
## Listergate Stall




### NEW OFFICE NEEDED

The co-ordinating meeting decided to give the necessary 6 months notice to quit 14 - 18 St. Mary's Gate and set up a sub-committee to look for more suitable and cheaper premises.

#### Background

Of the 440 ground launched cruise missiles to be deployed in Europe, 64 are planned for Molesworth. The essential difference between Greenham and Molesworth (apart from the fact that Molesworth is only 60 miles from Nottingham) is that while Greenham already existed as a USAF base, complete with security fence and personnel, the proposed Molesworth site consists of 48 acres of open If sufficiently large numbers of people gather on the site, their simply being there will prevent work going ahead, but if only a few are there, each person would have to risk arrest and charges and could only delay the work. CND's aim is to achieve the former: it has, therefore, launched a Pledge Scheme to mobilise as many people as possible so that no one has to take desperate action.

Before the US can start the construction of the cruise shelters, the government has to make the site 'secure' i.e. fence it in. US funding for the new base has been frozen until it is certain that the programme is viable. Put it another way, if the fence can't be erected (and kept erected) then the base cannot be built.

The US sub-committee dealing with the funding expressed doubts as to whether such a fence could be erected and maintained on that particular site in the face of possible largescale, well organised resistance.

The report concerned a row in the House of Lords concerning possible funding of the organisation by a registered charity 'Caroline Gourlay's Trust' and the assertion that "ex-NATO generals who have held high command should now be meeting with Soviet serving generals to discuss strategy in Europe is a matter of the gravest concern." 

#### Dear Nottingham CND,

I write this from my cell in Lincoln Prison where I have been sentenced to spend 20 days for refusing to pay a fine of £139.50 for my part in a demonstration at RAF Cottesmore last February. My 'crime' to paint peace slogans on a wall. This would seem a useful time to stop and reflect on what it is all about: on why I'm here. of 'acceptable' campaigning. We have to take our campaign up a stage, simply because if we don't we shan't win.

The demand for nuclear disarmament strikes at the very heart and soul of the ruling elite of the world. They're not going to give in without a fight.

I draw on our human culture, history and tradition. For all great changes in society over the last 800 years or more, have been brought about by people taking direct action. Taking control. Everything in our society that we hold dear has been fought for by non-violent (and violent) direct action. And those who took that action and suffered the consequences were regarded at the time as extremists and trouble-makers. Today the Levellers, Tolpuddle Martyrs, Suffragettes, Chartists, Conscientious Objectors command our respect and admiration.

Firstly, I felt I could not stand back and protest at a distance. I had to physically get in the way of the state's preparation for war. I felt a responsibility to history. To my past, my present and my future. Part of my family were murdered in Nazi concentration camps. And not enough of us interfered or got in the way. And I have a young friend called Rory who is 2 years and 4 months old, who according to his mother's will, I shall be legal guardian to in the event of her death. I am 25 years old and all my life I have lived under the shadow and threat of the cold war. I want something different for Rory. Something better. And that means doing interfering, taking direct action. For how will I be able to explain myself to Rory if I do anything less? I have often thought that in the face of my own mortality, the only way that I shall be able to give any sense or meaning to my life is if at the end of it I can look back and say 'at least I did my best.' How will I feel if at the end I look back and remember that I jumped when the murderers told me to jump, and marched where the criminals told me to march?

I took this step because I believe that just by coming together to positively affirm ourselves and our human spirit in direct action, we win a little. We re-discover and re-create in ourselves all that is best in our humanity and deny all that is corrupt and rotten. Means and ends come together. A direct

All this is very personal stuff. I would not push it onto anyone else. But I have other reasons too.

I honestly believe that this government (or any nuclear weapons government) will not give in to our demands just because action affinity group is a tiny but real expression of how I would like our world to be.

I take part in NVDA because it works. At this stage it brings us more in media publicity and propaganda and that publicity is crucial. If our movement keeps growing we will win. No government can defeat a people who insist on taking control of their lives.

