



BLOODY SCROUNGERS

The government's intention to maintain unemployment at a high enough level to undermine wage-levels and workers' collective strength, is all too clear beneath their public pretence of concern about 'the problem' and determination to resolve this problem. Hand in hand with this hypocrisy goes the ploy of keeping the media focussed on allegations of claimants being workshy, moonlighters, fraudulent and generally depraved. A spineless, arse-licking sensation hungry press, obsessed with denigrating any singled-out group, has all too eagerly continued to follow the established line of sticking the boot into the unemployed; -'They mustn't be allowed to sink further into their already evident indolence' - 'The benefit system is far too easy to take illegal advantage of', etc.

Little interest will ever be shown by the media in the ways in which we must overcome bureaucratic obstacle courses in order to get our entitlements, and then put up with random and deliberate victimising harrasment from the various DE and SS Fraud Squads. Not newsworthy. These things happen all the time, and serve the government's purpose of keeping claimants on the defensive.


The government in Eire has taken this policy one step further by allowing benefit offices to remove claimants from the register if they decide that the claimants have not satisfactorily proved their constant determined search for work. Benefits have been increasingly cut in this arbitrary manner.

As a result of this latest assault, claimants are being forced to comply with the government's face-saving pretence that there really are jobs out there, and that all we need to do is keep looking eight hours a day, five days a week, and sooner or later the Benefit Offices can close down. The presumption is that we are paid enough to keep us alive, so our time is not our own. We owe it to the government to dedicate our lives to full-time job searching, should the government demand this of us.




In Dundalk, the claimants have been protesting against this state of affairs. They maintain that such pressure on an already very neglected large group of unemployed people only makes the burden of coping with a jobless life (in a society that still regards paid work as an essential qualification to respectability and acceptance) much heavier. Moreover it is quite impossible for the Benefit Offices to devise reasonable criteria by which to assess how keenly the individual claimant has been job-hunting.

Hopefully the claimants' action will make the government in Eire rethink. Their success in defeating this scheme may well be crucial in influencing the British government one way or the other in its inevitable consideration of similar measures.

I once tried buying everything in 'economy size' packs, but that left me without any money for the last six days before my next giro, by which time I was considering eating my way through the packet of washing powder.


Then, in the queue, about nine people in front of me, and the woman at the checkout is waiting to find out the price of some unmarked item. I started thinking about those scenes from history when working class rebels used to go shopping without money.

In Spain, especially Madrid and Barcelona, shortly before the Civil War, workers used to go around with pistols and nobody dared ask them for money - free food, free transport..... (but these days you keep seeing mugs given worthless medals or handshakes after risking life and limb to protect their bosses' property from armed raiders). But then Franco and his cronies decide it was time to put the workers back in their place, and brought along bigger guns much to the delight of the bosses.

Then in Italy, in the 70s, they didn't need guns - they'd all storm in together, take what they wanted and storm out again before the cops came. Everyone who happened to be in the store at the time would join in, and anyone who got in the way would just get pushed aside. By the time the cops arrived, the only people left would be the Maoists who would be standing on the tables explaining why people should pay for the real value of the goods but not for the bosses' profits. This time it was mainly the Communist Party that put the workers back in their place, bringing tanks out onto the streets of Bologna, where indiscipline was threatening the profitable running of business.

But of course this is Britain, nothing happens here, at least not often.

At last it's all over, and I'm out again in the fresh air of Holloway Road. I might as well pop into the Unwaged Center and see if anyone there feels like appealing to the Government's humanity and asking for more money for the unwaged.



UNEMPLOYED used as SCABS

At the Guardian, bastion of liberal sentiments, management have been using unemployed workers as casual scabs against an overtime ban by print workers. As casual workers they have no chance of getting permanent work there, and will only be of use to the management until the workers' struggle has been defeated.

Of course, in our imposed poverty we all need to get more money when ever we can, however we can. But by allowing ourselves to be used against our waged sisters and brothers we can only make conditions worse, for them and for us.

The bosses and the state want to use us to force down wages and conditions at work. They keep us in poverty so that we will be forced to take on any grotty job, any pay and any conditions to escape the poverty of the dole. The Youth Training Scheme is intended to encourage young people to expect bad pay and conditions, and to make them produce goods that can compete with the slave-labour in South Korea etc. They want to use the poverty they impose on us to destroy the conditions gained by a century of struggle by the working class.

