

This year Saturday 1st May in Nottingham will be a real celebration of international working class solidarity and culture. For far too long the working class movement has been under attack by those who profit from international competition & division, while what the world



THE DURHAM MINERS



In the spirit of unity, we are proud to welcome the N.E. Area NUM Brass Band to lead our march on MayDay. The Durham miners have a long tradition of solidarity & support for causes as varied as the Spanish Revolution, the printers fight at Wapping & against the apartheid regime. They give reality to the slogan "Your fight is Our fight". Sadly years of onslaught by the Tories have destroyed the pits of Durham, but the communities & their fighting spirit live on. No where is this more evident than in the Durham Big Meeting. an annual gathering of bands & banners celebrating the spirit of working class unity. When I was a mere lad my grandad used to take me to the Gala & hoist me on his shoulders to watch a sea of banners pass by. Many of those banners bore a common legend "Unity is Strength". That slogan has as much relevance today as it ever did in fact more so. Far beyond the realms of the workplace & trade unionism to all groups & individuals fighting oppression

& injustice throughout the world. Too often have strikers been left to fight on alone because "it's nothing to do with me" or "who's interested in unions anyway?": likewise protests outside the trade union movement have been ignored or seen as not relevant. truth is we are all fighting the same battle and we need each others support. The growing of a mutual respect & support emerged in the great miners strike of 1984/85 & the year long printers strike at Wapping: and more recently the striking Liverpool dockers and Reclaim the Streets have seen the importance of a united struggle against the common enemy. The point is this - you don't have to be a worker in a trade union, or a traveller, or a free party goer, or a road protester. or a local resident fighting to save your swimming baths - but you do have to support these people in whatever way you can, because one day you may need to call on their support. HILLSBOROUGH During the 1989 FA Cup semifinal at Hillsborough 96 Liverpool fans (men, women & children) died following a crush in one section of the ground. The families of those who suffered at

Hillsborough have never received satisfactory answers about how such a tragedy could take place. A campaign group has now been formed to seek both increased public awareness & to insist upon real accountability.

The initial overcrowding could have been avoided simply by directing people to the less crowded sections. It is clear from the TV footage that players & fans realised that an emergency was developing but could not convince the police who believed that a pitch invasion was underway. Consequently supporters undertook the majority of rescue work & only two ambulances reached the pitch or proceeded to hospital, while ambulances lined up in the streets outside were refused permission to enter by the police. The presumed dead were left in a hall without being seen by a doctor or paramedic to ensure they were indeed beyond help.

The inquest failed to reveal the full story. The coroner decided at the start of the proceedings that all were dead by 3.10pm, consequently nothing after that time was considered. When you remember that people were still crushed inside the pen at that time & a living person was found left for dead some time after, it is a remarkable decision. We must ask if the response would have been different if the crowd were at the Royal Opera House rather than a football match. If the police had not viewed fans in terms of the trouble they may create rather than members of the public would they then have witnessed what was happening rather than what they expected to see?


This was not a random unavoidable tragedy but a terrible expression of the way in which attitudes & prejudice can contribute to the formation of tragedy & what efforts may be undertaken to hide the truth.







THE HAYMARKET MARTYRS


May 1886 and 80,000 workers & their families walk down Chicago's Michigan Ave. in the world's first ever May Day Parade. At the same time 340,000 workers in 12.000 factories across the US downed tools to demand the 8 hour day in order to spread work among the thousands made unemployed by new 'labour s ery. The next day Chicago police attacked peaceful strikers with guns and clubs, killing & wounding sever-On May 3rd 5,000 striking lumberworkers marched to the aid of strikers at the McCormick Harvester factory who had been locked out over a wage dispute. When pickets tried to stop scabs from entering the plant the police attacked again, opening fire on the strikers. killing 4 & wounding many others. Outraged at this act of naked aggression, a protest was called for the next day at the Haymarket Square.


The meeting was peaceful & a shower of rain soon sent away most of the crowd. When only a few hundred remained the police suddenly attacked. In the confusion a bomb was thrown & exploded among the police who immediately opened fire on the workers. Several police & many workers were killed.

