



Last year's Bookfair programme featured riots, occupations and the Arab spring. In every case retribution and repression have been harsh and in the UK and Europe accompanied by austerity and social cleansing for the poor while shedloads of public money are poured into the private purses of the rich. It's grim but we have a choice; either give up or step up. With less to lose and more to fight for, this year's Bookfair provides the ideal forum for learning from the past, reflecting on the present and building the fight for an alternative future.

Our meetings this year reflect this - from Hobgoblin on the Chartists and 'anarchist economics' from Michael Albert to resisting forced workfare and homelessness and how to take direct action in support of workplace demands. Lindela Figlan from Abahlali baseMjondolo will speak about the inspiring self organisation of the Shack Dwellers Movement in South Africa at a time when platinum miners are confronting the state and their international corporation bosses.

We've stayed in the same building as it has better access and everything is together in the same place. While we'd love to hold the Bookfair in a giant self-organised space, what we have provides an opportunity to promote the event openly and make it accessible. The downside is that you can't bring dogs in and you will see people asking for your money on the door - please do make a contribution on the way in or out or both. Food will be available at the venue - snacks and drinks between 10 am and 6pm, hot food from noon to 4pm.

The kids spaces are also part of making the Bookfair accessible and this year we have 3. The creche is for children from 2-8 (under 2s with a parent or carer only). There is also an older kids pace (8-12) and this year we are putting on a programme of events for 11-16 year olds (see page 23). We are giving the cabaret a rest this year, but there is an exhibition of prisoners art in the lobby area near the films room.

There will be a gig in the evening - venue to be announced on the day (see next page for details) and we all need to be out of the building by 8pm. Help clearing up is always appreciated come to the info stall for instructions!

If you are reading this before the Bookfair or early in the day, the United Friends and Families Campaign are holding their annual event speaking out against police and prison brutality. (Assemble: South side of Nelsons Column, Trafalgar Square, London, WC2N 5DN at 12.30, for a silent procession along Whitehall followed by Noisy Protest at Downing Street!)



No more islave -The battle against Apple continues....

Love your iPhone, iPad or iPod? What about the workers who made it? At last year's Bookfair Pun Ngai spoke about the inspiring work of SACOM, an organization fighting sweatshop labour in China. In May 2010, following a spate of suicides, SACOM turned its attention to Foxconn, the biggest electronic manufacturer in the world and largest Apple supplier. By gathering information from among the hundreds of thousands of workers in China's factories SACOM monitors working conditions in Foxconn's massive factories; hazardous working conditions, forced excessive and unpaid overtime, underpayment of wages, and inhumane and degrading treatment. These investigations are published to coincide with the launch of a new Apple product. Together with SACOM videos and banner drops of the "No More iSlave" slogan on the Apple iPhone background, these reports have turned the media spotlight on Foxconn and Apple. However, nothing has focused attention as much as the direct action of the workers themselves. The most recent was a

riot in Taiyuan plant on the 23rd September which broke out after several workers were beaten up by security guards. Escalating to include about 2000 workers the riot made international news headlines and resulted in the plant being closed. Meanwhile SACOM are campaigning for the democratic election of genuine trade union representatives and recognition of the right of workers to organize according to the Trade Union Law of China. 

4.30pm - 6.30pm **Anarchist Economics**

Even amidst economic crisis, experts and politicians tell us that 'there is no alternative'. When the Left proposes an alternative it is invariably the Marxist one of nationalisation and often just seems a mirror-image of capitalism as usual. Anarchists by contrast have explored and experimented with economic alternatives for 172 years. At this meeting a panel of speakers will discuss some of these experiments. Politicians repeatedly tell us that we must suffer years of austerity just to revive the capitalist economy. Yet, for 95% of our time on Earth humans have lived without capitalism - and for most of that time without states, classes or money. What can we learn from our noncapitalist past and how can we live a noncapitalist future? The discussion will be initiated by two radical anthropologists: David Graeber (anarchist and author or of 'Debt, The First 5,000 Years') and Chris Knight (marxist and author of 'Blood Relations' and (online) '2017 the anthropology of the future').

How do you gather together like-minded people separated by thousands of miles to work for a better world? And how does that group organise itself to achieve this goal? The newly launched IOPS aims to answer both questions by bringing people together to organise around a shared vision for the future based on self management, equity, diversity and solidarity. Pussy Riot in Rusia? That's just the start

The jailing of three Pussy Riot musicians in Moscow sparked new protests, and attracted massive western media attention. Other struggles in the former Soviet Union's workplaces, housing complexes and streets are less well known. In Kazakhstan, last year's oil workers' strike (in an area where UK companies invest) ended with a police massacre that left 16 dead and 60 injured. The panel will include Antii Rautiainen, an anarchist expelled from Russia after 13 years there, and Gabriel Levy, an activist who has worked with Russian and Kazakh trade unionists.

4.30pm - 6.30pmLindela Figlan from Abahlali baseMjondolo

Abhlali base Mjondolo (AbM) began in Durban in 2005. Lindela Figlan, chair of AbM (Shack Dwellers Movement) will speak about his experiences, ways of organising and other community based issues. In terms of people mobilised, it's the largest militant poor organisation in post-apartheid South Africa. Social movements like AbM, the Landless People's Movement in Johannesburg and the Anti-eviction Campaign in Cape Town pose serious challenges to the ruling party because of their refusal to vote. AbM's key demand is 'Land & Housing in the City' but has successfully politicised and fought to end forced removals and for access to education and the provision of water, electricity, sanitation, health care and refuse removal as well as bottom up popular democracy.

The Black Rose martial arts coop presents a seminar based on the principals of MMA and non-hierarchical organising. The Zapatistas of San Marcos Aviles in Chiapas, Mexico are under siege by armed supporters of political parties. Since the Zapatistas started their autonomous school, political party supporters have attacked this community, attempting to rape the women and steal their land and possessions. In 2010 the 170 Zapatistas had to flee to the mountains. The Zapatistas are now back in their community, but the increasing threat of violent eviction means international solidarity is urgently needed. This is no isolated episode, but part of the Mexican government plan to destroy the self-governing "communities in resistance".

The Network will have a stall and an open meeting/discussion at the London Anarchist Bookfare.






3pm - 4pm **Future of Freedom Newspaper**


5pm – 6pm Fuel Poverty: The Cold Front of Capitalism


12 noon - Ipm Equality – a bad ideal?

With sex and relationships education back in the spotlight with Nadine Dorries' terrifying attempt to introduce abstinence training for girls, Feminist Fightback have been considering what feminist sex education might look like and how resources for teaching it could be made available. The resources deal with human relationships from an emotional perspective as well as a physical one, and acknowledge diversity and individuality and enable open discussion of gender and sexuality. However, sex education isn't only necessary for kids. We want to extend this discussion further into our own relationships as adults, and how we attempt to educate ourselves in a collective way. 