The only way to fight back against this situation where our own struggle for survival can be used against us and our sisters and brothers in work is for us to join the struggle for better conditions for all of us. Obviously we are not in a position to go on strike, but we can support the strikes and picket lines of the waged in struggle, and we can directly fight against our condition in many ways. There are a lot of us, and we must get together to fight back (this does not mean that everyone has to join IAGOU, but it might help). We will never get anything without a struggle.

Only by fighting against our own poverty, by going out to get enough so that we don't have to compete for jobs and so force down wages, can we stop our poverty being used against us by those that impose it on us.

FIGHT BACK NOW

Islington Action Group of the Unwaged is a group of local unwaged people who have come together to fight for our rights and interests. The group is open to everyone who is not in paid work. That is people:

- on MSC schemes,
- who receive any kind of benefit,
- children at school or not,
- pensioners,
- and all those who don't do paid work but are barred from claiming benefit.

The group is autonomous, not connected to any party or any outside interests, but works within the labour movement (supporting the struggles of both waged and unwaged) and against any attempt by union and party leaders etc. to control and impose their interests on us and on workers.

We do not claim to represent anyone other than ourselves, but as we are all unwaged, we believe that our struggles for our own interests are also in the interests of other unwaged people. If you disagree with what we are saying and doing or have different ideas about how we should be fighting, come and tell us. We are always willing to discuss our ideas and listen to new ones. If you agree with us, then why not come and join us; the more of us there are the more we can achieve.




We are not experts in benefit rights but between us we have suffered many of the obstacles put in the way of claimants, and can give some advice and support. If you are expecting a visit from the Fraud Squad etc. give us a call and we'll send somebody round to give you immoral support.


At the moment we are mainly concentrating on campaigning against the Racist Checks, trying to find shops willing to give concessions to the unwaged, and planning for a possible demo in the summer, but if you have any ideas for campaigns, bring them along to a meeting, Thursdays 2 - 5.

ARE YOU MOTIVATED?

The main problem of seeking employment is a general lack of motivation. On looking around a jobcentre, at the different boards, one is quick to notice how impersonal they have become; no longer is there time to chat about ones employment problems with an experienced counsellor. You just pick up a card, fill in a form, and try your luck at the desk. Encouragement from the staff will be minimal, since they receive a fixed salary - the job centres receive no commission from the employers, who are quick to take advantage of the situation, by offering poor rates of pay, which we are expected to be overjoyed at.



However, if you decide to visit a commercial agency to seek temporary employment, there is a greater sense of motivation, since the agency receives a large commission for its efforts. But the motivation is wrongly directed, as they are only interested in their pockets. Most temporary unskilled workers are well and truly exploited. In 1979 I was paid an hourly rate of £2.50, compared with an offer of £2 in 1983. Remember, you are only paid for the hours you do, no sick pay or holiday pay. The Scrooge employers are still with us. It is sad that the days of genuine individual help are over and the days of impersonalism and exploitation are with us.




The Unwaged Centre is run by unwaged people, not by paid workers, who tend (no matter how good their intentions) to take control away from the unwaged, by passing on only the information they think we need and mediating between us and other groups, instead of us having direct contact and control over what is said. Our experience has shown that once someone is seen to take over control and seems to be running things for us, people lose interest and stop fighting for themselves. Nobody can fight our battles for us.

At the Centre we have duplicators, photocopier, typewriter, paper, spray cans, film projector, coffee, TV, creche facilities, etc. etc.

CON CESSION ?

At least twice in the last month the GLC has put on concerts under its London Against Racism banner and advertised them extensively as being £2 and £1 for UB4Os and other concessions. There was last week's Redskins and Billy Bragg doublebill held at Acklam Hall (The Redskins' anger and Billy Bragg's sexism) & before that the gig with amongst others: Johnny Osbourne, Misty et al. at the Academy in Brixton.

Both times when claimants arrived at the venues they were told there was no concession. They could pay the full amount or leave - there were plenty of others wanting to get in.

At the gig in Ladbroke Grove a number of claimants voiced their indignation and anger, imbetween the 'Defend the GLC' and laughable "You working-class people" sloganeering. And at the end of the performances, in reply to their shouting, the presenter apologised but pointed out it was the decision of the GLC. The great fairy godmother of unwaged youth, in a threadbare dress.

However, there are some places that actually do give concessions to help keep us off the streets. For example there is the Michael Sobell Sports Centre in Hornsey Road, where the unwaged can enjoy free


with concessions on other activities. Check with them for details.

