International Children's Art Exhibition

Exhibitionists of the World

THE INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION OF Children's Creative Art has so far received sizeable contributions of work from Japan, New Zealand, the Soviet Union, Yugoslavia and West Germany. The work spans the areas of painting, drawing, pastel work, printmaking, collage, sculpture and poetry. Further contributions are anticipated from other countries, including Britain.

Within the Exhibition's general theme of Peace, Nuclear Weapons and the Arms Race have emerged subjects such as Resettlement, Protection of the environment, nuclear shelters, the Joy of Peace, Man in Space and Man - a beast. We have been impressed by the thoughtfulness and power of the children's work and its general high standard.

We are currently arranging a programme of Exhibition venues starting with the Central Library Foyer during the first week in April. Following this, the display will be shown in a Derbyshire Secondary School and, in May, will move to County Hall, West Bridgford. It is hoped that school parties will visit the exhibition during this time. The United Nations Association (London) wishes to show the Exhibition as part of its activities in this International Year of Peace.

Spin-Off.

Hamilton CND New Zealand have suggested that we, in Nottingham, might like to form a twinning link with them. We feel that the involvement of many countries with this venture is helping to foster and cement international co-operation, friendship and trust. Through the help of Greenpeace (who provided for us a set of photographs taken of the evacuation of islanders from Rongelap in the Pacific) we are making the plight of the Rongelap people a focal point of the Exhibition. Further to this, we are developing for teacher and pupil visitors to the Exhibition, a set of follow-up study packs for English (creative essay writing), Social Studies, Geography and Cultural Studies through Art and Drama.

We are asking any neighbourhood groups who would like to have the Exhibition in their area to get in touch, so that dates and venues can be arranged. We would also point out that the Exhibition about Hiroshima-Nagasaki and the state of the arms race is available to any group who may wish to use it. We will make a small charge of £5 for small groups for each hiring in the hope that this will help to offset the colossal cost of mounting the contributions of work for the International Exhibition of Children's Art.

Greenham Women's Peace Camp has been a beacon of light in the dark to millions over the world. Don't let that light go out! Please go and stay a night or two if you can - or more if possible and please get this letter copied and sent to 5 or 10 more women or groups.

FEB6 Back from the Front Line?

AS MANY PEOPLE MAY know, there was some activity at USAF Molesworth the other week - it was in all (or at least some) of the daily newspapers, you remember!

Well, the National Mass Blockade of Molesworth was an unblemished success. Close to 6,000 people risked arrest in the biggest single act of civil disobedience since the '60s. The blockade remained solid throughout the day, despite the appalling conditions and not one vehicle went in or out of Molesworth during the course of the 9 hour sit-down.

As far as we in Nottingham are concerned it should be recorded that the 320 odd people who travelled down from here in the middle of a freezing cold mid-winters night to sit for 3 hours in snow and ice, facing the possibility of police custody is an achievement which greatly behoves the credibility, commitment and determination of our movement. There were also over 40 office volunteers, press persons and back-up drivers in Nottm. who, as it happened, didn't have to put in the long hours work they had prepared for. No-one from this area was arrested. Nottingham also provided a lot of the gate stewards, communications people, drivers and so on for National CND so we can claim 400 local people directly involved on the day. A stupendous achievement!!

The blockade again gave a strong message to the government that the Peace movement intends to resist cruise deployment at every step and in every way possible and will resist attempts to intimidate and dissuade the public from peaceful protest. We are not going to go away. The very fact that many hundreds of those in the blockade were taking part in civil disobedience for the first time means that the campaign against cruise is not weakening - it is growing!! The scale of Mr. Heseltine's Falklands-style invasion last year was intended as a signal to the Peace movement to 'pack up and go home'. Well, we've outlasted him and Feb 6th will live in our hearts and minds as another focus of cruise resistance - resistance which has lasted SIX YEARS!! Six years of resistance at Greenham and Molesworth. On Feb 6th we put ourselves in the front line at Molesworth - a genocide base being built in our lifetimes, before our children's eyes. If we remain silent we condone the evil which is being done in our name. What will we tell our children? They share our nuclear nightmare but they will reap the tragic harvest of our indifference.