It has never been discovered who threw the Haymarket bomb, but it was certainly none of the 8 anarchists who

were put on trial for it. Six of them were not even there & the other two were clearly innocent. Yet a trial of perjured testimony, a packed jury, biased judge & a hysterical press ensured a guilty verdict & condemned 5 of the 8 to death. Despite worldwide protests Parsons, Spies, Fischer & Engels were hanged on November 11th (Ling had committed suicide the previous day). Six years later the state governor released the survivors from jail, admitting that there had been no evidence to link any of the 8 with the Haymarket bomb.

On 14th July 1889, on the 100th anniversary of Bastille Day, an American delegate at the International Labour Congress in Paris proposed that May 1st be officially adopted as a workers holiday. This was unanimously approved & since then May Day has served as a date

RECLAIM OUR RIGHTS! REPEAL THE ANTI-TRADE UNION LAWS

Most anti-trade union law was introduced by the Tories between 1979 & 95. These laws strengthened employers & weakened workers. These laws MUST be repealed, not only because they are repressive, but also because they are illegal in themselves, contravening the UK's international legal obligations under the Council of Europe's Social Charter. Back in March 1997 Tony Blair declared the changes he proposed "would leave British law the most restrictive on trade unions in the western world". He was right. New Labour's "Fairness at Work" proposals, many of them welcome, will still leave most anti-union laws in place, and they have since been further weakened.

Positive legislation in the field of industrial relations is required - laws which will protect trade unions from legal aftacks, allow them to operate democratically & protect their members; laws which restore & extend collective bargaining, protect workers against exploitation and provide the basis for a fairer and more just society.



NOTTS FIRE BRIGADE Sends MAY DAY GREETINGS to all **Trade Unionists**

JUSTICE FOR TAJ & ROBERTO MAY DAY GREETINGS TO ALL ANTI-RACISTS

On the basis of the word of supposedly 'independent' witnesses. Taj Ahmed (24) & Roberto Brollini (21) were convicted of actual bodily harm on 2 other men -Andrew Wearden & his accomplice Matthew Perry. Perry & Wearden racially abused & then attacked Tai & Roberto. What the Jury was not told was that Andrew Wearden was the fascist British National Party's candidate during the 1997 General Election. As a result of this incident Tal & Roberto have been given a 12 month custodial sentence.

They are appealing against this but in the meantime both they & their families are suffering. Taj has spent Xmas, New Year & Eid in prison. His 3 children & their mother have had to flee from the area for fear of reprisals from mazis after the local paper published their home address. Roberto also had to spend his 21st birthday in prison & may have lost his job with a local delivery firm - all for having the courage to stand up to a racist bully. Compare their sentences to those of David Haraldsson, Preston BNP Organiser jailed in January 97 for a mere 18 months on 5 counts of ABH on elderly people at a nursing home in Chorley where he worked as a care assistant. The courts give a lenient sentence to a nazi who tortures the elderly but throws the book at Taj & Roberto!

countries raising the hope of an end to neoliberalism. The new governments remain unwilling, however, to introduce a fair distribution of labour & wealth. The Maastricht criteria and the stability pact are still in force and the welfare state remains under attack. The EU Luxembourg "lobs summit" in November 1997 solved nothing, resolving to export British "lob flexibility" to the rest of the EU. The racist "fortress Europe" remains in place & is being strengthened.

demonstration in Cologne on May 29th 99 to coincide with the Heads of Government Summit of the EU. It follows the 50,000 strong demonstration in Amsterdam in June 97 & those in Luxembourg, Cardiff & Vienna since then. The demo is expected to be at least the size of the Amsterdam one, if not bigger. To build for the demo marches will take place across Germany during May, heading for Cologne. They will start from Hamburg, Berlin, Prague & Basal in Switzerland. There will also be an international march from Brussels comprised of delegations from across the continent.

There will also be a global dimension with the participation of a large delegation of landless peasants from Brazil, trade union activists from South Korea, and links with the world march of women against poverty & violence against women.

There is already wide interest in organising for these events from Britain. Among those involved are Reclaim the Streets, the Socialist Party. Campaign for Free Education & the Euromarch Liason Committee.

The idea of the Euromarch is to make connections throughout Europe of all unemployed associations, trade unions, activists & others committed to fight against unemployment, all willing to work on a joint platform. It is also a means of circulating info about our struggles and encouraging contacts, actions & co-ordinated resistance.

