An NHS sell-off is coming our way. Let's stop it.

Leicestershire Health UNISON, which organises 4,500 healthworkers in Leicestershire, has stepped up its campaign against the cuts in acute hospital services being contemplated by Leicestershire Health Authority and the University Hospitals of Leicester NHS Trust. The 'Reconfiguration Project' promises (as ever) better services - but as a recent UNISON inquiry concluded, the numbers don't add up. There's a gap - a gap which seems designed to be filled by privatisation under the so-called 'private finance initiative'.

The union has agreed to establish an open planning committee to co-ordinate work publicising alternatives to the Authority's proposals. Everyone concerned by the reconfiguration can get involved in the campaign for a better health service.

Campaign

Nick Holden, UNISON Branch Chair, explains: "We want everyone in Leicestershire to be part of our campaign. We are running this campaign to fight for the best possible health service for people in Leicestershire. This is not about 'saving' one hospital or another, and it never should have been

- its about safeguarding the NHS in the whole of the county.

Profiteers

"You cannot solve the underfunding in the NHS by inviting private contractors to run parts of the health service for profit, and you cannot tackle the pressure on beds by swapping an acute hospital for a rehabilitation hospital - particularly one that the NHS has to rent from profiteers.

"Leicestershire needs increased provision for rehabilitation within the NHS, but not at the expense of acute care. This proposal is reckless and would result in a worse service both for patients requiring rehabilitation and those needing acute care.

"That's why we are stepping up our campaign to

halt the Reconfiguration Project. And it is why we are opening up our campaign to all healthworkers - (Continued on p. 2)

Kidderminster Hospital Sell-Off Causes Labour Council Meltdown.

In 1998 the local health authority announced plans to close the Kidderminster General Hospital, which provided a local version of the NHS for most of the last century. Labour in opposition promised to stop the scheme, but in government . . . you can guess the next bit.

The result? At the last local elections, campaign body Health Concern' took seven seats from NuLabour on the district council.


diamond companies and their friends in government were naturally outraged. Conflict resumed and UN "peace keepers" became the latest pawns in a game controlled by multinational gangsters.

Warning: politicians vare not a joke

In a statement released this week, the Ministry of Obedience warned: "Politics is a serious busniess.

Sniggering at your elected representatives is both unproductive and unpleasant. This cannot be tolerated in a profit-conscious democracy. That is why we are aiming to reduce UK laughter emissions by 35% over the next three years." Do we owe them a living? Course we don't!

Elaine Smith sees red:

If I came up to you and offered you the use of something you need, asked you to pay for it before you had even seen it, and then, told you that you had to pay an extra 10-25% on top of that, would you?

Thousands of the most economically deprived people in this city are forced to do this every day through electricity and gas prepayment meters. Not only do we pay for our electricity and gas up front in cash before we receive it (unlike those who pay quarterly in arrears) but we pay an extra for the rent of the meter on top of the standing charge. The gas and electricity we receive through our meters also cost us more - 10% extra for electricity and whopping 25% extra for gas!

When the price of gas and electricity is lowered by OFWAT and OFGAS it can take months before our meters are changed to the lower tariff, and in the meantime we continue to pay at the higher rate. So when they do eventually come to alter the meter we are in credit! In the rest of the world, this overpayment would be returned to the creditor, but


the gas and electricity boards put the credit towards the next bill which in effect means that I never get it back because I am never in arrears! In the rest of the world if I paid cash for something in advance I would expect a discount not extra duty!

This made me especially angry a few weeks ago when the electricity meter ran out and left the house in darkness. The washing machine had stopped with my eldest son's work trousers inside. In the past we could have gone down to Raw Dykes Road and purchased another card, but they have closed this outlet down. We can only buy cards from a few local shops or post offices. Once they've shut you're stumped. At the time this happened, the electricity company owed me £48.80.

British Gas are (as I write this) advertising on TV about the abolition of the standing charge. Will this include the pre-payment meter users or will it be yet another way for national companies to screw yet more money out of those with least economic power in our society?




LGB London Pride 2000







Who was Emma Goldman, then?

She was a revolutionary American anarchist. Born in 1869 in Russia, she moved to the US at the age of 17 where she became a tenacious activist and civil libertarian.

Her commitment to achieving social justice through anarchism, direct action and civil disobedience has had a rarely surpassed following. Her complex and unceasing fights for freedom of speech led to the creation of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU).

She was one of the first on the organised left to realise the particular issues that affected women and to challenge the institutionalised sexism of the workers movement. Her feminism eventually led to her being jailed for advocating contraception.

She was also a committed advocate of public education for working-class children and of general educational reform - believing that schools as they are foster blind obedience instead of developing the human faculties, which are necessary if a free community is to be possible.