We must never forget that we are ALL in the front line; every last one of us. We must never forget that.

Cruise continues to threaten us all and Feb 6th is in the past - now we must move forward; plan, organise, mobilise and act for a peace free from the threat of nuclear destruction.

MONEY MONEY MONEY

There are a number of demands on NCND funds and for a sensible discussion of priorities at next month's members meeting, it is important for us to understand the position.

The financial situation:
We have in savings £1,000 (deposit a/c) plus £4,000 (high interest a/c), the latter representing our grant from the County Council for the next 3 years.

The office:
We are committed to a 3 year lease which was negotiated on the understanding that the CC grant would back it, i.e. we have to budget for 3 years.

The Peace Festival:
Although the PF has been given as one example of NCND activities, it has always been made quite clear by those with whom we've negotiated on the County Council that the money is to be spent by NCND as we see fit. It was our decision last year to devote half of the CC grant to the PF and this cost us £750.

Basic Case Campaign:
Unlike 1985, this year sees the start of an ambitious and costly campaign of public education that extends throughout the year. We have budgeted 12 months' activity, starting in April, at over £5,000 which will have to be financed by a combination of savings and fundraising.

PEACE 86?

Once upon a time Nottm. CND decided to hold a Peace Festival, it was so successful that it has continued ever since.

As we begin to organise this year's - the 6th - perhaps we should think about why we should put so much time and energy into organising the event and its relevance to the peace movement in 1986.

There are many good reasons for NCND to continue with the Festival. It has become an annual event, people see the posters and know that it's worth coming to. It certainly attracts more people than any other NCND event. Each year we have more stalls from local community and voluntary groups (60 in 1985) and more commercial ones who pay us well. This means that many more people get to know what CND is about. The Festival is vital to the Basic Case campaign. The Festival is an excellent way of reaching people from a range of backgrounds who can then disseminate information about CND to other members of their group and to their friends.

Secondly, this is International Year of Peace and, if we run the Festival under the slogan of "Peace 86", we will be able to involve a lot more solidarity, campaigning and interest groups in the Festival - it is rumoured that even CVS will be there this year! CND has not been very good in the past at attracting support from the various ethnic groups. A broader based festival gives us the chance to make links and develop contacts with people from the Black communities. Further, people who have got involved in some voluntary or community group will know how hard it is to get resources to run their activities or to provide services, they are likely to appreciate our arguments about the costs of nuclear weapons and how these resources could be better used for the community's benefit. If we can produce this sort of information, then we can exploit the opportunities afforded by the Festival to communicate with people we wouldn't normally reach. Broadening the Festival in this way also allows us to apply for more grants and to raise money. The Festival has never cost NCND any money - even with last year's appalling weather! - we have always broken even or made a profit. The County Council has already given money towards the next 4 Festivals.

Thirdly, the publicity that the Peace Festival generates in the local media and generally in the city ensures that NCND remains in the public eye for another month.

Finally - the day is fun - it makes the rest of the slog of campaigning a little easier!

The idea of what the Peace Festival is and what it should be this year will be discussed at the March Monthly Meeting - so come along and contribute your views!

"Gates of Greenham" at Sheffield

DID YOU KNOW THAT a choral drama, "The Gates of Greenham" was given its first performance at the Royal Festival Hall last Easter with Sheila Hancock as the narrator? Despite the "SOLD OUT" signs, a few people managed to get in at the last moment when it was obvious that none of the press seats would be filled.

A recording with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, the Quaker Festival Chorus, and Sheila Hancock again narrating will be issued on the Sain label late in March. Those who heard it live evidently found it a deeply moving experience; many of the choir had been profoundly affected by it in rehearsals. Now there is a chance to hear it live again, and locally (details below). Sheffield City Council are sponsoring the production to mark International Peace Year.

