THE GREEN CONNECTION

The Green Connection project has now been launched - with the aim of targeting black and white ethnic groups of all ages to take part in environmental action in Nottingham. The project is the result of a partnership between Groundwork Greater Nottingham, Nottinghamshire County Council and the Nottingham Green Partnership.

Elaine Gibb has been employed by the Groundwork Trust to run the project, which will carry on the work of a previous initiative called Its Our Environment Too. Elaine will be targeting ethnic groups not yet involved, and forging new links with the ethnic communities of Nottingham.

The Green Connection will facilitate and support a variety of projects, based on four - physical environmental areas tocus improvements, countryside visits, wildlife in the city, & rural-urban twinning projects.

The Green Connection aims to enable communities in the city to participate in conserving, enhancing and celebrating the environment in ways which are relevant to local attitudes and cultures, and to help communities develop their own responses to sustainable development issues.

Green Network News is a monthly publication aiming to share information and build links between all individuals and organisations in the Nottingham and South Notts area with an interest in the environment.

The Green Connection has also played a key role in the bringing together of three environmental workers in Nottingham to form an environmental 'hit-squad' for the city. Their mission is to increase community participation in the environment by helping them to enjoy, protect and improve their local surroundings. The other two squad members are -

* Ruth Eyre (Youth Environment Worker with Nottinghamshire County Council), working with young people aged from 11 to 25 who attend city youth clubs. Ruth works with groups who have specific needs or concerns, whether it be improving the youth club environment or the personal development of members.

* Sukhy Johal (Environmental Ethnic Youth Worker), has recently been employed by the Black Environment Network. He will be developing four specific environmental youth projects within Nottingham over the next three years.

The Enviro Hit-Squad will also be joined by other environmental workers and partners, and are here to provide advice and assistance to groups who wish to take an active role in the environment. For more information contact Elaine Gibb on 979 9227.

GREEN AWARD FOR CITY

Nottingham City Council's Environmental Services department has become the first Council department, and one of only a few organisations in the country, to be awarded a coveted environmental hallmark. The new standard ISO14001 'green' rewards organisations which commit themselves to continually checking and improving their environmental performance.

Benefits of the system include cost savings through reduced waste, better management control and improved prospects of securing money from bodies like the EU - which require environmental guarantees before approving funding towards improvement projects.

Staff in the Environmental Services department carry out key functions in Nottingham such as pollution control, drainage, highway design and street sweeping. Over the next few months, the Department plans to offer local businesses a consultancy service, to help them to achieve the new standard.

railway privatisation appear to pose major In 1989 a Government White Paper promised threats to adopting greener transport policies. 'the greatest road-building programme since the Romans'. INTERNATIONAL ARTS PROJECT

NETWORK

1997 is the 50th year of the independence of India and Pakistan, as well as European Year Against Racism and the 100th anniversary of the City of Nottingham. To celebrate these events APNA Arts proposes to bring to Britain from India the internationally acclaimed artist Nek Chand Saini.

Nek Chand Saini will be arriving in Britain in May or June to train and work with four British artists for one month in Birmingham and Nottingham. Nek Chand will be introducing his philosophies and art practice to the artists, who will produce sculptures (in the broadest sense)



For years now, Wilford Baptiste has been dazzling neighbours in Sneinton with an ever-changing display of vertical flower gardening at the front of his house, and demonstration of just how much veg' can be grown in a small space at the back. He uses old plastic drainpipes, punched with planting holes, as vertical window boxes and tops garden walls with pots or growbags made from plastic sacks. He has built raised beds in his tiny backyard and grows a surplus of vegetables to give away.

Last year, Wilford's fame spread to the media and Central TV called to film his garden in the air, complete with lettuces in pots made from plastic tubing, suspended from the washing line.




