

# CHRISTMAS RECYCLING SAVES TREES!

Thousands of Christmas Trees were recycled last month, turning them into mulch for gardens and public parks! 173 trees were recycled by the City Council at the Goose Fair site, and around 300 people took trees along to Groundwork Greater Nottingham's service at Castle Marina. Thousands of trees have also been collected through Notts County Council Household Waste and Recycling centres.

Hundreds of Thousands of Christmas cards have been collected through a schemes - including Council collections County Waste Household and Recycling Centres, and schools around the County. Money raised through the recycling of these cards will be Countryside the Commission - enabling thousands of

trees to be planted locally by community groups in the Greenwood Community Forest area. The recycling of trees and cards is also a much 'greener' option than tipping them into landfill sites.

If you still have your Christmas cards, you could consider an even 'greener' alternative to recycling - saving them for re-use next Christmas. The Rainbow Centre Shop sells 'Christmas Paper Savers' - seasonal stickers which can be attached to old cards to enable them to be used again - saving trees, the environment used to grow them, and the energy used to make new

#### SCHOOL TRAVEL STUDY

This time last year, with the help of consultants Cleary Hughes Associates, Nottinghamshire County Council embarked on a study to look at the ways children travel to and from school, and to identify the scope for increasing the proportion of trips that are made by foot, bicycle and public transport.

All County schools received a questionnaire which resulted in figures being gathered for the journeys of 27,000 pupils, and the collection of views from 145 head teachers. In addition, 3 case study schools were selected for more in-depth work. These results show that well over one third of all Notts primary and junior school pupils travel to and from school by car. Many of these journeys are very short and could easily be walked or cycled.


The majority of primary and junior school pupils would rather walk or cycle to school than be taken by car, and most parents who currently drive younger children to school would be prepared to let them walk if measures were taken to make the journey safer - such as safe crossings on busy roads.

Under current circumstances most parents and head teachers to not wish to encourage more cycling to school, particularly among younger pupils. Traffic danger and lack of storage facilities for bikes during the school day are the main deterrents.

Public transport has a limited role to play in reducing the volume of school car traffic - the vast majority of pupils for whom this mode is appropriate already use it.

The County Council's Environment Committee have approved the commitment of £5,000 to progress this area of work. What we are hoping to do, by using this sum to lever in additional resources, is to select one secondary school where we will work over 3 phases -

1. An Audit of present school travel routes and patterns.



- 2. Implementing action determined by the school community to reduce the negative aspects of school travel.
- 3. **Evaluation** of the process and achievements. Alongside these phases, 2 additional strands will be pursued Community Participation and Curriculum Integration.

The project will have strong links to both the development of commuter plans and the Local Agenda 21 participation process.

# WASTE PREVENTION BILL

The Women's Environmental Network (WEN) has initiated the Waste Prevention Bill to enable local Waste Collection Authorities to promote waste prevention, in the same way as they can already promote recycling.

Local Waste Collection Authorities (who empty our dustbins) are empowered to deal with waste - once it has arisen - by recycling and other means. But, while everyone agrees that it is more important to prevent waste before it is produced, the collection authorities have no powers to do this. The Waste Prevention Bill will remedy this gap, enabling local authorities to encourage a variety of local initiatives to prevent and reduce waste - such as unwanted trade directories, used disposable nappies and throwaway cups, which are currently sent to landfill sites or incineration with all the attendant pollution problems.

The bill was launched as a Presentation Bill by Elliot Morley MP in the last session of Parliament, in early November, with

cross-party support from a range of MPs. WEN is planning to re-launch the bill in the current session of Parliament, possibly as a Ten Minute Rule Bill.

Elliot Morley MP has tabled an Early Day Motion (EDM) in support of the bill, which has already been signed by over 80 MPs. An Early Day Motion is a resolution which appears on MPs' order papers with names of those who have signed.

#### OIL BANK LINE

A new phone line has been set up by the National Rivers Authority (NRA) to help people locate their nearest oil bank, with the aim of encouraging motorists to dispose of oil safely. A new report from the National Household Hazardous Waste Forum showed that around 20,000 tonnes of used oil is disposed of improperly each year - and just five litres of oil is enough to cover a small lake!

