To secure its operation however several consequent changes were also necessary, such as the unquestionable identification of the eldest son, as up to this point—the family—tree Was distinguishable from the mother's side, instead of the father. Totem and tribal marriage, wherein all the men of one tribe or totem group were the husbands of all the women of a particular tribe or totem group, had to be changed in such a way as to ensure the complete paternal identity of the offspring.

Women became limited to one husband, and the age of the mother (matriachial) passed away to give place to the rule of the father (patriarchial). This much accomplished, there yet remained a something more to ensure that the son did get the wealth, and to protect his possesion of it,

The laws of the old world did not allow it, and so new laws had to be conceived

A complete new legal code was introduced, changing entirely the whole basis of communal society, and elevating to seat of importance, instead of Human Life, private property.

The law of primogeniture, i.e. the right of the eldest son to inherit the property of the father, came into being and made property sacred.

Protective measures followed until its possession and accumulation was secure, and free from all question, thus civilization was born and made free to pursue its course of human strife with its property owners and slave class, the master and the slave class,

Since then these two classes, the master and the slave class have been engaged in one perpetual struggle, a struggle which may have changed in its appearance, altered in its

intensity and directness, but which has never ceased until this day, when workers are fighting, struggling against, and challenging the rule of the employers.

The greatest, the bloodest, most terrible conflict recorded in the pages of history, involving in its throes, millions of the toiling masses over a period of 2,000 years, and it is nearing its end!!!

To-day there is scarcly a country in the known world, but there is to be found the Communistic movement, the masses of toilers organised together into a revoluntary movement, working towards, striving for and as in Russia dying on behalf of, that era of emancipation, that freedom from slavery which was our only inheritance,