All ILEA courses are £1 for the unwaged, for however many you want to do (but remember if you do more than 21 hours a week studying, your benefit could be cut off), and there are various courses from pottery to bike maintainance at the Ormond Road Workshop for £1 a term.

Also there are concessions at various gigs, cinemas and theatres, especially the trendy ones.

But if playing games that never lead anywhere, studying things you will never use or gazing passively at culture don't manage to take your mind off the misery of the dole (and the misery of work), come along to the Unwaged Centre and play games that lead somewhwere, or else stay on the streets and play, now that the weather is picking up. I think it may be a hot summer.



RACIST CHECKS

The Department of Employment (as it is called in newspeak) is still planning to bring in Racist Checks at the dole office, but as usual the government is being rather cagey about telling us when, no doubt hoping to bring it in when the fuss has died down or when we're all too busy fighting other attacks.


Under the scheme, counter clerks will be ordered to visually assess all claimants and classify them under ;

1. West Indian / African
2. Asian
3. Others
4. Refusals




The government claims that this this is part of their commitment 'to the fight against discrimination and the promotion of equal opportunities for all'. The governments record, including the racist Nationality Act, the introduction of passport checks at hospitals, housing agencies, colleges and universities and dole offices, police harrasment of the black community etc shows this 'commitment' to be just another piece of newspeak ie a blatant lie.

Race statistics have always been used to encourage and justify racism, never to fight it. If these stastics are brought out, they will not be used to show how black people are discriminated against in employment, but to suggest that they are all a bunch of scroungers.




This information (apart from those classified under 'Others') will then be put on the computer under each person's National Insurance number, and so will be available to claimant harrasment units, to help them target specific groups, as well as to the police and other 'authorised' groups.

The scheme is supposed to be voluntary and all claimants have the right to refuse to be assessed, but the only official notification we will have will be one small poster in English hidden somewhere around the Dole Office. Counter clerks can be disciplined for pointing this poster out to us, or informing us in any other way of what is happening.




We must fight against these racist checks, and against all attempts to intimidate and divide claimants, and we must fight for ourselves, not rely on others to do it for us.

JAPAN

BASTION

Two years ago, a group of secondary school pupils in Japan attacked a group of unemployed people and killed some of them, saying that such people are the scum of humanity because they did not work. Some adults criticised them, saying that they did not know the value of humanity. Considering the pressure put on these kids to instil the work-ethic into them, such criticism is pure hypocrisy. These kids are just a mirror of the values dominating Japanese society.

Despite the 'miracle' of Japanese economic success (particularly the high rate of development and lack of serious labour disputes), Japan, like other countries, is suffering from economic depression. According to official statistics the unemployed figure has reached nearly 2 million, and the number of bankruptcies was more than 1600 in March 1983 - the highest in Japan's history. Exports have gone down more than 10% and wages have fallen for two successive years.

However, while small companies are being severely hit by the recession, large companies are increasing production, and the differentials are growing. Wages at small companies are only about 60% of those at large companies.

When my elder brother started work for one of the big banks after leaving university, he was apid more than my father, who had worked at a small building company as an architect for more than 20 years. This is why forty percent of a generation want to go to university in Japan. Some school-leavers try to enter university for many years in vain.

Big companies never employ workers who have resigned from other companies - it is normal for Japanese workers to work for the same company all their life. The company is like a family - organising family events, trips etc. When Japanese workers introduce themselves, they always give their company's name before their own. Sometimes, particularly in large companies, pressure is put on workers to buy their own company's shares, and to save a part of their wages at the company's accounts department, both of which help enforce workers' loyalty to the company.

The only unions in Japan are company unions, and one of the quickest ways of getting to be a director is by being active in the union. If ever a union does come into conflict with the company, the company often sets up a new union and persuades the workers to join it, either by threats or by deliberately yielding to the new union.

Under these conditions, Japanese workers work very hard, often doing overtime without claiming for it. A friend of mine who worked for a large bank was expected to collect such large amounts of money, that he had to get all his friends and relations to deposit their money with him along with his salary. Eventually, after he had lost his health and given up trying to get promotion, he said that he found it abnormal to work so hard. But if he had worked for a small company he would not have been able to give up working so hard, and for immigrant workers from Korea etc. things are even worse.

A lot of pressure is also put on children. They are expected to get high grades at school, to get to university, which is a prerequisite to becoming a 'good industrial soldier' of the future. This overexpectation by parents and society imposes a heavy burden on children. This (along with the fact that many Japanese girls are told by their parents that they are not wanted, and that the only honourable thing for them to do is kill themselves) gives Japanese children an excessively high suicide rate.