For people in some countries, standing up for human rights is dangerous



Dita Indah Sari, a 24-year-old woman, has been sentenced to five years in an Indonesian jail. For nearly a year she lived with the fear of a possible death sentence, as she was charged under Indonesia's draconian Anti-sub-version law. Dita Indah Sari was arrested on 3 July 1996 when she took part in a demonstration calling for a rise in the national minimum wage. The demonstration was entirely peaceful, yet it was blocked and violently dispersed by a heavy military and police presence. At least nine students and workers were arrested. Many were beaten, including Dita. Most were released, but Dita was kept in custody. Her trial was held in December 1999. At an appeal in July Dita's sentence was reduced to five years imprisonment.

Amnesty International believes, she was denied a fair trial, because she was convicted for peaceful political activities. In 1998 Dita Indah Sari was offered conditional release from prison, which would mean, that she could not engage in any political activity or travel overseas until the year 2002. Dita refused conditional release, because she claims, that she is innocent and should be released without any restrictions. Dita's family believe, that the international pressure being generated on her case was a factor in the government's decision to offer conditional release.

DISPUTE AT LSG LUFTHANSA SKY CHEF SACKED FOR ONE DAY'S OFFICIAL STRIKE

Sky Chef is the largest airline catering company in the world and this dispute is at its Heathrow operation. The airline catering business is extremely competitive with contracts being won & lost quite frequently. LSG has

been trying to improve its competitiveness by increasing the productivity of its workforce. The company proposed changes to working practices & to rostering designed to make savings. A trail period was agreed on - after some considerable industrial relations difficulties - on the basis that once the trail period was evaluated there would be negotiations to reach an

agreement on enhanced pay rates to be implemented in return for the changes. The negotiations were unsuccessful & the negotiating procedure exhausted, including attempts at conciliation by ACAS. The company refused to implement the status quo clause in the negotiating agreement & insisted that the new working practices stayed in despite the failure to reach agreement. On top of this they refused to pay a promised 1% pay increase. These issues brought all T&G members

throughout the operation into dispute.

After an informal ballot indicating overwhelming support for strike action a secret postal ballot was conducted. There was a 75% majority for strike action. The company was given notice of 4 different days of strike action. The first of these was on Friday 20th November 1998 &

there was overwhelming support from those rostered to work. They were all sent notices of summary dismissal by courier to their homes the same day. Since then more union members have gone on strike & been sacked. At a series of meetings members decided to continue the dispute until all those sacked have been reinstated.

The company have publicly refused

to discuss the dispute and are recruiting new employees. The T&G members remain remarkably solid & support is growing, both on the airport & throughout London. There is a regular picket outside the London offices of Lufthansa Sky Chef's regular customers.

DEFEND BESTWOOD COUNTRY PARK

The "No Tarmac Quarry At Bestwood Campaign" is trying to stop the Tarmac company digging a 32 acre sand quarry adjacent to Bestwood Country Park. This quarry will destroy wild flower meadows, kill 20,000 trees, be a safety hazard & risk to life for young people in the Bestwood area, and choke Bestwood Village & the surrounding roads with dust & heavy trucks.

On Monday February 1st, with our campaign 1 year old, we decided to take the initiative again. Ten members of the local campaign were joined by about 25 from the international environment group Earth First. We went to the Bestwood 2 quarry at Devil's Elbow on the Mansfield Road where we erected a 25 foot scatfolding tripod in the main driveway & locked the gates. When all work had stopped. & we had explained to the workers why we were there, we answered Tarmacs phones in the office. Customers were informed that the quarry was shut as Tarmac had decided their operations were too environmentally damaging to continue. This action was taken to illustrate to Tarmac the disruption that would be caused to our everyday lives if they go ahead with their proposals to quarry at Bestwood.

In June the County Council will decide upon the final planning conditions on Farmac's application before they begin quarrying. On June 8th 1999 Tarmac is holding its AGM in Birmingham. To be able to officially attend this meeting and put your questions & demonstrate your concern directly to the board of directors all you have to do is own one share in Farmac plc. We would like to take at least 100 people to the AGM which means buying shares & reissuing them to individuals, and booking coaches to Birmingham. To support the protest we are asking for £1, to buy a share £1.50 and to guarantee a place on the coach £5.



