Ellen attends the Radford Care Project and we asked her to be on our poster campaign which you may have seen around the area. She could not remember exact dates but can remember the events of the twenties including the Suffragettes marching through Nottingham and also, with her friends, going to vote for the first time - the Polling Station was the front room of a house at the bottom of her street.



Vote $(\mathbf{1})$ for a party

You may agree with the views of one of the Political Parties who are putting forward a candidate. You may feel that they will most likely run things in a way that benefits you or the community. Why not get in touch with the local party office or party candidate and ask them for information about their policies.

2 Vote for a candidate

You may know or agree with one of the Candidates who is standing for election. You may feel that they will best represent your views and meet the needs of the area. Why not ask your local candidates about their views. The electoral office on 915 4523 can tell you where to contact candidates.

The local 'question time' was held on 27th April at the Bridge Centre. The evening was organised with a panel of Party and Independent candidates for the local area plus a non political speaker. All Parties standing locally were represented except one who declined the invitation to attend. The meeting was politely but firmly chaired and questions from the audience covered issues such as the Leisure Complex on the Forest, the new Tram, student grants, as well as broader issues such as issues of personal safety related to the Tony Martin case. The meeting had over 35 attending and the organisers felt it was a successful evening of discussion.

The Partnership Council is a very simple idea - to address the serious challenges which face our community we have to work together. We think this can only happen if we bring residents, business people, voluntary & public sector representatives and local City councillors together to make and influence decisions which affect our area. The challenge is that this is easier to say than do. Some take it to mean 'power to the people' and others see it as creating another layer of 'bureaucracy'. The fact is we are an organisation made up of very different people who are trying to find a new way of working together.

We believe that there is no other way forward but for people to work together. The only way to regenerate our community is to bring those with professional knowledge and skills together with those who live locally and who know what the real problems are. This requires us all to change.

We need to move away from a 'them and us' blame orientated culture to one in which people take responsibility for trying to work together. It means we all, as individuals, have to respect, learn from, and work constructively with people from other backgrounds.

Trying to make this happen is very difficult and although we have achieved a great deal we are not pretending that we always get it right. But the consequences of not changing are so bad that we believe we have to make it work.

We have created an innovative decision making process which engages local people at all levels and attempts to overcome prejudice, suspicion and mistrust between the sectors by providing opportunities for people from different backgrounds to work together. This partnership is a genuine 'Partnership'. It is not an organisation that is using a 'buzz' word. We are doing it for real.

We are currently looking over the future development of the Partnership Council and as part of that are re-emphasising the principles we set out with. For example: to break down prejudices and build bridges between sectors.

Workshops will include (1) How should learning be shaped in your area? (2) What skills would you want to be developed as a result of this process? (3) How can those who provide education and learning ensure that opportunities are accessible and relevant to the most excluded members of local communities.

The day will provide constructive feedback about the bid and suggestions as to how it could be improved. However we are looking to avoid individual project or funding obsessed discussion and trying not to waste energy on elements of the bid that cannot be changed (i.e. geographical area, time frames, etc), or the raising of unrealistic expectations.

This will be a real chance to influence the SRB bid before it goes in. If you are interested in learning and education and future funding in the area then come along.





The Voluntary Sector Forum has developed a local A-Z of voluntary groups. It is intended to be delivered to every houshold in the area to let local people know what services and opportunities are available to them. The A-Z should begin delivery in the next few weeks so keep an eye open on your letterbox.

If you know about funding then you'll probably know about SRB and what it's all about. If you don't know what SRB is - it is funding from the Government called the Single Regeneration Budget. It is set up to achieve particular aims, within certain geographic areas. SRB 6 is strongly aimed towards education and learning. This is a an opportunity to influence the bid and shape the access to the funding when it comes.

Background

The Single Regeneration Budget (Round 6) is a packet of Government funding which Nottingham is currently hoping to apply for. Locally it will cover all or parts of Radford, Hyson Green, Forest Fields and New Basford. It is intended to support various projects reflecting local priorities, as identified by local partnerships, over the period of 7 years.

Three strands have been set and they are: One - Community Learning and Information & communication technology or ICT for short (£5m). Two - Local area regeneration in Bestwood. (£2m). Three - Regeneration fund (£2m)

Currently, the SRB team have organised a series of workshops to bring together partnerships. The final bid for the funds has to be submitted by the 2nd of June 2000 to the East Midlands Development Agency.