Oil recycling banks are located at Household Waste and Recycling centres, as well as some garages in the area. The NRA's Oil Care Code gives three key points on preventing oil pollution -

- \* When you drain your engine oil don't oil the drain! Pouring oil down the drain will cause pollution. It is also an offence.
- \* Take used oil to an oil recycling bank. Call 0800 66 33 66 to find your nearest oil bank.
- \* Don't mix used oil with other material, such as paint or solvents, as this makes recycling very difficult.

Nottingham City Council are looking for garage or forecourt managers interested in providing space for Oil Banks. The council would manage the site - garages simply provide the space.

# GREEN COMMUTER PLANS

We are all becoming increasingly concerned about the over-use of cars in our cities. Nottingham is no exception, where the volume of car commuting has increased by a third during the last ten years. Nottingham City Council believes that major employers have a role to play in reducing car usage and is attempting to show by example how things could change.

The authority has announced plans to reduce staff dependence on the use of their cars by launching the Council's own Green Commuter Plan. The plan is being developed over the next three years, and will offer staff alternatives to using their own cars - including public transport, pool cars, taxis, car sharing, cycling and walking.

The Council is also hoping that its Green Commuter Plan will act as a model for other employers in Nottingham. A seminar for local employers has already been held in July 1995 to help share ideas and now the Council has launched a new employers guide entitled 'Green Commuter Plans - a Resource Pack for Nottingham's Employers'. The guide has been published jointly by Nottingham City Council, Nottingham Green partnership, Nottinghamshire County Council and Transport 2000.


The Council is following up publication of the guide by appointing a Green Commuter Plan adviser who will work with local employers.

#### WILDLIFE ACTION PLAN

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB), is calling on the government to give its full backing to the most comprehensive plans ever produced to protect wildlife and habitats.

'Biodiversity: the UK Steering Group Report' was published in December, with targets for the conservation of 116 species and 14 key habitats. Plans concentrate initially on species most threatened with extinction like the bittern (a bird), or with rapidly declining numbers such as the skylark. Other species to receive priority treatment include brown hare, grey partridge and grey crested newt.



Action plans have been prepared for threatened and scarce habitats such as lowland raised mire

and reedbeds. Only four per cent of lowland raised mire remains and since the second world war reedbeds and associated habitats have declined by 60% in the UK.

The Biodiversity Action Plan Steering Group, set up by the government in 1994, comprises a wide range of interests, with government departments, farmers, industry, local government, research institutes and conservation organisations represented.

The RSPB strongly believes that the key to success of the plans, in implementing the report's proposals, lies in co-ordinated action across all Government departments (from Education and the Environment, to Transport and the Treasury) over the next three years.

Tim de Winton, RSPB Conservation Officer for Nottinghamshire and South & West Yorkshire, said 'This report gives us a golden opportunity to halt the destruction of wildlife and to reverse some of the most serious declines. The Government must now grasp the challenge of converting these words into effective action.'

### LOCAL AGENDA 21

Last issue we looked at the background to Local Agenda 21. This time we take a whistle-stop tour of what councils in Greater Nottingham are doing about it.

Different councils have worked in different ways and at different speeds. Rushcliffe Borough Council was the first to get going on LA21. Groups representing the council itself, the voluntary sector and the parish councils have been meeting for some months to draft their own strategies. In November 1995 they met together for the first time, and are now working to combine their ideas into a single strategy for Rushcliffe.

Broxtowe Borough Council has just appointed two new officers to work full-time on LA21. The Borough is reviewing its own activities, and a program of consultation to find out residents' priorities for a sustainable Broxtowe is in the planning stages.

Nottingham City Council has agreed an outline LA21 process, and is starting to put it into practice in conjunction with Nottingham Green Partnership. Last Autumn the Council established a Sustainable Development Sub-committee to co-ordinate its own work in this field.

The Green Partnership will provide specialist input through its sub-groups on Energy, Recycling, etc. - this process has just started.

Gedling Borough Council is investigating ways to build on its existing environmental work. It has just held a seminar to brief councillors on LA21, and a conference to bring in the wider community is planned for the Spring.

Nottinghamshire County Council has identified Sustainable Development as one it's top priorities, and is organising a variety of projects in different departments - such as an Energy Efficiency initiative with local schools. Four 'task groups' have been set up with the aim of improving the council's impact on the environment, covering Waste, Energy and Water, Transport and Purchasing.

The County Council is also planning to host an Agenda 21 Conference in the Spring, in co-operation with local District Councils.