Since August this year, Boots, one of Nottingham's largest companies, has been giving publicity to the Territorial Army. They have requested Senior Managers to assist wherever possible to '...further the Company's policy of support for the T.A.' This publicity has taken the form of articles in Boots News and a poster campaign at the Main Sites geared to recruiting staff to the Reserve, some of whom no doubt took part in Operation Lionheart in September. Boots have made provision for those interested to be given details of terms of service and how to join.

Way back in March 1984 Boots received a letter fron the MoD, signed by Michael bill is, as we know, devoted to sheltering the upper levels of the Civilian, Military and Police Authorities. The rest of us are advised to stay at home, hide behind a few doors, keep a supply of aspirins handy and listen to the radio.

The MoD and the Government abrQgate their responsibilities by assuring us of our security whilst at the same time exposing us to the obscenity of Nuclear War.

We must be the ones who do not abrogate our responsibilities as Human Beings.

Dear Nottingham CND,

At the A.G.M. we split into workshops to discuss Chilwell. All the workshops agreed that we needed more information, and that should the campaign against Chilwell continue, it should not remain simply one of Non Violent Direct Action but should involve local Neighbourhood Groups, Churches, Trade Unions (on and off the base), the County Council, Political Parties, etc., as well as NVDA groups.

Should such a campaign be decided upon it would seem sensible to form some sort of co-ordinating body to ensure that the campaign does work on a broad basis.

discipline and initiative inherent in T.A. training...' which are, of course, '...as important to the community and as beneficial to the employer as they are to the Armed Forces.'

Mr. Heseltine speaks of the T.A. as being'...highly cost effective; providing some 30% of the mobilised strength of the British Army for about  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  of the Army Budget.' The T.A. is a volunteer reserve which is comparatively ill-trained and ill-equipped, through which the Government wishes to make a saving by increasing the British Army's reliance on it's cost effective nature. At the same time, they assure the public that Civil Defence expenditure, at 0.21% of the Military Budget is equally cost effective. The £45 million annual CD


What worries me is that the people who expressed an interest in setting up such a group were for the most part people already involved in NVDA. If people who have interests and experience in other fields don't come forward and take on the work involved, then any Chilwell Group will by default be dominated by NVDA activists. As a result the campaign against Chilwell will continue only as Non Violent Direct Action, undoubtedly far less effective than a comprehensive multi-area campaign - and we will only have outselves to blame.





Clausewitz, the great nineteenth century theoritician on winning wars, argued that defence is always stronger than offence. Defence knows the ground and has the support of the population; offense has the advantage of surprise in time and place - but once only. Stan Windass, Director of "Just Defence" and the Defence Research Trust, speaking to students and the public in Trent Polytechnic's Open Programme, argued that developing technologies are enhancing defence.

## NUCLEAR-FREE DEFENCE:

NECESSARY ? POSSIBLE ? A DISCUSSION

introduced by DAVID WOOD (involved in pre-war antifascist peace movement; in army 1940 - 46.) SUNDAY JANUARY 6th Friends' Meeting House, Clarendon St. 7.30.

"Advances in surveillance and 'transparency', due largely to micro-electronics, make it easier for defenders to locate enemy forces, and to eliminate the the danger of surprise attack. Similar advances in armour-penetrating and precision-guided munitions make it increasingly easy to destroy ships, tanks, and aircraft. Invasion is a big,visible and expensive activity. In comparison, defence can become increasingly small, invisible and cheap."

There is no future for tank crews, sailors and pilots in the next war. A sound and much cheaper defence policy is becoming increasingly possible and sensible. Nuclear weapons are beginning to be recognised as unusable; once this recognition has been "institutionalised" negotiated reduction becomes a matter of course, and elimination - or near elimination - a possibility.  (i) as Macchiavelli hinted, states need enemies to stimulate loyalty to the government;

(ii) the powerful military-industrial complexes depend for their prosperity upon irrational tensions and repeated demands for new and more expensive weapons.
