

Chancellor told to set aside £750 million for NHS

Nearly £7 billion should be injected into the economy to achieve a minimum growth rate and to save the health service the Government has been told. In its submission to the Chancellor on the 1988 Budget the TUC called for urgent action to reduce the divisions in society by increasing social benefits, boosting urban and regional policies and supporting local economic initiatives backed up with suitable investment in local infrastructure to tackle unemployment. BREL - THE KNOCK ON EFFECT

A report produced by Derbyshire County Council on the social and economic implications of the proposed job losses at BREL confirms the worst fears of local trade unionists. It estimates that the 1420 redundancies announced by BREL in September 1987 for its two main works in Derby would result in a further 45 jobs disappearing from local suppliers of raw material components and services. It also points out that other studies have shown that redundancies on this scale are likely to result in the loss of a further 198 jobs among service firms, especially those in retailing.

Overall, this means that even after the possibilities of alternative employment and early retirement are taken into account, it is likely that almost 1000 of the proposed redundant workers would become Furthermore due unemployed. to the heavy loss of manufacturing jobs in Derby during the last 5 years and the relatively high level of unemployment in this sector of the local economy, those redundant workers who find work would do so at the expense of other unemployed workers. This can only worsen the problems of long term unemployment in Derby, particularly in the inner city.

At the heart of the TUC's budget package is a lifeline to the NHS. The TUC asked Mr Lawson to set aside £750 million to reverse the long term under-funding of the NHS which is causing so much damage to the quality of public health care.

£340 million of this sum should be earmarked for bolstering ancillary services in hospitals; £150 million must afford full protection for NHS workers against pay and price rises; abolition of enforced "efficiency" savings would cost another £150 million; and £110 million would go towards much needed maintenance work.

Despite this even now the Tories are preparing to give more tax cuts to the rich than the amount identified by the TUC as needed by the NHS. They are set on giving away tax cuts and to hell with a poor NHS and lousy nurses pay.

Other key points in the TUC's message to the Chancellor were:

An immediate increase in regional industrial aid - cost £300 million.

More money for local authorities

Old age pensions should be increased by £8.75 for a couple and £5.90 for a single person - £2,600 million.



Ahmed Ghavami was General Secretary of an Iranian trade union. Involvement in a strike led to arrest and imprisonment for him and his 14 year old son. Both were badly tortured in prison. When they were released. Ahmed and his family suffered continual harassment from Revolutionary Guards. He went into hiding and later escaped to the UK where he was granted political asylum in 1984.



Refugees from persecution arriving in the UK now may not be so lucky. In March 1987 the Government introduced legislation making it more difficult for such people to reach the UK and for them to obtain asylum once here. Amnesty International fears that refugees are now being returned to countries where they face persecution, torture or even death because of this change of policy. If Ahmed had arrived in Britain today he could have been sent back to Iran without his case for asylum being heard.

To prevent this Amnesty is demanding a major review of Home Office proceedures for dealing with asylum applications and is proposing a Code of Practice which sshould be followed. For details on how to help Amnesty's campaign please contact David Abberley at 145 Boulton Lane, Alvaston, Derby.
