Peace Canvass

Broseley CND made a start on the Peace Canvass during April and plan to resume now the election is over. Its most useful function would seem to be the opportunity to talk to people individually. The overriding impression received by canvassers was of genuine concern about nuclear weapons coupled with ignorance and confusion. People are being bombarded with information and propaganda but many of them either turn off because it is too horrific to contemplate or just end up perplexed by all the contradictory points of view. We encountered very little hostility and most people were prepared to talk about the issues. Many commented that our visit had made them think. Others we managed to reassure about our intentions and the consequences of renouncing nuclear defence. Of the small sample completed, there was a large majority against Cruise and Trident, about 35% wanting to get rid of American bases and 25% for unilateral disarmament. More than half saw it as an important issue in the general election. However, there were many 'don't knows' for every question and many answers which completely

JUMP FOR PEACE

"CND symbol 'could have caused battle" was the headline in the Shropshire Star after the court case concerning the symbol made by members of TANG who sprinkled fertiliser on a T.D.C. grass mound. Despite initially claiming that we had caused Criminal Damage to the mound, the police as prosecution, decided that they would drop the charge allowing us to simply be bound over.

The Star headline was based on the speach made in court by the prosecution who said that making a @symbol could have caused people of a different point of view to "take the law into their own hands". We, they assumed, would fight back leading to a serious breach of the peace which could have been called the "battle of the Carrefour mount".

Dave Hopkins writes that he has done his sponsored parachute jump and raised about £85 for Greenpeace. He says that the experience was memorable, vivid, physically demanding, exhilirating, etc and that jumping backwards from the outside step of an airplane travelling 70m.p.h. at 2000 feet is the perfect cure for constipation. Depending Freedom?

The El Salvador Committee for Human Rights is organising a mass lobby of the American Embassy on the 5th July, opposing the continuation of American military aid to El Salvador.

The International Security and Development Cooperation Act makes this aid conditional on six monthly reports showing that the Salvadorean government is making progress in the fields of human rights and social reform.

I'm prompted to right this after reading some gibberish in the latest issue of Chain Reaction. It seems that there is some suggestion that being a warmonger is synonymous with being male and that nuclear disarmament is a woman's role. I see no sense in taking a moral issue such as disarmament, and making it a feminist issue. I have encountered entrenched attitudes from men and women and Mrs Thatcher, assuming she is human, would appear to be a woman. AFTER THE ELECTION - WHICH WAY AHEAD?

In just three years the peace movement has managed to put the issue of nuclear disarmament firmly on the lips and minds of people in everyday life. While the general election may have been a setback for practical disarmament, it should be seen in the wider context of changes in society.

Never before have so many been elected by so few. The two thirds of people in the UK who did not vote for the government must have some reservations about present life in Britain. The growth of so many social movements in the 70's and 80's indicates this dissatisfaction. For example, movements for peace, women, blacks, ecology, devolution and local democracy. Those movements will not go away simply because of one election : their roots are embedded in society and will

Initial Tasks

Whether or not one adopts these priorities, our initial tasks locally may include:

a) to attempt to undo the harm done to the peace movement on the 'defence of the realm' issue. This may involve campaigning very much on the more immediate weapons of Cruise and Trident for the moment. At the same time, we would need to investigate the non-nuclear defence situation with a view to establishing a practical alternative defence which, in the longer term, would not turn people off 'on the doorstep'.

b) to concentrate on informing 'all sorts of people' but especially younger people who may be despairingly searching for ways that they can turn for a more hopeful future. c) to investigate the problem of jobs related to military spending. If, for example, we are trying to persuade people of the wisdom of non-nuclear defence, it will probably be difficult to also campaign to reduce arms spending in general. However, the subject needs consideration as arms spending is increasingly using scarce resources which are also needed elsewhere.

What Defence Policy?

But why did people not vote for disarmament? Of course, many did especially with a clear majority of Wrekin voters (namely Labour & SDP) voting against Trident. However, Labour party canvassers in the Wrekin found on the doorstep that, of all the issues, Labour's defence policy caused the most uncertainty amongst their own supporters, let alone other people. The deep national and local concern and active protest on Cruise and Trident was largely ignored by all parties. Instead, the image of 'one-sided disarmament' caused voting splits.

Discussion

At national level it seems that 'defence' has been made to equal 'nuclear weapons' alone. So what do we in our local groups and as individuals now do to counteract this nuclear menace? The rest of this article puts forward some broad ideas for discussion, especially for the special TANG meeting on July 5th Tuesday at Dawley Information Centre at 7.30pm. Although we do not expect a definitive blueprint for the next few years to come out of it, it is necessary to review where we are and what we should now do.

Actions for TANG

To carry out these suggested aims, we should perhaps concentrate on :

i) make substantial efforts to increase Chain Reaction circulation, including through articles in the Wrekin Report and elsewhere, especially amongst young people.

ii) to form more local groups, whether formal or informal. Such groups could specialise in certain aspects if so desired.

iii) TANG should be maintained and enhanced to provide links between groups, production of Chain Reaction and co-ordination of area-wide events.

People

Bruce Kent of CND said after the CND rally following the election that "our basic task is still to inform all sorts of people". It was obvious now, he said, that "some things are more possible, immediate priorities than others". These could be Cruise, Trident and the Nuclear Freeze he thought. Polaris was not worth taking on as it would sink anyway.

iv) TANG to design and carry out (with the help of others) specific plans, over a limited time scale, which should result in the achievement of the agreed aims.
