Report by Ian Cohen: 24th September Joint CND/Stop the War **Coalition/Muslim Association of Britain Demonstration in Central London**

The demonstration was organised around the joint themes of End the Occupation, Defend Civil Liberties, Defend the Muslim Community. It started from Parliament Square with a march to a rally in Hyde Park. A coach was organised from Nottingham with members from CND, StW and the local Muslim community involved.

The weather was ideal, dry, sunny but not too warm. The march was very lively and colourful and made a real impact on Central London. The rally at the end was also very effective with some excellent speeches particularly from Jeremy Corbyn, Tony Benn, John Pilger and Bruce Kent. There were also some moving contributions from families of soldiers against the war whose sons/brothers/husbands have been killed in Iraq.

Coming as it did on the eve of the Labour Party Conference it kept the issues firmly on the agenda, drawing attention to the Public Opinion Polls showing that 58% of the British Public are against the war and want the troops brought home.

TRIDENT REPLACEMENT? An article by Richard Norton Taylor in Oct 5th Guardian describes how both the US and UK governments seem to be stifling debate on weapons policy. The Pentagon has removed from its website a document on joint nuclear operations for US chiefs of staff. In its guidance for US commanders it envisages nuclear use to pre-empt a possible attack by a country, terrorist or criminal group with 'weapons of mass destruction.' This barely-noticed doctrine envisages the use of US nuclear weapons in conflicts where they would previously have been considered illegal. At a recent press conference, US chief of staff Myers denied it lowered the nuclear threshold though neither he nor Defence Secretary Rumsfeld had yet read it! A UK defence official told the Guardian 'There is no need for a debate now. When the time comes there will be a debate.' That, presumes Norton Taylor, will be when it is too late to make any difference to what the government has already decided, in private with Washington.

WRITE TO YOUR MP - Clare Short has come third in the Private Members Ballot and has adopted a Bill proposed by Neil Gerrard MP called the Parliamentary Approval for Participation in Armed Conflict Bill. This Bill seeks to change the law so that war can only be declared and troops be deployed if Parliament as a whole approves it. At the moment the Prime Minister does not need such approval from Parliament. The Bill has its second reading on Friday 21st October and Friday is the day on which many MPs return to their constituencies so they will need pressure from you to get them to remain in London for the reading.

There is also an Early Day Motion number 85 which your MP can sign to show approval of this Bill. Even if your MP is already committed to returning to the constituency, signing the EDM will help.

Derby Weekend 22nd to 24th October. This event was highlighted in our last bulletin but we do need people to come and participate. On Saturday afternoon there will be mass leafletting to highlight the hazards of nuclear materials to the people of Derby who live close to the Rolls Royce factory on Raynesway. This plant manufactures the nuclear reactors and nuclear fuel which powers Trident submarines. The leaflets aim to highlight health and safety issues as well as the fact that we in the East Midlands are not prepared to let this continue. To travel to Derby we will most likely catch the Red Arrow coach from Victoria Bus Station. Then in the evening at 7pm there is a public meeting on nuclear health and safety and diversification which is being held at the English Martyrs' Church Hall, Alvaston. On Monday 24th October there will be a peaceful demonstration at Rolls Royce Raynesway, Derby. Buses for Derby leave Nottingham at convenient times.

Travel Arrangements: If you come to help leaflet and travel by car, parking is good in Derby once you get there. It is a challenge to get to the centre because of roadworks - use the Multi Storey by the Tourist Information Centre and Assembly Rooms near to the traffic island by Derby City Council Offices or the Eagle Shopping Centre Multistorey which is well signposted. Approach the city by the A52 into the City Centre or the A6 and look out for City Centre sliproads. Derby in my view is poorly signposted but the Tourist info centre will give you a map and directions. Give yourself time or bring a map with you.

Spondon Station is a short walk from Raynesway and is on the Nottingham Derby line - times should be available by telephone for weekends and weekdays or online.

If you come by car to the meeting venue there some parking at the English Martyrs Hall and plenty of sidestreet parking in Lincoln Avenue, or Brighton Rd just close by. If you come to the Blockade ensure your car is looked after by someone. The police will protect the demonstration and please take care of your safety on the dual carriageway which is Raynesway. There are good paths to walk along and grassy areas on which to demonstrate. Bring banners and signs by all means to draw attention to the demo and we hope create an impression for press and TV on the day. We do not envisage being there later than 2 to 3pm on the 24th. Trident Ploughshares will stay to care for any who are arrested but if you can help in any way that does not compromise your safety then please do. (Tom Cuthbert)
