS ASSEMBLIES, AND FOR THE SPEEDY AND EFFECTUAL PUNISHING THE RIOTERS

Whereas of late many rebellious Riots and Tumults have been in divers Parts of this Kingdom, to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace, and the endangering of his Majesty's Person and Government, and the same are yet continued and fomented by Persons disaffected to his Majesty presuming so to do, for that the Punishments provided by the Laws now in beingare not adequate to such heinous offences; and by such Rioters his Majesty and his Administration have been most maliciously and falsely traduced, with an intent to raise Divisions; and to elienate the Affections of the People from his Majesty. Therefore for the preventing and suppression of such Riots and Tumults, and for the more speedy and effectual punishing the Offenders therein; be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lord's Spiritual and Temporal, and of the Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by and by the Authority of the same, that if any Persons to the number of Twelve or more, being unlawfully, riotously and tumultously assembled together, to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace, at anytime after the last day of July in the Year of Our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifteen, and being required or commanded by any one or more Justice or Justices of the Feace, or by the Sheriff of the County, or his Under-Sheriff, or by the Mayor, Bailiff or Bailiffs, or other Head-Officer, or Justice of the Peace of any City or Town-corporate, where such Assembly shall be, by Proclaimation to be made in the King's Name, in the Form herein after directed, to disperse themselves and peaceably to depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Business, shall, to the number of twelve or more (notwithstanding such Proclaimation made) unlawfully, riously and tumultously remain or continue together by the Space of one Hour after such command or Request made by Proclaimation, shall be a judged Felony without benefit of Clergy, and the Offenders therein shall be ajudged Felons, and shall suffer Death as in case of Felony without Benefit of Clergy. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that the Order and Form of the Proclaimations that shall be as hereafter followeth (that is to say) the Justice of the Peace, or other Person authorized by this Act to make the said Proclamations shall, among the said Rioters or as near to them as he can safely come, with a loud voice command, or cause to be commanded Silence to be; while Proclamation is making, and after that, shall openly and wiith loud Voice, make or cause to be made Proclamation in theese words, or like in effect:

'Our Sovereign Lord the King chargeth and commandeth all Persons, being assembled, immediately to disperse themselves, and peaceably to depart to thier Habitations, or their lawful Business, upon the Pains contained in the Act made in the first Year of King George, for preventing Tumults and riotous Assemblies.

VAGRANCY ACT (1824) Sect 4 (5U5)

And it be further enacted, that every person committing any of the offences hereinbefore mentioned, after having been convicted as an idle and disorderly person; :: every person being found in or upon any iwelling-house, warehouse, coach-house, stable or outbuilding, or in any enclosed yard, garden or area for any unlawful purpose; every suspected person or reputed thief, frequenting any river, canal or navigable stream dock or basin, or any quay, warf or warehouse near or adjoining thereto or any street, avenue leading thereto, or any street highway or place adjacent, with intent to comit felony; and every person apprehended as an idle and disorderly person, and violently resisting any constable or other police officer so apprehending him or her and being subsequently convicted of the offence for which he or she shall have been apprehended, shall be deemed a rogue and a vagabond, within the true intent and meaning of this Act;

Prevention of Terrorism Act(Temporary Provisions) 1974. An Act to proscribe organisations concerned in terrerism, and to give power to exclude certain person from Great Britain in order to prevent acts of terrorism, and for connected purposes.

(c) arranges meeting of 3 or more persons, public or net, knowin/ furthers activities of proscribed organisations. can be convicted to six months or/and fined £400

2 Any person who in public Place (a)wears any item of dress

(b) wears, carries or display any article in such a way or such circumstances as to around reasonable apprehension that he is: a member or supporter of a proscribed organication, shall be on conviction to impaisement for a term not endeding 5 months or a fine not exceeding £200 or both. (do 100 and 1976).

3(a)if the Secretary of State is satisfied (a) any person (whether in G.B. or elsewhere) is of the first concern-. ed in commission, preparation or instintion of acts of terrorism

9 1) In this act "terrorism" means the use of violence for political ends, and this includes any use of violence for the purpose of putting the public or any section of it in fear.

PART 3/1/11 1) Ifca person who has information which he knows or believes might be of material assistance agin preventing an act of terrorism to which this section applies or b) in securing the apprehension, prosecution or conviction of any person for an offence involving the commission, preparation or instigation of an act of terrorism to which this section applies, or fails without reasonable excuse to disclose that information as soom as reasonably practicablei)in England or Wales to a constable, or

ii) in Scotland to a constable or the procurator fiscal, or iii)in Northern Ireland to a constable or a member of Her Majesty's forces, he shall be guilty of an offence.