The work follows the story of the Greenham camps from the start. The music begins in a celebratory mood as the women assemble and discover new forms of community, friendship, spirituality and partnership despite the miseries of mud and cold, fines and prison. As threats, harassment and vilification increase, the mood becomes bleak and despairing, leading up to the emergence of Cruise missiles from the base. Gradually, the women's sheer courage, suffering and persistence reaffirms hope for a reborn world.

Most of the words are quotations from the women themselves, spliced with references from William Blake, Martin Luther King, Gandhi, Jung, George Fox and Kahlil Gibran among others, reminding us of Greenham's place in the long tradition of struggle for peace and social justice. The orchestra itself combines orchestral and rock instruments. The music is full of tunes, energy, drama. If it were about cats or dogs, we'd be hearing a lot more of it but, as the empty press seats proved, "peace" let alone "Greenham", isn't seen as marketable.

Sheffield is only 40 miles; why not get a group together to go?

The Bulletin should be used as an opportunity to raise the level of awareness and commitment of our members as well as stretching out to a wider audience by factual arguments on all aspects of the Nuclear issue. It should become a means of education and recruitment.

It was the opinion of the Radcliffe group that the quality of reproduction was of secondary importance to the quality of the message it carries. We also need a lot more fun, cartoons, humorous articles. Fun and satire can often carry a greater impact when all else fails. Finally, I am sure that we should sell copies to non-members - there are a lot of people who support our case yet do not join, who would welcome the opportunity of playing a part and any conscious act for peace, however small, is a plus.

Let's go out for involvement, expansion and with fun and comradeship we will win. It's a great cause - let's enjoy it too.

DOUNREAY AND DOMESDAY

Tony Benn said at the Sizewell Inquiry: "In plain language, every British Nuclear power station has become a nuclear bomb factory for the USA. British civilian power stations have always been important to the USA as providers of plutonium for both US and British weapons. The USA relies on our reprocessing industry.

Now comes an opportunity to raise objection to the environment disaster which nuclear technology has begun. In April this year, a Planning Enquiry will begin into the proposals by British Nuclear Fuels and United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority to build an 80

ton a year capacity Reprocessing Plant in Scotland at Dounreay.

The subject arouses very strong emotions, particularly as day by day Windscale/Sellafield lurches from one disaster to another. All the same, the case against the development at Dounreay must be made factually, it must be well-researched, scientificallly based and realistic. As an objector, I expect to spend as much time on research in Libraries as on rallying support from all those concerned for themselves and their children.

Arguments must issue from a sound understanding of the facts or we shall attract the same kind of cynicism which attracted those who proclaimed "The end of the world is nigh" in 1800, 1900 or whenever.

During recent months, the USSR has made a series of very positive peace moves.

It took the unilateral action we so often call for in announcing on Hiroshima Day 1985 a 6 month moratorium on nuclear tests and, in spite of continued American, French and British tests, has extended this moratorium to March 31. It has reiterated its support for a Nuclear Free and for a Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty. It has proposed that the superpowers halve their nuclear arsenals as a first stage in a plan for the removal of all weapons of mass destruction by the end of the century. It has stated its readiness to destroy all its European SS20s on the spot with international inspectors looking on, if NATO will match the move. This would, of course, involve British nuclear weapons.

We now have the CHANCE OF A LIFETIME to campaign in response to these offers. Against this background we can show the British public that independent - or unilateral - nuclear disarmament by Britain would not be a pointless gesture, but a very positive step towards a progressive world reduction in nuclear arms.

It is time CND finally abandoned the myth that the superpowers are equally responsible for the arms race. Because of media bias and blackout, most people do not know what the Soviet offers are. We must not be afraid to publicize them in our forthcoming Extended Public Information campaign on the Positive Advantages of British Nuclear Disarmament.