RECLAIM THE STREETSII

On the eve of the 21st century the list of woes facing us seems greater than ever - economic meltdown, the millennium bug, environmental crisis, war, famine, poverty all unconnected we are told by the experts. The global market economy is crumbling. As usual talk of reform is in the air, but a system based on 'survival of the fittest' & 'growth' can only continue to cause human misery while destroying the ecology of the planet. A new world is possible. A global movement of resistance is rising - people are reclaiming control of their lives. Across the world social & ecological movements are coming together, talking, taking direct action & enacting radical alternatives.

Activists from diverse groups & movements around the world are discussing, networking & organising for an international day of action on June 18th, aimed at the heart of the global economy: the financial centres, banking districts & multinational corporate power bases. Your participation, no matter how small, is crucial; meetings need to be organised, events planned, leaflets printed & distributed, funds raised, laughter & conversation shared. If we co-operate & co-ordinate we can realise a different world; has it ever been so necessary and so possible?

STOP THE DEPORTATION OF SHIRIN & HER DAUGHTER

Shirin Begum faces being separated from her parents. sisters, brothers & other family members in the UK with whom she has lived since August 1989. Her father has been resident in the UK for nearly 40 years & had brought his family here in 1989. Shirin was granted entry clearance to come & settle here & she's lived here ever since with her daughter Farida, who was born here. However when she was granted entry clearance she was divorced & still living home as his dependent as she was only 17. The Home Office has now declared her as an illegal immigrant because she did not declare the fact she was divorced. Shirin accepts she didn't tell them but this was an innocent mistake by a 17 year old girl. Shirin's daughter Farida is now 9, attending school in Leicester & does not know any other country but Britain. She is actually a British citizen. It would be unfair to remove her from home & her settled life & unfair to remove her mother.

BASFORD ACTION GROUP



When the planned closure of Northern Baths was announced local people formed the Save Northern Baths campaign, organising petitions, door knocking, meetings, demonstrations - including blocking Vernon Road - and a parade & carnival. Following information from contractors that they had been hired to board up & eventually bulldoze the pool (part of which is a listed building) the site was occupied. The council promised us an independent survey if we would end the occupation. This seemed to be a victory: we had been disputing council claims about the state of repair of the building & the cost of improvements & had asked for a 2nd opinion. Since then the council have consistently ignored our requests to fulfil their promise. Indeed at one Leisure Services meeting we attended it became apparent that few members of its committee were even aware this promise had been made! Not content with this, they closed the pool months ahead of schedule. Incredibly they tried to blame it on the occupation, saying we had damaged the pool - totally untrue. This was a cynical attempt to divide the Basford community over the issue. That's how much you can trust this council.

We accuse them of letting Northern Baths fall into disrepair in order to justify closing it - a charge they even
admit, saying to do repairs is "throwing good money
after bad". We urge people in other areas to look out
for the warning signs we experienced; lack of even
minor repairs to swimming pools, allowing them to be
vandalised, unexplained temporary closure & cutting
public swimming time. This is what's happening at
Noel Street & it's no coincidence that it's run by the
ex-Northern Baths manager.

The whole experience has opened our eyes to how little the council consider themselves accountable to the communities they represent & how little they care about Basford in general. As a result we formed the Basford Action Group last August. We are still campaigning for the pool to be reopened & facilities expanded, and also plan to tackle the council about local issues such as lack of school provision, the state of vernon Park & lack of leisure provision & green space in this area generally. We are also involved in attempting to halt council plans to close Victoria & Noel St. swimming baths. We urge everyone to form local groups. especially in Lenton & Bestwood as those pools are now targeted. Co-operation between groups will challenge the arrogance of the Labour City Council. They believe they can carry out cuts & closures, accountable to no-one. Groups like BAG will show them otherwise & continue to be a thorn in their side. NOTTINGHAM HUNT SABOTEURS

Nottingham Hunt Saboteurs are a group of like minded people who regularly take direct action against blood sports. We use a combination of voice and hunting horn to gain control of the hounds from the houndsman, these tactics save thousands of foxes every year. Most hunts go out at least twice weekly between early August & March. There are 12 mounted packs and 5 foot packs in the Nottm area alone, as well as a mink hunt from May to September. We also target shooting (people shoot grouse, pheasants and basically anything that moves!).