Japanese wives are supposed to serve their husbands like slaves. Women are supposed to give up their jobs when they marry - it is an unwritten law. Some women have managed to sue companies for sex discrimination, but most of them were forced to resign anyway due to being ostracized at work. Women should be at home to take care of their husbands - the 'industrial soldiers' - and the children; this is a slogan of the Japanese government.

OF THE WORK ETHIC

The condition of the unemployed in Japan is very hard, especially for the young.

A young friend of mine who wanted to be a 'good worker' as expected by society, resigned from his local government office job because he found it unattractive. afterwards he told me he couldn't relax because his parents and neighbours looked on him as a stranger. When he went for a walk he felt he was being watched. I could only tell him to play more and do whatever he wanted. After a month he disappeared. When his parents phoned me to ask if I knew where he was, they said that he was being treated by a psychoanalyst.

As well as the social and mental problems, the economic situation of the unemployed is very difficult. Unemployment benefit is only paid to those who have worked for at least a year. The allowance is 60% of a person's previous wages, but is only paid for 3 months for those in their 20s, 6 months for those in their 30s and 8 months for those over 40. After that they get nothing.

Until five years ago, the allowance was given for 6 months to all the unemployed after a minimum of 6 months work. The change was made supposedly to improve conditions for the older unemployed, but considering the growing numbers of unemployed youth, the state has made great savings at the expense of young people, and their families who have to support them.

There are some job-training centres financed by the government, but the training is very old-fashioned - for skills that no company needs. The centres are only useful for employing arrogant government officials. at a course which my girlfriend went to 2 years ago, there were 20 pupils all in their 20s. when the course finished after 6 months, 3 of them managed to find regular work.


Under such conditions it is difficult for the youth to fight back.

In Britain and in Ireland where I recently visited, people always told me that they had never yet met a Japanese who wasn't a 'businessman' and who wasn't 'interested in money'. I must destroy this evil image of the Japanese, by helping to build a new culture and a new generation in Japan. working to build a new society in Japan will show a true solidarity with the oppressed nations. Japan must not be allowed to become the Britain of Asia.

This article was written by a young man visiting from Japan, and edited quite a lot by us. The situation in Japan is more oppressive than in Britain, but for years the British state has been studying the 'efficiency' of the Japanese economy and trying to find ways of doing the same thing here - including the reimposition of Victorian Morals. To stop this happening we must fight back now.

IN JAPAN AND BRITAIN

THE STRUGGLE IS THE SAME



The 14th of February is, as everyone knows, St Valentine's Day. But on that day in 1945 it wasn't Valentine cards that the British and US Air Forces were dropping on the German city of Dresden; it was bombs, that caused a fire storm and flattened the city. In all about 200,000 people died in this bombing - we shall never know the exact figure because the city was packed with refugees, mainly from the east where the Russians were steadily advancing, because many of the bodies were immediately dumped in mass graves for reasons of hygiene, and because the fire storm melted some bodies so much that it was impossible to tell where one corpse ended and the next began.

The fact that this horrific devastation was carried out with conventional, ie non-nuclear weapons, shows how absurd it is to campaign against a particular weapon, rather than trying to stop war itself. Obviously in a war each state will be out to win, and will use any weapon at its disposal to achieve this. Only an idiot could believe that with the Official Secrets Act and the vast areas of land occupied by the military and totally inaccessible to the general public, The British or Russian state would get rid of any weapon, despite any amount of "commitment".

World War II started in effect from the signing of the Versailles treaty in 1919, when the victors of World War I tried to ensure that German capital would be unable to compete effectively for colonies against Britain, France etc. But as German capital grew between the wars, having crushed the workers' revolution by 1920, its need for markets also grew, and a new confrontation became inevitable.

The Nazis played on the terms of the Versailles Treaty - the occupation of the important mining areas of Alsace and Lorraine, the presence of Allied Forces all over the country, and their inability to form their own army capable of fighting 'to defend the homeland', ie to go out and get colonies. They, along with the 'Communist Party' claimed that Germany was an oppressed nation (because it was not allowed to join in the oppression of the Third World) in much the same language as the 'peace movement' today, especially in Britain and Germany, when they refer to US troops as an 'occupation force', and attack US imperialism, while ignoring what is left of British imperialism and its aim to recreate its former 'greatness'.

The threat of war is held over us to keep us in order - we are expected to stop all our own struggles for our own interests, so that we can concentrate on getting rid of the bomb.