Direct action is the only way to tackle the hunters. The undemocratic "talking out" of the recent private members bill against hunting shows a Parliament dominated by the hunting fraternity.

Our tactics cause no harm to hounds, horses, or people. Hunters have made serious efforts to discredit us this comes as no surprise as people who torment animals for fun are bound to be bullies and thugs.

He has sent to work unloading earsto histor a since one of dangerous lobs in the country - with only a asualisation, where people are forced into low paid jobs little or no training, no job security, no sick pay & oliday pay means bigger profits for companies and more deaths & injuries for the people working for them.

Simon Jones was taking a year out from Sussex University when he was killed. The harrasment Simon eof from the dole made him take any job on ofter for ear of having his benefit stopped. He got the job through an agency. Personnel Selection, who should by law have checked the job was safe for him - they didn't. Throughout the country agencies make huge profits by providing cheap labour to companies. This government is busy creating a low pay economy where millions of people will be forced to take crappy jobs like Simon, or lose their benefits.

From the beginning the memorial campaign set up in Simon's name has been committed to direct action to

ensure that politicians don't get away with brushing his death, like so many others, under the carpet. Simon wrote for Schnews, the direct deten movement's week whouseher a was highligh in supporting direct action in support of the Liverpool dockers strike against the casualisation of their port.

On 1st Sept. 98. on what would have been Simon's 25th birthday we occupied the Shoreham dock owned b Euromin where Simon was killed. Two 80 foot towers are taken & banners reading "Simon Jones RIP"

Casualisation Kills" are unfurted. A wreath is layed a the dockside & leaflets handed out to sympathetic dock workers. Euromin are forced to close the docks & send all casual workers home on full pay. Two days later the Brighton offices of Personnel Selection are occupied. A banner reading "Murderers" is hung from the window. Leaflets are handed out & the office is shut down for the day, again workers are sent home on full pay.

Satpal Ram is serving a life sentence for defending himself against a racist attacker. His attacker died

only after refusing medical treatment. Satpal was found guilty of murder after bad legal advice and a refusal by the court to provide translators at his trial meant many defence witnesses were unable to give evidence. In October 1995, appeal judges again used the evidence of Satpal's attackers to uphold his conviction for murder, ignoring the fact that he was the victim of a racist attack. Satpal is appealing to the European Court of Human Rights. Because he is campaigning for justice Satpal has been continually harassed by the prison authorities who have moved him 57 times in eleven years and put him in individual segregation for months on end.

ment in community politics & Nottingham is no exception. The use they have made of local issues disguises their true colours & has given them publicity & an air of respectability.



last year when a group of residents discovered plans for closure contained in the City Council's "Leisure 2000" project. The Independent Residents Association have other plans....

Since last October we have initiated several public meetings (including a demonstration on the Forest with 200 people), a letter & poster campaign. The Council have since further incensed public opinion by proposing a £12 million replacement for Noel St Baths and Victoria Leisure Centre on one of the few remaining green areas in the city, the Forest Recreation Ground. We have subsequently seen support from the Open Space Society and the Civic Society.

Last Nov Clir Ian Maclemnan (Chair of City's Leisure Ctte) refused to debate Noel St. on local radio as "there were no plans to close Noel Street Baths'. We beg to differ.

This whole episode has highlighted a certain lack of democracy & accountability within the Council. We are not against a new leisure development, but along with the people of St Arms and Snienton (set to lose Victoria Leisure Centre), we will not sacrifice either much needed community facilities serving the most deprived areas of the city, or any more forest! 

In football racism has always been a problem. In the seventies and eighties racist chants and 'fans' throwing bananas at black players used to be common. The National Front and other Nazi groups targeted football grounds for newspaper sales and to whip up racial hatred.

Largely because of the campaigns that have been launched against racism in football, things are starting to change - but there is a long way to go. We still have the situation where only 1% of fans who go to football matches are black, and black managers and coaches are rare. Although thousands of Asians play football there aren't any Asian professional footballers.

But we're not just about challenging racism in football. we want it wiped out everywhere. It's our aim to encourage fans to follow the example of their heroes: enjoy, as they do, mixing with people from different backgrounds; celebrate each others culture; show just how easy it is for people to get along.


